Sad Drowning at Newcastle Monday

Little Arthur Jones Drowned While Bathing.

Arthur Jones, the 14 year old son of Mr. Harry Jones of Newcastle, was the victim of a sad drowning accident on Monday afternoon which marred the observance of Dominion Day. Two others had a narrow escape. With his younger brother and sister, Jones was swimming in the river a few hundred yards below Newcastle. The two ventured out into deep water and Arthur, according to an eye witness, made an attempt to save his brother and sister. He too became exhausted, and although parties saved his brother and sister, he was drowned.

Arthur was a bright young fellow and his death, under such tragic circumstances cast a gloom over the community. The family are grief stricken. His father is engineer in Hickson's mill. His mother, one brother and one sister also survive. The body was found yesterday.

Terrible Accident In Chatham Mill

Andrew Paulin Was Instantly Killed in Snowball Mill.

Another terrible accident occurred at Chatham, last week, when Andrew Paulin aged 16 years was instantly killed while working in the J. B. Snowball Co. mill.

Young Paulin worked near the trimmers' table and his work was to clear away the deal ends that fell from the moving platform. He got on the moving platform for some reason and must have tripped when near one of the revolving trimmers, for he fell directly across one of them and in an instant he was almost cut in two. The saw projects about six inches above the platform and it entered his right side cutting from the backbone more than half way round the abdomen. Death was instantaneous stated Dr. Duffy who was summoned at once by R. A. Snowball and who arrived a few minutes after the accident.

The deceased was a bright boy and a great favorite with all the men, so that the terrible misfortune has cast a gloom over the whole community.

He was a son of Prudenc Paulin of Chatham.

Death of Archbishop O'Connor of Toronto.

Toronto, June 30— Archbishop O'Connor died this morning shortly after five o'clock, at St. Basil's Novitiate. He had been sick for the past three years from Bright's disease, and his end was expected at any time. Archbishop O'Connor came to Toronto from London, when Archbishop Walsh died, and he was Archbishop until the late Archbishop McEvay was appointed in 1908. He retired because of ill health, and was named Archbishop of Laodicea.

Archbishop O'Connor was born at Pickering, Ont., on March 28, 1841, was ordained priest on December 8, 1863, became bishop of London, Ont., on October 19, 1890 and was made Archbishop of Toronto on January 24, 1899.

Rogersville Burglars in meshes of Law

Two Prisoners Admit Their Guilt--Tried at Newcastle.

Two men giving the names of George Anderson, St. John, N. B., and Roy Oakes, Perth, Ont., pleaded guilty before Magistrate Malby at Newcastle Friday last to the robbery of D. J. Buckley's store at Rogersville on Wednesday evening. A large quantity of goods was found on the prisoners.

Clerk of the Peace T. W. Butler asked for adjournment to investigate the characters of the men and sentence was consequently postponed until Thursday morning next.

Mr. Buckley will ask for leniency if the past characters of the men warrant it. Both Anderson and Oakes told hard luck stories and said the robbery was their first offence.

The capture of the men was a clever piece of work on the part of Constable John Bastin and Irene Boudreau, clerk in Buckley's store. The prisoners were seen to enter a barn about a mile from the railway and the constable forced them to surrender at the point of his revolver. In addition to goods a rather crude burglar's outfit was found on the prisoners.

Anderson has been in the vicinity for some time and got dinner from Mr. Buckley on Monday. It is now thought that the men are connected with other robberies.

Constable Bastin who made the arrest is well known here. He is a brother-in-law of Mr. Albert, ferryman.

Canadian Burned at Stake in Mexico

He Would Not Reveal Hiding Place of Money to Bandits.

Shawnee, Oakland, June 30—Robert Swazey, a Canadian, was burned at the stake by Mexican bandits near Fort Sumner, N. M., on June 15, according to a letter received yesterday from Mrs. Emma Bingman, mother-in-law of the dead man. Swazey was killed because he refused to reveal the hiding place of a large amount of money that had been left in his care by a Mexican railroad which employed him, the letter said. Mrs. Bingman has advised the British Government of the case.
