THE BEAVER CAN WORK NOW ONLY AT LOW WATER

Water EMPRESS GOT SCARED **Dredging** in Sand Point Basin is Done—Delegation Will Go to Ottawa Tonight to Ask for the Shift

The dredge Beaver, engaged in clearing Sand Point basin, has now completed all the high water dredging and has yet to do a strip running along almost the whole length near the Sand Point wharves, a stretch of about 300 feet in the centre of the basin and a section near Union street, practically all of which is to be carried on at low water. This means that the Beaver will be idle for fully six hours every day and will get in only about five hours' work in the twenty-four.




