MURDERED FIVE WOMEN AND TWO WEBB HIS WIFE

Alfred Knapp Coolly Confesses i Hamilton, Ohio, That He Killed Them in Response to a Strange Impulse.

Crimes Make Him a Second H. H. Holmes—Doctors Pronounce Him Sane, but a Degenerate of the Most Pronounced Type—His Plea Likely to Be Insanely.

KNAPP'S CONFESSION OF HIS MURDERS.

On January 21, 1884, I killed Emma Littleman, in a lumber yard in Gest street, Cincinnati. On August 1, 1884, I killed May Eckert, in Walnut street, opposite the Young Men's Christian Association, in Cincinnati. On August 7, 1884, I killed my wife, Jennie Connors Knapp, under the canal bridge in Liberty street, Cincinnati, and threw her into the canal. In Indianapolis, in July, 1885, I killed Ida Gebhard. On December 22, 1902, I killed my wife, Annie Knapp, at No. 338 South Fourth street, in Hamilton, and threw her into the river at Lindenwald. This is the truth. ALBERT KNAPP. I make this statement by my own free will, and not by the request of any officer or any one else.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Feb. 27.—Albert Knapp, who was arrested in this city yesterday on the suspicion of having murdered his wife, has confessed to five murders in Hamilton, Ohio. Knapp is considered the most depraved criminal caught in the United States since the hanging of John Dillinger. He is in the Butler county prison, in Hamilton, Ohio. Knapp's confession took place before Mayor Bosch of Hamilton this afternoon. This is the list of his murders, and the Hamilton police believe that there are more to come: Emma Littleman, killed in a Cincinnati lumber yard, January 21, 1884. May Eckert, killed in Jefferson, Ohio, in Columbus, Ohio, one in Joliet, Ill., and one in Michigan City, to which prisoner he was sent from Indiana in 1886 for an assault on Besse Draper, a child.

HIS CONFESSION UNEMOTIONAL. Knapp made his confession deliberately and without emotion, though he did show some when he later spoke of dying in the electric chair. After his confession he admitted he had repeatedly attacked women. He said to Mayor Bosch: "I met the Littleman child in the lumber yard and choked her to death when she made an outcry. "I went into the room with the Eckert girl, sat down with her and attacked her. She cried and I threw a towel and a towel and hurried from the house. "I was mad at my wife, Jennie Connors Knapp, when I killed her. We were walking along Liberty street. I sat her down under the bridge on pretext and choked her to death. I deny that I poisoned her. I never told any one I did. After she was dead I threw the body into the canal. "Ida Gebhard I killed because her memory is not clear as to what I did, and I cannot tell what made me kill the other people. I could not help it. Some kind of a desire to kill took hold of me, and I could not resist the temptation to kill. I am very sorry for my crimes, but I now I hope they will be easy with me." Knapp was contradictory in his statements about the murder of his wife, Emma, for at times he said he and his wife quarreled, and at other times he asserted that he did not know why he killed her, as they had no trouble.

MURDER OF HIS THIRD WIFE.

"Why I killed her I will never know," said he to the mayor. "For what I had no trouble, and I had no reason for what I did. It seemed to me that I was in a sort of daze when I woke up on the morning of Dec. 22. My wife was still asleep. "Without realizing what I was doing or having any reason for it at all, I grabbed her by the throat, my fingers seemed to tighten as I became wide awake, and I choked her harder until finally I saw that she was dead. "Then it came to me that I was in a terrible situation, and I did not know what to do. I finally went to Strauss' shoe store and paid fifteen cents for a large wooden shoe box. I carried the body and at once picked up my wife's head to double the legs under her to get it in. "Then I went to Schollenberger's livery stable and in the center, I drove to the house and tried to lift the box into it. I could not lift it myself, so I went out and called a man who was passing to help me. "We threw the box into the wagon. I did not know where to go, so I went toward the river on the Venice road. When I came to a dinner of willows I decided to stop there and throw the box into the river. I saw a small carrier approaching.

WIFE'S SOON AFTER THE MURDER.

"So I drove away, and when he was out of sight I drove back and threw the box into the sucker hole. Then I went home and sold and gave away my stuff. In a few days I went to

Indianapolis, where, on February 3, I married Miss Gamble."

The Hamilton police got several boats late this afternoon and started down the river in search for the body where Knapp said he threw it. The police will keep their search down the river fifty miles if necessary.

This third wife, who was murdered, became guilty of two barn burnings. When he was convicted for the assault on Besse Draper, he threatened to get even with every one concerned in his conviction.

Former Sheriff Womack, then sheriff, gained his enmity. His barn was recently burned, and several thousand dollars worth of horses and improved cattle perished. Albert Knapp was one of the jurors who convicted him. His barn was burned about six weeks ago. Almost every hour adds to the long list of crimes laid to Knapp.

Knapp made a long statement tonight in prison. He admitted to let his wife to choke them. I could not get when I once began. I never felt any remorse, only a feeling of satisfaction when I killed them. I used my hands in every case, except that of May Eckert. I choked that woman with a towel, but I could have done it with my hands."

EXPERTS PRONOUNCE HIM SANE.

Speaking for the doctors who examined Knapp, Dr. C. N. Easton said today: "Knapp is beyond a doubt a moral pervert, a degenerate of the most pronounced type, but there is no question as to his sanity and legal responsibility. His nervous system is normal, and the reflexes respond normally. The pupils of his eyes are normally susceptible to light and there is no insanity nor epilepsy in his family."

This Knapp will attempt to plead insanity is probable, as he told the doctors and the police that he frequently suffered pains in his head. He said he had been killed by a horse when he was four years old.

Knapp is in mortal terror of mob violence and begs pitifully for protection from the supposed mob. He asked many times about the number of men guarding the jail, how they were armed, and whether the citizens of Hamilton are much prejudiced against him. He appears to realize his condition only at times, though he is never defiant or restive under restraint.

LAMBETH PALACE The Official Residence of the Archbishop of Canterbury.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—The newly appointed Archbishop of Canterbury will soon take up his residence in Lambeth Palace, which is the official residence of the holder of that office.

Entrance to the palace is obtained through the great gateway in Morton's Tower, or "Gateway," as it is commonly called, after the prime minister who always lives in history as "the building archbishop," for he found the palace almost in ruins and restored it. It is one of the finest specimens of the early Tudor style of brick building in existence.

The room on the ground floor of the tower on the right hand is now the porter's lodge, but it was used as a prison, as the other churches needed the heavy iron rings in the walls sufficiently atill, without the names which may still be seen cut into the masonry of the wall.

On the left hand side is the Great Hall, or Juxon's Hall, as it is commonly called, after the archbishop who spent some ten thousand pounds in rebuilding it after the restoration, for it was demolished by Cromwell's soldiers during the desecration of the palace.

POPE LEO XIII. Celebrates 25th Anniversary of His Coronation.

Bishop Casey's Sermon—Brilliant Scenes in Rome—The Church.

The silver jubilee of Pope Leo XIII. was fittingly observed in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception Tuesday forenoon.

Cardinal high mass was sung. His Lordship Bishop Casey, being celebrated, Rev. Fr. Walsh, deacon; Fr. O'Neill, sub-deacon, and Fr. McMurphy, master of ceremonies.

During the offertory Miss Lawlor sang Mercadante's "Salve Maria." Bishop Casey spoke on the life of the pope, whose jubilee was being celebrated. Twenty-five years ago Leo was decorated with the crown of the religious world and has upheld the dignity of his position in a truly Christian manner. As the lion is a king, fearless and watchful, so Leo stands today the king of the religious world, and the greatest pontiff of the Christian faith.

Moses received from God a rod with which he was to lead his people, and which he used to lead them through the wilderness. Leo's mission was to care for the Israelites. The mission of the Christian church today is, immeasurably greater than that assigned to Moses, and in like manner the head of the church has received more powerful weapons than he. He brings to bear the written and spoken teachings of Christ, and with the ever abiding assistance of the Master, leads his people through the wilderness of this world.

The work of the Christian church throughout the world has never so shone as under the guidance of Pope Leo XIII. In all the years of his pontificate, he has given forth to millions of people words of wisdom and instruction which will live for ages. His letters are known wherever the gospel is preached, and have been a great factor in the advancement of the Christian religion.

What Leo's reign has meant during the past twenty-five years, and what it will mean in the future cannot be properly estimated. We marvel at his intellect, marvel at his scholastic attainments, and at the worn and feeble body which supports such a strength.

On this silver jubilee we offer him our salutation. His hand has for twenty-five years guided the ship of the church towards the port of eternal salvation. His letters have left no subject untouched, and will remain to his memory a monument of the truest principles laid down for our guidance. The prayers today from his devoted people are that he will live for many more years, the pride of the church and the worthy captain of millions of Christians throughout the world.

ROME, Mar. 6.—From sunrise today all Rome was in the alert and showed the most unusual animation and interest in the celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the coronation of Pope Leo XIII. This movement was especially noticeable at the large hotels, which were illuminated as though for a ball.

The scene on the piazza of St. Peter's was magnificent. There were assembled many hundreds of troops in various modern uniforms, making a striking contrast with the medieval costumes of the papal guard on duty at the bronze doors of the cathedral.

At the mention of the elevation of the Host a profound silence fell on the assembly. The guards presented arms, the people knelt, where it was possible for them to do so, and from the cupola came the clear thin sounds of silver trumpets.

The pope then administered the papal benediction and retired to a room for rest. The ceremony of the coronation of St. Peter's. Then, addressing Dr. Lapponi, his private physician, the pontiff said:

"You see that after all your warnings I have not been able to do so. What touching ceremony!"

It was calculated that there were about 7,000 people present. There were about 1,000 Americans in the tribunes and the body of the church.

ROME, March 3.—The twenty-fifth anniversary of the coronation of Pope Leo was celebrated today with all the grandeur and impressiveness usual to the high ceremonies of the Catholic church, and amid a display of enthusiasm and emotion on the part of the vast assembly gathered within the walls of St. Peter's, such as vied with the greatest of previous demonstrations of reverence and affection for the aged pontiff.

On the day of the sacred offices in Rome, monasteries, convents, seminaries and also many private houses are illuminated in commemoration of the event. The Trastevere quarter and the Leonine City especially presented a blaze of light, while the general effect was heightened by the burning of Bengal fires throughout the city.

Pope Leo, who supported admirably the fatigue and excitement of today's ceremony, after having retired, rose again from his couch and going to the window of his bedroom gazed for a while upon this scene of illumination.

The view from the Vatican, embracing a stretch of seven miles brilliant with light, was a marvellous one, and Leo exclaimed as he withdrew from the window, "This will, indeed, be a pleasant thing to dream of."

Reminiscences of Life in the French Army in 1870-71

At the end of these few remarks, I should like to be permitted to say a few words in regard to the military life of the French army in 1870-71. It is a life of hardship and privation, but it is also a life of honor and glory.

He was an old African soldier, and it was with him a question of what he could do, but he would not do it. He was a man of honor and a man of courage.

For two hours we sat in silence, about to go to bed. My eyes were closed, but I was not sleeping. I was thinking of the day that I had spent in the trenches.

As he was being taken away from his bed, he said to me, "I am a man of honor, and I will die as a man of honor." He died in the arms of his comrades.

It was a day of great sorrow for us all. We had lost a man who was a true hero. His name was Golek, and he was a man of great courage and honor.

I was taken prisoner at the battle of Sedan, and after spending five months of captivity in the fortress of Metz, I returned to France, and one morning I was shot by the Germans.

On April 12th, 1871, we received from the French government an order to attack and capture the town of Metz. The town was held by the Germans, and it was a difficult task to capture it.
