**GASPE HARBOR MAY BE NEW PORT**  
 Promoters Asking for Assistance to Build Another Railway

Ottawa, Dec. 30.—Promoters of the Canada and Gulf terminal railway claim to have discovered a means of saving miles for shipment to the Canadian seaboard traffic originating on the National Transcontinental Railway. The solution offered is the building of a new port at Gaspé Harbor to be connected with the Intercolonial and the National Transcontinental Railways by the new Canada and Gulf project. The map shows the new line constructed from St. Flavie, on the I. C. R. to Matane with projected extensions east to Gaspé and west to the Transcontinental at St. Elie.

The argument is made that present Canadian Atlantic ports cannot complete with United States ports which are nearer and can offer lower rates, especially when the interest of the Grand Trunk is to route to United States ports. It is suggested that the operation of the Intercolonial could be extended via the Quebec bridge to Winnipeg, with the proposed new outlet at Gaspé, providing a short air red route between Winnipeg and Liverpool. This, it is claimed, would allow as low rates as can be obtained to United States ports and would mean a saving of thirty hours on mails and fast freight. Gaspé is described as the finest natural harbor on the Atlantic seaboard.

**CAMPBELLTON HAS HAD GOOD SUMMER**  
 D. A. Stewart, M. P. P., Says North Shore Town is Growing.

(St. John Standard)

D. A. Stewart, M. P. P., of Campbellton, was in the city yesterday en route to his home from Ottawa. The year just closing, Mr. Stewart said, has been a very prosperous one for the town of Campbellton which is rapidly recovering from the disaster of two years ago. While building operations have not been carried on so extensively as during the previous year, many new buildings have been put up. Business has been exceptionally good during the year, and prospects are bright for the future of the town. Considerable work along the waterfront has been done during the year, and during the twelve months a large amount of dredging has been completed, while the wharves have been undergoing extensive repairs.

An agitation is being carried on for the construction of a bridge across the Restigouche to connect Campbellton with Mission Point, a distance of about 3 quarters of a mile. A delegation of residents of both places visited Ottawa last week and waited upon the minister of public works and Hon. J. D. Hazen in reference to the construction of the bridge, and received assurance that the matter would be given every consideration. There is considerable communication between the two points, and the need of a bridge is becoming more urgent each year with the development of the town of Campbellton and the surrounding district.

The indication in Restigouche for the lumber season are that the cut will be up to last year's, while some of the operators are planning to take out a larger amount this winter.

**INTERESTED IN NEW BRUNSWICK**  
 Vancouver Trust Company Will Help to Boom this Province

**TURKS LOST 75,000 MEN FROM COLERA**  
 New York, Dec. 30.—An least 75,000 Turkish soldiers have died from cholera, according to Frederick Moore, a war correspondent in Constantinople, who arrived here to-day. He painted a gruesome picture of the cholera devastations in the Turkish army. Following the outbreak of disease behind the Turkish works at Tchataldja, he said, about 5,000 Turks died daily.

"On a certain day when I visited San Stefano-camp there were 30,000 stricken men there," said Mr. Moore. "The dying were huddled with the dead to keep warm."

**FORETOLD THE GERMAN PERIL**  
 London, Dec. 30.—Frederick Harrison, the noted historian, and philosopher, appears in the role of a pessimist in an article in the January number of The English Review. Writing of the Mediterranean as a "mere trap" Mr. Harrison says: "The Mediterranean must be given up, stuck and block, and with it, yes, even Gibraltar, Malta, Cyprus, and of course, Egypt. For thirty years I have maintained that Egypt will be our death-trap. It will be our grave if we seek to leave there 10,000, 20,000, or 30,000 good men, whilst we are fighting for our lives in Europe.

Mr. Harrison makes this explanation of his attitude:

"I am," he insisted, "neither an alarmist nor faint of heart. I am an ardent lover of our fatherland and full of confidence in her sons' courage and strength. For forty years now I have foretold the German peril and have denounced the Imperial adventures into which we have been misled, and I challenge my critics to show a point in which, in forty years I have been false to our principle or where my forecast has proved to be wrong."



### NATURAL GAS IN I.C.R. WORKSHOPS

#### Furnished Heat, Light and Power at Big Plant of Government Railway

Moncton, N. B., Dec. 27.—The workshops of the Intercolonial Railway are now piped with natural gas which is being used extensively for the generating of power. Experiments conducted for some time have demonstrated that the natural gas could be used more economically and to better purposes than the gas from the railway plant and this is to be closed down and held in emergency reserve.

The entire railway plant is now supplied with the natural gas which is being used under six large boilers and in all the forges and gas engines as well as for heating purposes and for the generation of electricity for both power and light.

Natural gas is also being used in the general offices and in the station as fuel with the most satisfactory results.

Successful experiments have also been made in car lighting and pipe lines now supply the Pinch gas producing plant and the cars passing through Moncton are charged with natural gas for illumination.

### BULGARIAN CZAR HAS FINE RECORD

#### Brought His Country out of Chaos Into State of Prosperity and Enlightenment

The most outstanding figure among the rulers of the Balkan countries undoubtedly is Ferdinand, of Bulgaria. It is only a little over a quarter of a century since Prince Ferdinand of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha assumed the duties of government in the principality which 21 years later he was to declare a kingdom. It was in July, 1877, that the Bulgarians elected him to the vacant throne, and August 14th, at Tirnovo the ancient capital of the Bulgarian Czar, he took the oath to observe the Constitution of his adopted country. Just a week later he assumed his entry into Sofia, and assumed his new functions as ruler.

The task which lay before the young sovereign was no easy one. It was exactly a year since his predecessor, the gallant Prince Alexander, had been seized in the peace by the troops whom he had led to victory, compelled to sign his abdication, and transported to Russian soil at Rens. Throughout his reign of seven years, Prince Alexander had been confronted with the problem of reconciling the determination of the Bulgarians to assert their independence with the claim of Russia to keep the newly liberated nation in leading-strings. He finally determined to adopt a national policy, and the part which he played in the Eastern Roumelian revolution sealed his fate.

Advised by His Mother  
Prince Ferdinand in his early reign derived inestimable advantage from the counsels of his mother, Princess Clementine, a highly gifted lady, whom Gladstone described as one of the cleverest women in Europe. A daughter of King Louis Philippe of France, the Princess, while still a girl, was accustomed to advise her father on matters of State; she possessed a masculine strength of character, and a statesmanlike perspicacity of judgment, and it was largely owing to her initiative that her son embarked on his perilous adventure, which she was resolved to bring to a successful issue. Through her own or her husband's family she was connected with many of the principal sovereigns of Europe, including Queen Victoria, who was much attached to her; she was acquainted with most of the leading figures in the political world, and she skillfully utilized these relationships and friendships in her son's cause.

Proclamation of Independence  
In 1908 it was widely felt in Bulgaria that the revolution in Turkey afforded a golden opportunity for the achievement of national unity, which the Prince, who noted the symptoms which the Young Turk movement had aroused in Europe, resolved on maintaining a policy of caution. But a slight put upon his representative at Constantinople by the new Turkish Government, and the action of the powers, who insisted that the Bulgarian portion of the Oriental Railway Company's line which had been seized by the Government should be restored to Turkey, produced a feeling of feeling in Bulgaria which could not be ignored, and on October 5, 1908, the Prince proclaimed at Tirnovo the independence of Bulgaria, and assumed the title of Czar of the Bulgarians.

Country Progressive  
The progress of Bulgaria under Ferdinand has been extraordinary. The condition of the people has greatly improved; education has made wonderful strides, and the commercial and industrial development of the country has been equally rapid. The country has been covered with a network of railways, and new ports have been constructed at a heavy outlay. The dynasty is now firmly established, and its position has been further assured by the King's marriage with Princess Eleonora of Reuss-Koebitz, the present Queen, whose beneficent activity in many directions has endeared her to the Bulgarian people.

### TURKISH WORDS

"Sublime Porte" is one of those European expressions for Turkish institutions which are never used by the Turks themselves. The Ottoman Government's official title for itself is Hukümet-i seniyeh, the glorious Government.  
Turks do not speak of "the Sultan," but of the "Padisha," a Persian term meaning the father of monarchs. Turkey is a geographical expression used outside the land it denotes but unknown to those who dwell in it. The Turks talk of Rumelia and Anatolia. The foreign residents may speak of Anatolia, Albania or the Lebanon. They will tell you that they live at Smyrna, Salonica or Beyroust or elsewhere, but the word Turkey never crosses their lips. In the realm itself there is no collective name for the territory of the Sultan.  
Albania, Bulgaria and Roumania, although contiguous to one another, speak three totally different languages. The Bulgarian tongue is that of ancient Russia, and Roumanian resembles that of ancient Rome more closely than modern Italian does. Albania has no marked affinity with any other language, though philologists have discovered in it some slight traces of Pasque and Hungarian influence.

Where Nelson Fought  
There is now a fine field of cotton where over a hundred years ago some of Nelson's ships floated at the battle of the Nile.  
Delegates of the International Cotton Federation in Egypt visited near Aboukir Bay, an estate of 30,000 acres which has been reclaimed from the Mediterranean. Forty years ago the land was covered by a lake, but has now been drained.

### CANADIAN WEST RICH IN FOSSILS

#### One Animal of Bygone Ages Had Two Thousand Teeth, Another a Seven Foot Skull

The richest country in the world is the manner in which Charles H. Sternberg, an explorer engaged by the Canadian government, described western Canada when he arrived in Ottawa with over 20,000 pounds of fossils for the Victoria Memorial museum, which included perfect skeletons of two of the most wonderful and extraordinary animals ever unearthed. One of the skeletons named by Sternberg a duck gill dinosaur, weighed over 6,000 pounds and was 35 feet in length. This animal, Mr. Sternberg explained, lived 3,000,000 years ago, which makes the discovery of the skeleton in perfect order all the more wonderful. Another specimen he discovered, known as the triceratops (three horn trace), had a skull seven feet in length with horns over each eye, and one at the end of the nose. In describing another specimen of the dinosaur, found not very far from the first one, Mr. Sternberg said that he had enough material to complete a mount 40 feet in length. The front part of the mouth of the dinosaur was expanded into a duck bill, and covered with a horn. The teeth, 2,000 in number, were arranged in magazine form, and made a decidedly interesting study.

Mr. Sternberg was enthusiastic in his praise of Alberta and declared that in all his 40 years of exploration he had not lived in a richer country, nor had he ever made a bigger collection of fossils in the same length of time. He spent the greater part of his time in the Red Deer district. In this region he also found remains of lizards of enormous proportions.

### EASY VICTIMS OF CLEVER ROGUES

#### Fortune Telling Fakir Did a Big Business—Clients Were Mostly Women

Something like 1,500 letters containing money and addressed to a certain "Professor," were sent in one batch by the Montreal Post Office to the dead letter department at Ottawa. Most of these letters came from young women in the United States and Canada who desired "inside information," and were willing to pay for it.

The young women wanted to know what their future husbands would look like—whether to marry the tall fair man or the short dark fellow. For the small sum of two dollars the "Professor" guaranteed to wrest the desired information from the stars.

Cash Rolled In  
The professor advertised in a number of magazines and newspapers, and for a time the money just poured in. He was first heard of in St. John, N.B., where the post office authorities quickly put him out of business. Then for a short time he did a thriving business at St. Lambert, Quebec. Finally the professor changed his address to Montreal. About that time the post office authorities in that city became suspicious of him, and the professor in turn became wary and neglected to call for his mail.

Women are the easiest victims for such sharks. They send money to learn needle-work or how to make garments at home. Patent medicine enterprises and matrimonial bureaus are also among the most prolifically employed.

Another Scheme  
Upon the representations of a Florida land company a Montreal man purchased some land in Florida with a view to acquiring a quick and easy fortune raising celery. Investigation of the purchase proved the "city" to be a bogus place twenty or twenty-five miles from the nearest settlement. A specimen of the soil on his land was submitted to the Dominion Experimental Farms at Ottawa. Following is the report the Montrealer received from Ottawa:

"An examination of the sample accompanying your letter shows it to be practically pure sand. It would have no agricultural value and I do not think that any treatment with fertilizer with the view of making it productive, would prove remunerative."

"We close about five or six winders a year," said a post office inspector. "The Canadian laws are becoming so strict that get-rich-quick-brokers are not using the mails to defraud to any great extent now."

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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

The Manse, Jan 2nd, 1913.  
The Editor, Campbellton Graphic.

Dear Sir:

I read with considerable interest the letter that appeared in your last issue advocating license in our town. It will come as a surprise to most of your readers to learn that prosperity and well being depend upon a number of legalised saloons. The "political economist" who penned that letter has come to the conclusion that Bathurst owes its prosperity to bar-rooms. I hope Bathurst people appreciate this explanation. I do not think many will agree with this extraordinary doctrine which even if it were sound would not make the traffic a righteous one. The only class of tradesmen made prosperous by the liquor business is the rum-selling class and their prosperity is at the expense of other and legitimate businesses. Every dollar given to the saloon keeper is a dollar kept from the baker, the butcher, the clothier, the tailor. I said a few minutes ago that the argument even if it were sound would not make the traffic a legitimate one—it is based on that most callous of all doctrines, a doctrine which I am sorry to say is spreading alarmingly in this fair land of ours, that dollars and cents, material prosperity are the chief ends of existence. Men, women and children may suffer and die, but the business of heaping up money must be kept going. In the humble opinion of many, the lives, the welfare, the happiness of men and women are the greatest asset of any nation. The drink traffic is the foe of all these. It debases men, it destroys them physically, it destroys them morally, it is the parent of crime, of insanity and of disease. No reasonably man can deny these facts. Even if it brought millions of dollars into the exchequer of the nation, those dollars would be obtained at too terrible a cost, because gained at the cost of human souls. If your readers believe that a number of licensed houses will bring "prosperity" to our town let them vote for them but let them not complain if the consequences are not to their liking. If in attaining this wondrous "prosperity", their boys are brought home night after night in a state of beastly intoxication, victim of a traffic their parents have pronounced very good, if their daughters marry drunken wretches who drag them round the house by the hair of the head and beat them when the head is befuddled with liquor into a state of insensibility, if the little children are naked and starving, let them not complain. These things are but "trifling" when balanced in the scale against the "prosperity" we hear so much of. Conditions in the town of Campbellton are bad, we all know and deplore that. The citizens themselves are largely to blame—they are apathetic and careless. The point however is this—are we going to call legitimate a traffic which is fundamentally wrong, a traffic which blights ruins and demoralises everybody that it touches. Are we going to be parties to a system which will debauch and degrade our young manhood and womanhood. Father, mother, think of your boys and girls before you vote for legalising this traffic.

The men who are engineering the movement for a return to license claim to be very anxious to decrease the sale of liquor. They say that far more is being sold now than in the days of license. We find on investigation that the prime movers are interested in the business, or have been interested in it. Is it not strange that these men should be so anxious to return to license if more liquor can be sold under prohibition. They must be more unselfish and public-spirited citizens than we have been giving them credit for.

Is it not strange that in circulating their petitions these men will stoop to falsehood? They went to a member of my congregation who has a large family of boys and girls and told him that the Presbyterian Minister was going to sign it. My friend replied that when he saw the Presbyterian Minister's signature he would sign it too. Let us have done with the humbug that is being talked. The men who want this license system most are the men who will make the most money out of it and the men who like to have a drink without having to sneak into an illegal den for it. I have good authority for stating that Campbellton is a better town in every way than it was on the day of license, that there are no more illegal dens in our midst than there were before the passing of this law and that far less liquor is being consumed than in the old days. Those who contradict these facts are doing so to further their own ends and one feels exceedingly sorry that so many good citizens have allowed the wool to be pulled over their eyes. I have no doubt however that when the time for voting comes all good citizens who love their boys and girls, who admire good citizenship, who believe that "whoso shall offend" (canse to stumble) one of these little ones, it were better that a millstone were hanged about his neck and that he were drowned in the depth of the prohibition.

Buffalo, N. Y., Dec. 23.—Within sight of scores of people, a highwayman at 5.15 o'clock this afternoon held up two clerks in the city ticket office of the Grand Trunk Railway and succeeded in getting away with \$327.

Joseph E. Edward, chief clerk, and Harold D. Mowry, a stenographer, were behind the desk when the man walked in. Drawing a revolver, he threatened to kill them if they made an outcry. He then walked behind the counter and ordered Edward to open the cash drawer. When the drawer was opened the stranger gathered up all the bills in sight and fled.

The ticket office is on the ground floor of Elliott Square. The counter where the men stood is visible from both Main street and the court of the big office building.

### WAR AGAINST MORPHINE

#### Craze for Drug Reaches Terrible Proportions in Paris.

Paris, Dec. 23.—A general investigation into the illicit sale of morphine in Paris will be made as a result of the death here yesterday of a young man who recently was appointed professor of French in the Royal College at Budapest. The authorities are convinced that aggressive campaign must be waged in order to combat the growing craze for morphine in Paris.

The vice is said to be at its worst among the young women frequenters of the night cafes and dance halls in the Montmartre district and in the Latin quarter. The police are in possession of astounding statistics relative to the spread of morphine habit. The newspapers claim the craze for the drug has reached terrible proportions in the higher Normal College of which Jean Bourget, who is charged with having hypodermically administered the drug to Bichet, is a student. Bourget is charged with homicide by imprudence. The police will try to close up pharmacies which are selling morphine in violation of the law.






