Manure from the fowl. Lewis Wrigt, the well-known English poultry writer, says that in one instance the droppings of the braken fowls in one night weighed exactly one pound: in another instance, 13 ounces. The average was 3½ ounces per bird, but which was reduced by drying to 1½ ounces. On a basis of one ounce to each fowl, the amount per year will be 22 3-4 pounds, and for a flock of fifry head 1,100 pounds. He pronounces the manure equal to guano, and better in some respects; but counting it as worth \$50 per ton, manure from fifty fowls will be worth \$25 per annum or 50 cents per head. This estimate is not probably any too high, and is worth remembering by those who keep poultry or who propose to do so. It should also be remembered that this estimate is merely for the night droppings, and takes no account of the value of what is made in the day time. Much of the last, no doubt, is lost by exposure, but juwhat is made in the day time.
