Serious Situation in Chili. LONDON, Jan. 23.—A dispatch from enos Ayres states that information has buenos ayres states that information has been received there from Chili to the effect that Valparaiso, Iquique, Coqumbo and Pica continue in a state of blockade. The insurgents are masters of the situation. They have seized Tarapaca, and have sacked all the stores containing, or supposed to contain, arms and ammuni-tion in Valparaiso. The insurgents will consent to allow the port of Valparaiso to be reopened to commerce provided the foreign consuls maintain a neutral attitude. The general opinion throughout Chili, according to the advices received at Buenos Ayres, seems to be that unless President Balmaceda promptly resigns the whole of the military forces of Chili will rise and revolt against his authority. It is added that foreigners residing in Chili are safe from molestation, except the Italian residents, who are accused by the Balmaceda party of having openly and secretly encouraged the revolutionists.

dered a verdict to the effect that the duke died from a bullet wound through his heart, and that he committed suicide while suffering from temporary insanity during an attack of pneumonia. The whole affair is shrouded in mystery. Five days elapsed before the duke's death was registered, and the newspapers join in censuring the attempts of the various public officials concerned to hush the matter up. To such an extent was the policy of secrecy followed that even some of the members of the duke's family were not aware of the real cause of his death until the facts were published in the newspapers. At the inquest it was learned that the duke was entirely alone when he committed suicide, having dismissed his nurse just a moment before firing the fatal buillet.

It was added that a beautiful German governess who had been recently banished from the Belgian court by order of King Leopold had been in some way connected with the leath of Prince Baudouin. Rumor also had it that there had been an intrigue lasting a long Prince Baudouin's Death. there had been an intrigue lasting a long time between the governess and the prince, and the result of their liason is said to have been the birth of a child. In any case, the death of the prince is surrounded with mystery and speculation. Prince Bandouin Leopold Phillippe Marie Charles Antoine, Joseph Louis was the son of the Duke of Flanders, brother of King Leopold, and was born in this city June 3, 1869. THE GODERICH SHOOTING.

noon, by some person or persons to us (the jury) unknown."

An information has been sworn out by Chief Yule against Donald McKinnen, who is at present in jail, charging him with being the perpetrator of the crime.

KILLED HIS FATHER.

Thomas Coultier, Living Near the Soc. Shot by His Son William.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich., Jan. 23.— Thomas Coultier, a well-to-do farmer, liv-ing about ten miles from here, was shot and instantly killed by his son William Wednesinstantly killed by his son William Wednesday. 

NEW BOOKS.

The Origin of the Aryans: An Account of the Pre-historic Ethnology and Civilcation of Europe. By Isaac Taylor, M.A., Litt. D. (The Humboldt Publishing Com pany, 28 La Fayette Place, New York.) The last ten years have seen a revolution in the opinion of scholars as to the region in which the Aryan race originated, and theories which not long ago were universally accepted as the well established onclusions of science now hardly find a defender. In Germany several works have been devoted exclusively to the subject, but this is the first English book which has necessities of the public revenue. 

According to the American Furniture Gazette, a German mechanic has recently patented an invention which has certainly many advantages over the old-fashioned brick of clay, though use may not prove it to be in all respects superior. Comparative Strength of Men and Women.

In Paris a well-known scientist has recently carried out a series of experiments—by means of a specially-devised instrument—which go to show clearly the average comparative strength of the two sexes of humanity. On this strength-testing instrument the palm of the hand is placed, and then the greatest downward pressure and then the greatest downward pressure which the individual can give is exercised which the individual can give is exercised upon it, and the force thus produced is recorded by the usual clockwork device. Fifty robust men, and the same number of healthy women, both belonging to the middle class in society, in age varying from 25 to 45 years, were tested in this way, with the following results:

The strongest man of the company was able to produce with his right hand a pressure equivalent to 85 kilogrammes (a kilogramme is rather more than two pounds), and the weakest to 40 kilogrammes, the average being 56 kilogrammes. Between the strength of the right and the left hands in man there was shown to be on an average a difference of 10 kilogrammes, the former, of course, being the most powerful in every case. One curious result was arrived at—the short men were all very nearly as strong as the tall, the average difference between equal groups being only three kilogrammes.

The force of the strongest women of the 50 who were selected amounted only to 44 kilogrammes, and that of the weakest to 16 kilogrammes, while the average was 33 kilogrammes. The average difference of the power of the right hand ever the left in the women amounted to 5 1-10.

There are also two large circular openings in the upper side of each brick, arranged so as to receive projections on the lower side of the brick that is to be placed above it. One of these projections is hookshaped, which insures a solid hold. A wall of the bricks is very quickly put together.

After the wall is built it is covered with paint. This closes all the cracks, renders the wall can be made highly ornamental. The wall can be made highly ornamental, which is stored as possible.

A wall thus constructed can be taken down or rebuilt as readily as it can be put down or rebuilt as readily as it can be put down or rebuilt as readily as it can be put up. There is no mortar to be removed, as there is when clay bricks are used. A house with such walls is cool in summer and warm in winter, for the large air spaces prevent the passage of heat.

With a supply of such bricks a man can but his own house, and be entirely independent of bricklayers, mortar-mixers and hodearriers. If he does not like his house, he can take it down and build another with the same material, which is always as good as new.



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



Fresh Beef Best.

The beef killed at distant points and carried in refrigerators will not keep when exposed to the air. Why? Because it becomes loaded or covered with the bacteria of decay, and as soon as it gets in the warm sir, i. e., out of the chilling in the refrigerator, these germs begin their work to destroy the meat. There is then a race or atrife between the bacteria and the consumers who will eat it first. In too many cases the invisible bacteria win, and we have to eat, if we eat it, partly rotten beef. We say, eat it not, but get fresh killed. For any policy which separates or destroys docal interest is wrong. The beef monopoly has done this. The foundations of this trade are rotten. Home production is ruined. The butchers are made slaves and condemned serfs. Local trade or exchange is wiped out. How long will it be before the trades-people in our cities and towns will see this? If the farmer cannot produce and sell he cannot buy. If he cannot keep stock his farm will run down. Barrenness will not support trade, but productiveness will. The town man must look ahead and around, and not always inside.—[Farm Journal.

Regularity on the Farm. Systematic feeding and care of every kind is the part of a farmer's capital that Nind is the part of a farmer's capital that makes the best investment. The cows should be fed, milked, and cared for morning, noon and night, with exactitude and on time. No milk is elaborated while cows are chafing and worrying for food and drink. The horses appreciate regularity, and know when feeding time comes. It is at these anxious delays that the stable is marred by pawing, biting and kicking, and irregularity produces had habits and had tempers in otherwise gentle beasts. The ducks, geese, turkeys, chickens, and all living creatures on the farm suffer from irregularity more than can be estimated in the farmer's loss of profit. Regularity brings contentment and thrift to all the live stock, kills the weeds that eat up the crop food, and fills the barns with the best quality of crops, pays off mortgages, replenishes the bank account, dresses the family, educates the children, and imparts tone, energy, respectability and character to all concerned.

Dropping Wool.

A correspondent desires to know what I makes sheep drop their wool in winter sometimes. The most prevalent cause is too warm quarters. I have seen a bunch of sheep shut in a tight room for the purpose of raising winter lambs, and shearing was neglected. By spring more than half of the wool had dropped, and they looked more ragged than the proverbial street arab. Sheep are sensitive to storms and cold winds, and should be protected from them. Sheltered from these is all the housing they require. The coldest nights of winter, if still and it does not anow, they choose to lie out in the open. A shed fully boarded on three sides, and four or five feet up on the other, that there may be no draft of sir, makes the most suitable quarters. Another cause of wool falling is feeding a too heavy grain ration at the commencement of grain feeding. Here great caution should be observed. They should be seasoned into it gradually before full feeding is entered upon.—[Stockman and Farmer. Dropping Wool.

Drinking water is often impure. Many wells drain baruyards and unclean dooryards. The germs of typhoid and other fewers are in this water, and make successful attack on debilitated systems. Cellars are oftentimes dangerous to health. Decaying vegetables should always be taken out of them, as they furnish the location for development of germs. Whitewash is good. Health of farm stock requires warm but well ventilated quarters. All food has an equivalent in work, heat or fat. Stock often becomes debilitated because too much of their food is required to keep up animal heat. Our homes should be well ventilated, but draughts must be avoided. Violent exercise after hearty meals is injurious. Do not worry. The farming class furnishes more than its quota of insane There should be more recreation.
