He left his home a stonemason and returned an eminent statesman and one of her Majesty's most trusted Privy Councilors of the Dominion of Canada, and her first minister for that part of her empire. No wonder his that part of her empire. No wonder his fellow-countrymen in England and Scotland gave him the grand reception they did. On arriving in London he met the leaders of both sides of the Imperial House of Commons, who were deeply impressed with his clear grasp of not only Dominion but Imperial politics. His official business finished, he was invited to Windsor Castle as the guest of her Majesty. He subsequently, with Measrs. Blake and Laurier and Cartwright, it is said, was offered the Order of the Knighthood of St. Michael and St. George, but only the latter accepted, Mr. Mackenzie and the others respectfully declining the great honor, giving as a reason that titles were out of place in a democratic dependency like Canada. After leaving England he turned his steps to his Bonnie Scotland, to the scenes of his youth. A hearty Highland welcome met him on the threshold of Pertheliw-Highlanders and school-fellows in Dunkeld and Logienait were only a part of many banquets, etc., given in his honor. They were such, however, as will live in the memory for years. He received the freedom of the city of Perth and of the towns of Irvine and Dundee, and receptions in Greenock, Ayrshire and other places. 

Tributes to His Memory In the House of Commons.

Feeling Addresses of Sir John Thompson, Mr. Laurier and Hon. David Mills.

OTTAWA, April 20.—In the House yester-day the attendance of members was small, owing to the knowledge that the business would be merely formal previous to ad-journment until after the funeral of the

I agree to the motion.

Mr. Mills (Bothwell)—I beg to make a few observations to the House on the important subject now before us. It was my good fortune, sir, to be intimately acquainted with the late member for East York. I knew him before I became a member of this House. I enjoyed his confidence and his friendship during his public career in Parliament, and I am aure when he ceased to be able to discharge the duties to which he took a prominent part in this House the country felt it sustained a very great loss. I do not think, sir, there has been in my day, nor do I know there was in any earlier period of the history of Canada, a representative of the people in this House who in a larger degree enjoyed their confidence as a man. I am confident of this, sir, that however much those outside of Parliament and those who are representatives in Parliament may have differed from him, no one questioned his high character, his disinterested motives and fidelity to his convictions, whether they were held to be right or wrong. He implicitly believed that that cause which he advocated—were those which, if they could be made successful, would best serve the interests of the people. Mr. Mackenzie, in early life, had not the opportunities of intellectual culture and education that were enjoyed by others, but no squapes he was a man of great natural ability and nothing more. I don't think I ever met one of a more retentive memory, or who was more industrious as a student, than the late member. He had a retentive memory, and there were few things emistrature with which he was not conversant. Few men who sit in this Parliament when he was in the prime of life and are here now that do not remember his extraordinary readiness as a debater, and few will say he ever mingled anything like per sond bitterness with the subject of controvers, however warm he may have espoused the side he believed to be for the best. 


