The Valetta Court Martial.

VALETTA, July 18.—In the court martial which is trying the officers of the battle-ship Victoria, Capt. Bourke resumed his testimony to-day. He sand that he became aware of a collision almost directly the Victoria began to turn. He did not think that Staff-Commander Hawkins-Smith had ever been consulted by Vice-Admiral Tryon in regard to maneuvers; indeed nobody had been consulted. When Vice-Admiral Tryon hoisted his flag on the Victoria it was customary to use a 30 degrees helm. Vice-Admiral Tryon altered this to 28 degrees. Lord Gillford, flag lieutenant of the Mediterranean requadron, testified that after the collision Vice-Admiral Tryon said to him: "It was all my fault." Staff-Commander Hawkins-Smith also gave evidence showing that Vice-Admiral Tryon took upon himself the responsibility for the disaster. The staff commander said that immediately after the Camperdown rammed the Victoria the vice-admiral said to him: "It was entirely my doing. It was entirely my fault."

A LONDON HOLOCAUST.

Disastrous Fire in a Mercantile Section—Lors £1,000,000.

London, July 18.—Lastnight's warehouse fire in the district bounded by Leadenhall streets and Brazemarks and Cammomile streets, burned over an area 500 yards square before the flames were extinguished. Thirty buildings were entirely destroyed. These buildings were occupied by more than twenty-five firms who dealt in stationery, wines, tea, clothing, imported goods, etc. The porters and their families living on the premises had narrow escapes. Many of them rushed to the street in their night dresses. It is expected the loss will reach £1,500,000. The burned district is but a short distance to the eastward of the Bank of England, the Royal Exchange and the Mansion House, the residence of the lord mayor.

GOT A SHAKING UP.

London, July 18.—The Prince of Wales met with an accident last evening which, while it has no serious result, gave him a bad shaking up. While the Prince was riding in his private hansom cab through St. James' street a vehicle that was debouching from King street caused the Prince's driver to swerve sharply in order to avoid a collision with it. The Prince's carriage was being driven at a fair rate of speed, and in swinging out of the way of the vehicle turning the corner it smashed into another hansom cab that was standing In the carriage rank awaiting a customer. The shock of the collision was so violent that the Prince's horse fell and the Prince'himself was dashed against the side of his hansom. He was not at all seriously injured. He alighted from his cab and walked the remsinder of the distance to Marlborough House, his London residence.

Two English companies exploiting the oil have recently acquired tank steamers for exporting it to China, This is interesting to western oil men. Perhaps when our oil territory near the Pacific coast is opened up, we will be able to start up a trans-Pacific trade in the fluid. No one can tell what marvelous results may flow from the development of Canadian re-sources around and beyond the Rockies.

An important judgment affecting the right of police officers to limit their efforts to convict a suspected person of crime was given by Judge Grantham in the British metropolis last week. The wife of a man man named Neel was found murdered. The police accused the hughand. Not a particle of direct evidence was found. No trace smen of the pistol with which the murder strains of the pistol with which the murder strains. was committed was obtained. The police produced a great mass of testimony con-victing the husband of various faults but of no crimes during his past life. The magistrates admitted the irrelevant stuff at the preliminary examination, and con itted him for trial. the Borden mystery, but there were by no means so many suspicious circumstances involving the prisoner. Judge Grantham of the upper court delivered a sweeping scathing rebuke to both the police and the magistrates, and ordered the grand jury to find no bill. The case also clearly defined the right to examine accused persons. The the right to examine accused persons. The court holds that the police have no right to caution a prisoner as to his right to refuse to answer and then to question him. This practice is against the principle of a prisoner's assumed innocence until he is proved guilty. The duty of the police is held to be only to announce to the accused the nature of the charge. Then if any state. ment is volunteered, it is competent evidence at the trial without any warning having been given. This is entirely differ-ant from the policy actually pursued in this and other countries.

CAN the dreaded disease of leprosy be eured? Hitherto it has been believed that once tainted a victim had to suffer till he lied, but if we are to believe the "Vratch," the leading Russlan medical journal, a cure has at length been discovered. In its last ssue this periodical states that the noted Russian physician, Dr. Tomazoli, will shortly give to the world the result of his Dr. H. M. C. shortly give to the world the result of his abort for the last eight or ten years in the thape of a positive cure for leprosy, which has hitherte been thought incurable. It is well known that this disease has played a great role in Increasing the death rate of Russia in the last ten years, although strenuous efforts have been made to subdue it. Hence, in referring to the discovery of Dr. Tomazoli, the Vratch calls it a "heavenly ray of light and hope." The new remedy has already been put to practical use. The principal ingredient is the whey obtained from sheep, which as is well-known, are impervious to attacks of the dreaded disease. The preparation is injected into the muscles by means of a specially constructed needle. In the cases which have already been treated, of which there are seven recorded, it took from two to three weeks to remove all traces of the disease. Six injections pere given to each patient. Among them

PROSPECTS IN BRITAIN.

Mr. Gladstone will put renewed life into his followers by his calm statement of the present position and future prospects of the great progressive party of which he is the head. He is able to point out that by the conciliatory conduct of his followers in all three divisions of the United Kingdom the principle measure of the session-that for confering local self-government on Ireland—will at an early date (before the end of July) be passed by the House of Commons, Then the deck will be cleared for the promotion of those important radical measures, more particularly affect-ing Eugland and Scotland, which were promised in the speech from the throne.

The Grand Old Man will keep faith with the electorate. The people returned him to settle the Irish question so as to conciliate the people of the island and relieve a congested Imperial Parliament of many questions of a purely local interest. That trust has almost been fulfilled, so far as he is concerned. If the House of Lords throws out the measure, so much the worse for the House of Lords. It may be comfelled to pass it in an amended shape that will not be so favorable to the fearful possessors of special privileges.

When the Home Rule Bill passes the Commons, an interesting situation will be developed. This measure has been opposed by a number of former Liberals, who secured their election on the promise that they would be Liberal in everything lse but this one subject. Among them is Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, an ambitious man who seems to be specially displeased because Gladstone has lingered so long on the scene. What are these dissident Liberals, who have been hand-in-glove with the Conservatives in trying to prevent the carrying out of the decree of the majority of the people, to do when the great Liberal measures that are to follow the Home Rule Bill come up? They must either support these reforms, or come cut as Tories, as they virtually have been since 1885. That they would fain remain companions of the aristocratic element which has been using them to promote its; own kinterests is evidenced by the report which comes from Westminster as to their immediate future programme. They will, it is said, resume obstructive tactics when the estimates come to be considered, not because the proposed votes for the public service are unreasonable, but because they hope, through this mans, to delay the introduction of those popular and much-needed reform measures which the Gladstone Gov-ernment is pledged to pass. 



One of California's Wealthlest Men Reduced to Poverty.

One of California's Wealthlest Men Reduced to Poverty.

San Francisco, July 18.—When the Sonoma county supervisors made an order placing Josquin Carrillo on the poor list a striking example of the mutations of fortune in California was afforded. When the board granted Carrillo \$10 a month to keep the wolf from his door in his declining years it was with the knowledge that aid was being extended to one who, less than a half century ago, was one of the richest men in California, a prominent member of one of the proudest Spanish-American families. Josquin is a son of Maria Ygnacia Lopez de Carrillo, who came to what is now Sonoma county in 1838, from San Diego, upon the invitation of Gen. Vallejo. She died in 1849, leaving a estate comprising thousands of acres of rich land. Julio, the oldest son, was a generous man like Vallejo, and gave the property for building a court house at Santa Rosa. Before he died he was glad to accept the position of janitor of this court house at \$25 a month, and after his death the thrifty supervisors cut the pay of his widow, who succeeded to the place, to \$15.

Joaquin not only inherited a part of his mother's estate, but he obtained three square leagues of choice land from Governor Micheltorene, the last Spanish Governor Micheltorene, the last Spanish Governor Micheltorene, the last Spanish Governor Micheltorene, who had the pleasant custom of keeping blank land grants in his deak and filling them out for his favorites. Micheltorene's generosity with these land grants has made his memory revered by California lawyers, who for 30 years gained fat fees from litigation over these Spanish titles. Joaquin added to his other extravagances a passion for the new American game of poker. He fancied he could play it like an expert, and the delusion cost him most of his land. He was a high-roller, and he sometimes lost as much as a half section of fine land during a single night at eards. 


