

By this time it was after 11 o'clock, but Mayor Little was called for by many voices, and he responded, though suffering from a severe cold. He explained at the outset that Dr. English, who had been present earlier in the evening, prepared to give certain information about the hospital bylaw, had been called away to attend a patient, and had requested the speaker to say a few words for him. He also wanted to reply to one or two remarks that had been made. First, he was going to speak of last year's council, and of councils of former years, and felt he could speak more freely of them now, as he was not

a candidate for re-election to next year's council. Much had been said of politics in the council. But if all the stories of the kind were discounted 50 or 75 per cent, people would be nearer the truth. He remembered very few instances where anything against the interest of the city in general had been decided by a party vote. True that in some matters of little importance, politics had figured. It was but to be expected that men who think alike would vote alike on matters of little importance. If a Liberal wanted anything, and the Liberals could give it to him, he would, if as good a man as a Conservative, who was asking for the appointment, very likely get it. If a Conservative wanted favor, and the Conservaties could give it to him, he would, if as good a man as a Liberal who was in competition with him, be granted it. There may have been one or two appointments which had been made on political grounds, but if there were, they were matters of minor importance. A Special Pleader Set Right. Secretary J. W. Foster, of the United States, in his dispatch to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, writes as an aggrieved party, as one whose feeling of regret is very profound that the Government of Canada have not undertaken to put an end to the great wrongs that are being done to his countrymen through the inhuman conduct of our people in the destruction of the seals in Bering Sea.

Mr. Foster's statements are not borne out by the testimony of the experts who say that pelagic sealing has not really diminished the herd, and although it may not be increasing, the killing did not point in the direction great diminution of the seals, but that diminution has been brought about chiefly by the tremendous destruction on the Pribylof Islands since they passed from Russia into United States possession, and by the very large destruction of the herd that is carried on by United States sealers.

Mr. Foster is ready to undertake, if the Canadian Government will consent to prohibit pelagic sealing for twelve months, to enter into negotiations for the settlement of a number of other matters. Now, let us for a moment consider what these other questions are. In the first place, there are the Atlantic fisheries, the fisheries of the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the great lakes, and the fisheries upon the Pacific coast. The fisheries in the Gulf of St. Lawrence are really within Canadian waters, and yet citizens of the United States are permitted to enjoy them in common with those of Canada. The use of these fisheries ought to be carefully regulated by the Canadian Parliament, but the people of the United States wholly regardless of the condition of these fisheries, have had recourse to the nets and explosives which very nearly put an end to the mackerel fisheries in the gulf, which are incomparably of greater value than the seal herd to which the United States have been calling the attention and the pity of the world during the past few years.

Now, if we consider the lake fisheries we will see that the conduct of our neighbors has even been less excusable than in the Gulf of St. Lawence. The Canadian Parliament have made regulations of the fisheries in the great lakes, and the Canadian Government have sought to enforce hem for the preservation of the fish in the great lakes and in the rivers by which they are united. For many years the subject has been pressed apon the attention of the United States Government, and what have they ione? The fisheries in Lake Erie alone are of many times greater value than the seal herd on the Pribylof Islands and the Pacific. What has the United States done towards the preservation of the fisheries in that lake? They have well nigh exterminated the whitefish, and the salmon trout, and other valuable fish found in these waters. The value of the fish caught in Lake Erie alone is out of all proportion greater than the value of the seals on the Pribylof Islands and in the Pacific. These are not to be compared with what they were ten years ago, and although these subjects have been brought to the attention of the American Government very frequently, nothing has been done for their preser-






