Chicago, March 2.—Plans for a raid on the treasurer's office in the city hall, in the expectation of obtaining \$2,000,000 believed to be stored there, were revealed today by confession, the police say, of Henry Emerson.

According to the police, Emerson, who is held in connection with the recent robbery of an Illinois Central Railroad station, said the band fixed a date following the collection of licenses, and were to hold up every person in the office at the points of revolvers, force the elevator man to take them to the basement, and then flee to the street, where automobiles were to be in waiting to rush them away with their loot. The plan failed because more guards were about the city hall on the day fixed than had been expected. The police add that information that "something was to happen at the city hall" resulted in extra guards on the day fixed for the hold-up.



The announcement that Sir George C. Gibbons would accept the presidency was greeted with applause, and such good judgment was revealed by the nominating committee, of which the report was presented by Mrs. A. C. Joseph, that, like the presidency, other offices went by acclamation.

Mrs. H. W. Hill submitted the draft of the constitution, prepared by a committee appointed a week ago, and, with only a minor change, it was indorsed by the association.





Twelve Thousand Dollars Distributed in February.

DONATIONS GO TO OTTAWA

Monies for Local Distribution Are Requisitioned Each Month.

Not one cent of the money collected in a patriotic fund campaign in this city is actually handled by the London Patriotic Fund Association. As soon Patrictic Fund Association. As soon as collected subscriptions are immediately forwarded to Ottawa to the Canadian Patrictic Fund, of which Sir Thomas White is treasurer, the local organization requisitioning each month the amount required to meet allowances to beneficiaries and other expenses.

Not once since affiliated with the Canadian Patriotic Fund in April of 916 has the London association been beliged to make an overdraft over the nonies requisitioned, notwithstanding monies requisitioned, notwithstanding the long list of its beneficiaries. From April, 1916, until the close of February this year, the amount of money administered by the London association has been \$254,286.42. Probably no business firm in the city holds such a record for economic management as the London Patriotic Association. The cost of administration averages just 1.29 per cent of the total turnover, an object lesson in wartime thrift.



GERMANS CANNOT BREAK THROUGH TO PARIS BY APRIL NOR JULY, DECLARES NOTED MILITARY CRITIC

Hindenburg Is Attempting a Gamble Equalled Only by Napoleon's Final Stroke, Which Brought Disaster and Turned His War-Sick People Against Him.

In recent weeks the quiet on the firing line has been in strange contrast to the noise behind, noise chiefly confined to German quarters. How Strange Actors of the Invisible World Are Actually Screened in Comedy and Tragedy

HE microscope has opened to the motion picture camera a new and wonderful and an invisible world, teeming with its myriads of micro organisms cast in comedies, dramas and educational features without end. At first the filming of microscopic life was merely a novelty, but with the ever-increasing interest in popular ceientific films conditions have changed and today the wide presentation of American-made micro-photoplays is ample evidence of unusual success in this particular kind of screen work. Previous to the war the French enjoyed practically a monoply of this class of motion picture photography and thousands of feet of film of wonderful microscopic actors depicting invisible life were shown.

One would suppose that the micro-photoplay studio would be located in the country, with Nature close at hand. As a matter of fact, however, the majority of films of this kind are being made in a glass-encased studio on the roof of a New York city skyscraper, far from all traces of Nature unless it be the sun and clouds above. To this studio are brought the various samples of stagnant water and insects and other subjects to be filmed. They arrive in small vials, test tubes, large bottles and pill boxes; in truth, the transportation problem is so readily solved in the case of these little performers that the studio can be located almost anywhere. That is why it is found in the big city, where other advantages are greatest.

The first qualification of the micro-photoplay director is that he must be a born naturalist; he must not only be intensely interested in all forms of animal life, but must be intimately familiar with the subject. He must be ingenious; for the filming of the little performers calls for no mean ability at times. He must be a skilled photographer; for in the main the work is one of photography. And, of course, he must know what is interesting to the public and know how to tell a story in pictures so that it will be entertaining and instructive. For example, a drop of water taken from a stagnant pond is rich in motion-picture possibilities. In fact, the micro-photoplay has a big field to draw upon, aside from studies of animal life. In chemistry the formation of crystals and other marvels are now revealed. Just as the French have already done, it is possible to show various disease germs and how they affect the human system. The circulation of blood can be filmed, as well as other functions of the human body.

How life in the invisible world is staged in motion picture productions with the aid of the microscope is interestingly described in the Scientific American by Austin C. Lescarboura after a visit to a micro-photoplay studio in New York city, directed by Mr. Horace D. Ashton.

"For some time," writes Mr. Lescarboura, "Mr. Ashton has been filming micro-organisms for the audience. Starting with the simplest form of life, namely, the amoeba or simple cell, he and



"The director, after preparing the microscopic slide in the usual manner and placing it on the stage of the microscope which is then in position on the photographing stand, adjusts his instrument until the desired view is obtained. The slide, of course, is provided with a cover glass so that it can be tilted to any position. Then the microscope is turned horizontally, and its eye-piece and reflecting mirror are removed. The eye-piece is replaced by a motion-picture camera, the lens of which has been removed, while the reflecting mirror is now represented by a powerful lantern fitted with condensers, supplementary condensers and special

"In his work Mr. Ashton makes use of a camthrough which the image can be seen on the film, in greatly magnified form. So by providing his camera with a light-proof hood or cover it is possible for him to watch his subject while the pictures are being made, and to focus at any instant if conditions are altered. What is more, by means of this method it is possible to follow a performer about the slide by the usual movements of the microscope stage, just as the outdoor cameraman can follow a player about the scene by turning the crank of his tripod.

"So sensitive are the animalcules that they can be left only for a short period in the strong light necessary to photograph them. As a general rule a film must be made in from 40 to 50 seconds. and an extension of the period generally results in killing the performer. In one case, however, 200 feet

Obviously, this fact makes for quick action once the actual filming is started, and Mr. Ashton is of the opinion that once he attempts to film still more sensitive micro-organisms it will be necessary to use a shutter in the path of light so as to provide intervals of rest for the subjects. The French in some of their work have made use of a shutter which operates in synchronism with the camera shutter, so that the specimens have intervals of rest instead of being subjected to continuous light.

"Special types of condensers of the liquid variety, making use of different chemicals, have also proved a great help in bettering the photographic conditions and increasing the longevity of the micro-organisms.

"In justice to animalculae as a class be it said that they are usually willing enough to be filmed; for being slow of movement it is a simple matter to keep them in the field of the camera. And even if they should suddenly acquire the wanderlust, their movements can be readily followed about by shifting the stage as already described. But occasionally the director is confronted with a frivolous performer-one that insists on scampering about in the most disconcerting manner.



"While it may he true that a drop of water is not a very great area in the usual sense, when the high power microscope is applied to it the area then corresponds to a pond of respectable size. So when the animalculae decides to saunter off to parts unknown the search is not unlike that of trying to locate a fish in a large pond. Here, however, the director's ingenuity comes into play. For he provides for just such an occasion by keeping on hand a number of thin aluminum strips in which he has punched a square or round hole. By placing an aluminum strip on a slide so as to box in the specimen, he effectively limits the field of operation when the actual filming takes place. No matter where the performer's fancy may take him, he is still within the range of the camera.

"Again, there are times when the anatomy of a specimen is to be filmed. In this case it is essential to have the specimen remain in one position. Some are docile in this respect; others are not. The latter are soon tamed, however, by the resourceful director. He makes use of a special slide which has two glasses, a fixed bottom one and an adjustable top one. The top glass is mounted in a threaded ring which screws on a hollow stud, so that by turning the top glass it is brought closer and closer to the bottom glass, while maintaining at all times the parallel arrangement. The obstreperous performer is placed in this chamber of horrors, and as in the familiar lithographs of bygone melodramas the moving wall gradually closes in upon him. But in this case the movement is stopped when the specimen is slightly squeezed, there being no desire to crush him.

How SPEED of Pitched BASE BALL is

IN his efforts to discover the fundamental laws of human motion, Mr. Frank B. Gilbreth of Providence, R. I., has studied practically every sport and every handicraft. But he studies with the camera-the motion-picture camera-not with the

Since it is necessary to know the time occupied in carrying out a given motion, sometimes to the thousandth of a second, and since camera cranks are never turned unifformly, Mr. Gilbreth has invented a special clock which is photographed with the scene. "It is a very peculiar clock,' says a writer in Popular Science Monthly, "for it has only one hand, which makes six revolutions every second. That clock appears on every film and the position of its hand enables Mr. Gilbreth to determine the speed of a motion down to the one-millionth of an hour. Behind the catcher, a background is hung, ruled off into one-foot

tion can be accurately determined. "In one of Mr. Gilbreth's speed tests of a baseball's flight, Fromme pitched a ball which, including the wind-up, required only .99 second until the batter hit it. The time consumed from the moment that it left the hand of the pitcher until it reached the bat was 0.288 second. The ball therefore traveled 210.07 feet a second, or 2 2-5 miles a minute. Even speeds of 2.8 miles have been recorded. In that case the batter occupied 0.042 second swinging and striking the ball; which means that he began his swing when the ball was 9.24 feet in front of him.

"In another one of Mr. Glibreth's experiments, with White in the box, Mullaney catching, and Snodgrass at second, it required 4.407 seconds to

nitch the ball (including the wind-up) and to re turn it from the batter to second for a put-out. The actual time that elapsed from the moment that the ball left the hand of the pitcher to the moment when it dropped into the glove of the second baseman was 1.697 seconds. The actual time consumed from pitcher to catcher was 0.351 seconda rate of somewhat more than two miles a minute. The catcher recovered to launch the ball at second base in 0.317 second. It required only 0.796 second to throw the ball from catcher to second base -a distance of 129 feet. The record for a 100-yard dash is only 93-5 seconds. No wonder bases are difficult to steal.

"Strange things are revealed by Mr. Gilbreth's camera. So swiftly does the ball travel that it is struck by the bat before the pitcher's foot has risen to its full height from the ground. Some pictures show the ball in the catcher's glove before the batter even began to strike."




