NO FUTURE FOR HORSE INDUSTRY MIDWAY SHOWS MUST WITHOUT RECIPROCITY

be good for the horse industry. But Mr. Beck is a partisan first, and a horseman a long way afterwards. Mr. Beck told the county council of Middlesex at its last meeting that the farmers of Middlesex need not fear reciprocity or anything else if they made the best of their opportunities. He was not expecting an election then. But his party friends at Ottawa invited one, and then invited Mr. Beck to go on the platform and denounce the reciprocity pact as a bad thing for the farmers. Mr. Beck dutifully obeyed,

As to the horse industry, the farmer will prefer the evidence of a man who is a horseman, not a politician. Mr. A. Yeager, of Simcoe, one of the greatest horse breeders and dealers in the country, is out strongly for the pact. He says:

"I have been a breeder all my life, and in 1896, 1897 and 1898 I bought and shipped over 1,100 horses to Montreal, which was our only market. Then they were re-hipped to England, and the breeder was getting for 1,200-pound and 1,400-pound blocks sixty to eighty dollars apiece. The same kind will bring today \$200 to \$250 in the Toronto market, and considerably more in Buffalo. But ship them to Liverpool and the price is \$150, which nets the breeder \$80 or \$90 by the time he pays his freight and commission, and we could not sell 100 horses in 100 days at that price. In other words, that market is gone.

Now take our great Northwest, that is buying our best mares and stallions. With their steam plows and binders, and with the number of horses that they will raise in ten years or less they will not want our horses. Will any sane man tell us where we are

going to sell our horses?
