### BRITISH AND AMERICAN PRESS APPROVE OF GREY'S APPOINTMENT

Peace Conference Is Anxiously Awaiting Decision of British War Department As To W ithdrawal of Troops From the Caucasus Mountains District.

Paris, Aug. 14.—The peace conference is awaiting anxiously the decision of Great Britain as to the withdrawal of British troops from the Caucasus, which it is expected will begin to move homeward tomorrow.

Colonel William Haskell, U.S.A., Allied high commissioner in Armenia, has telegraphed the supreme council that Armenia undoubtedly will starve, and the people be exterminated if the British soldiers are not detained there until others are sent. The supreme council, however, is unable to provide troops. None of the large powers is willing to send soldiers there, and consequently no action has been taken.

Action Is Taken in Accordance With Demands Made by the Members of Peace Conference.

Amsterdam, Aug. 14.—Rumanian troops are about to leave Budapest in accordance with the note sent to Rumania by the peace conference, according to a wireless dispatch received here from Vienna, quoting newspapers of that city:

#### RUMANIANS THREATEN TO STRIP HUNGARY IF FORCED TO LEAVE

Vienna, Tuesday, Aug. 12.-A statement attacking Great Britain and America, demanding that Hungary be united with Rumania under the sovereignty of King Ferdinand, and threatening to strip Hungary if the Rumanian army is forced to withdraw from that country, has been presented to Archduke Joseph, head NEW YORK NEWSPAPERS of the Hungarian Government, by the authorized Rumanian rep- REGARD APPOINTMENT resentative at Budapest, according to dispatches received here.

"There are 250,000 workmen in Budapest who are only waiting for the Rumanians to leave Hungary to immediately take the situation into their own bands, which means the return to Bolshevism. The Hungarian Government cannot depend upon the Entente powers for assistance, for those powers have withdrawn all their troops from Russia, and American is unwilling to send a single soldier.

"The only grudge the Entente has against us is that we refuse to have British and American capital dominate Rumania," the communication says.

# **VISCOUNT GREY** IS APPROVED IN

#### ABILITY RECOGNIZED

London, Aug. 14.-Viscount Grey's acceptance of the appointment of temporary British ambassador to the United States is given warm approval by the press here, which eulogizes his public services, and for the most part regards his appointment as excellent. There is, however, dissatisfied criticism in some quarters, not on the ground of Viscount Grey's fitness or his acceptability to America, but because of the enormous responsibilities attaching to the post at this moment. Doubt is expressed with the naming of a temporary ambassador for this reason.

The Daily News severely scores the government for making an "emergency apointment," adding: "To choose a statesman who for more than two years has been out of touch with active political life is, to say the least, a singular proceeding."



Premier Bauer Is Appointed Imperial German Chancellor-National Assembly Will in Future Bear the Title of the Reichstag-Federal Council Replaces the Federal Commission.

Berlin, Aug. 13.-The new German constitution was promulgated today. President Ebert has appointed Premier Bauer imperial chancellor, and has issued a decree that all public officials and all members of the defence forces shall immediately take the oath under the new constitution.

The National Assembly will henceforth bear the title of the Reichstag, while the Federal Council-the Bundesrath-will re place the federal commission.

SITUATION IS SERIOUS

Reverse Regarded As Severe Blow to Entente Policy in Russia.

London, Aug. 14.—The retreat in the Ural Mountains of the forces of Admiral Kolchak continues, according to news received here today. South of Uralsk, at the southern end of the Urals, it is added, the Bolsheviki have driven the Cossacks back 60 miles, and are endeavoring to separate them from the main body of the Kolchak forces, who are fighting on both sides of the who are fighting on both sides of the trans-Siberian Railway.

East of Chellabinsk, a junction point on the railway, and Shaddrinsk, the Bolsheviki are said to have reached the line of the Miass and Isset Rivers, and captured Tiumen, just east of the Russian Siberian border. The advices add that there is no sign that the Bolshevik advance is likely to be checked.

Serious Blow to Entente.

The Associated Press is informed, however, that the general position of Admiral Kolchak and his government is not believed to be materially weakened by the Bolshevik advance and barring the unexpected collapse of Admiral Kolchak the munitions being sent should arrive in Siberia in time to add in his recovery.

Nevertheless, it is admitted here that the reverses suffered by Admiral Kolchak are a serious blow to the policy of the Entente in Russia.

Winnipeg. Aug. 14.—"It is expected that the proposed airplane flight from Halifax, N. S., to Vancouver, B.C., will be accomplished in 40 hours of actual flying." This was the statement of R. C. Crowe-Swords, publicity agent for the British Columbia Association, which is organizing the trans-Canadian flight, who reached Winnipeg last night on his way to Ottawa, where he has business in connection with his duties as an official of the soldiers' civil re-establishment department in the coast province. The flight, according to Mr. Crowe-Swords, will be started from Halifax about September 20. It is intended to make stops at Toronto or Montreal, Port Arthur, Winnipeg. Calgary and Vernon, and at all the cities at which the aviators call a halt an exhibition of "stunt" flying will be given. The airmen will be Lieut. D. K. Trim, pilot, and Lieut. W. H. Welsh, navigating officer, both of Vancouver. The plane to be used will be a De Haviland four. The main objects of the flight are to demonstrate the commercial possibilities of the aeroplane in Canada, said Mr. Crowe-Swords.

A little better record is, shown this week, as 27 loads have been sold. Before automobiles were used in such great numbers, the weekly consumption of this farm product was 100 loads. Except for a few tons received this week, the C. P. R. barns, where 48 horses are kept, is without hay. At this place four loads are used each week. Private citions are having a harder time getting this horse food than compenies are having.

One north end citizen went out, into the country and hauled a load with his own team. Another has been meeting the loads at the city limits. He did not meet with success, however, for every farmer that he met informed him that his hay had been purchased.

Farmers have their crops stored in the barns, and as they are busy on the farm, they are not bringing the product to the city. Another reason is the scarcity of corn and barley straw. The grass is not said to be in very good condition either.

Only a month ago, new hay was selling at \$16 to \$18 per ton, but today there is a brisk demand for it at \$23 to \$26.



Self-determination of peoples has been the most difficult of all Mr. Wilson's fourteen points. It should be considered that he was speaking with reference to the countries of central Europe, several of which had been trampled on by the Teutons and Magyars. He was concerned with the patent to any American not altogether mossissues of the war between Germany and the Allies, not immediately or at all with matters out- active part in co-operating for the permanent side that contention, e. g., the status of Ulster, or the Philippines, or Egypt, or India. Then, again, he was speaking broadly, knowing certainly all the while that the detailed application of so general a principle must be beset with all sorts of

What is a people or a nation that is to deterby a bare majority? Could a people like the Jews, scattered through many countries, determine its political status as a whole? What are the territorial limits within which a population may be called a people? How far may the need of strategic boundaries be permitted to interfere example, Mr. Wilson has agreed with other statesmen that Poland, Armenia and Serbia are to be guaranteed secure frontiers and economic safeguards, but this necessitates the incorporation with these regions of territory inhabited largely by alien populations. It is unfair to hold President Wilson and other Allied statesmen to a crabbedly literal application of the self-determination point. It cannot be considered alone by itself with respect to the populations rescued from Hohenzollern or Hapsburg or Ottoman tyranny, let alone with respect to the case of Ireland.

It is an endless question whether there are two peoples in Ireland or one, whether there ever was a single united Irish people in Ireland, how long tenure of a land by invaders constitutes an independent right of controlling its political destiny, would Ireland be at peace or like the Kilkenny cats if Ulster were forced to be included in a unitary autonomous or independent Ireland, and so on. In Poland there will be trouble enough with racial and religious minorities, but what can equal the bitterness between Belfast and Cork? This self-determination of peoples is a thorny

It is, then, "an alliance for war," not a league of peace at all. It may be true that the five great powers, including the United States, will dominate the league, but only in an external and negative way, not in the internal affairs of the several countries. To any fair-minded person the obvious intention of the league is not to make war except upon war, and even then not by the exertion of military force, but by economic pressure. To propose an international court for prevention of war without any police force for prevention of war without any police force behind it is childish, and Mr. Lodge knows it as well as any one. There must be a league, and the league can have cohesion and initiative only by a leadership of its principal members. Mr. Lodge wants to put the United States in Mexico's class, outside the league, and since the war, that means outside the pale of civilization.

The conscience of humanity demands a world organization to prevent any recurrence of international warfare, or breach of international law. Since 1914 every self-respecting state must feel itself its brother's keeper, or at least must do all in its power to prevent war being thrust upon its own citizens. The very fact that the United States was fairly forced by the conditions of modern life and warfare into a struggle that did not at all directly concern it should make it covered that his government must take the most security of the future.







# DRIFTED ON AN SIX MONTHS

Members of Stefansson Party Had Remarkable Experience in North.

EDMONTON, Aug. 13 .- Six months drift on an icefloe in the Arctic Sea, cut off from all civilization by miles of deep water, such was the experience of Storker Storkersen, who arrived in the city last night from the great northern waste. Observations of great scientific value were made while the part was on the icefloe, but these will not be fully discussed until Storkersen meets his chief, Vilhjalmar Stefansson, in Banff, next Saturday and prepares his full report.

Stefansson was taken ill at the last moment, and Storkersen, being second in command, was forced to take command of the party and proceed without stefansson. So in the spring of 1918, after all preliminary arrangements had been made, he set out from Boder Island on March 15 with thisten more Sedam. n March 15 with thirteen men, 80 dogs on March 16 with thirteen men, 80 dogs and eight sieds.

The object before the daring little party was to stay for one year, if possible, on an icefoe and drift during this time. They wished to determine the currents, if any, in Beaufort Sea, to take soundings and to discover any new land that might not have been sighted before.


