# SECRETS OF THE KING'S KITCHEN

French Chef Who Prepares Lunch and Dinner for Edward.

London, July 3 .- It is often said that the meals of His Majesty King Edward, when he is at home at one of the royal palaces, are prepared like hose of any other personage of refined taste, wealth and high degree, but this s not strictly true, for a unique and ittle known system obtains in the King's kitchens.

To begin with, the royal chef car-

ries out his duties in an unusual man-ner. This official is a Frenchman of

great experience and a cook of extraordinary capability, who is rewarded for his services with a most liberal yearly salary and with free lodging near the royal palace. It is his business to superintend only the King's lunch and dinner, and he has nothing whatever to do with the breakfast. He arrives at the palace at which the King is resident at about 11 o'clock each day, and forthwith receives from Lord Farguhar, the master of the household, the menus which have been selected for the day. Thereupon he gives the necessary orders for provisions, and remains in the kitchen until lunch has been served. Then he is at liberty to depart for a short period. returning again at 6 o'clock, when he attends to the preparation of the royal dinner. When this is completed he presents a bill for the day's expenses and receives a check for the amount from the treasurer. That is the

the day's cooking so far as he is con-But while he has been at work in the kithchen a really wonderful process of preparation has been carried out. When their majesties are ready for dinner the scene in the kitchen is one of perfect order and readiness. Everything is in its proper place, and while the cold dishes which were prepared during the morning stand on a table, surrounded if necessary by ice, the birds and other such dainties which are to be served up cooked to a second

are ready to hand. At the same moment the hors d'oeuvres are sent forward to an anteroom, which, in the case of Buckingham Palace, is 200 or 300 yards from the kitchen. All the assistants are clad in perfectly spotless linen, they all work by the clock, and each dish is commenced and finished to within a minute of its appointed time. The royal chef walks round and superintends, but his assistants are so well drilled in their respective duties that he seldom needs though here and there he offers a suggestion for the further perfection of some little dainty. ### Death of Dr. Johnston.

The death of Dr. T. G. Johnston, th was a man of popular qualities, bighearted, genial, human. He inherited his father's medical practice, perhaps the largest in the County of Lambton, and devoted himself to his profession with great energy and success for 25 years before he entered Parliament. When the late Judge Lister, who represented West Lambton for many years the Commons was elevated to the ench in 1898, Dr. Johnston's popularty and ability made him the logical candidate of the Liberal party. obeyed the call of public duty at considerable personal sacrifice, being obliged to renounce the greater part of his professional practice. He defeated Mr. Farrell in 1898 by an enormous majority, which was reduced to 89 in the general election of 1900, when present Provincial Treasurer, and the strongest Conservative in the riding. In November last Dr. Johnston had a long lead over his opponent, Mr. Clancy, He as a very useful and painstaking ic loss. A blank will be left also in the social side of parliamentary life. for he was a great favorite among his fellow-members. The people of Lambn county, among whom he labored unselfishly for a life-time, will grieve for one whom they knew to be a friend.

Because they cover the earth with their business as no other corporation does. Banks are local, with agencies abroad, railways are local, trust companies are local, loan companies are local, but life assurance companies have spread out wherever business could be obtained. Had they been confined in their operations as ther corporations have been, their proportions would not have stunned the business world as they have. Some of the brightest men connected with life assurance have been considering the remedy that should be applied. It has been suggested that soliciting business should be stopped when a certain volume was reached, and a limit placed in any event. This would work a partial remedy. Life assurance at present knows no national boundaries. 


