London, Feb. 6.-The latest rumo London, Feb. 6.—The latest rumor regarding Queen Victoria's will is that it bequeaths £140,000 each to the Duke of Connaught, Prince Christian of Schleswig-Holstein, Princess Louise and Princess Beatrice, and includes liberal legacies for the Duchess of Albany and a number of the late Queen's grandchildren. The bulk of her private fortune, 'however, goes to King Edward, and both Balmoral and Osbarne House are given to the King. Two small houses on the Osborne estate are given to 'Princess Beatrice.

### BOERS MAY KAID LORENZO MARQUES

British Hurrying ur -A Heavy Casualty List.

London, Feb. 6.-It is reported in London that the Boers commanded by Blake are threatening Lorenzo Marquez and that Portugal has requested British assistance. It is further asserted that a British squadron has been ordered to Lerenzo Marquez, Later it became known that the British foreign office had received semi official confirmation of the report that the Boers were threatening Lorenzo Marquez and that the local Portuguese authorities were asking for British assistance. It is also reported here that British troops are advancir rapidly towards the Portuguese frontie Col. Brander drove the Boers out

Col. Brander drove the Boers out of Varrhynsdorp, capturing a number of wigons and a quantity of merchandise. All the farms in this region are deserted. The only person found except armed Boers was an Engli h governess on one of the farms.

The Boers captured 200 British when they rushed Modderfontein January 30. The prisoners were subsequently released. Thirty British were killed or wounded. Well, the Province of Ontario replied by prohibiting the export of pine logs, with the result that many Michigan saw mills were closed up for want of pine logs, and many others were moved over to Canada. OUR POULTRY TRADE WITH GREAT BRITAIN.

The development of our poultry trade with Great Britain is evidently beginning to surprise our neighbors, the Americans.

Under the title, "Canadian Poultry in England," the state department at Washington, has issued a consular bulletin which says that it is now about ten years since an attempt was first made to bring Canadian poultry to England for the Christmas market, At that time the facilities for the carriage of perishable goods on board ship were in a very crude state. The birds were packed loose in their feathers in cases, and conveyed in the ship's hold to Liverpool. The journey usually occupied nine or ten days, and, as the birds remained so long in a close atmosphere, they were found to be in very poor and almost unsalable condition on their arrival. (Trade consequently was not good, and the experiment of shipping dead poultry to England was a failure.

Later the cold storage process was tried with great success. The method of business is for the merchant to visit farmers in the autumn and buy the birds, which are delivered, alive on specified dates at the important centres, such as Toronto and Montreal. Then they are killed and plucked and bung for 24 hours in cold chambers. At the end of that time each bird is separately wrapped in parchment paper, and they are packed in cases, each case containing a dozen birds. The cases are conveyed by train to the ports of Portland, Me., St. John, N. B., br to Boston, and placed in cold-air boon companions, only a short pumped into the chambers by day and night, and the temperature is maintained just above freezing point. The birds are never frozen, but kept in a

"At present the sedson for Canadian turkeys in England commences a week before Christmas, and continues until the middle of January, or about a month altogether. The birds are rather larger than the English birds, ranging from about 8 to 30 pounds in weight. The breed is that of the American bronze. As trade develops samller birds will be cultivated, and then Canadian Turkeys may be expected all through the English season. which commences at the beginning of December and continues until the end of March. During the month this year it is estimated that at least 300,-000 Canadian turkeys were shipped to England.

### SUNDAYS AT THE EAU TOO GODLESS

To Suit Judge Houston-He Suggested a Non-denominational

The only objection I have to Ereau," said Judge Houston yesterday morning, "is that there is no Sunday there. The seventh day of the week is no different from any other day. 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


### FARM GATES.

New Idea of the Sort That Can

Gates which can be open wagon are always in demand. most convenient one is shown in the illustration. It has no hinges and does not swing open, but turns on its inner end, which leaves open. The gate should made first, as upon its dimensions depend those of the remainder of the device. Make it of light lumber, on the same plan as any other gate, ex cept that the inner post should be of heavy, hard lumber, say 6 in. wide and 1½ in. thick, and should extend about three-fourths higher than the rest of the gate. Although here is no weight to be supported the gate must have a brace, else it will become twisted in lifting.

Now take the measurement of the diagonal of the gate. At the place where the swing post is set for hinge gates, two posts, 7 in. square, are set about three ft. apart, so that their height will be 3 ft. greatthan the diagonal of the gate. een these posts, at the bottom placed a roller, which must ely so as to produce little fric-The lower inner corner of the ate is fastened to this roller and braced vertically and horizontal-

on both sides. the tops of the posts a two ch board is nailed. To this board hung two stationary pulleys, hout 2 ft. apart. Two and onealf feet further down the posts, on ide opposite the gate, is bolted



a piece of scantling, to which two nore pulleys, also stationary, put the same distance apart as the first two. At a distance of about 20 ft. on both sides of these posts, other posts, only one shown in the illustration, are set, a little lighter than the first, but as high as the second set of pulleys above mentioned. Near the top of each post another pulley is fastened, but to a so that the pulley will be

about 4 in. from the post. Two ropes, heavy enough to lift the weight of the gate, are fastened, one on each side, a few feet from the outer end of the gate and are run over the pulleys as shown in the il-Just below the las the three pulleys on each side, a weight is hung, heavy enough that both weights will in a great measure counterbalance the weight of the Below these weights the ropes extend to the ground.

To open the gate, give a steady downward pull on the rope. This will lift the gate to a point where it will be almost balanced, but momentum will carry it beyond, and it will fall slowly over on its inner end. To close the gate, the operation is repeated on the other side, and the result is the same. If the gate does not fall well in opening, it indicates that the inner post not heavy enough, and weights should be attached at a. If, on the other hand, the gate does not fall well in closing, the weight is too heavy at a, and a part of the post should be sawed off. If it does not fall well, either in opening or clos-ing, the weights on the ropes are too heavy, and should be lightened.





The man on duty was taken unawares, but managed to disarm Mrs. Nation and bolt the door before any of the party could enter. Mrs. Nation afterwards said her friends held her and prevented her going in through the window.

The next place visited was 406 Kansas avenue. The women entered without meeting resistance, but a colored man quickly seized Mrs. Nation and took her hatchet. In the scuffle Mrs. Nation was struck on the right temple by the hatchet, but the blow did not disable her, and she at once seized the hatched carried by Mrs. White. She turned over two large slot ma-chines and smashed the glass in front of each. A large refrigerator and the bar fixtures were quickly demolished.
All the liquors behind the bar were spilled on the floor. With a hatchet Mrs. Nation knocked in the head of a barrel of beer. The beverage spouted out and completely drenched her. At this juncture the colored porter fired his revolver into the ceiling to

frighten the crusaders and attract attention from the outside. Policeman Graham was attracted to the place by the noise and escorted Mrs. Nation to the police station. Here Mrs. Nation and her little band of followers held a short praise meeting

and lectured those in charge of the Mrs. Nation's hearing for the dis-turbance she created yesterday aftermoon, when she attempted to enter a "joint" on East Sixth street, was salled during the morning.

FRIEE-FOR-ALL-FIGHT. Mrs. Nation met her first defeat in her saloon-smashing career Monday afternoon. Later, at the police sta-tion, she laughingly declared that it was by no means her Waterloo, and
