Passes Away Unexpectedly at Hamilton Aged 80 Years. Hamilton, Sept. 7.—Judge Thomas Robertson died unexpectedly yesterday afternoon at his residence on Arkledun avenue. He was 80 years of age. In 1876 he was elected to represent

RIOT OVER THE TREATY

Tokio Shows Anger-Two Killed and 500 Wounded.

Culmination In Japan of Dissatisfaction With the Portsmouth Peace Treaty Which Is Shown In Disorderly Meetings and Very Outspoken Criticism From the Radicals, Including Count Okuma (Progressive).

Tokto, Sept. 7.—Rioting broke out here Tuesday night in connection with the dissatisfaction over the results of the peace settlement. There were several clashes with the police and it is estimated that two were killed and 500 wounded.

The rioting ceased at midnight.

The rioting ceased at midnight. The police stations were the only property destroyed.

Tokio, Sept. 5.—(Delayed in transmission.)—The first turbulence attendant upon the popular anger over the terms of peace arranged with Russia took place to-day. A mass meeting to protest against the action of the Government was called to take place at Hiblya Park, but the metropolitan police closed the gates and attempted to prevent the assemblage of the people. The municipality protested against the action of the police and finally the gates were thrown open and a large crowd gathered and voted in favor of resolutions declaring the nation humiliated and denouncing the terms upon which the treaty of peace was arranged. The crowd was serious in its conduct rather than angry and the police handled it discreetly. The gathering eventually dispersed in an orderly manner.

Later on, however, a crowd attempted to hold a meeting in the Shintomi Theatre and the police dispersed it. A Theatre and the police dispersed it. A portion of the crowd then proceeded to the office of The Kokumin, Shinbun, the Government organ, and a portion of the crowd made a rush at the building, burled stenes and damaged some of the machinery. Several persons were injured during the attack, but the police eventually cleared the streets and arrested a number of rioters.

The disorder is not general and the situation is not serious. Similar meetings have been held at Osaka and Na-

ings have been held at Osaka and Na-goya which in round terms denounced the Government and asked them to re-Count Okuma's Opinion.

Count Okuma's Opinion.

Count Okuma leader of the Progressive party, in discussing the settlement, said he was unable to reconcile himself to the result, because the conditions preventing Russian aggression in Corea and Manchuria were insufficient. "They leave," he said, "a ample root for Russian ambition in the future, The conditions prevailing before the war were liable to repetition at any time.

"Both nations agree to evacuate Manchuria, but if China is unable to maintain order there, Russia will have an opportunity to sow seeds of war instead of removing causes for a future dispute. It leaves them exactly as before hostilities began."

This morning Mr. Fleming received a cheque from the Education Department for \$1,045 for continuation class work done in the Public schools of Kent. In addition the following Government cheques were separately received: Blenheim \$100, Bothwell \$100, Thamesville \$100, Wallaceburg \$200, Dresden \$200 and Tilbury \$50.

The Government also forwards a cheque for \$251.25 to the credit of the rural school libraries of Kent.
The County supplements the Government grant by a like amount and also bestows a money bonus for every student successful in the continuation class examinations.



A Very Exclusive Order.

The Order of the Swan is a unique decoration. It has nothing to do with "Lohengrin," but was founded in 1443 by Elector Frederick II. of Brandenburg, surnamed the "Iron Jawed."
Of all the orders of knighthood this

is most remarkable, inasmuch as only one solitary member in Europe is entitled to wear it, and she is the wife of the reigning Prussian monarch— the German empress. The insignia is very beautiful. It consists of a gold chain set with diamonds, alternated by a ruby heart, to which is suspended medallion of the Madonna and Child and to which in turn is suspended a silver swan surrounded by a ring or frame of exquisite pearls. With this goes a superb star to be worn on the left shoulder.

Should the empress become a widov she would be compelled to relinquish the insignia and her membership of the Swan to the present crown princess. This order has been worn in turn by the wife of every sovereign occupying the throne of Prussia since 1443, and it is an object of intense pride in the royal family.

Lightning as a Rock Driller.

"Lightning, when in the mood, has an ugly habit of drilling," writes an English observer. "It will drill the hardest rock-rock which would turn cold steel-and not only drill, but vitrify it. They have found in Cumber-land channels thirty feet deep and from two to four inches in circum-ference. The interior was hard and glazed where the solid substance had been melted by the stabbing flashes. Artificial experiment has shown that a powerful shock from a battery will vitrify finely powdered glass, but not feldspar or quartz. The lightning, how ever, does it in the manner described. not in one place, but in many, showing that before striking the ground it divided into several branches, strong enough to penetrate and liquely the solid rock."

Hard Headed Moors.

Negro heads are proverbial for solidity, but in this respect they are far excelled by certain Moorish tribes of Morocco, who take a very real pride in the thickness of their skulls. The heads of their boys are kept closely shaven from the time when hair commences to show upon them and are never covered, whatever the weather. 

Moreover, a petition is now in circulation to pave Head street east of Victoria avenue. This will cost the P. M. about \$7,000. about \$7,000,

General Manager Colter and Su-perintendent Pyeatt at a recent conference with Ald. Austin, Dunn and Edmondson, talked over the situation and asked if the Council would change the pavement to some other kind. He would not state what his position would be if the class of pavement were changed, nor would he give any idea of what the road

wanted.

He stated, however, that rather than pay their share of paving east of Victoria avenue the company would tear up its tracks. The great-

would tear up its tracks. The greatest objections to the tearing up of the tracks come, however, from the Canada Flour Mills and the Hadley Company. It is understood, however, that both of these places will be tapped by switches from the electric road.

W. F. Smith is prepared to continue the work of endeavoring to compel the removal of the tracks. He has received instructions from several interested residents to take the necessary steps to prevent the loading or unloading of ears on Kent street.

street. The only authority the road has for being on the street is a short by-law of the city granting them permission to lay their tracks along it to reach the Canada Flour Mills. It would seem possible to repeal this and do away with the nuisance.

King Edward Cuts Some Kissing. Until the assesion of King Edward not only each peeress, but every daughter of a peer, was entitled to a ceremonial kiss from the sovereign on presentation at court, and at Dublin castle, the Viceroy, as Lord Lieutenant of the Monarch, was required by etquette to accord a similar salutation quette to accord a similar salutation to every woman presented, no matter whether young or aged, married or single, homely or beautiful. Fortunately the vast majority of the daughters of Erin are extremely attractive, so that the Lords Lieutenant seldom complained, and it is doubtful whether the reform instituted by Edward VII. in abolishing viceregal osculation at Dublin castle was going to culation at Dublin castle was quite as popular as most of the other innovations which he has inaugurated. He, however, justly took the ground that since he himself had sacrificed the Monarchical prerogative of kissing debutantes at court there was no reason whatsoever why the Viceroy of Ireland should continue to enjoy it on his respect to the continue of the continu it as his representative. It may added that until now the Nationalists have not seen fit to add this measure on his part to the long list of wrongs to which they claim the Emerald Isle has been subjected by the British Crown.

There are certain forms of ceremonial kiss, however, which Edward VII. has not attempted to abolish. Thus, Archbishops and Bishops of the church of England, Ambassadors and Ministers plenipotentiary, Cabinet officers, and the great dignitaries of court and state, kiss his hand at the audience at which he confers upon them their appointment, and the fact that they have "kissed hands on ap-pointment" is always recorded in the royal Court Circular and The London Gazette. Similar homage is paid to Emperor William, to the venerable Francis Joseph of Austria, to the Czars of Russia, to the Sultan of Tur-key, to the Kings of Sweden and Denkey, to the Kings of Sweden and Denmark, to the Sovereigns of Spain and Portugal, and to many of the minor rulers of Germany. Indeed, one of the most picturesque incidents of the ceremony of the accession to the Crown of Emperor William, was when at the close of his first speech from the throne old Prince Bismarck and the still more aged Field Marshal he still more aged Field Marshal Count Moltke, both stepped forward and bowed low to kiss the hand of the young Monarch, whom they had known intimately ever since his earliest infancy.

ASK MACLEAN TO LEAD

Fight Against Salary Grab and Return to Former Indemnity.

Farmers' Association In Session Pass Upon Many Political Subjects -Want Mr. Whitney to Regulate Electric Water Power Rates-Opposed to Higher Tariffs and Endorse Taxation of Railways.

Toronto, Sept. 6.—Representative farmers from all sections of the Province gathered yesterday at Victoria Hall so attend the fourth armual convention of the Farmers' Association and gave their views of various political phases that are affecting this country and adirectly, the farmer.

In the absence of the president, J. Lockie Wilson, who is at present in the Northwest, Vice-President L. E. Annis presided. Discussion of resolutions in their crude form, to be drafted laier, occupied the time of the association at its morning session.

Denounced Salary Grab.

Chief of all matters touched upon by the association was a denunciation of the sessional indemnity grab at Ottawa. This was accorded unanimous condemnation. The subject was introduced by W. C. Good of Brant County, who spoke of the pension grab as being an indication that the servants of the people were becoming their masters. Mr. Beam of Welland stated that no Parliament should have the power to increase the indemnity of its mem-

ing an indication that the servants of the people were becoming their massers. Mr. Beam of Welland stated that no Parliament should have the power to increase the indemnity of its members. Others who spoke on the subject branded it as wholly unjust. It was finally proposed that a resolution be drawn up calling upon W. F. Maclean, member for South York, to take the lead in the House in a movement looking to a return to the old indemnity and a reschiding of the recent bill.

The Electric Problem.

Ontarlo's electric power problem was briefly discussed. It was pointed out that the waterfalls of the Province can be made to develop enough power to operate all factories and all railways; that these powers are practically all in the hands of an few corporations; and that the public interest imperatively demands that the rates which these coiporations may charge for the power supplied by them be regulated by public authority. At the end of the discussion a resolution was adopted calling upon Premier Whitney to take

Opposed to Higher Tariff.

Touching upon the tariff question, the associatic. went on record as being opposed to any increase in the lates. Reductions were advocated if any change at all were made. Preference in trade with Great Britain met with approval. Summed up, the sense of the discussion was to the effect that the association should appear before the tariff commission to oppose any increase in the tariff, to endorse British preference and advocate tariff reduction with any other country that would do likewise.

Taxing Railways.

On the subject of railway taxation, Mr. Beam of Welland began the discussion with a motion to the effect that the association endorse the principles of the Pettynice bill.

cussion with a motion to the effect that the association endorse the principles of the Pettypiece bill, with provision for 85 per cent, of the revenue derived under it going to the municipalities and 15 per cent, to the Province. Another resolution, dealing with railway subsidies, expressed gratification that the late session at Ottawa and Toronto had passed without any railway subsidies, and expressed the hope that this marked the end of an iniquitous system.

A resolution was adopted asking the Ontario Government to pass legislation providing for the payment to the Provincial Treasury of a loyalty on the mineral output of the Province.

The Government will also be asked to so conserve our forest wealth that only such timber as is matured shall be taken, and a continuous supply thus insured.

THE FARMING INTEREST

Gets Very Considerable Attention From the Politicians.

Denutation From the Farmers' Asso ciation Meets Premier Whitney and Outlines. Their Views - Ontarjo's First Minister Concurs With Them On Many Points-Hon. Nelson Monteith Speaks on Farmers' Ideals.

Toronto, Sept. 7.—At noon-vesterday a deputation from the convention, headed by Mr. L. E. Annis, the Vice-President, waited upon Premier Whitney and urged the adoption of legislation along the lines of several of the

resolutions passed.

They were briefly: The abolition of the bonus system to rallways, coupled with an equitable faxation, the control

with an equitable faxation, the control by Government of all water power and electrical rates, the husbanding of the forest reserves and the placing of a royalty on minerals.

The Premier's Reply.

In reply to the deputation, Premier Whitney declared that the views presented were identical with those of the Government. Some effort, the Premier said, should be made to equalize the assessment. The views presented with regard to the control of water power and electric rates were fully in accord regard to the control of water power and electric rates were fully in accord with the views of the Government. Bonusing of railways the Government was directly opposed to, and, continued Mr. Whitney, if the change of Government had been further prolonged there would soon have been no public domain to give away. A money grant might, in exceptional cases, be given, but a land grant, never.

Views on Pettypiece Bill.

The bill proposed by Mr. Pettypiece, he did not regard as binding upon the Government, in that it did not go far enough.

A royalty on minerals was a part of the policy of the Government. The situation in Cobalt was a perplexing one. The interest of the individual ought not alone to be considered. The Province of Ontario ought to get something from the mineral wealth. Continuing, Mr. Whitney said: "I do not think it is right that the me, who find. think it is right that the man who finds think it is right that the man who finds a spot with gold should forthwith take up 40 acres at \$3.50 an acre."

Regarding Referendum.
Touching briefly on the referendum, Mr. Whitney declared that whether the

referendum was or was not a better system than that of Canada, it was antagonistic to British Government and could not be successfully operated un-Canada has representationthrough the Cabinet. In conclusion the Premier expressed his hearty sympathy with the views presented, and his pleasure of meeting with the members. The deputation withdrew after thanking the Premier and the other mem-bers of the Cabinet.

Officers Elected.

At the afternoon session, James Mc-Ewing of West Wellington was select-ed to succeed J. Lockie Wilson as president. Mr. Wilson declined reomination.

The other officers were re-elected by acclamation. They are: Levi Annis, vice-president (Scarboro); J. W. Hyatt (Wentworth) and W. C. Good (Brantford), directors; W. R. Douglas and W. C. Goodfellow, auditors; W. L. Smith,

Ideals were being made for the farmer to work toward, and one great aim was for the farmer to so breed as to get the maximum figure. There was one thing the farmer was not sufficiently alive to, the possibilities of co-operation. Much had been done in this line in the dairy, but more still remained in this, as nother lines.

The speaker referred to Denmark as an example of the carrying out of the co-operative plan. He had noticed that farmers were specializing in certain lines. To some extent this would solve many difficulties. While the west was doing much, it should not be forgotten that Ontario was the banner Province in making wealth along agricultural lines, declared the Minister of Agriculture amid loud applause. Hon, John Dryden made graceful allusions to himself as representing a body that had been and now was not, that had been "destroyed in a day by freaks of the bad peanst." Speaking sariously, he said that he would never lose interest in agriculture and would always do his best to advance the interests that lay close to his heart. If he could not be Minister of Agriculture himself he was glad to know that

so good a man had taken his place. He would be a credit to the office, was the expression of the ex-Minister's

overflowing generosity.

President E. C. Creelman of the Ontario Agriculture College, Guelph, referred to Ontario's great agricultural production of \$250,000,000 yearly and the large proportion expected. Prof. Day also spoke.

He says he did not resign when the last Government was in power in order to make room for a relative, nor had he a relative applying for the position. Dr. Clarke states, furthermore, that the present Government did not insist on his resignation, but that on account of III-health he voluntarily resigned last April, and was asked to remain in insane Asylum, writes stating that some last April, and was asked to remain in office until his successor was appointed. "So far," says Dr. Clarke, "I have received no notice of acceptance of my resignation. I have been treated very considerately by the present Government."
