THE RUSSIAN ELECTIONS.

For the past few weeks one of the strangest and most pitiful elections the world has ever seen has been going on in Russia. An Imperial Ukase, it will be remembered, went forth long since with the order that a National Assembly-the first in the history of oligarchic Russia—is to be held on the 10th of next May, and the assumption was to be inferred that thenceforth Russia would be oligarchic no longer. The Assembly, as thus defined, is to consist of two Houses, the Duma and the Council of the Empire, corresponding rather closely, as drafted, with the British "Commons" and In the latter House it was provided that half of the members should be elected by the people and half appointed by the Czar, the former eligible for nine years, while a third of the number is to be reelected every three years. Each Zemstvo (Elective Provincial Assembly) is empowered to elect one representative to the Council, six being elected by each of the following Synod of the Church, the Universities and Academy of Science, and the

THE PREMIER'S POSITION

London, April 7.—(C. A. P.)—In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. Thomas Cairns (Liberal), in moving the second reading of the diseases of animals act amendment bill, sketched the history of the act of 1896 and the continued hostility that had been shown it by reason of the fact that under its provisions foreign, and especially Canadian, cattle could not be landed alive at our home ports. This bill, he said, did not affect Ireland, yet the Nationalists had announced their intertains.

Symmetry of the Horse An experiment station says that the closer a draft horse is to the ground the better both for service and endurance. 



Pages-Provides For Board of Governors, But Real Power Remains In the Legislature of the People.

Toronto, April 7.-The report of the royal commission appointed by the Ontario Government on Oct. 3, 1905, to enquire into the present condition and needs of Toronto University was laid on the table of the Legislature by the Provincial Secretary yesterday. It is a comprehensive document; comprising sixty printed pages.

In addition to the report, a draft bill, embodying suggested improvements in the system of university management has been handed to the Government,

has been handed to the Government, and if the report meets with the approval of the Cabinet the bill will be given to the House in the shape of a Government measure.

The commission issued in October last authorized J. W. Flavelle, Dr. Goldwin Smith, Sir W. R. Meredith, B. E. Walker, Rev. Canon Cody, Rev. Dr. B. Macdonald and A. H. O. Colquhoun (secretary) to report upon:

Science comes now with a remedy for even this snake bite—simple permanganate of potassium, discovered by Dr. Leonard Rogers and reported by Consul Masterson of Aden. The paper "reports twelve cases of snake bite in which this new remedy was put into practice. In two cases it failed, but these were the cases in which the longest interval had elapsed before the remedy was applied. The persons were bitten during the night and were not treated till the following day, the interval in one case amounting to eleven hours and in the other to nine hours. In seven of the successful cases the snake was killed who ever survived an encounter with successful cases the snake was killed and identified, in five cases it was a cobra and in the other two it was a

viper.
"Of the two fatal cases one was bitten by a cobra, the other by a snake that was not identified. Two of the successful cases were treated by Europeans without any medical training. In three of the successful cases treatment was begun at once, in the remaining seven the interval varied from half an hour to four hours. These results show that even when all the doubtful elements have been excluded or allowed for this method promises to be most efficacious, and a very satisfac-

THE PLANET JUPITER.

There Are Practically No Seasons In This Distant World, Taking the earth's mean distance from the sun at 92,796,950 miles, the mean distance of Jupiter from the sun will be 482,803,970 miles. The eccentricity of its elliptical orbit being .04825, its distance from the sun at perihelion is 459,507,760 miles and at aphelion 506,100,180 miles. Between its greatest and least distances, therefore, there is a difference of 46,592,420 miles, or about one-half the earth's mean distance from the sun. The inclination of Jupiter's orbit to the plane of the ecliptic being only 1 degree 18 minutes 41 seconds or less than that of any of the other large planets with the exception of Uranus, the planet never departs much from the ecliptic, and hence it was called by the ancients the "ecliptic planet." Its period of revolution round the sun is 11 years 314.8 days.

The inclination of its axis of rotation being nearly at right angles to the plane of its orbit, there are practically no seasons in this distant world, and the only variation in the heat and light at any point on its surface would be that due to the comparatively small variation in its distance from the sun referred to above. Its mean distance from the sun being 5.2028 times the earth's mean distance from the sun, it follows that the heat and light received by Jupiter are 27 times (5.2 squared) less than the earth receives. The amount of heat received from the sun by this planet is very small, and were it constituted like the earth its surface should be perpetually covered by frost and snow. Far from this being the case, the telescope shows its atmosphere to be in a state of constant

and wonderful change. These extraordinary changes cannot possibly be due to the solar heat, and they have suggested the idea that the planet may perhaps be in a redhot than that of the sun—are facts in favor
