*JANUARY SESSION.*

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WELLAND, Jan. 27th, 1885.

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BY - L A W S.

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*BY-LAW NO. 485.*

*For the Appointment of High School Trustees.*

*A BY-LAW for the Appointment of High School Trustees.*

January 28th, 1885.

WHEREAS, it is necessary for the Municipality of the County of Welland to appoint High School Trustees for each of the High Schools within incorporated towns in said county, to fill the vacancies about to occur in the Boards of such towns.

And whereas it is necessary for said municipality to appoint two High School Trustees for High Schools situated elsewhere than in incorporated towns to fill the vacancies to occur in such Boards.

Therefore, be it enacted, and it is hereby enacted, that for the High School situate in the Town of Welland, D. McEwing shall be High School Trustee; that for the High School situate in the Town of Thorold, Andrew Hardie shall be High School Trustee, and that for the High School situate in the Township of Stamford, Rev. R. Atchinson and Egerton Morden shall be High School Trustees.

That in their opinion exemptions from taxation should be solely confined to property used and occupied for religious, charitable, educational or public purposes, viz.: places of worship, public schools and colleges, cemeteries, hospitals and asylums, and similar institutions, and such lands as may be actually required, and are occupied for building purposes by the same, and all property belonging to the Imperial, Dominion or Provincial Governments, and all lands and property used or required for City, County, or other municipal purposes.

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## 7—ACCOMMODATIONS.

The accommodations, both in regard to the school houses and out premises, and the furniture and equipments are, in the majority of schools, good, and in a large proportion of them, excellent. Improvements, however, are steadily going on, as in some cases it is desirable that the schools should be placed upon a better and more satisfactory footing, while it is necessary that the school houses and out premises should be adequate, it is also important that the furniture should be suitable, and that ample equipments should be provided.

The furniture with which most of our schools is supplied, and which is gradually taking the place of the pine furniture still remaining, is of the most approved kind, being comfortable and convenient, and at the same time such as to contribute to the neatness and tastefulness of the school room.

In regard to equipments, however, it is commonly thought that one good black board is sufficient for all requirements, but in some of our best schools black boards are placed in all available places on the walls, and while the expense of providing them is comparatively small, they are found to be of great practical utility in teaching.

Most of the subjects can be better taught by the use of the black board than without it, and it is sometimes advantageous to allow the work done on the black board, or the questions placed there to remain, while other work is going on, or to have a whole class work upon the blackboard at the same time, and for these purposes ample space is required.

So useful an equipment as the blackboard, should not only be ample, but also of the best description. The common wall plastering which is often used for the purpose, is not sufficiently substantial and durable, and while wood answers a good purpose, blackboard cement forms one which is not only durable, but also free from the joints of a wooden one, and upon which work can be the most easily and neatly performed.

## 8—CONDITIONS OF SCHOOL ROOMS AND PREMISES.

In most of the schools the endeavors to secure cleanliness, neatness and order in the school rooms and premises, have been successful in some cases, however, the custom prevalent during the earlier history of our schools of relegating the work of scrubbing, sweeping,

dusting, &c., to the teacher and pupils has not yet altogether died out. Economical considerations seem to cause a reluctance to yield to more recent legislation, requiring the Trustees to make suitable provision for this purpose, and as a result, longer intervals sometimes occur between the times of scrubbing, sweeping, &c., than should be the case if neatness, cleanliness and tidiness are to be preserved.

It is important, however, that educational institutions and their surroundings should be in all respects unexceptionable.

The cultivation of house plants, as a means of rendering the school room pleasant and attractive, though hardly yet general, is becoming more so, and attention is also given to the planting of shade trees, with a view to improving the appearance of the premises, and adding to the comfort of the pupils in hot weather.

Although great credit is due to many sections for the excellent accommodations they have provided, some of which are kept in a very satisfactory condition.

The Niagara Falls South public school affords a model not only as to the character of the accommodations, but also as to the cleanliness, neatness and taste displayed, both within doors and outside, and although we are able to boast of a number of excellent teachers, there is an appropriateness in having the Niagara Falls South Public School under the arrangement of the excellent teacher, who has for so many years been in charge.

#### 9—LIGHTING, HEATING AND VENTILATION.

In the construction of the school houses, the principal of admitting light into the school room from the two opposite sides, only has in some instances been overlooked; but by closing up windows cross lights have been to some extent avoided, and in the matter of seating, such arrangements have been effected as enable the pupils in almost every case, to sit facing a blackboard.

As to heating, the arrangements are generally satisfactory. In some schools coal is used, and when the stoves are properly managed, the school rooms are always comfortably warm, but in most of the schools wood is used. In the Niagara Falls South School hot water is employed, which affords an even temperature throughout, and is conducive to a pleasant and healthy state of the atmosphere.

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The ventilation of the school rooms is generally effected by keeping windows a little lowered, care being taken to prevent cold blasts from falling upon the pupil.

#### 10—SUPPLY OF TEACHERS.

The supply of teachers during the year has scarcely been equal to the demand, even after extending an unusual number of certificates. The law authorizing such extensions has proved highly advantageous, not only in giving elasticity to the school system, but also in enabling Trustees to continue the services of efficient teachers, and avoid the prejudicial effects of a frequent change.

Moreover, a teacher of three years' experience is able to accomplish more in a given time than a novice, and by extending certificates a staff of experienced teachers can better be secured.

#### 11—OPENING AND CLOSING EXERCISES.

With very rare exceptions, the schools are opened with prayer, or with reading the Scriptures and prayers, and in some of the schools, singing also forms one of the opening exercises. The closing exercises is generally prayer.

#### 12—ORDER, DISCIPLINE AND PROFICIENCY.

The order maintained in the schools is usually good, and the demeanor of the pupils respectful. The rewards for recitation, conduct and punctuality are merit marks, merit cards change of places in the class, inscribing the names on the honor roll, and in a few instances prizes.

In carrying out discipline the usual punishments are demerit marks, detention standing on the floor and corporal punishment, suspension or expulsion is very rarely resorted to.

In regard to the state of proficiency while in our best schools, a highly creditable degree is attained to in the different subjects taught, in the majority of the schools, although a uniformly good standing in all subjects can scarcely be expected, substantial progress has been made.

#### 13—PROGRAMME OF STUDIES.

The essential subjects to which attention has hitherto been chiefly directed still hold a prominent place in the programme, but drawing

and literature will hereafter require more special attention, as greater proficiency in those subjects will now be exacted for admission to High Schools.

Marks will be awarded in drawing, both for work done at the examination and for the proficiency exhibited in the candidate's drawing book.

In literature, candidates will be expected to be able to quote from memory, passages of special excellence from the selections from the fourth reader, to show that they have studied the lessons thoughtfully and entered into the spirit of them; to illustrate and show the appropriateness of important words and phrases; to explain allusions and to paraphrase difficult passages so as to show the meaning clearly. Such an acquaintance with selections from the best authors as is now contemplated can hardly fail to be beneficial in its results and to promote improvement in taste, in sentiment, and in feeling.

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## APPENDIX C.

### REPORT OF COUNTY JUDGE *RE* GAOL SURGEON.

*To the Warden and Municipal Council of the County of Welland :*

In the matter of Doctor J. W. Schooley, Surgeon of the Gaol of the County of Welland, and of Sec. 480 of "The Consolidated Municipal Act, 1883."

I have to report that in pursuance of the resolution of the County Council passed on the 7th November last, I proceeded to investigate the charges against the Gaol Surgeon specified in that resolution.

The charges were the following, viz :

First—Gross and continued neglect in attendance as Gaol Surgeon on the prisoners confined in the gaol for months prior to his suspension.

Second—Gross and continued neglect in attendance on the families of the gaoler and turnkey.

Third—Using grossly and abusive language of the Sheriff.

Fourth—Malicious mutilation of the Gaol Surgeon's book belonging to the office.

Fifth—General irregularities in performing the duties of his office.

The gaoler was suspended by the Sheriff on the 18th August last.

As to the first charge: It was urged that (1) Between the 11th June, 1883, and the 17th August, 1884, Dr. Schooley failed to visit the gaol during a number of periods exceeding four days each, such periods being 34 in number, and varying from 5 to 14 days, and the prisoners confined numbering from 3 to 14. It is not stated that any of them required medical attendance, and (2)

That he failed to visit when required to do so, the following prisoners then ill, viz.: Frederick Barber, George Offspring, John McQuinn and Mrs. Oille.

As to (1) I find that Dr. Schooley was not in attendance on the days mentioned, but I am not prepared to say that such non attendance constituted acts of "Gross Neglect," as charged. Leaving out of the question the cases of Barber, Offspring, McQuinn and Oille, which I will deal with separately, it is not shown that he had knowledge of, or was notified by the gaol officials of existing cases of illness, requiring immediate attention, and failed to attend to them. It is not specified in the prison regulations that any daily or other periodical attendance is necessary except under Rule 34, and several others, none of which, however, touch this allegation, and no satisfactory evidence was given of usage, except in cases of actual illness requiring attention.

As to the cases under (2), I find that Barber and McQuinn were both afflicted with incurable diseases, and could not be relieved in any way, and that medical attendance was unnecessary in their cases although the Doctor did on various occasions visit and prescribe for them.

But that Dr. Schooley, although notified between the 6th and 14th January, 1884, to attend George Offspring, and between the 6th and 12th August, 1884, to attend Mrs. Oille, both of whom were ill, and required medical attendance, failed to do so.

It is however but justice to Dr. Schooley, to say in reference to the case of Offspring, that he was away from home at the time of the neglect complained of, or at least for part of the time, and engaged in professional duties during the remainder of it, and his partner, Dr. Montague, a physician in good standing, offered to attend in his stead, but was informed by the acting gaoler that he would not be

permitted to do so. In reference to the case of Mrs. Oille, I think Dr. Schooley was either out of Welland, or professionally engaged when notice was left at his office to attend. His partner, Dr. Carrol, was in the office at the time, and I believe would have attended on behalf of Dr. Schooley had it not been understood and believed that no partner of Dr. Schooley would be accepted at the gaol as a substitute. It is unfortunately a fact that the relations between Dr. Schooley of the one part, and the Sheriff and the present turnkey of the other one, were of the most antagonistic character. I do not know who is to blame for the acrimonious feeling between the parties.

It was not alleged that there was any neglect of the turnkey's family, but it was urged that there had been a failure to attend a child of the gaoler, Mr. Coulson, who was ill.

I think the latter complaint was based upon a misconception on the part of both the gaoler and the Gaol Surgeon. The latter had ordered a bottle of medicine similar to some he had before prescribed for the gaoler's child to be sent to the gaol office from the druggist. The first bottle had been labelled with directions as to the manner and quantities in which the contents were to be administered; the last one was not so labelled. It appears to me that the gaoler imagined the doctor would prescribe the dose to be taken from the last bottle, while the doctor supposed the instructions given in the first instance would be followed without any further directions from him. The last bottle was not used, and the gaoler called in another physician without going to see the doctor about the matter.

I do not find that this charge is substantiated.

As to the third charge: I find, and it has not been denied, that about the 17th of January last, in the gaoler's office, Dr. Schooley told the turnkey, in the presence of the assistant turnkey, that the sheriff was not fit for his position, the only thing he was qualified for, being for carrying paper for closet use at a second-class hotel. I cannot well conceive any language grosser or more abusive than that, and find that charge sustained.

As to the fourth charge: The Gaol Surgeon's book is one of the records of the gaol. Dr. Burgar was called in to visit and prescribe for the prisoners Offspring and Oille in the absence of Dr. Schooley, and made entries in the book in question—first on the 11th of August, 1884, and again on the 16th of the same month. Dr.

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Schooley called soon after each entry, and on each occasion tore out of the book a whole page, containing not only the entries made by Dr. Burgar, but some made by himself in reference to other prisoners. I think he was actuated more by anger and annoyance at the entries in the book by Dr. Burgar, and the latter being called to the gaol and told to continue to treat prisoners, than by a desire to injure the book. However, the book was not his—it was a public record, and in mutilating it as he did he committed an unlawful act. I find, therefore, that he unlawfully mutilated the book.

As to the fifth charge: The only irregularities shewn were those above mentioned.

The petition of the Municipal Corporation of the County of

HUMBLY SHEWETH :

That your petitioners are impressed with the urgent necessity in the public interest of an Act being passed by your Honorable Body, providing for the regulation, to a certain extent, of heavy traffic over all public roads and highways within this Province, by requiring a uniform width of tires on wagons and other wheeled vehicles to be used on all such roads and highways.

That the tires at present in general use are one inch and three-quarters wide. This in your petitioners' opinion is entirely too narrow in the case of heavily laden vehicles, especially when the roads are in

a soft condition, the tires cutting into and destroying the road beds, thereby increasing the difficulties, and compelling the use of more draught power in general road traffic, and adding largely to the expense of road work and repairs to highways in all parts of the Province.

That any Legislative measure which will provide a fair and just remedy for this state of things will be a great relief to municipal rate-payers, and to all others interested in our public roads being kept in proper condition and repair, and a great boon to the people of the Province generally, and your petitioners pray that any such measure which may be submitted to your Honorable Body will receive the most favorable consideration, and with your advice and consent be passed into law.

That in the opinion of your petitioners, any Act for this purpose should provide that within a reasonable period after its enactment, the width of tires on wagons, drays, and all other wheeled vehicles used on any of the public roads or highways within the said Province, and carrying a load of two thousand or two thousand five hundred pounds and upwards, shall not be less than three and a half inches wide, and that any person or persons violating the provisions of the Act shall, upon conviction, be liable to the payment of a reasonable fine and costs, or to such other punishment, for enforcing the provisions of this Act, as may seem just and proper.

PETITION *RE* HUMBERSTONE FERRY.

*To the Honorable, the Minister of Railways and Canals for the Dominion of Canada, Ottawa:—*

The petition of the Municipality of the County of Welland  
HUMBLY SHEWETH :

That at present there exists a Ferry at the fourth concession of the Township of Humberstone, across the Welland Canal, which is in its present condition inadequate, dangerous and annoying to the travelling public, who are obliged to use it from the fact that the approaches on either side are so steep that the lives of both man and beast are endangered in attempting to cross,

And whereas, a number of accidents have already occurred ; among the number are the following : In December, 1883, John Roach had a horse killed ; in the Fall of 1881, R. Shekleton and brother upset their top buggy, were thrown out and considerably injured. John Leech was also thrown out of his vehicle and very seriously injured, which has resulted in an arbitration with the Government to recover for damages sustained, and is still unsettled, besides innumerable accidents of minor importance.

Your Petitioners therefore pray that the Government will cause the banks on both sides of the Ferry to be levelled, and the approaches thereto put in a condition that will insure safety to those persons who have occasion to cross in the said Ferry.

#### PETITION OF COUNTY OF WELLAND.

Praying that the House will take into its favorable consideration any measure having for its object the simplification of the Land Laws, and for the introduction of the Torrens System of Land Transfer.

*To the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario :*

The Petition of the County Council of the County of Welland

HUMBLY SHEWETH :

That your Petitioners are desirous that some simple and inexpensive system of Land Transfer should be adopted in this Province, whereby land-holders may be able to deal with their lands with great facility, and may not be subject to the delays and expenses which are common under the present system.

That the present system of Land Transfer is objectionable on the following grounds :

First—It is expensive ; and as the number of transactions increase, expense will increase also.

Second—It frequently causes serious delays, loss and disappointment to property holders.

Third—It is uncertain ; land-owners having no guarantee of the soundness of their titles.

Fourth—It is complex; and by the increase in the number of registries, the investigation of title is constantly becoming more difficult and complicated.

That your Petitioners have been informed that for the last twenty-five years there has been in operation in Australia a system of Land Transfer known as "The Torrens System," whereby titles are rendered indefeasible, and as good as if held directly by patent from the Crown; and land has been made as easily transferable as a share in a bank or incorporated company.

That your Petitioners are most desirous that a similar system be introduced into this Province as speedily as possible.

Your petitioners therefore pray:

That your Honorable House will be pleased to take into your favorable consideration any measure having for its object the simplification of the Laws for the transfer of Land; and if it shall be found that the Torrens System has proved successful in Australia, to adopt the same to the requirements of this Province.

And further, that such amendments be made in the Laws respecting Real Estate, and the tenure thereof, as may be necessary to secure the effective administration of the proposed new system.

#### MEMORIAL. *RE* EXEMPTIONS.

*To the Legislative Assembly for the Province of Ontario, in Parliament Assembled:*

The Memorial of the County of Welland

HUMBLY SHEWETH:

That in the opinion of the Council of the County of Welland, the stock of all incorporated bodies ought to be assessed at its cash value against the individuals owning the same, who are residents of this

Province, and when held by individuals residing in a foreign country, in another Province, against the company at its chief office or offices in this Province.

That the land used or occupied for railroad purposes should be assessed at the actual value which it has reached by reason of the use to which it is put.

That all incomes exceeding four hundred dollars derived from any trade, profession or employment, from any office in the service of any municipality, or in that of the Dominion Government or Legislative Assembly, or from capital invested in any foreign country or in any business, the capital in trade of which has not been already assessed, should be assessed in the municipality in which the person deriving the same, resides.

That exemptions from taxation should be solely confined to property used and occupied for religious, charitable, educational or public purposes, viz.: places of worship, public schools and colleges, cemeteries, hospitals and asylums, and similar institutions, and such lands as may be actually required, and are occupied for building purposes by the same, and all property belonging to the Imperial Dominion or Provincial Governments, and all land and property used or required for city, county, or other municipal purposes.
