

Annual Meeting of the Dominion Organiza-tion-A stirring Address. The Dominion Grange met Saturday morn-ing in twelfth annual session, in Temperance Hall. Twelve delegates, eight from Ontario and four from the Maritime Provinces were present, in addition to the officers. W. M. Robt, Wilkie delivered his annual address, in which it was stated that the andiand both ess, in which it was stated that the condi tion of farmers is not so easy as represented. 


