

Well known Canadian broadcast news personality Mike Duffy led off the first installment of the Campus Entertainment speaker series last Wednesday at MacLaggan Hall.

Duffy drew on his extensive experience in journalism and not just a little humour to host discussion on various topics, from free trade and federal elections to his most embarassing moment. The topic of discussion was very much in the control of the audience of approximately fifty. They kept Mr. Duffy talking for about two hours with many interesting and varied questions.

The federal election was a prominent topic, about which Duffy stressed his feeling that this is the most exciting and important time in Canadian politics in the past twenty-five years: "If we leave this election to bureaucrats and single issue groups we may wake up in twenty years to find a country we don't like very much, and we won't have anyone to blame but ourselves.'

### **SMARTT PACC** Program a Success

Smart Pacc (Student Managed Alcohol Response Team) is a program designed to make particularly students, freshmen, conscious of their drinking habits during their academic life.

"It is not an anti-alcohol program" claims Marc Braithwaite, instead it is a program designed to "hopefully influence attitude change" in drinking.

The program has been in effect for two years, and at this time is "in a limbo stage" because of financial difficulties says Braithwaite. It has completed the initial two stages which included the UNB orientation/Smart Pacc tape, and campus awareness campaign. The third phase of the program is to continue alcohol awareness throughout the year and sponsor different events on campus.

Several different programs similar to Smart Pacc have done quite well across Canada. In fact, the program has been presented to universities in the United States and many of these universities are more than willing to finance such a program. "Ironically", says Braithwaite,"the program seems more popular externally than internally."

Braithwaite hopes the program can continue to reinforce its message to drink responsibly, but without the proper funding, the future looks

**Brad Woodside Running for Liberal Party**

What are Mr. Woodside's reasons for desiring to run in this federal election? "One of the things concerning me greatly is the Free Trade issue." And, he says, "I would like to see us solve the problem of the Trans Canada highway and its upgrading." Also looking at the past four years with the Prime Minister and seeing the "scandals that have taken place, the broken promises, the flip flops in policy, including Free Trade," annoyed him.

One of Mr. Woodside's major goals is the environment and its related problems. He believes we are "environmentally raping the planet." He says "we'd better start having more than just lip service, and start taking action because we are in a serious situation which is going to get worse; and maybe our kids won't even have a planet to live on. This (issue) is very important to me." He points out that we will actually be spending less money if we clean up the environment now instead of waiting, and that we have to 'get tough' with the businesses that are aggravating the problems.

Mr. Woodside adds that another thing he wants to do is "maintain accessibility to the people I represent. I have always been that way. I am a people politician." He notes that this fact is probably "my biggest selling point."

He also does not want to follow the crowd: "I like to consider myself not like the mainstream politician. I have different philosophies and different views." He mentions that entering into party politics is a difficult step. "There are some things I support, but some that I can't; and I am not believes that "we lose and the research and would help away with them.

The present summer Challenge program has been criticized as not providing students with sufficient funding for their university tuition. What kind of system would be fairer? "Being a member of the Board of Governors of UNB, I have to deal with tuition, and I appreciate what it costs the student. I understand the legitimate concerns students have. But what is fair to me is not necessarily what is right for the students. I can't sit here with pat answers and promises. We're getting a barrage (from other politicians) and a lot of it is nothing more than propaganda." To deal with this issue, Mr. Woodside believes in the importance of dialogue and discussion in order to then take action to resolve the problem.

Student Aid is another issue, and in response to the fact that many students have high debts upon graduation, Mr. Woodside says: "I think there is a problem with the ratio between the federal and provincial governments when they provide bursaries and loans. It seems very unfortunate to me that someone would go through the trouble of trying to get an education or a degree and have that burden on them when they graduate."

In Ouebec, a student needs to have a minimum loan of \$800 before being eligible for a bursary, while in NB, the minimum loan required is \$2500. "We have to look at consistency. The federal and provincial governments need to get together with (representatives from) higher education to make the system fair and consistent."

When the federal government allocates funding to the Health Care system and Higher Education in this province, the Health Care system gets its complete share but Higher Education usually does

"In all fairness," Mr. Woodside states, "if money is allocated for higher education, it should be spend on higher education. There needs to be something more binding in terms of a contract." A contract between the federal and provincial governments would ensure that funds are not diverted into other areas.

Mr. Woodside does not approve of differential fees for Înternational students. He believes that "we lose and they cooperation, not competition."

Harry Marshall is running as an Independent Candidate in the federal election because, as he says, "It is the belief of many people, including myself, that 'Canada is in Chaos'.'

The reason for this, he claims, is that "the programs of the Conservative and Liberal Parties just do not work."

Mr. Marshall has offered himself as a candidate is every federal, provincial and municipal election in past

years. In his platform he has outlined his views on several issues. Of the free trade deal. he says "I am against it because it will not be free at all. It will cost us jobs and Canada, as we know it today. We have what America wants: natura resources; and by the method of takeovers, America will owr them, then pillage them for the

benefit of America. Also, if this deal is signed, a great many of our manufacturing concerns will be lured south to warmer

climates and low wages." Speaking of environmental concerns, Mr. Marshall again places the blame for serious pollution problems on past Canadian governments formed by the Conservatives and the Liberals. He says "It seems to me that our politicians are 'in the pockets' of the big companies and corporations." He offers a solution: "Tax dollars are used to clean up all pollution, and to make industry pollution free. When finished, the cost is calculated and this will be treated as a loan with an interest rate of 15%. The company will then have to pay 25% of its annual profits to the government until this loan has been repaid."

As Mr. Marshall sees it, one of the most important national issues is what he calls "our shameful debt". According to his figures, every man, woman and child carries a debt of \$10,815 as their share of the

national deficit. Again he blames the current and past federal governments for "spending our money like it is going out of style." To cure this ill, if elected he would stop giving grants but tax the wealthy and big corporations. He would also impose price and/or profit control.

Mr. Marshall says that education must be placed under federal jurisdiction so that students across Canada are all at the same standard. "If this were the case, financing for post-secondary education across Canada would be more evenly spread to all income groups. More scholarships should be available for low income high school graduates who wish to further their education."

On his personal qualifications, Mr. Marshall says "I like to believe that I am honest, straightforward and truthful and indeed have been told that I am. It has been said that I am in fact too honestt to ever get elected. I refuse to change from what I am proud to be.'




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### Federal Election '88

### **Bud Bird, Progressive Conservative Candidate**

Bud Bird cites the free trade issue as one of the key factors influencing his decision to run in the upcoming election.

Speaking on the importance of the free trade agreement to students, Mr. Bird says "Every student in Canada should be vigorously waving the free trade flag and parading in suppport of the vast horizon of opportunity which free trade offers to every Canadian." He says that the deal means an increased potential for prosperity, greater trading oppor-tunities and more jobs. In his view, free trade will abolish regional disparity and "allow students to find jobs, careers and futures at home (in New Brunswick) and stop the constant exodus of brains and ability to other regions."

Mr. Bird dismisses criticisms of the free trade agreement as

being based on "emotional and mythological reasons." He says "No country ever lost its identity or sovereignty by growing stronger in its economic performance and raising its standards of living. The reverse has always been true."

On the global scene, Mr. Bird says that protection of the environment is "perhaps the most important priority of all in the long run. The quality of life we have here in New Brunswick particularly is something we all value highly and keeps us here even though economic prospects may be less attractive than in other parts of Canada and the U.S." He says,"the completion of the free trade agreement will open the door and set the precedence for competion of an acid rain agreement in short order. Prime Minister Mulroney is the only person who could possibly accomplish

The Mulroney government has been critized for cutting back funding to postsecondary institutions. Mr. Bird says that "the federal government record has got to be viewed in the context of the whole economic scene and it seems to me that over the past four years the Mulroney government has particularly addressed itself to the creation of jobs and to gaining control of Canada's massive deficit." He calls the government's record in this area "outstanding". Unemployment among young people and women has fallen by one third and the deficit has been reduced by

four years.

The Canadian Federation of Students and other youth groups have been vocal in their criticism of the federal government's summer job creation 'Challenge' programme.

They claim that the length of employment and the wages paid (usually minimum) are inadequate and do not allow students to meet the expenses of their education. To this charge Mr. Bird replies that "All of these programmes have got to be viewed in the context of the alternative, which is unemployment. There is no question that salanes from the Challenge Programme are not adequate to meet all the needs and requirements of a student, but ... to totally provide all the

support that a student requires has not been the objective. The objective has been to provide help." A prime objective of the Conservative government is "to create an abundance of career opportunities for students upon graduation."

According to the CFS, one in ten students graduates with a debt load in excess of \$10,000. Mr. Bird does not support a proposal to write off debts. He believes that students would prefer to be able to get a solid job and repay their own debts and have the "satisfaction of having paid their way." However, he says that "no student should be brought to ruin over a student aid debt that they haven't

been able to pay." Student loans should have a generous repayment schedule and the conditions governing the award and repayment of student loans in Canada should be similar or more generous in areas of high unemployment and economic disadvantage.

Mr. Bird notes his lengthy experience in public service. He served as Mayor of Fredericton for five years and as the provincial Minister of Natural Resources for four years. He says "I think the Conservative Government is clearly the only choice in this election and I am a good candidate representing that government and the best choice for the students of Fredericton."

While it may seem unusual for a Physics professor to become so interested in politics, Mr. Sharp's interest was sparked by several factors: As a physicist, he has seen how his "profession has provided the military with sophisticated and damaging weapons. It is important for us to ensure that science is used for peaceful means, and not only military. Being the founding member of the NB chapter of "Science for Peace," he believes he understands the problems. In addition, "it made me angry," he says, to see the Liberals announce cut-backs in higher education and then to see the Conservative government promise increased funding, only to do the same thing as the Liberals before. watched the Tory convention when Brian Mulroney was elected. I heard unfair politics. It was about a different Canada than I had in mind -this country is built on cooperation, not competition."

The Free Trade deal concerns him as well; "The Trade deal is opposite to what I think Canada is about. The nature of Canada is at stake."

In response to what his goals are, Mr. Sharp responds that his party's goals include putting more fairness and trustworthiness into the Canadian government. He also feels that "tuition fees (at universities and colleges) should over time be abolished." He opposes the Free Trade deal because he believes it will "Americanize" Canada and provide a bleak future for students looking for jobs and needing to become 'more American" to get them. He also would like to see two times more research funding than is presently being provided for graduates of Canadian

He is completely against the proposed tax reform where 20% tax will be charged on almost everything a person buys. "Students will be major losers," he acknowledges, "it's not fair.'

Other goals include working to eliminate nuclear weapons, and trying to safeguard the environment against pollution. However, Mr. Sharp emphasizes his interest in postsecondary issues.

What about summer employment for students? The present Challenge program does not meet the needs ofmany students as far as money goes. "We will make it more possible for community groups and private sectors to provide employment. (We could) also institute a summer internship program for students to assist faculty members." It would provide an "impetus to research and would help

students to find careeroriented jobs." Mr. Sharp is willing to see a raise in the present scant hourly rate students normally receive during summer months.

According to Mr. Sharp, the present Canada Student Loan Program is "crazy, unfair, and puts the student in a major hole before even starting (his education)." He would "lean on the Provincial Government to provide more funding for grants" and he supports the idea of national funding for students for their first two years. He is prepared to look for more federal money in such

From a period beginning in 1982, "the Liberals cut over 2 billion (from higher education funding). Brian Mulroney did not reverse that, and managed to cut a further 1.5 b illion during the 1984-90 period. promising to cut 700 million per year afterwards. It's a sorry record and it's why students are paying higher tuition fees," he claims.

At present, the Federal Government allocates a certain number of dollars to the province for health care and higher education. The health care system must legally get its due share, but the rest of the money does not all go to higher education as it should. Mr. Sharp believes in a 50-50 sharing plan between trhe Federal Government and the province, and a "binding contract" that would ensure funds would not be diverted to areas other higher education.

The differential fees that international students must pay are "totally unfair," according to Mr. Sharp, "we should do away with them.

### Establishing a Legal Clinic at the U.N.B. Law School

Ever since Frank McKenna's Liberal Government axed the province's legal aid program in April of 1988, there has been much discussion throughout New Brunswick as to possible solutions to the resulting dilemma of having equal access to justice for the poor virtually cut-off. No doubt, from all indications, a new province-wide legal aid system will soon rise from the ashes of what one can only hope will be proven to be a short-term purge of a previously ineffective system. However, regardless of what materializes in the form of a provincial legal aid program, there is another aspect to the whole question which relates to the University of New Brunswick - in particular - the fact that the U.N.B. Law School: Ludlow Hall does not have a legal clinic.

Specifically, what is intended in the embodiment of a egal clinic at a Canadian law school is to provide a forum in which law students can gain much needed practical experience, while at the same time, providing a much needed public service to those who use the service.

As is the experience at most law schools in Canada - the overwhelming majority of whom have some sort of legal clinic instituted - by working in these clinics, students gain a sense of social responsibility and public service so often left untaught by academics most often uneasy with addressing fundamental moral questions in a increasingly relative society. Thus, students come in contact with real people who must deal with a wide spectrum of legal problems. They learn that there are sometimes discrepancies between laws and real justice, and in practical terms, they come to acquire a greater appreciation for the quirks within the Canadian egal system; something the cold impersonal case studies and theories taught in lecture halls often neglect to transmit into the law student's psyche.

Thus, it can be demonstrated that it would be most beneficial to establish a legal aid clinic at Ludlow Hall. The students want it. The faculty wants it. The public needs it. All that is needed is the will to fill an obvious void on this campus. Rest assured, should such a legal clinic materialize, no doubt the quality of the legal profession as a whole in New Brunswick shall rise accordingly.

All that is needed is for the right people to get this job done properly to come forward now.

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
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### EDITORIAL

After all, the story was about UNB students and had been brought to our attention by some students who felt they had been given a raw deal by the contest organizers. If we had been scared away by the possibility of a lawsuit and not printed a story that directly involved our primary audience then what would be the point in calling ourselves a Newspaper? I've always thought that in our country you could print anything you wanted with facts or testimony. I hope I am not proved wrong or even have to contest the issue.



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

#### THE DEAL

This nation is in grave danger. Amidst the thunderous applause for a Constitution about which we know little and a continental trade deal about which we know even less, the voice of the concerned Canadian was struggling to be heard. From above these edicts came, and those in power have demonstrated a frightening predisposition for dictatorial excess. A recent remark by a Tory incumbent in Ottawa was heard in stony echo: "We have a mandate to do whatever we want."

The ship of a frail democracy threatens to be torpedoed by the guardians of the holy politics. These are the politics f sonorous platitudes and inept policy; the politics of corporate donations and government propaganda euphemistically called information.

Many voters may wonder at this point in an absurd electoral campaign, why do we have this Mulroney-Reagan Trade Deal? Why, when our illustrious P.M. was opposed to such a deal when elected Conservative leader. Did that same P.M. stumble into a marriage contract that looks as if it were drawn up by the United States government and simply initialled by a top-hatted beaver?

The Business Council on National Issues is one key element. The B.C.N.I. applied its coercive talents to our P.M. and party so that they would change their mind and back an economic merger between the Eagle (with claws) and Beaver (without claws). What the bell is the Business Council on National Issues?

The Business Council on National Issues contains an important ingredient: the 150

largest U.S. corporations with branch-plants in Canada. It has interjected itself into public policy, so that by slow economic means its interest will be furthered. Even if Canada were not a branch plant economy in many sectors we would still be in difficulty. In order to compete with the U.S. South's rock-bottom minimum wages, longer growing season (not to mention that free trade zone with Mexico which is cheap, cheap

in order to compete with the U.S. South's rock-bottom minimum wages, longer growing season (not to mention that free trade zone with Mexico which is cheap, cheap manufactured components) and American subsidy in the form of Pentagon procurement, our indigenous Canadian firms will be backed to the wall.

The U.S. does not and will likely never acknowledge that Pentagon procurement (defence) contracts are regional development tools in the U.S. and by our definition, subsidy. The other U.S. subsidies include the aforementioned 19th century style wage rates. They are not going to change these features of their economy.

What about Canada? What are our subsidies? Try medicare, regional transfer payments (for regional disparity and despair), U.I.C., cultural subsidies (if you think its exempted because it was promised you're dreaming) etcetera and so forth. Our systems of basic social support will not only be attacked by the United States as unfair subsidy under "The Deal" (and subject to countervailing duties if seen as subsidy), but we will also be attacked from within. Right-wing Canadian business firms want our social programs gone, after all, they cost tax money to support. But some businessmen aren't that extreme: they may simply want to survive under "The Deal" and cries will be heard even from the moderates to cut taxes to businesses and corporations. In the real world that means goodbye to your social programs, not to mention national independence.

The key to all in this "Deal" is one word in it: harmonization. That means, we slowly and inexorably harmonize our systems and programs. Do you think, with a population ratio of 25:1 (U.S. to Canada), that they will harmonize any of their way of life to ours? Don't let the economists try and fool you. Their ivory tower talk of comparative advantage means, in the real world, a strong advatage for the American Colossus to the South.



generally don't like compilation albums, especially if they are mere repackagings of an artist or group's singles over x number of years in the business. Film soundtracks usually fall neatly into 2 categories: those that group several big name artists with even marketing potential when spliced together, and those scores that are true attempts at creating an atmosphere intended as a complement to the action of film.

The soundtrack to THE COURIER borrows from both mentioned outlines. 

Dear Uncle Stevie: When I saw Sarah McLachlan's debut album, Touch, for the first time, I just had to have a listen to it. You see, I had heard her on the

Halifax Compilation album Out of the Fog (Put out by those Flamingo people) in 1986, and thought she had a wonderful voice.

Now, at the age of 20, Sarah McLachlan has been signed to the Nettwerk label after they discovered her three years ago when the band she was in opened for Moev in Halifax.

I could compare McLachian to a cross between Sinead O'Conner and David Sylvian, but even that comparison does not describe the whole story. She has been classically trained in singing, guitar and piano, "making her one of Nettwerks most formally skilled artists."

The first single is "Vox", but there are other notable selections, such as "Out of the Shadows" and "Ben's Song." The music is very atmospheric; McLachlan's voice rises and falls beautifully and is right on the mark everytime.

Touch gets better everytime I listen to it, Uncle. Sarah McLachlan has quite a future ahead of her if this album is any indication of things to come.

The first time your humble reviewer heard of this Irish quintet, The Hothouse Flowers, it was from news that these chaps were to be the choice of Eire for the risible **Eurovision Song Contest. Given my traumatic televisual experiences as a nipper, it came as a completely unexpected surprise that 'people' is easily one of the best five albums of contemporary music released so far this year.

Picture the scene. There you are amidst several thousand representatives of the great unwashed all shouting "Ann Franks! Ann Franks!" It is a British heavy metal festival and cornish pastries, chicken carcasses and plastic lager bottles full of the punter's urine (sic) fly through the air with gay abandon.

"Whoooargh! We are the muthas!" slurs a neanderthal before passing out and being swallowed by the seething masses of suspiciously male

predominance. One thing you notice immediately is the volume of the twin bass-drums the sheer force of which whallops us all back like the wind-swept corn in the next field. When one blunders into an album typical of the latter-day contemporary speed mutants, it's usually a bit of a yawn. Yeah, yeah: blood; death; and enticing SATAN up for a quick cuppa hot mystical babes either riding around on bikes, unicorns or the subject's groin (yawn). We used to have a lot of fun getting real angry about all this violent sexist racist bullshit, but nowadays it just isn't worth the bother. I mean you don't go up and lecture to little kids about the heinous concept of playing 'war' do you? Here is a similar situation.

Anthrax however seems to be a little different. A quick scan of the lyrics on the sleeve reveals not one reference to wizards, nuclear destruction, torture or big tits. Amazing eh readers? 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Beaverbrook Art Gallery features an exhibition in the Annex Gallery entitied New to the Collection which includes works acquired by the Gallery since the November 1985 Auction. Contemporary works by HERZL KASHETSKY, DAVID UMHOLTZ and WYNONA MULCASTER and historical works by ROBERT FIELD and LIEUTE-NANT SMYTH are New to the Collection. Funds realized in the 1985 auction helped to make it possible for the Gallery to purchase these works.

HERZL KASHETSKY is an important Saint John figurative painter who has heretofore not been represented in the Collection. KASHETSKY's From the Family Album... was a work which the jury selected for The Beaverbrook Art Gallery's 1987 N.B. McCain Art Competition. It reflects KASHETSKY's interest in vintage photographs to furnish the motif for a painting. The painting is taken from a 1916 photograph in the Main Street of Saint John and portrays immigrant Jewish families from Saint John and Fredericton who settled in New Brunswick in the late 19th century and early 20th century.

The large acrylic polymer on canvas is enhanced by two studies for the work, one in graphite and chalk on paper and the other, a watercolor.


Also New to the Collection is an acrylic and collage composition by the Deer Island New Brunswick artist, It is an abstract pictorial representation of the infamous Hole-In-the-Wall-Rock. Though it has a topographical reference, it is primarily concerned in the vocabulary of form and color.

The work Homeland, 1985 by Saskatchewan artist, WYNONA **MULCASTER** extends The Beaverbrook Art Gallery's representation of Canadian prairie landscape painters which includes ERNEST LINDER, IVAN EYRE and L.L. FITZGERALD.

**MULCASTER** commented: The life energy of a painting is very often embedded in the contradictions

Three works of Maritime interest from the first half of the 19th century have recently been acquired. Portrait of a Naval Officer 1818, by ROBERT FIELD (1769 — 1819) is the latest dated work recorded by this artist.

Oh course, I can't give the entire movie away, but next comes the climactic conclusion that we've all been psyched for (yawn)!


I can just see the producers now: "C'mon guys, we have a half hour. Let's create a theme and plot for a picture. Hey!

A stuntwoman wakes up at the end of an airport runway in Mexico and cannot account for the last two days of her life. The film fills in the background through flashbacks starting from her leaving the States to visit her lover in Mexico before a very daring stunt (free-fall from an airplane without a parachute into a volcano).

The film stars ELLEN BARKIN (reason enough to rent the movie) and GABRIEL BYRNE (Gothic/Excalibur) as the main characters of the stuntwoman and her circus trainer lover. The supporting cast is extremely good looking including MARTIN SHEEN, JODY FOSTER, ISABELLA ROSSELLINI, GRACE JONES, ALEXEI SAYLE, JULIAN SANDS and so on.

The film tends to become strange and muddled in areas, but this simply reflects BARKIN'S state of mind. The supporting characters are truly "characters" (case in point ALEXEI SALYE as the world's horniest taxidriver) and the film is stylish and colourful. The storyline reveals nothing about the ending until the last 5 minutes or so and the end is a head turner, for certain.

This less than brilliant effort stars JOE PISCOPO & TREAT WILLIAMS as two cops who stumble onto a plot involving the resurrection of dead criminals to commit a series of flamboyant crimes. The process also renders the criminals invulnerable to conventional weapons. WILLIAMS & PISCOPO accept this fact as certainly calmly as we would accept finding gum under our shoe.

In the process of investigating WILLIAMS is killed in a decompression chamber, but brought back to life in order to solve this mystery (the catch is he is only has about 6 hours.) The main points of interest are the special zombie effects. This is supposed to be an action-scifi-comedy but it has no action, no science, and the funny lines amount to about 6 spaced out at 15 minute intervals (most of the humour amounts to "you've looked better but then again you're dead" jokes).

The whole thing is 86 minutes long and looks like it took only about twice that long to shoot. Maybe Joe had a beer commercial to do, oh well.

The senior Raider on this years squad is Bill Jarett (BPE







> On Wednesday, November 2, 1988, undergraduates and graduate students will be asked to choose a representative on our Board of Governors. With your confidence and support, I hope to be that representative.

Having received an disappointment I felt with the undergraduate degree in

political science from this university, I am currently enrolled in the School of Graduate Studies and Research for the purpose of obtaining a Master's degree in the same discipline.

In the three and one half vears that I have been a student on this campus, I have witnessed many discouraging actions regarding student affairs. To name just a few, two years ago fiscal power was arbitrarily taken from the Student Union. At this same time, liquor licencing and food service regulations were tightened so much as to stifle most efforts of students to socialize in their own campus; thanks to all the red tape. In my opinion, last year's Student Representative Council did very little except to maintain inertia while acting as complacent supporters of the administration. A case in point was the silence with which Susan Forestell's unjust removal from the Board of Governors was met. The S.R.C. President could have spoken up. Instead she did nothing. Ironically, now, that very same former S.R.C. president wants to fill Ms Forestell's vacancy on the B.O.G.

Fortunately, this year's Student Union Councillors are very active. Innovative ideas are rejuvenating student affairs. Community outreach programs are being formulated and sincere, creative efforts are being made to increase campus spirit. It is this team that I would like to contribute to as a very active member of the Board of Governors.

There are many changes that could be made to improve the quality of life at our university. Some of the specific issues I would hope to address are the following:(1) more reasonable liquor licencing and food services regulations; (2) getting a legal aid clinic established at the UNB Law School; (3) generating specific ideas for more library funding; (4) daycare on campus for students who are single parents, and (5) supporting the S.U.'s community outreach initiatives.
