# The Little Famine Refugee

The church bell had just stopped ringing, and the school boys began to march from the schoolyard into the church. In a steady line they marched, each one a little shorter than the last, till a small bundle of a boy, loaded with a big Testament and a Hymn Book, popped through the gate, making the tail of the procession.

"Who is that little chap?" some one asked, and the answer was, "Why, that is Shu Hai, the famine refugee."

Shu Hai's father was once a banker away off in Chihli province, where he had a comfortable home. He was never wealthy, but at one time the family had three meals a day and could eat bread of white flour; and though the children did not need much in the way of clothing in the summer, when the weather became cold, the mother could manage, by using over again the old clothing and making some new ones, to keep them all warm.

When Shu Hai was born, there was great rejoicing, because there was food enough to feed another mouth. And, anyway, he had not been born a girl, and that was always something to be thankful for. He was a fine, healthy boy, but his face was badly disfigured by a hare-lip. Now, if Shu Hai had been a girl that would have been very bad indeed, for girls all have to be sold when they grow up, and no one would want to buy a girl with a hare-lip. When he was born, the old nurse was very careful not to wash his beautiful black hair, or in fact any other part of him. Chinese have all, or nearly all. glossy black hair, and it is because they are careful not to wash the color out of it. If foreign mothers were wiser, and did not wash their babies' heads so much, instead of having brown or red hair, they would all have beautiful black hair too. At least that is what the Chinese mothers say.

But Shu Hai's head was clean shaved, all but two round spots above each ear, and from each spot sprouted a little pig-tail. Later on these were shaved off, and only one round spot was left on the top of his head from which grew his queue.

But hard times came-no more white flour, no three meals a day. Either from drought or floods, crop after crop failed. The bank had to be closed and many people were on the verge of starvation. Shu Hai was only five years old when his family, with many others, left their homes, perhaps never to return, and became famine refugees. Every stick of furniture had been sold to buy food. Even the beds and the bedding were gone, and their clothes were thin and ragged though the weather was cold. People said that, away hundreds of miles to the west, in Shensi province, food was plentiful. So every day there could be seen a long line of famine refugees on the road to Shensi. The old people who could not walk were pushed on wheel-barrows, and the parents carried the very little children. Sometimes people gave them a little food, but food everywhere was scarce. The feet of the children soon became sore and bleeding from walking, as their cloth shoes were worn into holes on the rough roads, and they were so tired and hungry. At night they slept, or tried to sleep, in some temple, huddled together to keep a little warm, with only the cold brick floor beneath them and not even a single quilt to cover them. Then, in the morning, without any breakfast, they began again their weary. weary journey.

But they never reached Shensi. In day they reached Hwaiching Fu. It is a good thing there were missionaries there, for they could not have traveled much farther. Little Shu Hai was very weak, and for some time we feared he could not live. But with proper food and care he recovered, and later on the doctor fixed up his hare-lip, making him fairly good-looking.

One day he appeared in a wonderful costume. One of the ladies had given his mother some clothing to use for his sisters; but the mother had a better plan than that. She just

put in a big tuck in the middle of the article and then we saw Shu Hai strutting about as proud as Solomon in his glory, dressed in a suit of combination underclothes, with a corset cover for a coat.

Shu Hai will not always be at the tail end of things, for he is brave and trustworthy, and will be given a chance to grow up to be the Christian man that the loving Father in heaven intends he shall be.

# THE LESSON RETOLD

One of God's good prophets of old was named Isaiah. Often he told the Jews of trouble and punishment that were coming upon them because of their sins, but the news that he told of the coming of a Saviour was good news. One strange thing that Isaiah told also, was that the Saviour's coming would bring peace and blessing, not only to them, but to all the nations of the earth. The Jews had always thought that the Messiah was to be a Saviour to them alone, but God meant Him to be a Saviour of the world-of the black man as well as the white, of the heathen as well as of the Jew-and Isaiah taught this to God's people hundreds of years before Jesus came to earth. After Jesus came, there would be no more quarreling, no more war; but this would only be when they had learnt from Jesus all His law of love.

Isaiah went on to say something about Jesus Himself. Although He was the Son of God, He was to come down to earth as one of themselves—a member of the family of David. Yet He was to be not altogether like other men. "For the spirit of the Lord shall rest upon Him", said Isaiah, "the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord"; which meant that Jesus would be filled with wonderful wisdom and knowledge and power. He would not judge as men do, by their eyes and ears, but He would understand men's hearts. He would understand people's sorrow and poverty and weakness, too, although He would punish all who did wickedly.

Still, Jesus' love could change wicked men to good men; that is, if they gave up their sins and served Him. Isaiah then described the lovely condition of things that shall exist when all men have grown to love and serve Jesus. In that day, the wolf and the lamb shall live together; and a baby shall play safely beside the nests of snakes, and a little child shall lead about wild beasts, like the leopard and the bear. These things shall be done when wild, evil nations and ignorant heathen peoples have been made pure and sweet and childlike through the power of Jesus' love. Then, said Isaiah, the day will come, when no one will hurt nor destroy another, for the knowledge of the Lord shall cover the whole earth, as the waters cover the sea.

#### EASTER LESSON

An Alternative Lesson 1 Corinthians 15: 1-11.

After Jesus died and rose again and had gone back to heaven, His followers preached everywhere what He had taught them. There were now more than the twelve apostles whom He had at first chosen. Other men who loved Him became teachers

and preachers. The greatest of these, named Paul, was a man who at one time had hated Christians and persecuted them. But one day as he was journeying on the road, Jesus appeared to him from heaven, and spoke to him; and ever after Paul believed in Christ and did all he could to persuade others to believe.

It seemed to be very hard for some people to believe that Jesus, after He had died, had come back to life again. So Paul preached often about this one subject, showing that Jesus had indeed risen from the dead, and because He had risen, so would they also one day rise from the dead. He reminded them of the other people, besides himself, who had seen and spoken to Jesus. Among these were Simon Peter and the other apostles, and the five hundred people on the mountain top who had seen Jesus taken up to heaven; some of these had since died, but most of them were alive and could bear witness to the fact that Jesus had indeed been among them after His death.

"And, last of all", said Paul, "He was seen of me." And then he went on to say very humbly, "I was not worthy to see Jesus, for I am the least of all the apostles, because I once persecuted the church of God; yet God has changed me and made me what I am, and it does not matter what I once was, so long as I now preach the truth, and so long as you believe. So Paul lovingly taught the people that the most important point of all their faith was to believe that Christ rose from the dead.



# THE LESSON RETOLD

It happened one Sabbath day, that Jesus and His disciples were walking through a field of grain; and the disciples, who were very hungry, plucked some of the grain and ate it.

Now, some of those who were passing by thought it sinful to pluck grain on the Sabbath, and they said angrily to Jesus, "Why are Your disciples doing that which is wrong to do on the Sabbath day?" "Have you not read in the scriptures", asked Jesus, "how David, when his enemies were chasing him on the Sabbath day, and he was very hungry, took some of the bread from the tabernacle, which was forbidden to any but the priests, and he and his men ate it that they might be strong to escape from their enemies?" Jesus also said to these fault-finders, who were called Pharisees, that He, the Son of man, was Lord of the Sabbath and knew best how it should be used. Besides, He said, "The Sabbath was made to be a help to men, and not a burden to them.

Shortly afterwards, Jesus went into a synagogue or place of worship, and there He saw a man with a withered, useless hand. When the fault-finders who had followed Jesus saw this, they watched eagerly to see if He would heal the man, so that they might again accuse Him of doing wrong. Jesus knew their thoughts and asked them, "Is it lawful to do good on the Sabbath day, or to do evil, to save a man's life, or to allow it to be lost?"

The wicked Pharisees could not answer this question, so Jesus, sad because these men had such wicked, unkind hearts, turned to the man with the withered hand and said. "Stretch out thy hand." And when the man obeyed, his helpless arm was made as strong and well as the other. But the Pharisees, instead of being glad, went away and plotted how to destroy Jesus.

# Remember the Sabbath day

THE APPOINTMENT OF THE TWELVE Lesson III. April 21, 1912

#### THE LESSON RETOLD

When Jesus knew that the wicked Pharisees were plotting against Him, He went away with His disciples to the country lying on the shores of the Lake of Galilee. But from Jerusalem and from the heathen cities of Tyre and Sidon, great crowds of people came flocking there to Him, to see the wonderful works which He did or to be cured of their diseases. Sometimes, indeed, there were such crowds about Jesus that He was forced to enter one of the little boats on the edge of the lake, and from it He would speak to the people; and those who were sick or blind or lame, He healed with a word or by His living touch.

Then, one day, Jesus went away alone to a desert place and stayed there all night praying to God. And when it was morning, He called all His followers to Him and from them He chose twelve men, who were to be with Him always as His special friends and disciples.

Jesus first told the listening people plainly. that His followers would be hated in this world for His sake, but that this should only make them glad, because, if they proved faithful, a great reward was waiting for them in heaven. The holy men in the olden times had also been treated in the same way.

And then to these twelve men Jesus gave power to heal sickness and to cast out evil spirits; they were also to teach the people what He had taught them. The names of these twelve disciples were, Simon Peter and Andrew his brother, James and John the sons of Zebedee, Philip and Bartholomew, Thomas and Matthew, James and Thaddæus, Simon the Canaanite, and Judas Iscariot. It was Judas who afterwards sold His master for a few pieces of silver.

To His disciples Jesus spoke many wise and loving words. Amongst other things, He said, that, as salt keeps food fresh and fit to eat, so His true followers would silently help others to be good. They must not keep away from people who have faults, but by being gentle and kind with them, get them to love and obey God. "Ye are the light of the world", said Jesus, "and as a city on a hill or, as a lighted lamp set on a table, shows people where to go, so your good deeds will show the right way to others, and by following that way, they will live so that God shall be honored and praised.

#### THE LESSON RETOLD

After Jesus had chosen His disciples, He gathered them around Him, with the rest of the people who were near, and preached to them on the top of the mountain the wonderful and beautiful sermon which we now call the Sermon on the Mount. As Jesus looked at the faces before Him, He saw very few who were really happy, so He told of eight ways, each beginning with the word "Blessed", in which people could learn to be truly happy and satisfied.

First, the Saviour said they must be "poor in spirit", that is, humble, for only the humble could belong to His kingdom. "And blessed, too, are they that mourn", said Jesus. It is hard to bear trouble, but if one bears it quietly, when God thinks it best to send it, He will bless that person.

And, "Blessed are the meek: for they shall inherit the earth." To be meek means to be patient, and not to grow angry when others try to offend us or do us harm. Jesus was often attacked by wicked men, but He bore it meekly and patiently, and those who fol-

low His example shall be the very happiest persons on earth.

"Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness: for they shall be satisfied, or filled." We hunger and thirst after righteousness, when we are as eager to please God as we are to get food when we are hungry or water when thirsty. And if we try to do right as much as this, God will help us, and we shall be satisfied in pleasing Him. "Blessed are the merciful", Jesus went on: "for they shall obtain mercy. Blessed are the pure in heart: for they shall see God. Blessed are the peacemakers"—those who will not quarrel, and who try to keep others from quarreling: —"for they shall be called the children of God."

Jesus also told His hearers plainly, that they would often be hated and cruelly treated in this world, because they were His followers. But this should only make them glad, for by this they would know that they were His and that at last they would be rewarded in heaven. Even the prophets, He said, whom God sent in the old times, had been treated in the same way.

#### THE LESSON RETOLD

In the Lesson for to-day, which is still from the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus spoke specially about poverty and riches. He told His disciples that they must not long to be rich. Indeed, He said, "Blessed be ye poor". And then He explained this by saying that they would one day possess the kingdom of heaven. Jesus then made other promises of reward to His loving and obedient children. "Blessed are ye that hunger now, for afterwards ye shall be filled. Blessed are ye that weep now, for ye shall laugh. Blessed are ye when men shall hate you for My sake, for ye shall obtain a great reward in heaven."

Then He said that those who cared only for riches and the sins and pleasures of this life would be punished. "Woe unto you that are rich; you have your pleasures now, you shall have none in the life to come. Woe unto you that have everything you wish now, for one day you shall hunger. Woe unto you that laugh now, for you shall yet mourn and weep. Woe unto you when all men praise you, for this is what they did to the false and wicked prophets of old."

Then He told this story: "Once, in the same town, there lived a rich man and a poor sick beggarman named Lazarus; and each day Lazarus' friends carried him to the rich man's gate, so that he might get the food that was left over from his table. The rich man never thought to help him, but the dogs came and licked his sores. At last the beggar died, and was carried by the angels to heaven. He was not poor there; he sat close to Abraham, God's great servant and friend. After a time the rich man also died, and, because he had been selfish in this life, he went where the wicked go. And in his torment he looked up, and, far off in heaven he saw Abraham, and Lazarus leaning on his bosom. And he cried out, "Father Abraham, have pity on me, and send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue; for I am tormented in this flame."

But Abraham said, "Son, remember, that in your lifetime, you had your good things, and Lazarus only evil; now he is happy and you are in torment. Besides, there is a great gulf between us which no one can cross." Then the rich man said, "If Lazarus cannot come to me, send him at least to my five brothers, that he may tell them to repent and obey God, so that when they die they will not come to this dreadful place. Abraham said, "They have the scriptures to read, let them learn from them." "But", said the rich man, "if one went back to them from the dead, they will surely repent." But Abraham answered, "If they will not hear what God says to them in His word, they will not believe even if one rose from the dead."

So in this parable Jesus taught a great lesson to those who loved riches and spent their time only in enjoying themselves. They had their pleasures in this life, but they could not have them also in the life to come.

#### THE LAW OF LOVE

May 12, 1912

Luke 6: 27-38; Romans 13: 8-10-Memory Verses, 27, 28.

Golden Text-Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself .- Romans 13: 9.



27 But I say unto you which hear, Love your enemies, do good to them which hate

#### THE LESSON RETOLD

In the wonderful sermon which Jesus preached to His followers on the mountain. He gave them a new law to follow-the law of love. It was the custom among the Jews. when one man injured another, that he should be punished by receiving the same injury in return. There was also a common saying, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor, and hate thine enemy." But the rule that Jesus gave His disciples was, "Love your enemies." He said, "Do good to them that hate you, and pray for them that treat you badly. Also, if any one strike you on one cheek, turn to him the other also. If a man take

away your cloak, let him have your coat also. Give to him that asks of you and if any one has borrowed from you, do not beg your goods back again. Just as you would like people to treat you, so do you treat them. For, if you show kindness only to those who are kind to you, that is not enough. Even the worst people in the world do that. And if you lend to people, hoping to receive something from them in return, why should you be praised? Even wicked men do the same. My disciples", said Jesus, "must be different. Love your enemies, do good, and lend, hoping for nothing in return, and you

shall be called the children of God, and shall be rewarded in heaven."

Jesus also spoke of other ways in which they must be different from the wicked people around them. "Be merciful", He said, "and God will be merciful to you. Do not judge your fellowmen unjustly, and God will not judge you. Do not condemn others unheard, and you will not be condemned; forgive, and you shall be forgiven. Give generously to those who need help, and God will give blessings and benefits to you. For as you treat others, so shall you be treated in your turn."

"Do not owe any man", He went on to say, "anything except love, for whoever loves his fellowmen is keeping the whole law of God. For all the Commandments can be summed up in the one sentence, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."

This was a wonderful new lesson for Jesus' hearers, for the scribes and Pharisees had twisted and turned God's laws until all their simple meaning had been lost, and the people hardly knew what to do or what to believe. But this new law of Jesus' was so simple that even a child could understand it.



# THE OLD LAW AND THE NEW LIFE

May 19, 1912

Matthew 5: 17-26-Memory Verses, 17, 18.

Golden Tert-He that loveth his neighbour hath fulfilled the law.-Romans 13:8.



17 Think not that I am come to destroy the law, or the prophets: I am not come to destroy, but to fulfil.

18 For verily I say unto you, Till heaven and earth pass, one jot or one tittle shall in no wise pass from the law, till all be fulfilled.

# THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus, after telling His disciples about His new law of love, went on to explain still further the differences between His laws and the false teachings of the scribes and Pharisees. "Do not think", said Jesus, "that I am come to destroy your laws or speak against the prophets. Every word of God's laws which the prophets spoke shall be fulfilled, and God will be very angry with anyone who changes His laws or breaks even one of His commandments or teaches others to do so. But every good and faithful teacher of God's laws will be called great in the kingdom of heaven.

"And this is what I have come for", Jesus went on, "to show you what God's laws really mean, and to tell you how to follow them. For if you do not seek to live better and purer lives than the scribes and Pharisees,

you will never enter into the kingdom of heaven."

"Now it is written in your laws", said Jesus, "that if any one kills a person, he will be in danger of being punished. But I tell you, that if he is even angry with another without a good reason, he will be in danger of punishment."

Then Jesus told His hearers that, when they were going up to the temple to worship, they must try to remember whether they had done wrong to any person. If they had, they must first go and get forgiven by that person, for God would not accept their worship, while there was a sin in their hearts for which they were not sorry. After that they might come and worship God.

Also, when they quarreled with any one, they should make friends again quickly, lest their enemy should give them up to the judge, and the judge should give them to an officer and the officer cast them into prison, for it might be long before they would be free again.

We see in this Lesson how much Jesus wants us to be good and kind and forgiving. If we ask Him to come and dwell in our hearts and help us day by day we shall be able to obey Him.

#### THE LESSON RETOLD

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus also spoke about truthfulness. The scribes and Pharisees used to dispute as to which was the most binding promise or oath, -- one made and sworn to by the temple, or the world, or the sky, and so on. Jesus' answer to all these difficulties was very simple. He said, "I say unto you, swear not at all, neither by heaven, for it is God's throne; nor by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. But let your 'yes' mean yes, and your 'no' mean no. Anything else is wrong."

Years after this, James, one of Jesus' disciples, taught much the same thing. He reminded Christians what a wonderful power the tiny tongue has: if the heart is right, the tongue can do great good; but if the heart is evil, the tongue can do great harm.

"It is very hard", James said, "to keep

the tongue back from speaking wrongly; but we ought to try to control it, for, just as the little bit in the horse's mouth turns his whole body, or just as the small rudder makes a great ship move this way or that, as the captain wishes, so the tongue directs us. And just as a little flame may cause a great fire, so a few words from a little tongue may cause a great amount of trouble."

Men can tame all kinds of wild beasts and birds, poisonous serpents, and even fish of the sea; but the tongue is far harder to tame than any of these. Only the power of Jesus can tame it. "Another strange thing about the tongue", said James, "is, that with the same tongue we praise our Heavenly Father and speak evil against people, although they are made in the likeness of God. This is very wrong; a fountain does not send forth fresh water and bitter water. A fig tree cannot bear olive berries, nor can a grape vine bear figs. So the tongue should not say both bad things and good things. It should say only good things."

"But above all", said James, as Jesus also had said on the Mount so long before, "do not swear, either by heaven or earth or any other oath. When you mean 'yes', say 'yes', and when you mean 'no', be brave and say 'no'."

Jesus and James both teach us here that we ought to try to speak only those words which are pure and gentle and true, for God hears us always.



#### THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus went on, in the Sermon on the Mount, to speak about giving to the poor. Many people in those days gave their gifts in public places, so that others might see them and say how kind and good they were. "These" said Jesus, "have their neward. People speak well of them, and they care more for that than they do for God's approval."

But Jesus' disciples were to do differently. When they give to the poor, they must do it so quietly that no one will see. And when they pray to God, they must not choose a public place, to be seen, like the vain Pharisees; but they must go to their own rooms and shut the door, so that only God can hear; then God will answer their prayers. Nor were they, when praying, to repeat over and over again words with no meaning, as the heathen do, who think they will be heard for this. "Your heavenly Father knows what you need before you ask Him", said Jesus, "and so requires no long prayers."

Then Jesus taught His disciples the simple, short prayer which we now call, The Lord's Prayer. "When you pray to God", said Jesus, "speak to Him as your Father in heaven. Pray that His name may be reverenced, and His will be done here on earth as it is in heaven. Each day, ask God to give you your daily bread, and to forgive your sins, as you forgive those who sin against you. And pray to be kept from temptation. and from evil. If you forgive people their trespasses, your heavenly Father will forgive you; but if you will not forgive, neither will your Father forgive you."

Also when they fasted, He said, they must not look sad, as the hypocrites did, to attract attention; but they must look as cheerful as at other times, and their heavenly Father would know it. And from Him, one day, they would get their reward.

#### THE LESSON RETOLD

In the last part of the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus warned His disciples against the teachings of the scribes and Pharisees. They did not know the true meaning of God's laws, and yet they tried to teach them to others. "Can the blind lead the blind?" asked Jesus. "It they try to do so, both shall fall into the ditch."

Jesus then spoke to the scribes and Pharisees themselves. "Why do you see the tiny speck that is in your brother's eye, and do not see the great one in your own?" By which Jesus meant that they were telling others to be good, while they themselves were most sinful of all.

Then, to show His followers how they might always be able to judge between the

true and false teachers, Jesus said, "Ye shall know them by their fruits. A good tree cannot bring forth bad fruit, neither can a bad tree bring forth good fruit; and it is just as impossible for evil men to serve God as for figs and grapes to grow on thorn bushes or thistles." God wants men to have good hearts, and their lives will also be good.

Then Jesus told this story to them: "There were two men, each of whom built a house. One built his upon a rock. When it was finished, a great storm beat against it. But the rain and wind could not move the rock, and so the house stood firm. The other man built his upon the sand, and when the storm came, the rain washed away the sand from beneath it, and the wind blew against it, and

it tottered and fell." Then Jesus explained that those who listened, and did what He taught them, were like the wise man who built his house on the rock; and those who listened, and would not do as He taught them, were like the foolish man who built his house on the treacherous sand.

At last Jesus finished His wonderful Sermon on the Mount, and all who had heard it were astonished at the things He had taught them, because these things were new.

#### THE LESSON RETOLD

While Jesus was going about, preaching and healing the sick, John the Baptist was kept in a prison by wicked King Herod. But, even in his prison, John heard of the wonderful miracles of Jesus, and sent two of his faithful friends to Jesus, to ask Him if He were really the promised Messiah, or was the Messiah still to come.

And Jesus said to them, "Go and tell John all that you have seen and heard of Me, and he can then decide for himself, whether I am the One sent from God. The blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised up, and the poor have the gospel preached to them."

So John's friends went back with Jesus' message. And when they had gone, Jesus turned to the people standing near and said, "John was no weak, wavering man bending

this way and that, like the tall reeds by the river; nor a man dressed in soft, silken robes like the great men of Herod's court. John is the last of the prophets of God. He was sent as a messenger to prepare the way before Me, who am the Messiah. And I tell you", said Jesus, "that no other of the prophets was greater than John the Baptist. Yet, the very least of those who belong to My kingdom is greater than John, because it is better to enter My kingdom, than to tell of its coming."

The common people heard this gladly, for many of them had been baptized by John. But the Pharisees were very angry. Then Jesus said, "The men of to-day are like children that refuse to be pleased, for John came, paying attention to all the customs of the Jews, such as fasting, and they said he was too strict, and would have nothing to do with him. I came and did not fast, and they say I am a glutton, and a friend of publicans and sinners."

But those whom the Spirit of God had made truly wise, understood that Jesus and John alike were doing and teaching God's will, each in the way God had commanded.

So we see that as Jesus went about from place to place some people got good from Him because they looked for it and some got nothing because they found fault with Him.

#### THE LESSON RETOLD

#### TEMPERANCE LESSON

An Alternative Lesson Ephesians 5: 11-21.

The Apostle Paul lived for a long time in the heathen city of Ephesus, and many of the people were persuaded by him to give up their idols and their wicked ways, and to worship and serve God. Paul then went to other cities, to teach the people in them also to know Christ. But he did not forget his friends in Ephesus, and soon after wrote them a long letter filled with good advice and telling them how they should live if they would be true followers of Jesus Christ.

He reminded them, that before they had learned about God, they had done wicked things, but now that they knew what was right, and had become God's children, they must give up all evil thoughts and deeds, any talking or jesting about impure things, and any evil habits they might have learned. In this way they would show themselves to be true children of God, and teach others by their example to be the same.

"But", Paul warned them, "now that you have the light, see that you are very careful lest you again fall back into evil ways. There are wicked people all around you, who will try to tempt you to go to places where you should not go, and do things you should not do. But turn away from them, for your time here on earth is short, and it should be spent, not in sinful pleasures, but in doing all the good you can to those among whom you live.

"So, be wise, and try to understand and do just the things that you know God would approve of. And do not drink wine, for it takes away people's senses, and then they do wicked things that they would not do if they were sober. But talk often among yourselves about holy things, and sing psalms and hymns of praise, and give thanks often to God, in Jesus' name, for all His goodness to you. So you will be kept from evil."

# The Very Words of Jesus

Every Lesson of the Quarter except the first has words that were spoken by Jesus. In Lesson I. Isaiah the prophet tells us what kind of words Jesus would speak when He should come among men. He would speak wise, kind, helpful and pure words.

Lesson II. contains wise words of our Lord about the Sabbath day. "The Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath", said He. This Lesson also tells us of helpful words our Lord spoke to a sick man whom He healed.

"Ye are the salt of the earth", are words that Lesson III. says Jesus uttered to His disciples. He also said, "Ye are the light of the world." We should try to be like salt to keep other people sweet, and like light to lead them in the right way.

Almost all of Lesson IV. is made up of lovely words of Jesus. The word "Blessed" is at the beginning of nine very beautiful sayings of His. Can you repeat these?

There is a wonderful story in Lesson V. Jesus told it to set people thinking about the best things in life. He wants us to love kindness and goodness and not money.

Lesson VI. gives us Jesus' words about loving our enemies. The Golden Rule is among these words,—"As ye would that men should do to you, do ye also to them likewise."

The words of Jesus in Lesson VII. are about the law of God. He said of the law, "I am not come to destroy, but to fulfil." This is the Golden Text for to-day. Let us repeat it. Jesus in Lesson VIII. tells us to speak the truth and not to swear or use strong language. "Swear not at all", He said. We should try to be pure and kind in our speech.

Lesson IX. contains the words of Jesus about the sin of making believe that we are good, when we are not good. God sees us just as we are, and we should try to live to please Him first of all. The Lord's Prayer is in this Lesson. Let us all rise and offer it now to God.

Jesus loved to use stories in His teaching, and in Lesson X. we have another story about two men who built houses. One built on the sand, the other built on the rock. Which house stood the storm?

In Lesson XI. we read the kind words which Jesus spoke about John the Baptist. He sent a message to John in prison to cheer Him.

Lesson XII. tells us how Jesus comforted a woman who was sorry for her sins and who showed her sorrow by her actions. "Thy sins are forgiven", He said to her.
