- 1. Boiled by steam in creamy lime.
- 2. Washed in the dash-wheel. 3. Boiled in alkali by steam.
- 4. Washed in the dash-wheel.
- 5. Steeped in bleaching-powder solution some 6. Steeped in oil vitriol, and water, about
- the strength of Lemon Juice.
- 7. Washed in the dash-wheel.
- s. Squeezed between rollers. 9. Mangled and dried in air, or in warm rooms, built for this purpose.

The cloth is now perfectly white. This bleach ed cloth is now printed with one or more colours, four to six colours may be applied by the printing machine. If more are wanted, they are introduced by the hand, with blocks, after the other colours are finished. The figure or design is engraved on a copper roller, each colour having a separate roller. The colour which the beholder sees imprinted, as he watches the process, is not the colour that is to be, when the print is finished.
