





Pardon the di-gression, but there is just as much liquor drank here now, as at any time since we came to Fredericton, but all sold, or most of it is sold unlawfully, and the revenues are cheated. Nothing is gained but the gratification of the fanatics, whose honest feelings in the matter at first hew changed into an attitude of hateful persection had espionage; where the per-sonal feeling not against the traffic, but against those whom they fancy they have triumphed over alone prevails.
