In a letter to the Bishop of Chester he declared that if the Local Option Bill pretends to be a remedy for evils for drinking, it is little better than an imposture. The principle of the Gothenburg system he maintains to be the only one permissable or at all tenable, and to the great amazement of both the Gladstonians and the Conservatives, adds, that for long years he has been strongly of this opinion. The temperance party in Great Britain has been highly scandalized by this declaration, and their organs recall the fact that when Mr. Gladstone last came into power, it was largely in consequence of his having repeatedly pledged himself to secure the passage of a local option measure. 


