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



I think if I could accomplish that should be doing more to save life than by endowing half a dozen hospitals.

How can you accomplish this? Well; here are a few suggestions: Look after the garbage pan daily. See that it is carefully sprinkled with lime or kerosene oil and effectually

See that any manure box near your nome is made fly-tight and frequently emptied and sprinkled with lime

Keep flies from the sick, especially those with contagious diseases. necessary, cover them with mosquito netting, as you do a baby.

Do not leave the food in pantry or icebox, or even on the table, uncovered one minute longer than neces sary A single fly speck may contain 3.000 germs.

Great Ocean Highways

THE HUDSON BAY ROUTE. Manitoba and the great Canadian North West having been so wonderfully developed during the past few years, and her population increasing by leaps and bounds, laterly at the rate of 250,000 new settlers each season, naturally the question of the shorter route for the transportation of her grain and live stock to the shorter route for the transportation of her grain and live stock to the ocean has become the all important question of the day. The route that is most favoured is via Hudson's Bay, either from Fort Churchill or Nelson River. The former seems to be the most favoured. It is 970 miles shorter than the ordinary route of to-day via Montreal. For the transport of live stock this saving of distance is live stock this saving of distance of immense importance. It is well known that the first three days in the train do not in any way injure the animals. It is the long haul of a week or ten days cooped that makes them deteriorate. Hudson Bay route with its two or three days journey is an ideal route for cattle. As regards savings the difference in the cost of transport via Churchill on 82,000 head of cattle would amount to \$600,000 a year. Grain can only, of course, be shipped after the harvest, but cattle can be forwarded all through the open sea-son from July to October. This calson from July to October. This cal-culation was made several years ago by a freight traffic manager; the number of cattle for transport are now more than doubled. A route that saves nearly a thousand miles of haulmust sooner or later come to the front. After many years of de-lay the line is now built to Le Pas, and there is only 474 miles from there to Churchill—it is this year actually under construction. This Hudson Bay route has been tremendously opposed. The great Railway Corpora-tions and all the power of Canada and the Lower Provinces have been up in arms against the project, na-turally there has been delay in its completion, but the power of the North West and the urgent demand of its population for the new line was too strong, too unanimous, to be resisted forever, and now the new way is actually being built. 

"I] do solemnly and sincerely in the presence of God profess, testify and declare, that I do believe that in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper there is not any Transsubstan-tiation of the Elements of Bread and Wine into the Body and Blood of Christ at or after the Consecration thereof by any person whatsoever; (2) and that the Invocation or Adoration of the Virgin Mary or any other Saint, and the Sacrifice of the Mass, as they are now used in the Church of Rome are superstitious and idol-atrous. (3) And I do solemnly in the presence of God profess, testify and declare, that I do not make this Declaration and every part thereof, in the plain and ordinary sense of the words read unto me, as they are commonly understood by English Pro-testants, without any Evasion, Equivocation or mental Reservation, what-soever, and without any Dispensaion already granted me for this purose by the Pope, or any other Auhority or Person whatsoever, or witht any Hope of any such Dispensa-n from any Person or Authority whatsoever, or without thinking I am or can be acquitted before God or Man, or absolved of this Declaration Pope or any other Person or Persons or Power whatsoever, should dispense with or annul the same, and declare

that it was null and void from the This declaration below is the one which is contained in the bill introduced into the House of Commons las Wednesday in substitution of the 17th century oath given above.

THE AMENDED OATH. "I do solemnly and sincerely, in the presence of God, profess, testify and declare that I am a faithful mem ber of the Protestant Reformed Church by law established in Eng infent of the enactment to secure the Protestant succession to the throne of my realm, uphold and maintain the said enactments to the best of my powers according to law."






