He paused and glanced swiftly towards Lillian — "and yet it is only too probable. Poor girl! Do you remember her, Lillian?"

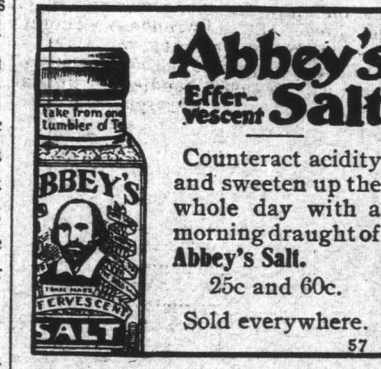

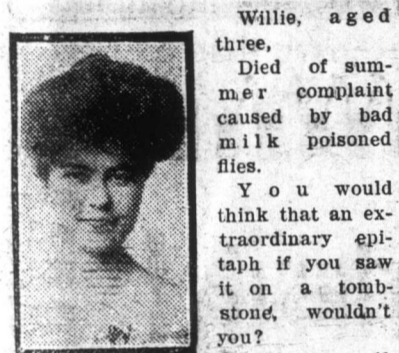

The Oath Objected To.

We give below the Oath objected to by the Roman Catholics.

"I do solemnly and sincerely, in the presence of God, profess, testify and declare, that I do believe that in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper there is not any Transubstantiation of the Elements of Bread and Wine into the Body and Blood of Christ, at or after the Consecration thereof by any person whatsoever; (2) and that the Invocation or Adoration of the Virgin Mary or any other Saint, and the Sacrifice of the Mass, as they are now used in the Church of Rome are superstitious and idolatrous. (3) And I do solemnly in the presence of God profess, testify and declare, that I do not make this Declaration and every part thereof, in the plain and ordinary sense of the words read unto me, as they are commonly understood by English Protestants, without any Evasion, Equivocation or Persecution, whatsoever, and without any Dispensation already granted me for this purpose by the Pope, or any other Authority or Person, or with out any Hope of any such Dispensation from any Person or Authority whatsoever, or without thinking I am or can be acquitted before God or Man, or absolved of this Declaration or any party thereof, although the Pope or any other Person or Persons, or Power whatsoever, should dispense with or annul the same, and declare that it was null and void from the beginning."

This declaration below is the one which is contained in the bill introduced into the House of Commons last Wednesday in substitution of the 37th century oath given above.

THE AMENDED OATH.

"I do solemnly and sincerely, in the presence of God, profess, testify and declare that I am a faithful member of the Protestant Reformed Church by law established in England, and I will, according to the true intent of the enactment to secure the Protestant succession to the throne of my realm, uphold and maintain the said enactments to the best of my powers according to law."

Diphtheria at General Hospital.

Two cases of diphtheria developed yesterday at the General Hospital and the patients, a man and woman, were removed to the fever hospital after which the other institution was fumigated and disinfected. This dangerous disease seems to be clinging to the General Hospital, and people who have friends there cannot but be uneasy about them. Should the disease gain a permanent foothold there where so many are already ill, the consequences would be disastrous, especially now that Dr. Keegan has gone abroad on a holiday.

Under date London, July 1st, we received to-day a brief account of the Declaration Bill. An ampler message under date, however, June 28th, appeared in the Halifax papers. The debate took place last Wednesday. We draw the following from the Secretary and the Postmaster General to this instance of sending state news in the Postal Telegraph message.

House Burned Down.

On or about May 8th there was an outbreak of diphtheria at Flatrock, and two deaths occurred in one house under date, however, June 28th, appeared in the Halifax papers. The outbreak contained two tenements, and as the house was about 100 years old and was very dilapidated the Health Officer ordered that it be burned down after a better residence had been provided for the owners in a similar manner. The Board supplied nails, timber, felt, etc., and the people of the place set to work and put up a new residence in a thorough manner. Yesterday the old house was destroyed by fire under the supervision of Health Inspector O'Brien.

ROYAL OATH BILL PASSES FIRST READING.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 1.—Beginning by expressing the hope that it would not be controversial, Prime Minister Asquith in the House of Commons introduced the Government Bill altering the form of the King's declaration on his accession to the Throne. The introduction of the Bill was voted 383 to 42 and it was read the first time amid general cheers. The Prime Minister reviewed the history of the Oath which is offensive to the Roman Catholics of the Empire. He also said the language of the oath was emphatic, but it had been equalled by the 39 articles of the Church of Rome to convert in denunciation of the Protestant doctrines. Roman Catholics, he declared, enjoyed all civil and political rights, although they were barred from one or two offices. He also said he hoped the relics of the past would be removed. He continued: The Roman Catholic subjects of the Crown number 12,000,000, nobody doubts their loyalty and the declaration cannot fail to be offensive to the Sovereign himself. (Cheers). The late King found it a repugnant duty to sign the beginning of his reign by a repulsive formula directed against a majority of his subjects. (Cheers). Mr. Asquith expressed the hope that the House would not enter into full debate on the Bill. Mr. Balfour, leader of the Opposition joined Mr. Asquith in this wish. The introduction of the Bill was voted 383 to 42, and it was passed the first time amid general cheers.

GIGANTIC ARMADA.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 1.—The most powerful force of war vessels of one nationality ever gathered together will be engaged in the annual manoeuvres of the British Navy which now begin—45 battleships and 25 armored cruisers, with a displacement of 1,016,550 tons, representing five complete fleets. In addition there will be a large number of smaller cruisers, auxiliaries, destroyers, torpedo boats and submarines. Admiral Sir William May will be in charge of the fleet, and it is estimated that he will have 300 vessels under his orders. Sir Arthur Wilson will be second in command.

"CARMEN SYLVA" ILL.

Special to Evening Telegram. BOUMANIA, July 1.—The condition of Queen Elizabeth of Roumania, who is suffering from a severe attack of appendicitis, is reported to-day as improving. Her Majesty's physicians state that she is experiencing less pain than in the preceding days of her illness. The Queen is in her 67th year, and because of her age much uneasiness has been felt. Elizabeth was crowned Queen in 1881, the same year in which Roumania became a kingdom. It has subsequently become known that she was a writer of poems, dramatic sketches and fairy stories under the pen name of Carmen Sylva.

ANNEXATION SENTIMENT.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 1.—Admiral Sir Lucius Douglas, retired, who is aboard ship returning to England from Canada, in a wireless message received to-night disclaims an alleged interview with him published in a Montreal paper. This interview quoted the Admiral as having said that many Canadians favored the annexation of Canada by the U.S. W. S. Fielding, the Canadian Minister of Finance, who was a guest at the Dominion Day dinner in London, in his address made reference to the subject, saying: "There never was a moment in Canadian history in which less attention was paid to the idea of annexation to U. S. than now."

PORT ARTHUR A FREE PORT.

Special Evening Telegram. TOKIO, July 1.—The announcement of the opening of Port Arthur to shipping of all nations, commencing July 1st, is published in the official Gazette. The decision some months ago of the Japanese Government to open Port Arthur as a free commercial port of entry caused some surprise, as this meant its elimination as point of strategy for military and naval movements and its development as a commercial city.

REDMOND'S DILEMMA.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 1.—Chancellor Lloyd George having retained all the features of the previous Budget in the current Budget, will oppose its progress with the Redmondites, who are disappointed at the retention of the whisky tax, but it is not likely they will seriously obstruct the Budget, while the fate of the Veto power of the Houses of Lords is still in the balance.

AMERICAN YACHT WON.

Special Evening Telegram. TRAVENUNDE, Germany, July 1.—The American yacht Westward won the Emperor's cup in the race from Kiel to Travenunde to-day. The Germania was second and the Hamburg third. The Emperor's yacht Meteor was towed in.

GOLD DUST FROM ALASKA.

Special Evening Telegram. FAIRBANKS, Alaska, July 1.—Three million dollars' worth of gold dust has been received by the Fairbanks banks since the season started, six weeks ago. More than one million of it has already been shipped and more will follow shortly.

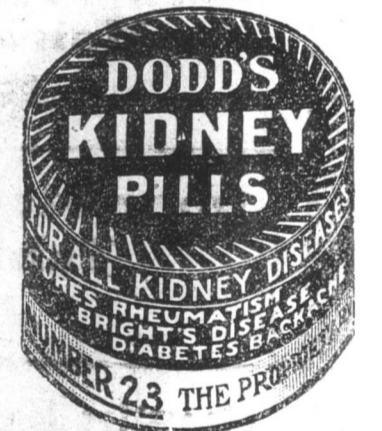

New York, June 25.--A special cable to the Times says: "To Americans the most interesting man among the King's birthday honours will probably be the Baronetcy conferred upon

Harold Harmsworth, who is almost as well known here as is Lord Northcliffe. Of all the amazingly successful Harmsworth brothers--sons of the late Alfred Harmsworth, barrister of the Middle Temple--Harold is said to be the greatest financial genius. Al-

though he differs politically from his eldest brother, Lord Northcliffe, Harold Harmsworth is closely associated with him in business, and is a familiar figure at Carmelite House, London, the home of The Daily Mail and of a large number of the other Harmsworth publications, which al-

together number between seventy and eighty, and provide employment for something like 15,000 persons. Harold Harmsworth, indeed, is said to be practically the chief financial director of these various undertakings, and it is also said that his personal fortune is at least as great as

that of Lord Northcliffe. In this connection it may be interesting to mention that another of the Harmsworth directors, Kennedy

Jones, who is also a millionaire, is said to be "slated" for a baronetcy, and afterward for a peerage, when the Unionist party regains power.
