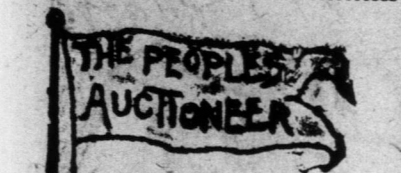

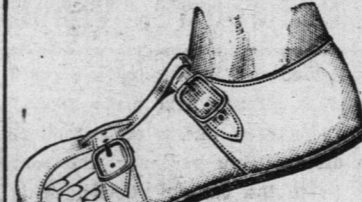

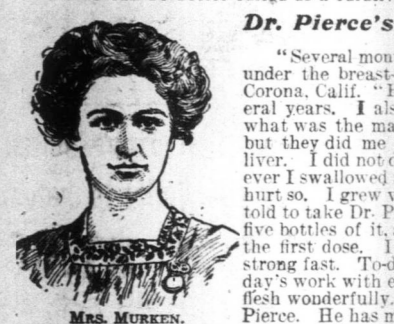

Yellow, dingy lace curtains are most speedily restored to their former purity of color if boiled in a strong soapuds which is half milk and half water. Boil them thus thirty minutes and proceed to finish washing them as usual.

The woods are deserted where erstwhile we flirited with Susan Mirendy and t'other nice maid; the tall poplars wonder why no one sits under — the chiggers have driven the boys from their shade!

Surveyors to Start for Site of New Outlet.

Steamer Beothic Will Sail From St. John's Shortly and Will Have Number of Engineers on Board to Inspect New Site.

A party of engineers, numbering twenty-five, will leave shortly for the Hudson Bay for the purpose of looking over the proposed terminals at Nelson, for the railway that is being constructed either to that port or Fort Churchill, as the official decision has not yet been given out by the department at Ottawa. The party will sail from Montreal on July 2nd on board the S.S. Beothic, which is to make the initial trip to the bay, of the Hudson Bay Steamship Company, which is understood to be a part of the syndicate or company organized to building a railway from Montreal to Nottawa, on the James Bay. The ship is 1,400 tons, sails fourteen knots an hour, and is expected to make Churchill the tenth day out from Montreal, Nelson, the twelfth and will most likely arrive at the mouth of the Nottawa in fourteen days from Montreal. The promoters of the James Bay Railway are also sending by the same steamers, monthly trips to the Bay from the St. Lawrence, a number of engineers, who are to make a permanent survey to the several ports around the Nottawa region, with a view to ascertain the best site for the terminals of the Montreal and James Bay system, which is announced to be started at both ends, viz., at the Transcontinental crossing and at the northern terminus, early next spring. It is expected that sufficient work will have been accomplished by the end of the present season to enable work to go ahead rapidly next season especially north of the Grand trunk Pacific, and it is contended that the section by the G. T. P. can be completed in two years from the time of the first sod.—Sydney Herald.

Abolition of Pain

New York, June 15.—A London cable says: The abolition of pain resulting from injury or operation is promised by the new anaesthetic process described in the London Lancet fulfills its discoverer's claims.

Dr. F. W. Forbes Ross makes the announcement in the Lancet, and from the fact that it receives publicity in that conservative publication, the claim of Dr. Ross may be considered to have received orthodox approval. McCreover, Dr. Forbes has met the official requirements by giving his discovery to the public.

At the operation the patient is put under a general anaesthetic in the ordinary way, and the five to ten cubic centimetres of a 1 per cent solution of quinine and urea-hydrochloride are distributed over the nerve supply of the part concerned. The effect of such injection is to produce a total loss of the sensation of pain. Popularly speaking the affected part is put to sleep.

Balene sent off on her work. We have already pointed out the reckless disregard of our fishery interests in taking the S.S. Fiona off the service at a time no suitable steamer was on the ground to prevent bait being run to St. Pierre and foreign bankers. The action of the Government under Acting Premier Morrison is in marked contrast to that of Premier Bond under circumstances much less grave than those of to-day.

The shipwrecked crew of the Norwegian ship Thattalla, which went ashore on an island near Pleasant Harbor, particulars of which already appeared in the Telegram, arrived by the S. S. Prospero last night. The Thattalla was in ballast and on her way to Point Leamington for a load of lumber. The steamer is unable to speak English, but our reporter ascertained that the ship after reaching Battle Harbor and taking on board a pilot to take her to her destination, got caught in drift ice and was obliged to lay under Long Harbor Island during which a heavy tide swept the vessel on the rocks. The crew managed to escape in the life boats. The Thattalla carried a crew of twenty one men all told. The captain and mate stayed behind at Battle Harbor where they are selling the deck, masts and other gear, which were taken out of the ship, in the interests of the underwriters. When the Prospero was at Battle Harbor it was learned that the hull of the vessel was submerged. Vice-Consul Cook is now looking after the men and will have them sent home the first opportunity.

Narrow Escape. The schr. Nellie M., Capt. Taylor, arrived to Monroe & Co. last night after a run of 21 days from Barbados, molasses laden. She had stormy stuffing weather all through the run up. The ship left here on the 26th Feb., and an hour afterwards met the ice (a heavy jam) off Cape Spear. She was forced into it by the wind and was taken up along the Southern Shore with the ice and went shorewards with it at Cape Ballard, and after her fourth day out she dragged in within a gun shot of the rocks; a big swell ran and the captain and crew concluding the vessel's doom was sealed got their clothes bags and effects on deck to leave her and walk ashore on the ice when the wind veered to W. N. W. and swept the ice off the coast carrying the vessel with it out over the Banks. She had a close call and had very stormy weather afterwards, going down in 37 days to Pernambuco.

Boy Hurt. As Master Leo Duffy, son of Mr. M. Duffy, grocer, was fielding mid-wicket in a cricket match in St. Bonaventur grounds yesterday, a drive was made by "allegor" and the ball took him squarely in the face at short range. He received a terrible blow, three of his teeth being knocked out and his upper and lower lips split open, while his face was badly bruised. He was treated by the brothers at the college but suffered intense pain and on going home a doctor was called in. He will be disfigured for some time.

Illicit Shooting. Indeed the Pope has ceased what may be called informal conversations and now confines his interviews to ritual benedictions and giving his hand to be kissed. His regular recitations of precepts of principal congregations are now reduced to fortnightly interviews. It is reported the Pope is suffering from almost profound melancholy which is probably due to his now being more a prisoner than ever. The effect of the Pope's growing weakness has been the failure of a number of reforms, emanating from the Vatican.

CHICAGO, To-day.
 If Roosevelt eventually heads an independent ticket, it seems certain that the Convention which will name him, will be held at a time considerably after the adjournment of the Republican National Convention now in session in this city. As a result of the decisive votes in the proceedings of the Convention, particularly that of fourth California district contests, and after a day of sober reflection on the part of his friends, the plan for continuation of the present Convention as outlined has practically been abandoned. To-day's convention enters on the fifth day and still it is proceeding under temporary organization. This condition is unprecedented in its history. The party leaders are going at their task earnestly to-day. Although many doubt their ability to do so, they are going to get through with the nomination and everything else before the adjournment on Sunday morning.

The St. John's Gas Light Company has recently installed an up-to-date plant for the manufacture of Sulphate of Ammonia, the increasing cost of materials and labor making it necessary to use to the best advantage all the by-products of gas manufacture possible in a small works.

The plant was successfully worked during the past week, under the management of Mr. F. M. Ruggles, and a quantity of Sulphate of excellent quality was made.
 Sulphate of Ammonia is a valuable fertilizer, and contains 20 per cent. of Nitrogen as against 15 per cent. in Nitrate of Soda. Three quarters of a ton of Sulphate has in it as much food for a crop as a ton of Nitrate. Fourteen pounds of Sulphate per acre on hay land is the best dressing.
 Elaborate experiments with Sulphate were made at the Dublin Exhibition held in 1908, and many tests were carried out with various fertilizers. It was found that the use of Sulphate of Ammonia increased the yield of potatoes per acre by 4½ tons. Swedish turnips, 8 to 9 per acre, and other crops in proportion.

The Cry for Help

To-day we publish the first list of subscriptions to the fund started for the relief of those lost in the S. S. Erna, Aureola, Grace, Dorothy Louise, Arkansas, Beatrice and Reliance. A generous response was given to the appeal which was made yesterday by Mayor Ellis to start the subscription list at once and \$3,865 was reported last night. It is roughly estimated that there will be a need of a fund at least fifty per cent. greater than the \$18,000 which was found necessary in the Greenland disaster. This is reckoned on the basis of allowances on the same scale as was given in the Greenland case to fifty per cent. more women and children than were aided after that disaster. It should, however, be remembered that a dollar will not go as far to-day towards bringing up a family as in 1898, and the scale arranged should not be less than was arranged at that time. The Committee were fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Joseph Outerbridge for the Executive Committee as he has some fourteen years' experience as Treasurer of the Greenland Fund. Hon. J. A. Robinson also was associated with the administration of that fund, and his experience will be of value to the Executive elected yesterday.

As some 73 persons lost their lives in the ships already mentioned, against the 48 in the Greenland, it will be realized that the Executive has a big task before them. But their labours will be lightened by the certain hope of a prompt and liberal response to the appeal from all parts of the island. The example of England in the case of the Titanic appeal will help to stimulate the well known liberality of the seafaring people who dwell around these coasts.

Attempted Suicide.

Const. Quinlan arrived here to-day with a man named Joseph Young of Main River for the Lunatic Asylum. The man whose wife died a few weeks ago became demented and made a desperate attempt to cut his throat with a knife, but was frustrated by friends. He was very violent at the time and Const. 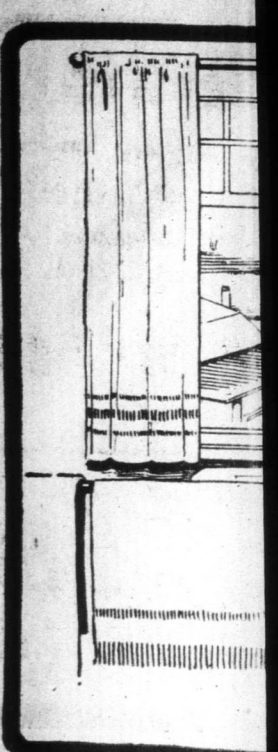

CHICAGO, June 21.

The Taft forces in the Republican National Convention further demonstrated their control of that body to-day. The Convention took up the contests from many States, and in each instance the Taft delegates were declared entitled to their seats by the high water vote of 405 out of 496 to the close margin of 542 to 529. The latter vote was in the Californian cases. Despite the fact that the Roosevelt people were defeated in all their fights to-day, there was no indication of a bolt. Some of the Roosevelt leaders feared the Californians might take matters in their own hands and fall to observe the Roosevelt programme set for the Convention to the end. When adjournment was taken to-night until 10 a.m. tomorrow, Washington contest cases still remained unsettled. There is a likelihood of more bitterness between the opposing forces. After the Californian case was settled the delegates seemed in much better humor, and there was much fun during the afternoon when minor contests passed through without any opposition from Roosevelt forces.

The performers, however, will give their services free.

A motion was carried to add to the Committee all clergymen and stipendiary magistrates. A motion to establish a permanent "Marine Disasters Fund" did not meet with general approval and was withdrawn.

An Executive Committee was appointed, consisting of: His Worship Mayor Ellis, Chairman; G. C. Fearn, Esq., Hon. Secretary; Hon. Jno. Harris, Hon. Treasurer; Joseph Outerbridge, Esq., Hon. Geo. Knowling, J. C. Hepburn, Esq., and Hon. J. A. Robinson.

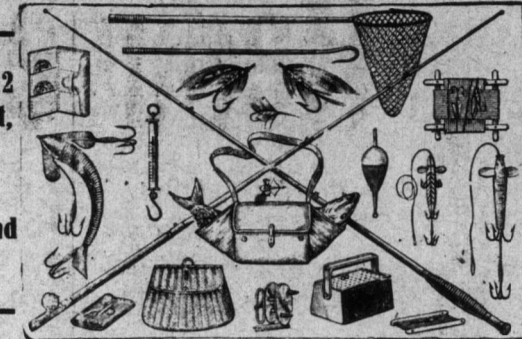

Football Match at Wabana.

Representatives of Both Companies
Tie in First Game.

The opening game of football at
Wabana for the season took place on
Tuesday night, June 18th (with a
heavy gale of wind blowing at the
time), between the Dominion Athletic
Association, employees of the Dominion
Iron & Steel Co., and champions
for the years 1910 and 1911, and the

Row in Sydney.

"Parties arriving by Saturday's ex-
press report that six Terranovan sea-
men from the schooner F. Rose beat
up the North Sydney police badly, and
last Wednesday the whole force had
to be called out to suppress them.
They were fined some \$30 altogether,
making their peasantry a costly one."
The foregoing is taken from a St.
John's Nfld. paper, and contains as
much truth as there was "peasantry"
for the burly Terranovans. The para-
graph refers to the incident, where
Officer Hec McNell arrested, single-
handedly, nearly the whole of the crew
of the schooner F. Rose, who made
such a brutal attack on the lone of-
ficer, and which it committed on a
policeman in St. John's, would mean
a long term of imprisonment for the
offenders without the option of a fine.

This morning fifty tons of hard
coal is being placed on board the
steamer Morwenza for shipment to
Montreal, where it will be put on
board the steamer Epitaph to be taken
to Hudson Bay for use by the Mounted
Police. The shipment is being looked
after by J. Mann, ship broker, and is
the first cargo of the kind ever to
leave here for the above place. It was
first intended to have the Beothic call
here for the coal and to take other
supplies, but the Government changed
this order and sent the steamer direct
to Montreal.

The five Newfoundland sailors who
made their escape from the whaler
Lloydsen, on the ground that they
were being ill fed, etc., and who were
later arrested, but won't out in the
court, left for their home in the An-
cient Colony, being given free trans-
portation on the steamer Nascopie,
through the good efforts of Mr. Martin
Cleary, who also secured for them
legal talent which procured them their
liberty.—Sydney Herald, 19th.

Perfect Boy Condemned.

James L. Hughes, chief inspector
of the Board of Education of Toronto,
is a champion of the plain, every-day
little boy who may, or may not, be
known as a neighbourhood nuisance,
but who, at any rate, does not make
any pretense of winning school prizes
for good conduct or correct prizes.

"It is usually the deader fellows
who get the best marks," says Dr.
Hughes. "The one who sat still and
never did any harm got all the prizes.
He was the model child, according
to the storerooms. The one who had
vigor, originality, and executive abil-
ity used to be looked upon in horror."
"Lots of times we say boys don't
like to work, when, in reality, they
don't like the kind of work we pick
out for them to do. I would think
any boy a piece of putty if he stood
around to see what I had for him to
do next. You've got to let the boy
pick out his work. He's got to have
some responsibility."

"One of the greatest modern ten-
dencies is to develop power. We have
established parks and playgrounds to
keep up the physical power of child-
ren. We have medical officers in the
school to keep them healthy. We
have open air schools for the sub-
normal. We are beginning to realize
that book knowledge is not the chief
function of our schools.

"That boys naturally take the right
view of things is shown by their re-
verence for law. They may dispute
whether or not a runner reached first
base before the ball, but if it is a
matter of rules, and some one has the
latest rule book, they will follow un-
flinchingly what that rule book calls
for."

Dr. Hughes thinks no child should
be taught to read until 9 years old.

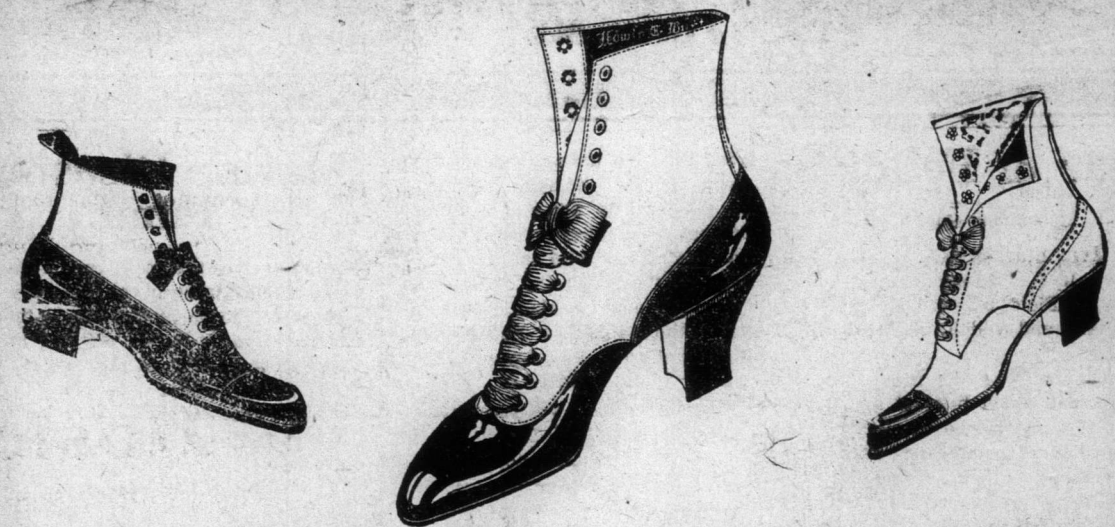

Salt Steamer Arrives in Port.

Lost a Man Overboard.
The S. S. Membrand, Capt. Middleton,
arrived in port this morning,
after a stormy and eventful passage
of fifteen and a half days from Cadix,
bringing 4,885 tons of salt for Job
Bros.

The first week at sea favourable
weather was met, but after that
strong head winds were continuous
and which retarded progress. The be-
ginning of the present week while at
the edge of the Grand Banks the
weather was unusually stormy with
thick fog at intervals.
On midnight of Wednesday last
Lewis Edgerton, a seaman, was wash-
ed overboard and drowned. At the
time of the occurrence there was a
heavy sea running and it was pitch
dark. The ship was then to the east-
ward of St. John's. The clock had
just struck twelve when Edgerton left
the forecastle to go on watch in the
wheel house. He was walking across
the deck when suddenly a huge
"comber" suddenly boarded the ship
and took with it the deceased seaman,
who was never heard of afterwards.
No body witnessed the happening, the
first to hear of it was the man on the
"look out" whom the victim was going
to relieve. The sad affair cast a
gloom over the ship as Edgerton was
well liked by the other members of

the crew. The deceased was 44 years
old, a native of South Shields, Eng-
land, married and a wife and three
children are left to mourn him.
