Why Every Man in This Country Should Be a Liberal.

It is proper on the eve of Elections that we should discuss the politics of the country from the viewpoint of the laboring man. Government is an intensely practical thing, and every man must look at it from his own angle. To look at the politics of to-day at the viewpoint of the laboring man is not to suggest that there is oneview proper to him, another to the employer, another to the capitalist, and another to the professional man, but merely that the life of the country as a whole may be looked at from various points of view, and yet be viewed as a whole. Nothing is more unfortunate, nothing is more unwarrantable, than to think of politics as a contest of classes as made up of interest in competition with one and another, and in opposition to one another. The whole business of politics is to bring classes together upon a platform of accommodation and common interest. To-day we may look at ourselves in the light of those questions which particularly affect the working man, and perhaps those who are not working men will be none the worse for taking that view of things. In a political campaign the voters are called upon to choose between parties, and many of them choose their party out of habit; but fortunately for our own freedom and intelligence in action there is at this

particular time an enormous number of men who are not choosing by tradition, but making their choice upon principle and upon a very clear view of what it is they desire to see accomplished in our country life, whether for themselves or for the country as a whole. Parties and platforms and candidates should be frankly put under examination to see what they will yield us by way of progress, and there are a great many questions which the working man may legitimately ask and press until he gets a definite answer. Intelligent working men will ask the men now seeking their votes what they may be expected to do for them. I do not mean for them separately, but what they may be expected to do for the country which will entitle them to the confidence of those who perform the daily labor, which lies at the basis of all our daily life. On the one hand they will be told that if the Liberal Party get into power they may look to see industry languish and wages go down, and employment harder to find. They forget that the Liberal Party of this country constitute something like two-thirds of the population of the country, that the Liberal Party are engaged in occupations of every kind, depend upon all sorts of business for their livelihood, share in every interest and enterprise of the country. It may safely be taken for granted that the Liberals are not going to destroy themselves economically. All that is meant by the dire prediction of those who foretell disaster

if the Liberals should be successful is that the Liberals will encourage new industries, give every individual equal rights, and set the wheels of progress going which will certainly destroy the special privileges now being enjoyed by a few of the Tory Party.

Harvest Home Festival.

The annual Harvest Home of George Street Epworth League was held last night in the basement of George St. Methodist Church.

The place was nicely decorated and the platform was heavily laden with a large variety of the fruits of harvest, which presented an attractive appearance. The League was no doubt encouraged in their work by the large audience that filled the basement. The Rev. J. W. Bartlett, opened the entertainment, and after the opening exercises, Mr. Robertson, of the Presbyterian Church, was called to the chair, a position which he very ably filled, and spoke with considerable earnestness on seed sowing and harvesting in its numerous stages and spheres. Mr. Jones, of the Green fall Institute, addressed the gathering on the Spiritual life of Harvest, with its many applications to life. He very forcibly dealt with Sunday School teaching and the faithful teacher and what it was possible for them to accomplish. He also strikingly portrayed the power of prayer, without which every Christian work is a failure. During his address he used many illustrations to make clear his points, showing that the big seeds did not reap the best harvest, but the little seeds bring forth the best fruit. The speaker encouraged the League in their work and gave them many helpful points in its endeavour to sow seed which, we hope, will not be without its harvest. Rev. Mr. Bartlett, the next speaker, dealt with harvest on land and sea, educationally, and the liquor traffic, the blight of harvest, which the unity of the churches are trying to curtail. He also referred to Mr. Jones, who is doing a great work at the Institute with the Newfoundland fisherman, the hero of the sea. Educationally, the speaker said, our schools and colleges should be appreciated and helped in their work of seed sowing. The instrumental trio (piano, organ and cornet, by Miss Joliffe, Miss Christian and Mr. Mews) was a highly appreciated and well rendered. The duet by Messrs. Stephen and Walter Tucker was a very pleasing feature and added to the success of the evening.

Meth. Guards Parade.

The Methodist Guards paraded last night at Buchanan Street Schoolroom for the purpose of reforming the Brigade; this is the first time the Brigade has met for drill since the Armory was destroyed by fire on June 1st, 1912. By eight o'clock the schoolroom was filled by a splendidly equipped band, when Major Heston and Captain Blackwood addressed the boys, saying the plans of the new Armory were in the hands of an Architect and would be ready in a few days, and hoping to have the drill space ready about the middle of January. They also asked the boys to co-operate with the officers and make the Methodist Guards Brigade the best in the city. On finishing they were heartily applauded by the boys who showed the greatest enthusiasm right through. On the companies being formed up and the roll signed it showed a strength of 150, when the Brigade turned out and marched up New Gower Street to Springdale St. going into Water Street and Adelaide St. returning by way of New Gower Street. The Brigade will drill in Centenary Hall till the Armory is ready where everything will be put on a strong basis. One feature very noticeable last night was a number of new men, the recruit squad showing a strength of upwards of forty. Recruiting will be continued next Friday night when others will have an opportunity of joining.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Oct. 2.
Prince Albert has joined the flagship Collingwood, of the home fleet, and will do the same work as the other midshipmen. He will get his commission as lieutenant at the age of 22 years.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.
Harry Vardon and Edward Ray, famous English golfers, will have another chance to meet Francis Ouimet within another month. It is announced that the Englishmen have also arranged another match with Ouimet and Travers for November.

LONDON, Oct. 2.
Events seem to be moving rapidly toward a grave industrial crisis, says the Times, though it may be postponed for a time. Recent indications forbid the hope that it can altogether be averted, and signs pointing to a speedy development are multiplying. One of the most ominous is the fact that yesterday the master cotton spinners' federation decided to close all spinning mills from October 5th until the dispute in connection with the mills at Bolton are settled.

PANAMA, Oct. 2.
Two earthquakes of intensity and much more severe than any disturbance since Americans took possession of the canal zone, occurred last night. They were felt from Panama City to Colon. The first shock, which was slight, was quickly followed by one of longer duration which shook the buildings to their foundations. Church bells were set ringing, doors were thrown open and people were thrown from their beds. The first shock lasted five seconds. At midnight many people were gathered in the streets and so alarmed that they feared to return to their homes. According to the seismograph two other slight shocks were recorded, but were unnoticed by the people. The movements appear to be from west to east. There was no damage to the Canal, so far as has been reported.

SOUTHAMPTON, Oct. 2.
Very Rev. Herbert Hensley Hanson, Dean of Durham, created a sensation in the Church of England Congress in a speech in which he openly approved of divorce. The growth of the divorce movement, he said, was not to be explained by an outbreak of licentiousness. Its strength lay in the fact that it gave expression to a new Christian and of self-respect, facts that would not acquiesce to a situation which actually became degrading. It was an error, he said, to fasten attention to divorce statistics as if any importance attached to them. What really mattered was the standard of personal purity. The audience listened with some strain of uneasiness to Hanson's views, and were manifestly relieved when he concluded. Other delegates insisted the Church must maintain the doctrine of the permanency of marriage.

Friend of the Fat Man.

This Doctor Tells How They May Reduce Their Too Solid Flesh.

The latest remedy for obesity has been set forth by Dr. Galish, a German physician. He claims one of the main causes for an increase of weight is the late dinner hour. Food taken in the evening and then followed by the repose of the night is the best thing in the world for forming of adipose tissue, and those who lament their increasing weight should stop that particular form of pleasure the first thing.

His treatment in a dietary is as follows: In the morning the patient must take a cup of tea with buttered toast, and if he is too hungry to wait for luncheon he may take an egg and some bread and butter at 10 o'clock. At 1 o'clock the meal consists of meat, vegetables, salad and a little compote; in the afternoon some coffee, with a little white bread and butter. And in the evening there is only a small piece of bread and butter.

For the first two or three days the patient will feel extremely hungry in the evening, but this soon passes off, and he gets into the habit of eating more at the first two meals, this being counteracted by exercise in the afternoon.

It is claimed for Mr. Galish that his patients lose one or two pounds a week.—Chicago Tribune.
