



> Petrograd Jan. 12 -A curious aviation incident happened a while ago beween the German and Russian trenches in Poland, which were only a few hundred yards apart. A Russian aviator having completed a reconnaisance over the German positions was reurning, and apparently feeling fairly safe after having got past the artillery positions, came down preparatory to landing behind his own lines. He was promptly fired at by the Germans, who nut three bullets through the benzine tank. This necessitated placing down, and the aviator landed about half way between the opposing

trenches. The Germans did not continue shooting, but thinking the prize secured, rushed out empty handed to bring in the machine. The Russians did the same thing and a hearty bout of fisticuffs took place between the two lines for possession of the prisoner and aeroplane. The Russians finally saved the man and ran off with the aeroplane, but were then fired upon from the German trenches.

On the following day the Russians got even by bringing down a German aeroplane behind their lines. The Germans carry besides the ordinary tank a supplementary one, which can be turned either to prolong the voyage or o save themselves if the first tank is lamaged. On this occasion a Russian bullett severed some of the essentlal connecting parts and the German avi-



FRENCH OFFICIAL REPORT.

PARIS, Jan. 15.

The French War Office this after noon, gave out a statement which says: From the sea to the Lys there were vesterday artillery engagements made progress near Lombaertzyde Arras a brilliant attack by Zouaves resulted in the capture at the bayonet of positions of the enemy near the road between Arras and Lille. In this same region, at Targette and at St. Laurent, as well as at a point to the north of Andechy, in the region of Roye, our artillery secured advantage over that of the enemy. VICTIMS OF HUN BRUTALITY.

"August 21, the priest of Duechene an invalid, seventy-seven years old, Why should I weep? I am his fore- suffering from disease, was accused by the Germans of having fired on Whose name and ring I wear with them. He was arrested, hoisted on a cannon, tossed into a ditch, tortured and shot.

"A witness deposes that he saw the priest Geirode brought into Aershot on August 24 with three wounded men. The Germans said he was an English spy, and took him to the town hall. The following day they beat him with rifle butes and then on the Demer' bridge they shot him and cast his body into the river.

"A priest makes the following de-"On August 15 German soldiers

swarmed into the village of Schaffen and began to burn and pillage on the pretence that shots had been fired on them. One hundred and seventy houses were burned and twenty-seven civilians were murdered.

"'The Germans maltreated me in every way. They erected a gallows on which they said they proposed to hang me. They thrust me into house which was on fire, but dragged me out again. They sent me off, and at a distance of 200 yards they began shooting at me. I fell and pretended to be dead, and so escaped."



NEW RUSSIAN ARMY IN FIELD.

LONDON, To-day. The latest official reports from the Russian General Staff disclose new operations on the part of the Russian cavalry commenced a forward move ment in Northern Poland on the right bank of the Lower Vistula River have reached the Skrwa River, driving a small force of German cavalry and infantry before them. It is believed the Grand Duke Nicholas, Commander in Chief of the Russian forces, intends to use an entirely new army, consisting according to Petrograd despatch of from 800,000 to 1,000,000 men in tais region. Operating in conjunction with an army which is advancing in East Prussia this army would place the German troops at Mlawa in a vice and at the same time threaten the Germans in front of Warsaw. The latter are still making occasional attacks on the Russian line and according to a Berlin report, have taken a Russian vantage point, Northeast of the Rawka River. Along the rest of the Eastern front nothing of importance has happened. 
