





THE BEST IN HISTORY - SALT SCARCITY.

From parties who arrived from the 3. W. Coast by the S. S. Portia this morning we learn that the codfishery in that centre is a remarkable sucess; in fact to use Captain Joe Kean's own words, "It's the best in the history of the coast." Thus far there more than treble as much fish ashore as there was up to the end of the autumn season last year, but a regretable feature is the scarcity of salt. Owing to the absence of a sufficient supply of this very essential article in a couple of places several hundred

quintals of fish have been spoiled. The Bank fishery also promises to be an unparalleled success, principally attributed to the fact that the bankers are fortunately scuring plenty of squid on the grounds, thereby avoiding the undue delays which they previously experienced in looking for bait. At Burin, Grand Bank, St. Jacques, Belleoram, Hr. Breton and other well known banking centres vessels are arriving daily from the Grand Banks with big fares. Amongst the high-liners are Capts. Thornhill and Cluett, of Burin, each having landed four thousand quintals of cod to date. By finish up time they hope to "clean up" another thousand each.

British War Cars Filled Russian Gaps.

Held Up Teuton Advance for Hours and Inflicted Huge Losses on Enemy.

July 31.—The London imes correspondent, telegraphing from the headquarters of the Russian Seventh Army on July 28, gives a description of the part played by the British armored cars in stemming the enemy's advance when the Russian defections left great gaps in the line. He says:

"The Russians remained in the trenches as long as the armored cars stayed with them, but as the Austrians advanced and the Germans were crying out 'Hurrah,' the Russians, of their own accord, flung down their rifles and ran for their lives. Despite this shocking defection we attempted to keep the enemy back in order to stem the retreat, but it was appossible. We had to give way, and the fleeing Russians crowded our cars, breaking them down, so that we lost three, which we had to abandon.

"A similar state of affairs occurred with the other squadrons which yards." checked the Austrians and managed to keep the advancing infantry back until their artillery arrived, rendering further assistance impossible Russian retreat became a rout, and though we went into action time and again during the day the effect produced was only local. 




