America's

Answer.

On September 16th, when the German armies retreating in France and Belgium were destroying every bit of property that could be of any use to the invaded countries after the war, and enslaving the inhabitants, the American State Department received a protest from the German Government that the sale of German-owned property in the United States was "consciously almed to do lasting injury to German economic existence." As usual the protest was followed by a threat to retaliate. The only answer vouchsafed was an annonuncement that eleven concerns, valued at more than \$100,000,000 would be sold between October 21st and December 10th. It is intended to wipe out entirely the interest of German banks and industries in American industries. Already more than 200 enemy-owned concerns, valued at about \$300,000,000, have been sold to American citizens. The total value of the enemy-owned property taken over by the Custodian of Alien Property in the United States, is between \$700,000,000 and \$800,000,000. The American-owned property in Germany is estimated to be worth about \$14,000,000.—Morning Chronicle.





Of course I know the man and while I am ready to take my ployment, I have partners in the business and there are circumstances that I cannot control. Just consider these facts: A man cannot be placed in a job for which he is not fitted; suitable vacancies for men who are disabled cannot be created as if by magic: the Vocational Officer cannot to the whole thing, the man for whom he is trying to find employment has part to perform likewise.

This man called on me for the first time and in response to the invitation of the Civil Re-establishment Commitdeavoured to learn from him his fitness for work and the kind of employment that he thought he could undertake. He is not very strong and the choice is not a very wide one. He then suggested a position as attendant in the Lunatic Asylum. After thinking this proposition over, I concluded that he was not fitted for the work, but by October 3rd I was able to offer him what seemed to be a must suitable job and that was the position of orderly in the Penitentiary. He interviewed the Governor of the Penitentiary and declined the position. To the best of my knowledge he has not been to see me since and I naturally concluded that he had obtained suital le work. So far as he has permitted me to do so, I have treated him with

The regrettable thing about it is that without this often superficial knowledge teachers will not retain their schools, even if fortunate enough to secure them. Here is a golden opportunity for the

Government to prove its gratitude to some of Newfoundland's heroes. The percentage of teachers that have fought in this war is one that justifies some tangible mark of esteem and encouragement; moreover. the need of a Training College for our teachers was never greater nor will it ever be more clearly shown than in the next few years.





Parcel Post for Nfld. Expeditionary Forces!

The attention of the public is drawn to the very urgent necessity of strictly observing the regulations published by this Department from time to time concerning the despatch of parcels to members of the Regiment overseas and the following particulars should be strictly observed:

(1) Parcels must not exceed eleven pounds.

- (3) Parcels should bear the name and address of a second addressee to whom the parcel may be delivered or forwarded, if it should prove impossible to deliver to the first. The Original address should be written on the FRONT of the parcel where the postage stamps and customs declaration are affixed, and the second or alternative address should be written
- of posting and delivery cannot be effected, the contents of the parcel, unless of exceptional value or of a personal nature, will be turned over to the Military Authorities for
- (5) Parcels containing articles of personal nature or of special value will be returned if request for their return, in case of non-delivery, is made by the sender, such request to be written on the cover of the parcel at the time of posting.
- (6) The procedure outlined in (4) and (5) is adopted at the suggestion of the British Post Office, to prevent the waste of a large quantity of perishable food stuffs which form the contents of 90 per cent. of parcels sent to

(7) Parcels should be packed securely.

(8) Attention is drawn to the Notice concerning Christmas parcels recently published by the Postmaster General. All Christmas mail for B. E. F. should be posted in time to arrive at the Pay and Record Office, London, not later
