Mr. Chairman and Rotarians: You, who have the encouragement of the Tourist traffice so much at heart, will appreciate my embarrassment when I am sometimes asked by visitors, "Have you a Public Library?" And when I answer "No our Public Library was destroyed in the Great Fire," they again ask, "When did the fire occur?" I very reluctantly answer, "1892." This, indeed, is a reflection on our community. We should have a Public Library, and the number of its volumes should at least be equal to the population of the city.

(a) Public Works Department—Accounts due must be presented, duly certified, at the Department before noon on Mondays and Thursdays, payment being made on the following Wednesdays and Saturdays.

(b) Agriculture and Mines Department—Every day but Monday, on which day accounts are

(c) Marine and Fisheries Departmentand Friday.

(d) Postal Telegraph Department-Tuesday and

In the event of any of these days being a holiday, payments will be made on the following day.

All bills, duly certified, payable by the above Departments (b.c.d.) should be rendered not later than the morning of the day preceding pay day. (2) All cheques, drafts and other documents, repre-

senting money, in payment of Fees or Dues of any kind whatsoever to any Government Department must be made out in the name of the Department and not in that of any individual official thereof. The several Public Departments and their subsi-

dary offices in the Outports have been directed to refuse to accept, in payment of amounts due the Government, any cheques which are not properly endorsed and stamped and which have not been certified by the Bank on which they are drawn, or the paying Bank in the case of cheques drawn outside of Newfoundland.

(4) In view of the lack of general compliance with the law in respect of stamping receipts as provided for by the Stamp Act (Consolidated Statutes 3rd Series Cap. 28), the attention of the Public is drawn to the following provisions thereof, viz:

"Receipts for any sum of money exceed-"ing ten dollars (\$10.00) shall be stamp-"ed with adhesive or impressed stamp "of the value of two cents. "An instrument shall not be duly "stamped unless the stamp affixed thereto

"is cancelled." The Public is warned that no receipt is valid unless these provisions are complied with.





which there may be a demand. The Memorial College will be associated with the principal universities of North America and the British Isles, and its certificate accepted pro tanto. In the case of the universities in North America, this will reduce the residence abroad to two years

The President is at present engaged in securing a suitable staff of Professors for the institution. Mr. S. P. Whiteway, B.Sc. (Columbia University), will continue in charge of the teacher-training or normal classes.





#### The Country's Producers

Dear Sir.-Kindly allow me the use of your valuable space to answer the

Some of my friends and correspondents have combated with me with the assertion that the only producers of wealth in Newfoundland are those who are producing goods for export. Some go so far as to assert that the only producers are the fishermen. Let

A fisherman producing codfish, preserved with salt and slightly dried with sun and air. Let us take one hundred pounds of it which will cost us say seven dollars. This fish has produced let us say the full seven dolars worth of a new commodity . There wear and tear on gear that are the product of former labour, but for the sake of brevity we will not consider them here. So we take the proluct of the fisherman to the full value

The hundred pounds of fish is taken nto a fish factory, is washed, dried, skinned, hones removed, cut into strips, shredded, packed into paper boxes, wood boxes and bottles, for market to the consumers of Newbundland and the world. The fish factory thus converts our seven dolthe fish factory have taken the pronet of the fishermen and have produced a new product of food worth three times the original raw material as supplied by the fishermen.

The factory workers have thus proluced or created by their labors twice the purchasing power created by the fishermen in producing the original salt fish. If the salted fish had been bought in say Norway and brought here for manufacture then the factory workers here would be producing in Newfoundland double the value of the original fish.

Newfoundland workers in the fish factory would thus be producing for Newfoundland and themselves more value by double than the fishermen in Norway would have created in their country by producing the original fish. This is the key to the value of manufacturing of any and all kinds to Newfoundland or any country in which the manufacturing is done. Now again taking our own fish, as we would, the factory workers would create or produce fourteen dollars value that is fourteen dollars producing power for Newfoundlanders and the fishermen seven dollars on this hundred pounds of fish, in all twentyone dollars value.

I think it will now be made apparent to thinking people that the factory worker is a producer as well as the fisherman and if we change the materials and take a stocking factory using wool as the raw material, the factory worker who makes the stocking is just as much a producer as if he worked in a fish factory or as a fisherman catching fish.

### **Body Fatigue Poison** is Still a Mystery

That hard physical labor causes fatigue has been known for hundreds of thousands of years, yet the immediate cause of fatigue remains still a mystery. #### Claims Lying Caused Death of Petersen

W. T. R. PRESTON TALKS OF THE DEATH OF BRITISH SHIPPING

Ottawa, June 16.—(By Canadian Pess).-W. T. R. Preston, whose report to the Dominion Government charged that the North Atlantic Conference was a steamship conference operating in restraint of Canadian trade, told newspaper men here today that the death of Sir William Petersen, British shipping magnate, who died here last Friday, was caused by "damnably lying" cablegrams sent to the directors of his company by "agents of the shipping combine." Mr. Preston and F. McGregor, Private Secretary to Premier King, acompanied the body, which left for

England to-day. "They killed him," Mr. Preston repeated. "They cabled lies to his directors that Sir William proposed going ahead with a contract for two years without any guarantee from the Canadian Government.

This was absolutely false, the contract was going through for a trial period of two years to see what results would be obtained. But there was never any question of Sir William going through with the scheme without any assistance from the Govern-

"And that killed him. It was the last straw. He worried about it terribly as he was unaccustomed to such outages back home in England. where man in public life is given at least some fair treatment.







### Joyous Party Plunged

New York, June 17.-Five separate investigations were under way to-day in the wreck of a Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad tourist specal train at Rockport Sag, N. J., sixty miles west of here, in which 42 persons were killed and 36 injured.

The train carried 182 German-Americans, mostly from Chicago bound for Hoboken, N. J., to embark on the liner Republic to visit their homeland. Only eighty sailed on the Republic

Speeding on a down grade the seven car train hit a stretch of muck and debris that had been washed over the tracks by an electrical storm early yesterday. The heavy engine plouged through, but the pony tender was thrown off the tracks. It clutched the frogs of a switch farther on and wrenched the engine and four steel cars from the rails. Three cars piled up on top of the overturned engine The steam pipes burst and sent scalding fog spouting directly onto the pas-






