He was born in 1797, and entered the army at the somewhat mature age of 27, purchasing a cornetcy in the 7th Hussars. EXCOMMUNICATED.—The Lords of the Admiralty have been reluctantly compelled to remove the name of Captain, the Honorable Augustus C. Hobart, brother to Lord Hobart, who has figured as a writer on the Alabama claims, from the Navy List, in consequence of his having accepted an appointment under the Turkish Government, without, in the first instance, having consulted the wishes of their lordships. At the same time we believe that the difficulty of Captain Hobart's position has been well considered at Whitehall. 
