CARDINAL MANNING

Interviewed on the Church in Americ

London, June 14. —I called by appoint ment at the residence of Cardinal Manning in Vauxhall Bridge road. "I long to see America and know the Americans," the cardinal said; "but, alas! I am too old. know but one journey to make now. Forty times have I traveled to Rome, and I am well weary of that journey. The position of the church in America is to me o great interest. You see, in America the church has lost nothing—it never had anything to lose. There you have no aristocracy handing down the traditions of the anglican church; no powerful territorial interest operating against Rome; there you have not the effects of 300 years of anglican church; the church is former to the church in the church is the church in the church in the church in the church is the church in the church in the church in the church is the church in the church has been entired in the church has been entired in the church has lost nothing—it never had anything the church had any can prestige. The church is free and un

can prestige. The church is free and untrammelled."
Discussing religious against secular education the cardinal said: "I have the worst fears for the future in England. In France the secularists have full right to exercise their tyranny. In Belgium the position is almost as bad, though recent events have improved the position of the clerical party. As to America, quoing the opinion of the bishop of St. Paul, Minn., he said: "The influence of the sevententh century English puritan blood is too strong to allow the sacred tie of parent and child to be severed by the tie of parent and child to be severed by the sate. In England we have lost the ear of the people; but the church makes marvelous strides. She was never more pure, free, independent and powerful."

"The church has been to an extent driven from the position which it had attained. Whether she will ever be restored to that position no man knoweth, but this we do know? No man who lays hand on the vicer of Christ (and thus on the church) The cardinal spoke highly of the work of the blue ribbon army, but condenned the operations of Gen. Booth. Appearance and Reality. If we were to judge by appearance only, we might suppose that the candidate chosen by the republican national convention is beaten even before it is known who his democratic opponent is to be. That is to say, by appearances in the newspaper world chiefly, the fact being that a number of influential republican journals have come out "flat footed" against their own party's candidate. In New York the Times, the Evening Post, and Harper's Weekly, and in Massachusetts the Boston Advertiser and Springfield Republican, all journals of large circulation and influence, say that the nomination is a bad one, and that as between Blaine and an honest, respectable demograt they would prefer the latter. And there is quite a formidable list of other republican journals besides, which say that they will "bolt" the nomination.

Appearances certainly look bad for Blaine, as far as the attitude of a portion of the republican press is concerned. In more ways than one the opposition to Blaine, within the ranks of his own party, looks very streng-on paper. But if we look below appearances, and try to get at the reality, we may find good reason for uestioning whether the "bolting" journals do in this matter represent more than a very small minority of republican votes. Their avowed objection to Blaine is that when in congress he was mixed up in several rather shady transactions, and was in fact guilty of jobbery and cor-ruption. An inquiry into the proofs offered in support of this charge might fill a whole congressional record, and doubtless the democrats will see to it that the country is flooded with campaign literature bearing on the subject, but the Canadian press can scarcely take interest enough in the charge to go over its details. But one rather important fact in Blaine's favor may fairly be pointed out. Four years ago the entire republican press accepted Garfield without that very little of the jobbery laid to Blaine's charge could be proved against him without implicating Garfield more o less. Garfield's nomination was hailed as that of a christian statesman, of blameless life and without reproach. When Garfield entered upon power he quickly showed where he stood with regard to Blaine by making him secretary of state, thus placing in his hands the most important office in the cabinet. Further, none of the republican papers now opposing Blaine made any objections to the president's choice for his chief minister, but gave either silent acquiescence or active approval. All the charges made against Blaine had been made before Garfield's accession, they had been freely ventilated by

We have before said in these columns that what republican opposition there is to Blaine draws its strength and sustenance mostly from a small but wealthy and influential clique of eastern free traders. The New York Tribune says that the socalled "business men's boom," which was started in favor of Arthur, and is still continued against Blaine, is and has been all the time run by importers and agents of European financial houses; and every day's news brings facts in confirmation. 
