In Bar The year of 1874 will be long remembered be by many residents, as the year in which Lord Dufferin visited the town, as well as other parts of Muskoka and Parry Sound. In 1858 to the Government commenced the extension of the Northern Division of the G.T.R. from Washago north. In 1859 it was opened to South Falls, 3 miles below B. For some time the two branches of the river has presented an almost insurmentable obstacle to settlers, but with the completon of the road these barriers were successfully removed. The Northern and E. J. road now runs from Gravenherst to Callander on Lake Nipissing some 110 miles distant. The first settler was John Beal who took up his residence where B. now is, as recently as 1861. Under the old formation the townships of Draper, Macoulay, Stephenson, Ryde and Oakley were situated in Victoria county. In 1870 the county Council passed a bylaw separating Magaulay and Stephenson from the others, forming them into 2 separate municipalities. 


