Farm Items.

The American Agriculturalist, after telling its readers that it pays in various ways to procure seeds and implements in the season as practicable, gives a list of well tried standard varieties of vegetables that have given general satisfaction last year, which we quote below for the benefit of our farmer friends.

Apples.—Queen of the Golden is the favorite. Argentinian is no better, if not worse, and it requires three or four years from sowing time till it becomes fit for use. We cannot get on the value of 'Palmetto' in the North.

Beans.—Among Best Beans, Early Yentner and Monark are capital green-fleshed sorts, and Golden Wax, yellow-fleshed. Among Lima Beans, Dresser's Improved for quality is the best, and for earliness and early maturity Blue Extra Early is the best. Challenger and King of the Garden have large pods and large beans, but are not so prolific as Dresser's.

Best.—The Egyptian for summer and fall use, with some Lima smooth blood for winter. Egyptian, a new Egyptian, the Best, is a capital variety.

Cabbage.—Early Jersey Wakefield for earliness, Early Summer Flat Dutch and American Drumhead for winter. For fall and winter, Drumhead Navy, Challenger and King of the Garden have large pods and large beans, but are not so prolific as Dresser's.

Carrots.—For family use exclusively, Early Scarlet Horn and Halfing Stump-rooted. Besides the spring sowing, sow again early in July.

Cauliflower.—Snowball or Early Erfurt for early; Early Erfurt Algiers, or Lanorand for late.

Celery.—White Plume from September till Christmas; Golden Heart for main crop, also London Red.

Corn.—White Extra Early Marblehead for earliest for main crop, early Concord; for late, Stowell's Evergreen. The varieties of corn often behave very differently in different localities.

Cucumbers.—Improved White Spine, Salamander and Deacon for frames. Lettuce.—Tennis Ball for frames, Salamander and Deacon for general crop.

Onions.—Yellow Danvers, Watersfield Large Red, and Southampton White Globe.

Parsnips.—Long Smooth. Parsley.—Extra Moss Curled.

Peas.—Improved Daniel, D'Urbere, earliest; also, next Champion of England (needs brushing) for main crop. American Wonder is one of the best Dwarf Peas. If sown soon at one time, a gap of some three weeks will occur between the first and last crops.

Wise mothers see that the children always have dry feet. Shoes should be loose enough to be comfortable, but not so loose as to give them any support. John's Court.

This portion of the bird family of which the curlew is the leading type is remarkable for the manner in which its different members are scattered abroad. The curlew itself spreads over nearly the whole of the deserts of Africa, the savannah, with its horrid helmet, represents it and the luxuriant vegetation of Malacca and Java.

With the Arabs of the desert the chase and capture of the curlew is the most attractive and wasteful of the many diversions in which they indulge. The first thing attended to when a hunt is contemplated is the preparation of the horses. They are entirely deprived of grass and fed on barley for seven or eight days before the intended hunt.

Having a first-class horse's fall power, the curlew is also under great management. The harness used in this hunting is much lighter than that in ordinary use, and the martingale is dispensed with.
