*Commercial Summary.*

The German empire will not hereafter issue new loans at a higher annual rate of interest than 2 1/2 per cent.

Mrs. J. L. SIMPSON, a small storekeeper, of Chesley, is endeavoring to effect a compromise at 50 cents in the dollar. She has never made more than a bare living.

THOS. R. HOGAN, a barber and tobacconist, of Yarmouth, N. S., has assigned with liabilities of \$800 and assets of \$500. He is said to have neglected his business somewhat.

DEBUENE & HUNTER started a small grocery in Cornwall last winter. The profits were evidently so small to support two people, and they now assign with liabilities of \$1,000 and assets of \$500.

THE Bank of Commerce has, it is understood, purchased a site on the corner of King and Jordan streets, Toronto, opposite Manning Arcade, for the purpose of erecting a commodious bank building.

The action taken by Mr. Thomas Brophy, against Messrs McLachlan Bros., for \$50,000 damages, arising out of the recent customs affair in which the firm was concerned, has been settled out of court.

THE first consignment of cattle from Manitoba to Montreal arrived a few days ago in fine condition. They are chiefly Durhams. They were removed from the cars and fed about every twenty-four hours.

THE average exportation of horses from Canada to the United States for some years past has been 22,000 head. A few years ago the average value per head of horses so imported was \$95, whereas last year it was \$140.

THE career of Smith and Rawlison, grocers, of Kilmount, Ont., has been a brief one. They started on the first of the month, dissolved a few days later, and now the remaining partner has been closed up by a Woodstock creditor.

H. H. SMITH, dry goods merchant, of Bedford, Que., has assigned with liabilities of \$2,000 and assets nominally equal in value. An offer of 50 cents in the dollar, secured, payable in 3, 6 and 9 months, has been accepted by the creditors.

D. C. BULLOCK & Co., general storekeepers, of Brighton, Ont., are endeavoring to compromise with their creditors at 62½ cents in the dollar. They carried far too large a stock, and heavy expenses and keen competition have proved too much for them.

JULIUS DASTOUS, a small tobacconist, on St. Antoine Street, has assigned to Seath & Davely. His liabilities are placed at \$1,500 and assets probably \$100 less. No cause is assigned for the failure as the business was always supposed to be a remunerative one.

AN English exchange states that Colonel Good, late of the 107th regiment, and formerly Lieut.-Governor of Guernsey, has decided to settle in Canada, as a direct result of the impression produced by the exhibits of Canadian products at the Colonial Exhibition.

J. RAMSAY & Co., general storekeepers, of Brampton, Ont., who bought out the stock of W. Wilson last November, have called a meeting of creditors at which it was decided that an assignment should be made. Liabilities are \$16,000 and assets probably \$1,000 less.

R. H. THOMPSON, tailor, of Mount Forest, Ont., is a young man formerly a cutter, who started in business for himself with his savings as capital. He has not found it remunerative and has assigned with small liabilities after a struggle of about a year to make ends meet.

C. P. GINSON, fruit dealer, of Winnipeg, Man., has assigned in trust after a few months experience of business.—Hugh Jones, a Dresden shoe dealer, has assigned. His business was too small to pay running expenses, and the stock is now advertised for sale by auction.

J. L. BARNER & Co., furniture dealers, of Waterford, Ont., have assigned with liabilities of \$7,000. The senior partner has been in business for many years, the son being admitted 3 or 4 years since. Too much credit and an accumulation of bad debts are given as the cause of the failure.

Mrs. HEAR, dry goods dealer, of Owen Sound, started in 1884 with a new stock, all paid for, and every prospect of success. She

now assigns.—R. Bennett, hotel-keeper, of Sterling, Ont., has assigned, with liabilities of \$2,000 and assets probably \$1,300. He was formerly at Queensville.

ACHILLE PERRAULT, a small storekeeper, of St. Guillaume, Que., has assigned. He has been in business a little over a year, but has never made more than a meagre living and is now compelled to seek relief in an assignment. From the first his chances of success were never considered bright.

THE Institute of British carriage manufacturers is making detailed inquiries as to Canadian woods, with special reference to their suitability for carriage-building purposes. It is believed that these inquiries will lead to the more general use among British carriage builders of the timber of the Dominion.

MALISTER & Co., tailors, of Trenton, Ont., have assigned with liabilities owing principally to Toronto houses. He was formerly in business at Napanee, where he assigned in September, 1885, his stock being bought in by his brother at 62½ cents in the dollar. He started at Trenton in the early part of this year.

J. A. G. DELFOSSE, hardware dealer, of this city, has assigned with liabilities of \$2,500 and stock valued at \$2,000. He commenced business for himself less than a year ago, having been previously clerk in a wholesale hardware house. Last week a seizure for rent unpaid was put in which compelled him to assign.

vival of trade. For the last four weeks in July the receipts amounted to \$219,000 more than in 1875, and so far in August the returns promise to be fully as satisfactory, running up for the first fourteen days to \$120,000 more than last year.

JOSEPH WILLIAMS, grist miller, of Glen Williams, Ont., whose financial difficulties have already been chronicled in these columns, has made an assignment.—J. H. Thompson, stationer and insurance agent, of Bobcaygeon, who also held several municipal offices, is stated to have left that town, leaving some debts behind him.

SCHUYLER W. SHIMLEY, grocer, and his wife, milliner, of Strathroy, Ont., have both assigned. Liabilities are about \$3,500, with assets of \$1,000 less. They have been in business about four years.—Alexander & Foster, carriage makers, Orono, Ont., have called a meeting of their creditors. They have been there about a year.

The Dominion government have begun the survey for the proposed subway between Prince Edward Island and the mainland. The *Examiner* says the schooner *Cygnets* left Pictou with the sets of boring apparatus and corps of experts, with buoys, anchors, etc., and that work will be prosecuted vigorously during the fine weather.

J. B. G. PERREAULT, hardware dealer, of this city, has assigned with liabilities of \$13,000

and assets estimated at \$4,000 only. Of these liabilities, \$8,130 direct and \$275 indirect are due to a namesake. A meeting of creditors was held at the office of Seath & Daveluy, when it is understood that an offer made by the insolvent was refused.

During the last few months a new industry has sprung up in the Northwest—that of shipping hogs to eastern points. In one day recently, nine cars, seven for Toronto, and two for Ingersoll, left Winnipeg. This trade promises to grow to large proportions. The hogs are gathered up from farmers all over the province and command good prices.

HORMSDAS LUSSIER, has been in business as a grocer in this city for thirteen years past. Last spring he changed his stand and does not appear to have done well in his new location, or to have given his business that close attention which is essential to success. His liabilities are about \$1,000, with assets of \$900, and the estate will probably pay 25 cents in the dollar.

T. G. GOULDING, general storekeeper, of Innerkip, Ont., formerly did business at Cooksville, whence he removed to Innerkip in May, 1885. He evidently did not benefit by the change as he is compelled to assign.—John Turner, storekeeper, of Kinburn, Ont., was formerly at Fitzroy Harbor, whence he removed early this year. He did only a small business and now assigns.

The *Medicine Hat Times* complains that although the coal mines seven miles west of that place are turning out good coal, they cannot afford to mine and ship on account of the exorbitant rate of freight charged. It says that while the tariff from here to Winnipeg is over \$5 per ton, Pennsylvania coal is hauled over 2,000 miles, duty paid, and sold in Winnipeg for \$8 per ton.

GUNN BROS., of Ailsa Craig, have made arrangements to establish a flax mill, the town giving a bonus of \$1,000. Forty to fifty hands will be employed, and about 300 acres of land will be required on which to raise the flax. The mill will be used for the purpose of manufacturing dressed flax, green tow, fine and coarse tow and linseed oil. It will be exempt from taxes for ten years.

A CALGARY rancher says that at least thirty thousand head of cattle have gone into the Calgary districts during the past summer. There are now at least 100,000 head of cattle in that section, distributed among sixty ranches. Up to the present there has always been a sufficient local demand to enable them to dispose of their surplus stock, but by next fall they would have to begin to ship to eastern markets.

MR. WILLIAM JAGO, well-known in connection with the testing of wheats and flours on behalf of British millers and others, is making a tour through Canada to report upon the

Abolun G. Moutis, cigar importer, of this city, has assigned. The cause of his failure is the fact that he is interested in the Isaac disappearance to the extent of about \$6,000 for accommodation paper signed by him, and that the bank is now pushing for settlement. His liabilities amount to \$34,000, and his assets to \$12,800 only. Mr. Morris offered a composition of 25 cents in the dollar, payable in three, six, and nine months, unsecured, which was refused by the creditors, but if security can be obtained the offer will probably be accepted.

shares of \$50 each, has been incorporated; the Williams, Greene & Rome Co., of Berlin, (Limited), for the manufacture of linen shirts and collars, with a capital stock of \$60,000, divided into shares of \$100 each; the Central Press Agency of Toronto, with capital stock of \$2,000, divided into 20 shares of \$100 each; the Sarnia Canadian Printing Co., of Sarnia, with capital stock of \$25,000, divided into 500 shares of \$50 each, have also obtained acts of incorporation.

The shipments of teas from producing countries have been large this year, but one cargo, that of the S. S. *Aberdeen*, will drop out of the calculations of importers, as Messrs. J. Duncan & Co., city, have received word from China that this vessel, which sailed from Hankow, for London, with 4,500,000 pounds, has foundered at sea. regular way, all he has to do is to include in his invoice of goods a few chests of tea and the whole is sure to come to hand.

F. O. CHARLEBOIS, dry goods merchant, of this city, has assigned with liabilities of \$3,600, and assets nominally showing a surplus, but which will shrink largely if realized. He was in trouble last February, when his liabilities were about \$8,000. He succeeded then in compromising at 25 cents in the dollar, secured by his father-in-law, payable in 3, 6, and 9 months. It is understood that the first payment has been met. Mr. Charlebois attributes his failure to the action of a large wholesale house who promised to allow him a small line of credit but afterwards declined to deal further with him on the ground of lack of confidence in his methods of doing business. Mr. Geo. Daveluy has been appointed curator.

The government has acted with commendable promptitude in slaughtering and cremating imported infected cattle at Quebec quarantine. The loss though great will be infinitesimal compared with that which would result if less stringent measures were adopted.

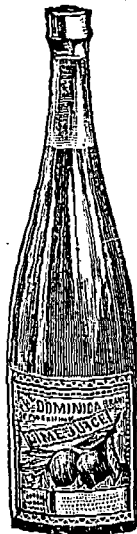

An order-in-council has also been passed prohibiting the importation of cattle into Canada from districts in Great Britain where disease is known to exist. The latest news is, that the valuable herd of polled Angus, imported by Mr. Andrew Allan, and said to be worth \$1,200 each, is also to be destroyed. In cases of this kind of contagious diseases, the act provides for compensation being made to the owner by the government to the extent of two-thirds of the value of the cattle destroyed, provided the amount per head does not exceed \$150.

J. A. GAGNON & Co., wholesale grocers and provision merchants, of Three Rivers, Que., are endeavoring to effect a compromise with their creditors on the basis of 50 cash or seventy-five cents in three, six, nine, and twelve months, unsecured. The firm commenced business in 1880 and in 1883 their warehouses were destroyed by fire, but were insured to their full value. The father, N. Gagnon, carries on a separate business in Champlain, under the style of N. Gagnon & Pils, which is managed by another son. The junior partner was previously unsuccessful at Berthierville in 1879, and compromised at 62½ cents in the dollar, his liabilities being assumed by his father. The liabilities of the present failure are estimated at \$60,000 indirect, and \$45,000 direct, or \$105,000 in all, and it is claimed that the assets will show

surplus of \$4,000. It is understood that many of the creditors have already accepted the offer of 75 cents on time.

LEOPOLD ISAACS, tobacco merchant, has, it is said, left the city, his office being closed. Mr. Isaacs came to this city about five years ago and commenced business with a partner under the title of Goldstein & Isaacs, who failed about a year and a half ago with liabilities of about \$70,000. Mr. Isaacs started again under the title of L. Isaacs & Co., the business being registered under the name of his daughter, Carrie L. Isaacs. He succeeded in obtaining a line of discounts with a French bank who had been creditors to the extent of \$15,000 to the defunct firm, by promising to pay off this indebtedness at a stated figure, provided banking facilities were granted to him, and then devoted his talents to the procuring and floating of accommodation paper, in which pursuit the number of firms involved in his failure shows him to have been uncommonly successful. The transaction which has led to his absence is as follows: A short time ago he went to Toronto and met one of the partners of a dyeing firm there and induced him, as the story goes, to exchange \$21,000 of his paper for \$10,000 worth of Isaac's paper and \$10,000 in cash, which latter, it is needless to say, was not forthcoming. Armed with these bills he proceeded to a leading bank and presented them for

discount, and the transaction was nearly consummated when the manager, whose suspicions became aroused, communicated with another member of the firm purporting to have given the notes, who promptly repudiated the transaction. Isaacs succeeded in obtaining the notes back from the bank and proceeded with them to Brantford, where one of his customers and endorsers resided, and offered the same paper to the local manager of the bank there. The manager telegraphed to Toronto and learning the true state of affairs, of course refused to discount the paper, but acting under instructions from his head office, retained \$7,000 of the notes to cover liabilities in his bank on accommodation paper already discounted there. Isaacs took the remaining \$14,000 and posted back to Montreal where he lodged them for discount at his own bankers, but in the meantime the Toronto firm had telegraphed their lawyers to seize the paper and arrest Isaacs. They at once obtained the balance of the notes, but Isaacs was not to be found, and has not since been seen. His liabilities, direct and indirect, will amount to over \$100,000, and the assets consist of tobaccos lodged with his various creditors to secure in part their advances. Four banks are interested, one French bank being in for \$76,000, more or less secured.

### THE FISHERY QUESTION.

The vexed question of the fisheries appears to have changed but little in its status since it was last referred to in these columns. The adhesion of Newfoundland to the doctrines laid down by the Dominion, although, owing to the absence of the funds necessary to render it practically effectual, it must be considered as more of a moral than a practical nature, has undoubtedly had the effect of strengthening the Canadian position both in the eyes of Europe and in those of the United States. On each side there is more of a conciliatory spirit manifested, and there is an evident desire on the part of both Governments to arrive at some *modus vivendi* by which an arrangement satisfactory to the national pride of their respective nations could be made without incurring the odium of being the first to suggest negotiations.

With regard to the services rendered by the tiny fleet of cruisers established by the Government at so short a notice, considerable diversity of opinion appears to exist. From one source we hear that so far as any protection to the fisheries are concerned they might as well not be in existence, while others, equally reliable, assert that they have effectually put a stop

to the depredations of Yankee fishermen in our waters. Probably a middle course is the correct one. It is, as every practical man will admit, an absolute impossibility for a small fleet, composed, until the arrival of the newly purchased steamer, entirely of sailing vessels, to patrol effectually such an enormous extent of coast as our own, indented as it is throughout its entire length with numberless small harbors and shelters where a fishing schooner can find concealment even from the hawk eye of the Customs officer. That the commanders of the fishery cruisers have succeeded in making the seizures they have, in the face of the numerous restrictions and regulations by which their hands are fettered, is very creditable to their energy and tact, and that their vigilance has already made itself formidable to the marauding fishermen of Gloucester is abundantly manifest. We hear no more of armed American schooners fitting out to fish by main force wherever they please, on the contrary we find that the modern Gloucester fisherman is a remarkably civil and obedient gentleman whenever he comes within gunshot of the smallest Canadian cruiser. No doubt, the cruiser, like the average policeman, is often not to be found when most wanted, but when the number of cruisers available is contrasted with the extent of coast to be patrolled, we do not think that any slur can be justly cast upon the efficiency either of their commanders or of the Government who controls them.

It is perfectly evident that the facilities are all in favor of the fishermen and against the cruiser. The captain of the American-owned fishing schooner is frequently a Canadian, perfectly conversant with all the harbors and shelters of the coast on which he plies his vocation, and in many cases having friends or relations on shore. In one way or another he usually manages to be thoroughly conversant with the whereabouts of the cruiser on his station, and as he can easily, on her arrival in the offing, get beyond the three mile limit which bounds her jurisdiction, he can practically set her authority at defiance. Were the offending fishermen foreigners, speaking a different language, and having no affinities with the inhabitants of the shore, the task of the cruiser would be a comparatively easy one, but under the existing circumstances, when, as is no uncommon case, both the captain and crew of the offending vessel are Nova Scotians, living at home under the very laws they violate at sea, and having wives and families living under the Canadian flag, often in the very harbors they frequent, it is easy to see that the position of the cruiser captain is an exceedingly difficult one, and that therefore should he be unable to guard our fisheries as successfully as critics unacquainted with the peculiar difficulties

under which he labors, may think possible, the fault is attributable not to any want of vigor or energy on the part of himself or the Government, but rather to the anomalous nature of the circumstances against which he has to contend.

On the whole, the Canadian people may fairly be satisfied with the action of the Government in the fisheries question; the dignity of the country has lost nothing in their hands, in fact a growing respect for their aggressive and vigorous policy is apparent throughout the United States, and thus when this vexed question is finally set at rest, the settlement we think will be found to be such as will redound to the credit as well as to the advantage of the country.

#### THE TEA TRADE. (2)

With the abolition of the East India Company's monopolies in teas as well as on all trade in the British possessions in the East, came, as may be supposed, quite a revolution in the business. Great fears were excited about the quality of teas now that the strict examination of the Company was ended, but these proved largely not well founded. That adulterations were practised in the East was true to some extent, but all reliable, trained merchants, importers and dealers who knew their business had no occasion to touch such teas, and, as to-day, reliable men could be depended upon to furnish standard goods.

In eastern Canada the consumption for years continued almost wholly to be in Twankays and such kinds. Some Hysons, Gunpowder and Blacks were used, but the proportion was quite small. In the upper province Young Hysons of fine quality went principally into consumption. With the unjustifiable opium war of 1840, and later, came the opening permanently of certain ports in China, but the chief operations were carried on at Shanghai. Prices of teas advanced largely owing to the war, and it is a fact that at a cost of over 5s currency Young Hysons were sent by sleigh to Toronto in the winter of 1839-40. After the war prices became of course greatly reduced, and with varying values have continued mostly since at moderate rates, with the exception of the time of the American civil war, when values became again very high, so that common Young Hyson touched in 1861-62 as high as 65c @ 70c.

Soon after the opening of the Eastern trade to the world, some traders and importers introduced what were known as Canton teas, chiefly Gunpowders of fine appearance and highly colored, but very pernicious and objectionable. They were largely made from the once used leaf gathered up in the City of Canton by unprincipled parties, refined and colored heavily

and twisted with great skill, presenting a fine appearance. For a number of years this found buyers, chiefly with the French Canadian trade. Happily the introduction of Japan teas in 1861 caused the almost total disuse of these injurious teas, so that to-day in the remotest parts of the country it is almost universal to find Japan teas, and therefore, as a rule, only a reliable article. This is a change that has not been sufficiently considered, but it is one which the country can congratulate itself upon. The introduction of Japan teas was made as Blacks, but it was soon found they were not so, but were really Green teas in almost entirely natural state. Since then coloring has been used, more or less, its chief component being Indigo. A table-spoonful of the liquid is usually sufficient for a half-chest of say 60 lbs. This coloring, as practised, is said to be quite harmless, and in fact of less consequence than the usual coloring of cheese. It is of value, in some respects, preventing injury to the tea from moisture on the voyage.

The great extension of the tea trade is remarkable. Few could have dreamed fifty years ago of such aids as special tea ships and a direct line through Canadian territory, and, if they did, they were scarcely sanguine enough to imagine they would live to see such dreams realized. The latest news is contained in a cable from Yokohama which reports the "Carrie Delap" full engaged to sail about the 25th inst. for Vancouver, B.C. The fifth vessel, the German barque "Bylgia," will follow, and be despatched about the 15th of September, with teas and general cargo from Hiogo and Yokohama, for the same destination. Cargo for New York and vicinity, ex "F. P. Stafford," "Zoroya" and following vessels, will be transhipped at Brockville, Ont., for Morristown, N.Y.; thence by the Utica & Black River Railroad to Utica, and over the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad to New York.

#### THE CHICAGO TRIALS.

The severe sentence passed by the jury in the trial of the anarchists at Chicago, and the universal approval by the press, with the exception, of course, of the so-called labor organs, of the verdict recorded against them, form significant evidence of the remarkable change that has taken place in the sentiments of our American neighbors towards these social agitators since the effect of their pernicious doctrines has been practically brought home to their own firesides.

So long as the socialist and dynamiter confined his outrages to European cities, a certain undercurrent of sympathy was distinctly apparent, both among the American public and in the columns of the public press for these men, who were looked upon as victims of the tyranny of the

crowned heads of Europe compelled to avenge centuries of oppression by sudden and violent means. It was only when men living under the free popular government of the United States, a rule whose freedom is only excelled by that under which Canada is making such giant strides towards prosperity, committed one of the most cruel and dastardly crimes of the century in the sacred name of liberty and freedom, that the people of the United States first awoke to the fact that there existed in their midst an organized body of cruel and unscrupulous fanatics whose idea of liberty may be described as a desire for universal license, and whose aim and object is to strike at all the foundations of social morality and religion, and to substitute for the present conditions of law and order, an hysterical creed of untrained license and blasphemy.

If the recent outbreak in Chicago proves nothing else, it proves satisfactorily that there exists among the more mystical and morbid races of Europe what may be termed a sect of men, call them anarchists, communists, socialists, nihilists, or what you will, whose aim and end is the subversion of all law. To them, even the absolute freedom and liberty of a popular government, a government elected by the people from its own ranks, represents the tyranny of a governing class, while amongst the more fanatical of this sect, every man whose industry has enabled him to lay by some small provision for his declining years, or who has been enabled to purchase a home for his family from his savings, is looked upon as a capitalist and oppressor and consequently as a victim whom it is not only lawful but meritorious to destroy by any of those merciless agents of destruction, which modern science has unfortunately placed within the reach of the poorest enthusiast.

From one point of view the recent outbreak at Chicago may be regarded, to a certain extent, as a blessing in disguise. It has destroyed the last sentimental harbor of refuge that the socialist and dynamiter has enjoyed and has thoroughly opened the eyes of the American people to the real character of those misguided men, whose acts they have always viewed with a certain degree of pity, if not sympathy, so long as they were directed against other governments than their own. Now that they see them in their true colors and have experienced the natural effects of a political creed which defines true liberty as the absolute abolition of all law, whether human or divine, their opinions of the socialist have materially altered, and the recent verdict at Chicago is not only the opinion of the jury but the expression of the unanimous abhorrence of the country at large. The rose colored veil through which the liberty loving people of the new

world have viewed these novel doctrines has been rudely torn away, and the fiendish creed of the legality of murder and outrage as a means for the propagation of universal license stands revealed in all its original blackness.

The hurling of the bomb in the streets of Chicago may be regarded as the death-blow to the hopes of socialism in America. The natural acuteness of the people rejects the absurd and high-flown platitudes which form its creed, while their better nature refuses to accept doctrines which inculcate the murder and mutilation of unoffending fellow-citizens as the natural concomitants of universal progress. The fiat of the American people has gone forth and public opinion on both sides of the Atlantic has unanimously decreed that the socialist and dynamiter must go.

#### IMPORTS AND EXPORTS.

A comparison of the latest official returns for the port of Montreal enable us to arrive at some definite conclusion as to the movement of merchandise, and it may be said at the outset that the figures, in connection with other features of general trade, are well calculated to inspire confidence. Exclusive of coin and bullion, the aggregate trade of Montreal for the seven months ended July 31, show an increase of \$3,046,947 over 1885, and of \$4,249,734 over 1884. Following were the figures, inclusive of coin and bullion:

The imports of merchandise for the seven months are therefore \$2,189,841 in excess of last year, while the exports of produce from Montreal during the same period show an increase of \$857,106 over 1885. If we compare the imports for July with those of the same month last year and the year previous, some interesting variations will be noticed. Thus wheat flour imported to the value of \$109,394 in 1884 had fallen to \$18,268 in 1885, rising again to \$37,395 in July last. The value of imports of cottons in July 1884-5-6 was respectively \$323,012, \$301,972 and \$129,554; coal, \$138,019, \$154,067 and \$186,208; iron and steel, \$301,273, \$334,414 and \$351,655; jewellery, \$28,555, \$24,863 and \$34,422; leather, \$66,650, \$63,082 and \$42,212; silk, \$189,634, \$150,095 and \$180,753; wines and spirits, \$51,405, \$79,338 and \$44,638; sugar, \$366,936, \$140,066 and \$36,980; woollens, \$665,145, \$677,974 and \$698,149;

paper, \$22,134, \$34,259 and \$32,968; paints, \$30,639, \$62,854 and \$24,975; oils, \$28,791, \$53,309 and \$36,328; glass, \$41,066, \$49,070 and \$48,543; furs, \$22,549, \$27,037 and \$20,299; fancy goods, \$94,631, \$64,658 and \$90,687, and drugs, \$81,102, \$40,597 and \$36,402.

#### THE BANK STATEMENTS.

The returns of the Chartered banks for July have been issued by the Finance Department. The changes in the principal accounts are not of any great importance. The paid-up Capital now stands at \$79,679,666, a decrease since last month of \$800,000, which represents the reduction in the Union Bank of Lower Canada. Circulation has fallen off \$317,000, which might be looked for at a time when farmers are too intent on gathering the

harvest to bring forward much produce of any kind to market. The greater part of the current month is subject to the same influence, but the latter half sees some movement of the new crop, and circulation and deposits are both likely to be increased thereby. Government and private Deposits are reduced \$446,000. There is an increase in the total of Government bonds held of \$331,000, partly caused by a purchase of \$256,000 worth by the Imperial Bank; the remaining \$75,000 has probably been acquired by a Toronto bank, but the statement is "out" that amount in the addition of the figures for Banks in Ontario.

Loans of all kinds are down \$752,000, a natural and wholesome result of the realization of some of the Assets produced by means of capital borrowed from the banks. The net balances due by agents abroad have increased \$1,217,000, which is also the result of realized assets. It means that for the month we sent abroad Canadian produce sufficient to pay the obligations incurred during the month, and to leave \$1,200,000 to apply on previous indebtedness or create a new credit for us abroad. During the present month there has been a strong inducement to increase holdings in New York in order to reap the benefit of the high rates that have prevailed, so that the August returns are likely to show even more marked changes in this respect than those under review.

Overdue debts show a large diminution for the month—something over \$400,000—but the greater part of this is in the figures furnished by the Union Bank, that institution having written off \$350,000 on the reduction of its capital. Some months ago when discussing the form imposed on banks for their statements to the Finance Department we called attention to the uselessness of dividing overdue items into "secured" and "unsecured," and to the folly of relying on the figures given under either heading as in any sense indices of the position of the Bank. The action of the Union Bank points the "moral" we drew. Of the loans reported as Current, no less than \$550,000 were so worthless that they have been written off altogether. Of the Past due bills \$350,000 were written off and about \$90,000 carried ward as good, so that there were more worthless assets held in current shape than as overdue. We do not for a moment suggest that there is any analogy between the position of the Union Bank and the banks generally. The former was in a desperate plight and had been for some time, as they frankly admit, but we do say that the occurrence shows how utterly worthless mere figures are as showing any Bank's true position, and, as a natural consequence, what a useless waste of time and trouble to the banks and the public is occasioned by the wire-drawn distinctions

introduced into the Government statements.

We append our usual comparative table of the returns. As regards the comparison with last year, we might remind our read-

ers that in July, 1885, there was a five million transaction between the Government and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company which increased foreign balances in that month by just that sum.

THE MONEY MARKET.

In our local market the week has been marked by a recovery in stocks, which are still on the upward move, notwithstanding that the high rates for money prevailing in New York have started lenders here in the same direction. The bull in the market was no doubt due to fears of increased cost in carrying stocks, and the recovery

to a belief that the New York movement was a mere flurry. At the present writing however, there is every appearance of a firmer market in that quarter for some time to come, and if so, money must sooner or later follow the lead. Equalization of the rate of interest is a fundamental law in the movement of capital, and money will not long be lent at 4 per cent. here if



7 per cent. can be got on equally good security in New York.

It may be interesting to consider, at a moment when great interest exists as to the effect which the disturbance in New York may have throughout Canada, the things which hamper this natural movement of rates to a common level. At first sight it might seem that since the banks (the larger ones at least) can now lend their money in New York at higher rates than are current here, they would at once call in their loans and transfer their funds to New York; with the inevitable result of higher rates here. But there are limitations. There are practically only three ways of placing money in New York, namely, (1) to buy drafts drawn against goods shipped, (2) to ship coin, or (3) to borrow in England by bills sold on the New York market. The first of these is a slow process, which obviously cannot be forced at all. The third would only be practicable were the market for sterling in New York strong enough to take the bills at a rate which would ensure their being covered later on at a profit or at least without a loss. This condition however, never co-exists with high rates for money, since many people will be trying to sell bills for the same purpose, and bankers do not care to buy when money can be more profitably employed in loaning. As to the second mode of placing money in New York, the shipment of coin, we in Canada are in a peculiar position. The main gold reserve of the country is carried by the finance department, and the authorities have adopted the policy, for just such contingencies as the present, of keeping the reserve almost wholly in British gold. As this is not legal tender in the United States it has to be sold to the mint as bullion, and a loss of  $\frac{1}{2}$  to  $\frac{3}{4}$  per cent. falls on the individual who endeavors to pay a debt in New York with English sovereigns. The connection of this with rates of interest is clear. If New York borrowers will pay high rates, and can be depended on to do so for a sufficient length of time to make good this loss, and leave something for a profit beyond what the money would earn here, gold will certainly be shipped. But there is an immediate loss to face at the start, and the duration of the high rates is uncertain, so matters remain, with slightly higher rates for the present, and an undercurrent of incertitude and expectation as to the future.

Some of our readers may think the policy of the Government, which interposes an obstacle at such a time as this to higher rates, a commendable one, but we do not. Its direct and chief effect now is to throw the banks on the local stock exchanges to find employment for their spare funds and reserves, thereby stimulating and fostering speculation to an unreasonable degree, without affording any

measurable protection against undue rates of interest to mercantile borrowers. Rates of discount in ordinary accounts would be unaffected if gold shipments were going on largely, for few bankers would withdraw money from regular customers who borrow all the year round, and whose accounts yield profits besides in the way of exchange circulation, deposits, etc., for the sake of profiting by temporary and precarious high rates in New York.

As to the general position there, the steady reduction in the surplus reserves of the associated banks, the demands for money from the interior for the handling of the crops, with the undoubted improvement in general business throughout the country, all indicate that notes for some time to come will be higher than they have been for many years past. Money at very low rates is not a wholesome sign, and there is nothing to regret in an increase from 1 and 2 per cent. to 4 and 5 per cent., and that is the point at which well informed business men look to see money. Our own market will move in the same direction, but as usual with a higher range. This is the best judgment we can form from the facts we now have.

To return for a moment to the general question, we wish to call attention to the limited use of gold for payments between debtor and creditor at home. A reserve of gold is chiefly needed for the payment of claims due to foreign countries, and these payments, so far as we are concerned, whether to England or to any other country, are all made in New York. That is practically our clearing house, where any surplus which may be due us for our produce exported, or balance we may owe to our creditors, is finally settled, through the sale or purchase of exchange. If it comes to a point that we must pay our foreign creditors our balance in specie, it is to New York that it goes. Therefore our specie reserve should be in such coin that we can send from it to New York at any time, at the mere cost of shipment, and not in coin that is incurrent at the only point where it is likely to be offered in payment of our debts. The loss may appear to fall (as at present) on the banks, but in reality it falls on the whole community.

#### AT HOME AND ABROAD.

The local money market is feeling the effects of the high rates prevalent in New York to some extent, and there is not so much money offering on call as there has been, with the necessary result of higher rates.  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. is very generally paid. We have discussed the situation somewhat at length in another column.

The main interest in business circles has been centered on the harvest. Merchants report that payments are not as good as

they have been, caused no doubt largely by the fact that farmers have been so busy with the harvest that little country trade has been done, or money turned over. But the harvest itself is admitted on all hands to be an excellent one, the quality of the grain is very fine, and the quantity, though short in some localities, is at out up to the average, taking the country as a whole. Fall wheat has already been marketed in some parts of Ontario, and the millers report the berry to be plump and hard, fit for immediate grinding.

From Manitoba we learn that the wheat crop has turned out better than was looked for. The quality is superb; the grain is said to be the finest ever grown in the Northwest. A three-quarter crop is estimated as the yield of the province, which, taking into account the increased area sown, and the fine quality of the product, must bring a very substantial amount of money into the province. A cargo of this year's wheat is already on the sea *en route* to Liverpool. The Northwest (as apart from Manitoba) has not been so fortunate. Drought has injured the crops more or less throughout the whole territory, in many cases destroying it altogether.

General business, with the exception of the falling off in payments above mentioned, is reported to be in satisfactory condition. The wholesale trade in Toronto report more activity than for some years past, especially in dry goods.

In New York the interest chiefly centres in the money market. The high rates reported last week have been maintained, although with many fluctuations. Early in the week it looked as if money were settling down to near the old quotations, but the continued withdrawals by the banks and trust companies from the loan market brought the rates back again, and they are firm at 6 to 7 per cent. The legitimate needs of the country have evidently absorbed a great deal of the over supply, and we may reasonably look for better rates from now on.

Of business generally the American reports are very favorable. There is a marked improvement in almost every line, especially in the iron and steel trades. The cotton mills are doing well, and consumption keeps pace with production.

The English money market is stronger in sympathy with New York. Discount rates on the street have been firm at  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. during the week. This, with the probable withdrawal of gold for New York, led to an advance in the bank rate, which was increased by the directors at their meeting on Thursday to  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent.

#### THE LATE JOHN DOUGALL.

By the death of Mr. John Dougall Canada loses one of her representative journalists. Although for the latter years of his life Mr.

Dougall has cast in his fortunes with the New York *Witness* he will always remain identified with the career of our Montreal contemporary. He may be looked upon as the pioneer of temperance and religious journalism on this continent, and although originally a member of the mercantile community abandoned his chances of success in that career to embark in the troubled waters of literary enterprise. As the founder of the *Daily Witness* he has justly earned the esteem of his fellow citizens, and it is with feelings of unfeigned respect that we bear this tribute to his memory.

**EXPORTS OF CATTLE AND SHEEP.**—The shipments of cattle this season from Montreal to date were 40,247 head—a decrease of 453 head from last year, an increase of 7,037 over 1884, of 7,870 over 1883, and of 29,614 over 1878. Exports of sheep to date were 43,386 head—an increase of 13,051 head over last year, of 9,011 over 1884, of 960 over 1883, a decrease of 384 from 1882 and of 11,637 compared with 1880. **CABLE** advices from London state that the prices of wool continue to improve. Fine colonial grades average an advance of 1d @ 3½d, as compared with the prices prevailing at the last auction sales. The prospects for the September series of sales are that there will be a further material advance on July rates. There has been a large trade during the last few weeks for home grown wools. American buyers have given a stimulus to the finer down growths, and prices are fully 1d dearer. The fresh arrivals to date have been 289,000 bales. Of these 52,000 bales have already been disposed of, 13,000 being sold in London, and 39,000 being forwarded direct.

It is understood that in consequence of the appearance of pleuro-pneumonia in the cattle quarantine at Levis an order-in-council has been passed, which will appear in next Saturday's *Gazette*, prohibiting the importation of neat cattle from those counties in the United Kingdom in which the disease is officially reported to exist. All importers of cattle will be required to certify under oath to the localities from which the cattle have come. Cattle importers and steamship companies should exercise the greatest precaution before shipping any cattle to Canada, or they may find themselves in difficulties.

The total value of the bullion and coin imported into the United States during the calendar year 1885 was \$1,418,129, of which \$8,322,909 consisted of bullion and \$3,095,120

of coin. Of the total imports, \$23,645,311 consisted of gold and \$16,772,718 of silver. The total exports of gold and silver were \$44,697,749, of which \$11,417,207 was gold and \$33,280,542 silver. While the United States lost by net exportation during the year \$15,507,824 in silver, it gained \$12,228,104 by net importation of gold.

It is stated on good authority that 70,000 pounds of fine graded merino wool has been furnished by this year's clip in Alberta, Northwest Territory. The flocks in Alberta are all imported Montana sheep and produce the grade of wool which bears the now well recognized name of Montana. This wool fetched from 25 cents to 26 cents per lb. in the United States market this year. A wool growers' association has been formed in this district, and there is every prospect that this new and growing industry will become one of the most important in the Northwest.

The chief of police has received a telegram from San Francisco, asking if the \$10 bills of the Montreal Consolidated bank are good. It will be remembered that some years ago \$40,000 in \$10 bills were stolen from the bank and the robbers escaped. The bank failed a few years after, and now the bills are being passed in California.

The traffic returns of the Grand Trunk railway for the week ending 21st August, show an increase of \$62,982 over the corresponding week of 1885.

### Financial.

Sterling exchange, 60 days sight, closed at 8 7-16 @ ½ and 8½; demand 9 1-16 @ 3-16 and 9½ @ ½; cables, 9½; New York funds, 10 @ ½ and ½. ### MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

THURSDAY Ev'g, Aug. 26, 1886

The weather has been warm and more seasonable, and work in the fields is said to be progressing favorably. Though business at the moment is quiet, owing to activity in the country, it is not unusually so for the time of year, and merchants are disposed to think that both trade and collections will exhibit marked improvement next month.

**ASHERS.**—Receipts have been fair for the season: about equal to the same period last year. Sales of first pots: have been made at \$3.42½ @ \$3.45, closing at latter figure. Seconds from \$3.20 @ \$3.25. Pearls are quiet, with very light stock; we quote \$5.30 for firsts. Receipts since 1st Jan., 2,519 bris. pots; 191 bris. pearls. Deliveries since 1st Jan., 3,095 bris. pots; 303 bris. pearls. Stock in store on 26th Aug., 768 bris. pots; 39 bris. pearls.

**CANNED GOODS.**—There is a fair demand for canned mackerel, and \$2.90 @ \$3 is quoted, as to quantity. There have been sales of round lots at the inside figure. Packers views in Prince Edward Island are higher, some asking even above market values in Montreal. One packer recently asked \$2.95 for a lot of 500 cases. Lobsters are worth \$5.20 @ \$5.40 as to brand. There has been considerable stir and excitement in canned salmon, and it is firmly believed here that there is only half a pack. Packers find it useful to remember a saving clause in their contracts which provides that if there is a shortage, orders will only be filled, pro rata. One local merchant who sold a lot of canned salmon a short time ago at \$1.22½ is a subject for general commiseration, considering that the market is now strong at \$1.40. As high as \$1.50 has been mentioned, believed to be for a blind. A round lot was placed some days ago at \$1.35, but this, it is said, could not be repeated. Another and a later report about canned mackerel was communicated as follows:—Last week they sold at \$2.85 @ \$2.90, and to-day they are worth \$3.10. Wholesalers are not anxious to place distributing orders owing to the shortage. Most of the American contracts with Canada were filled before the senseless U. S. Customs order raised the duty to 100 per cent. London has, as usual, bought largely, and Australia is taking an increased quantity from that city and other sources of supply. The trade in small canned fruits and berries is smaller at Montreal than expected, owing to the universal household preserving custom and the cheapness of sugar. Winnipeg and other distant places

have, however, bought fairly this season. The crop of peas has given out, and packers are clear of stock. More could have been placed. They are offered at \$1.25. Several of the largest packers of canned corn have sold clean, and this is also firm, a first class article being held for \$1.25. No recent quotation for tomatoes was mentioned, but there is not going to be a big pack, as the speculation was overdone and disastrous in the past, and canners have taken care not to put up more than selling agents are likely to place easily. Altogether there has been an absence of rash speculation, and canned goods will take their proper place this year. There is likely to be more money in the Canadian trade than in any previous season.

**COAL AND WOOD.**—The market for anthracite has kept active but unchanged in price. We still quote \$6.00 for stove, \$5.85 for chestnut, and \$5.60 for egg, per 2,000 lbs. For round lots quotations are shaded 10c@20c per ton. Cape Breton \$3 @ \$3.10, Nova Scotia \$3.50 and Scotch steam to arrive \$3.75@\$4. Cordwood—Yard prices per long cord (cartage 50c extra) are as follows:—Maple, \$6; birch, \$5.50; beech, \$5; tamarac, \$4.50; hemlock, \$4. Coke, \$2.50 per chaldron of 36 bush.; crushed coke (stove or egg size) \$3.30 delivered.

**DAIRY PRODUCE AND PROVISIONS.**—It is stated that the make of most of the creameries on the North shore has been taken at 19½c and 20c, but offers over the cable have not met with an encouraging response. The situation is practically the same. There is a steady tone to fine dairy goods, and a few lots are being picked up for shipment. In cheese we note a few sales at full figures, finest selling at 8½c and 8c, and medium grades at 7½c and 7c. The exports for the week will be fairly large. From Ingersoll a good August make is reported. It is stated that the parties who have been bulling the market "stood from under," leaving things to run in their natural course. The *Utica Herald* says:—"The receipts at New York are gradually approaching those of last year in quantity, the difference since May 1st being now only about 61,000 boxes. A week ago it was about 77,000 boxes. The receipts are very far behind those of two years ago, however, being 313,000 boxes less, or fully 25 per cent. The exports, also, are beginning to increase, the shipments from all points in this country and Canada having been 6,793,000 lbs. last week, against 6,008,889 lbs. the corresponding week in 1885. But there is no doubt that the prices paid in the country for the last two weeks have brought out more than the customary shipments of stock. In this section at least the factories have matters well in hand, and on an average the stock is sold down as close to the hoop as is safe at this time of year." *Provisions.*—Market quiet but steady with a fair jobbing trade. Eggs 13½c@14½c. Canadian in New York higher at 16½c.

**DRUGS AND CHEMICALS.**—The quinine market has not varied since our last. The bark sales in London yesterday resulted in offerings of 2,225 bales Ceylon, and sales of 1,000. Prices unchanged but firm. Opium is yet dull and the prospects for the future are not favorable. Norwegian cod liver oil is weaker, owing to the more liberal foreign offerings. Bleaching powder continues firm with an increasing demand. Higher prices are demanded by the makers and the tone of the market is strong. Liverpool cables £6 16s, and holders here quote \$1.55@1.65. Borax is extremely dull. Cutch continues to maintain a firm tone.

**DRY GOODS.**—Wholesalers are now busy making up and shipping orders received by letter or by travellers. Many of the latter are still out, in fact the old regular trips seem to be practically abandoned, and some travellers are on the road ten months out of twelve. Remittances are only fair, as is usual at this time of the year, as the farmers are all engaged in harvesting, and are consequently not visiting the country stores. Very few buyers are in the market just now, and probably until the Eastern Townships merchants visit us next month the trade must depend on the exertions of their travellers or on letter orders. The city retail trade is slack, it being right between the seasons, too late for summer goods and too early for fall purchases, and this state of affairs will probably continue until the summer visitors to the seaside or the country return to town again. In the States there has been little done of notable interest in the market during the week. There is a quiet, steady demand for goods from first hands and a strong and healthy tone throughout the market. The jobbing trade continues exceedingly good; the amount of business done since the first of the month being far in advance of that accomplished last year during the same period.

**FISH AND OILS.**—It is now anticipated that the catch of herring on Labrador will be short, but as to prices, no new fish has been placed on the market as yet. Old is held at \$2.75 for round lots. Cape Breton herring has changed hands at \$5.50, but this is an extreme rate, being merely obtainable on the first arrival—a small lot. Prices will fall under fresh receipts. Salmon in brls. is scarce. Only one small parcel of new is said to have arrived; reported sold at about \$15. We quote \$14@ \$15 for No. 1. Dry cod is firm at \$2.75, with jobbing parcels worth \$3. The price in Halifax is \$2.63. S. R. seal has sold at 44c. Oils have been in moderate demand, but are less firm in view of expected arrivals. *Salt.*—Elevens have sold at 42c@43 and twelves at 40c@41c.

**FLOUR AND GRAIN.**—Flour is firm, particularly for spring extras, which are in light supply. Superior commands \$4 and extra \$3.80, while sales of fancy have been made as high as \$3.65 and of extra at \$3.60. Superfine is held at \$3.25. Among sales were 125 brls. choice superior at \$4.05, 250 brls. patent at \$4.30, a car Manitoba strong bakers at \$4.60, two cars medium do. at \$4.10 and two cars shorts at \$15 on track. Grain generally was quiet, but wheat was firmly held. There are no interesting facts to mention, and the usual corrections will be found in the table. The Chicago market was excited and strong, partly owing to war rumors from Europe. The total quantity of wheat in sight on this continent and afloat to Europe, calculating according to the Chicago visible supply, is 61,230,000 bushels—an increase of 1,419,000 bushels compared with a week ago, an increase of 3,098,000 with two weeks ago, an increase of 5,254,000 with three weeks ago, an increase of 7,253,000 with four weeks ago, and an increase of 7,387,000 with a year ago. Late English advices state that wheat in Liverpool was firm at the advance with a fair demand and holders offering sparingly. Beerbohn, however, quoted corn rather lower. Cargoes of wheat and corn in all positions were steady. At Mark Lane wheat was firm but not active and corn firm. The country markets were firm. The amount of wheat and flour reduced to wheat afloat to Europe shows a decrease of 45,000 quarters or 360,000 bushels compared

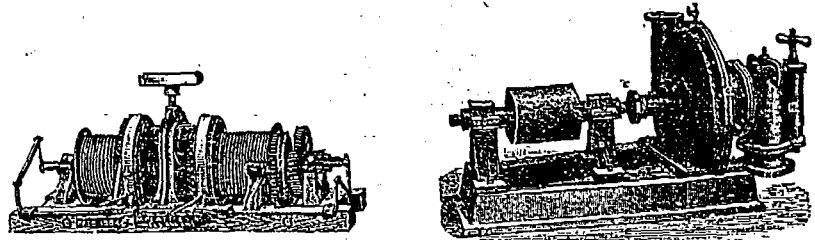

with a week ago, and an increase of 765,000 quarters or 6,120,000 bushels compared with a year ago. Corn shows a decrease of 440,000 quarters compared with last week, and an increase of 45,000 quarters with a year ago.

**FREIGHTS.**—More enquiry for grain tonnage with prospects of a further advance. Grain for London 2s 9d; Liverpool 2s and Glasgow 2s. Cattle 50s@60s. Insurance 1½@1¾ as to steamer. Deals to Liverpool and London 45s @47s 6d. Phosphates are taken at about 6s 3d to direct ports. Lumber to South America \$10.50@\$11. Flour in sacks to Liverpool 15s per ton; cheese 25s and butter 30s per ton.

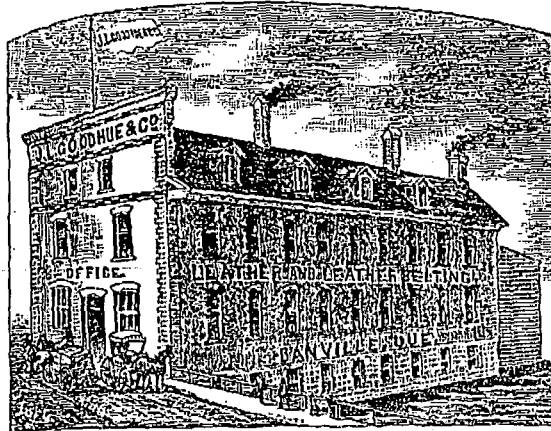
**GREEN FRUITS, ETC.**—There has been an extraordinary glut of plums and no less than one hundred barrels were sent in to two houses to-day. This explains slaughter prices quoted below. Bartlett pears are also depressed by large receipts and the warm weather is just calculated to rot them in about two days. Bananas suffer from the same cause. American apples \$2 @ \$2.75 and Canadian \$2.50 @ \$3. California pears, \$6 @ \$6.50 per box; Bell, \$4 @ \$5 per brl.; Bartlett \$3@\$7; plums, bask., 50c@\$1; bush., \$1.25 @ \$1.50; barrel, \$3 @ \$4.50. Peaches, in carriers, \$3.50 @ \$6. Yellow bananas, 50c @ \$1.50 bunch; red, 25c @ \$1. Coconuts, \$5.50 to \$6 per 100. Brazil nuts, 11c. Peanuts, 8c@10c. Pecans, 8½c@11c. Tomatoes, 40c @ 50c per bush. Spanish onions, \$4.50 @ \$5 per case. New strained honey in kegs, 10c @ 11c; in the comb, 2c @ 3c higher. Dulce in brls., 10c per lb. Southern grapes, seedlings, 10c @ 12c; Concord, 12c @ 15c. Watermelons, 30c @ 40c.

**GROCERIES.**—As a rule trade is reported quiet. Payments compare very favorably considering the month. In another column will be found our second article on the tea trade. A cable from Yokohama, dated 20th inst., says: "Steamer 'City of Rio Janeiro' leaves to-morrow with 4,000 half-chests tea for New York, Canada and the East, 5,000 do. for Chicago and the West, and 7,000 do. for San Francisco. The settlements to date were 273,000 piculs, against 221,000 piculs to same time last year. Exports to date, 28,000,000 lbs., against 23,500,000 lbs. to same date last year. Stocks decreasing and supplies coming in slowly." It is affirmed that low grade black teas have held their own in England in spite of the new importations there. On this market there has been a fair demand for new season Japan teas at about 22c @ 25c, and 250 half-chests at the latter figure for Western account were included in recent sales. Japan tea dust has also been wanted for the west at 10c @ 10½c. Pingsuey Young Hysons were called for at 14½c @ 15c, and some sales of caddies are mentioned at 15½c. The demand for Jamaica coffee is good. Late accounts from London state that low grades have been well cleared out for export, and this has stiffened the market here. There have been sales of Jamaica ginger at 13½c @ 14c. Sugar is firm at former prices, and there is a good turn-over. Sales of granulated from refineries are reported at 6½c for small lots, and at 6 3-16 for larger quantities. Molasses continue firm and fair sales are again mentioned within the range of 30c @ 31c; small jobbing lots to the country trade at 31½c. A sale of Jamaica raw sugar has been made at 5c. A cargo of Porto Rico is expected at the close of the month, for which holders are asking 5½c. The refineries are turning out a low grade of sugar at a price under 5c. The strength of raw sugar suitable for domestic purposes is still appreciated, and there is a good demand for it from the west



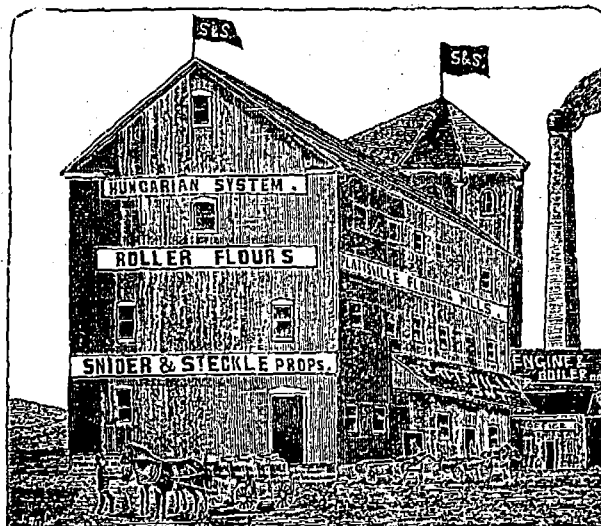
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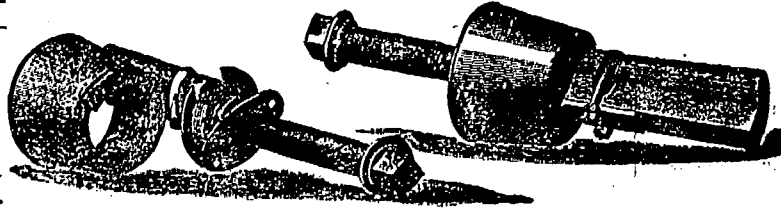

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Pecan nuts are now worth 9c, and some dealers in the States are making enquiries in the local market with a view of picking up any small lots available. Cables from Patras say the second steamer to leave there with new crop currants will be the "Hungaria," and fruit of that shipment is held at 18s 6d. This steamer made a remarkably quick trip on her last year's voyage from Greece to New York, consuming only 21½ days. The subsequent steamer will be the "Nicosian." Sales of new crop at Calcutta to Trieste speculators are reported at 17s f.o.b. The market for new raisins at Valencia appears to be hardening. There are no longer firm offers at the earlier prices, owing probably to the slow receipt of the crop at shipping points. Buyers could probably fill orders at 8½c for loose off-stock and 10½c for layer laid down. English advices quote 11s per bushel for new crop mustard seed, but an advance was expected. In Wisbech, the principal English market, there is said to be great competition between American and home buyers.

HAY, STRAW AND FEED.—The receipts of hay were fair and the market was steady, with a good demand. Choice old timothy sold at \$13 per 100 bundles, and new hay ranged from \$8@ \$10 per 100 bundles, as to quality. For choice pressed hay there has been a good enquiry, while for inferior the demand has been slow at unchanged prices. We quote No. 1 at \$12, No. 2 at \$11, and No. 3 at \$10 per ton, in large quantities. There was a fair enquiry for straw, but the offerings were light at \$4@ \$6 per 100 bundles, as to quality. Pressed straw has been quiet and steady at \$7 per ton. The demand for manilla is slow \$22@ \$23 per ton. Bran is moving slowly at \$13@ \$14 per ton, and shorts at \$14@ \$15 per ton.

HIDES AND TALLOW.—Hides are slightly easier, the decline in the West, noted last week, being maintained. There is a good enquiry here, and more could be sold if stock was available. Chicago buff is now quoted at 9½c@10c, heavy steers at 9½c@10½c and calf-skins at 13c@14c. Tallow is dull with some little business at our outside figures.

HOPS.—The market has continued quiet but nominally firm in tone. In the hop sections picking of what is left of the crop has commenced and some idea of the quality will soon be arrived at. Business has been in small lots only, with offerings from growers

light. The range of prices may be given at 20c@28c. In New York prime to choice are quoted at 25c@30c. Cattley, Grindley & Co., of London, write Mr. J. G. Sidey as follows:—"The hop plantations have made fair progress during the past fortnight, but the low temperature that has prevailed generally at night time has kept the plant somewhat in check, and we fear may have increased the spread of mould, though thus far nothing is reported to produce a serious doubt as to the probability of a large crop being realized in this country. The outlook as to the continental crop is not materially altered."

IRON AND HARDWARE.—Jobbing orders for iron and heavy metals are coming in fairly but no movement of any consequence is expected for the present. Both the English and the local market retain the same features as last week. Merchants are all confident about the fall trade and there seems little chance of prices going any lower. An English correspondent says that stocks of tin plates continue to fall, the decrease at Swansea alone during one week amount to 12,000 boxes, which is a remarkably good auguring. The shipments for a week from Swansea amount to 69,071 boxes, of which 2,000 tons were sent to Philadelphia and Baltimore and 1,200 tons to New York. In pig-iron the contrast in the set of figures appertaining to England and the United States is striking. In the case of Britain stocks are still going up. At the close of last year Connals' had stored at Glasgow 665,668 tons, while now the stores amount to 795,628 tons, showing an increase during the past seven months of no less 129,940 tons. It is impossible accurately to ascertain how the stocks in makers' hands in Scotland stand, but it is generally conceded that they show a large increase. Some idea may be gathered from glancing at the state of makers' stock in Cleveland. Stocks in makers' yards at the end of last year stood at 310,077 tons and by the end of June they had increased to 359,718 tons. During the same period the quantity in makers' stores rose from 88,386 tons to 62,000 tons, while Connals' stores in Cleveland to-day amount to a further 270,076 tons. At the end of June—which is the latest complete return available—the total stocks in Cleveland stood at 689,185 tons, which was more than at the commencement of the year by 171,697 tons. And these increased stocks exist notwithstanding that during the first half of this year England exported 28,268 tons of pigs, in excess of the first half of 1885. Warrants in Glasgow are

cabled at 39s 7d and No. 3 foundry in Middlesborough is at 29s 6d. London, August 24:—Tin, spot, £98; three months' futures, £99. Market steady; G. O. B. Chili bars, £39 5s; soft Spanish lead £12; best selected copper, £43; soft English lead, £13 5s; Silesian spelter, £13 17s 6d; Hallett's antimony, £30; tinplates, 13s 3d. In New York, domestic pig lead is rather firmer, with 4½c bid for common and 4.80c for refined. Offerings at those figures are moderate, however, and transactions the past few days have been limited to small lots aggregating about 100 tons. London cables were somewhat firmer at £13 for soft spanish. Pig tin.—An improvement in prices in London to £98 10s spot, £99 future, for Straits has stiffened the market somewhat.

LEATHER AND BOOTS AND SHOES.—The leather market may be said to be absolutely unchanged, and but little business has been done, partly owing to its being so near to the end of the month and the consequent unwillingness of manufacturers to purchase till after the 1st. Sole leather is somewhat easier, and No. 2 has sold at 20 to 22 cents in small parcels, and No. 1 from 23 to 26 cents, according to quality. Black leather remains firm, but very little business is doing, it is questionable if prices would not stiffen should a demand spring up. Splits remain in the same position as last week, the better class are not too plentiful, but cheaper grades are accumulating, and although shipments of splits and buff to England still continue and thus relieve the glut here to a certain extent, the prices obtained are scarcely remunerative to the shipper. The boot and shoe men appear to be doing fairly well, but some complaints of remittances are heard amongst the trade. In the States the market is very quiet, the conditions of the past four weeks continuing to characterize it as dull all round. The demand for all grades of hemlock sole is general, but the prices are low and the margin of profit small.

LIVE STOCK.—There has been renewed depression in the British cattle trade, the markets being glutted with stock. Prime Canadian steers were at 11½c, fair to choice, 11c, poor to medium, 10c and inferior and bulls 7½@9c. Sheep were heavy and unchanged. Best in Liverpool are quoted by cable at 12c, seconds at 10c@11c, merinos at 9½c@10½c, and inferior and rams 7c@8½c. The meat markets have ruled weaker. In the local market there was little done in export stock owing to the light supply offered. Values

were quoted firm at 4½¢@5¢ per lb. live weight. There was a good enquiry for butchers, but good beeves were scarce and a few sales were made at 4¢, while inferior to fair sold at from 2¢@3¢ per lb. live weight. Sheep were dull and sales were slow, although the offerings were fair and prices steady. Sales of export stock were made at 4¢, and butchers at 3¢ per lb. live weight. For hogs there was a good demand, there being a good supply offered and prices advanced ½¢ per lb., and all the offerings were bought up at from 5½¢@5¾¢ per lb. live weight. Calves were lower and sold at from \$2.50@3 each as to quality.

**PAINTS, ETC.**—A moderate business is reported in paints and glass at former prices. Linseed oil is firmer in England, but quotations have not been raised here by the trade. It is said that importations could not be laid down here under present market rates. In this department of trade payments are generally good, the remark of a leading importer and manufacturer being "we have no complaint whatever to make." Linseed oil in London is now cabled weaker at £21 15s @ 22 per tun.

**POTATOES.**—Only small supplies have come in so far, and reports of disease are confirmed. The yield will likely be short all over the Province. As high as 70¢ per bag has been paid, but the regular price is now about 60¢.

**Wool.**—A strong, firm market exists, and it will be noticed that we advance our quotations of Australian to 16 cents as the minimum figure, and that of Cape to 14½ cents, none of these grades being obtainable under those figures. Not only are prices advancing, but the time given on purchases is being considerably curtailed, and 30 or 60 days is now considered sufficient time on most lots, while many parcels are sold for prompt cash. Australians and Capes have sold freely at prices within the limit of our advanced quotations, and a firm feeling for fine wools is noticeable all round. In domestics, pulled goes as fast as offered at quotation prices, but fleece hangs fire, and with the exception of some lots taken for the manufacture of military cloths, does not appear to be called for. The appearance on the market of some fine Northwest wools, similar to the so-called Territory wools of the States, and one or two grades finer than Canadian wools is one of the features of the week. No sales have as yet been effected, and it is therefore impossible to fix their value on this market. In the States there is a good steady demand for wool at quotations. Fine wool is still less active relatively than medium, the features of the week being heavy purchases of medium fleece, washed and unwashed, by over-coating mills.

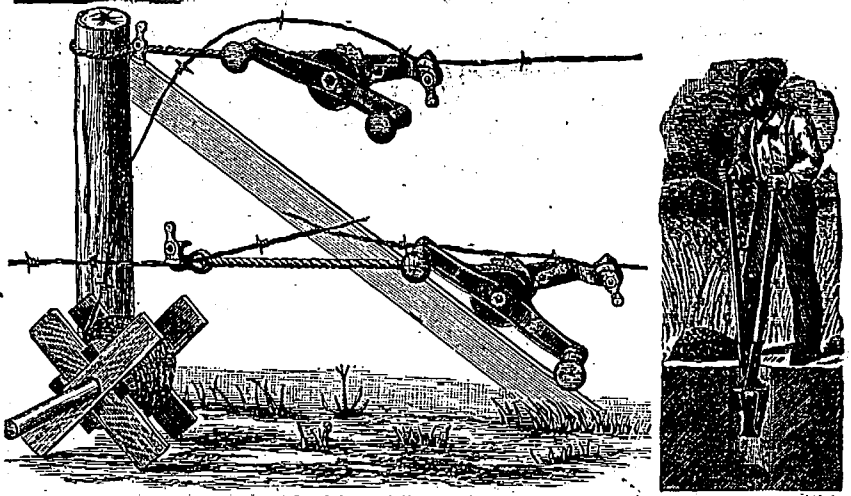

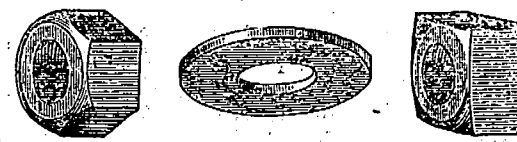

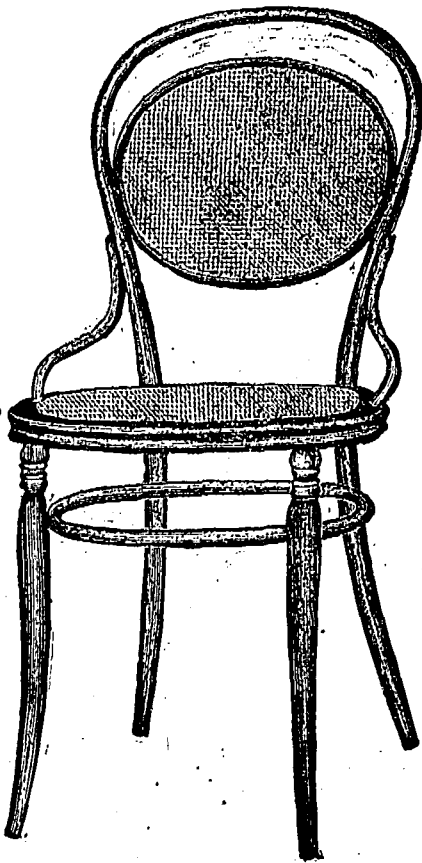

**BUTTER, &c.**—There has been a fair supply during the week, with little or no change in prices. The demand for choice is good at 14c to 15c for tub lots. Medium to good are quoted at 11c to 13c in jobbing lots, and superior at 9c to 10c. Round lots of choice dairy sell at 12½c in the country. Eggs are plentiful and easy at 12½c to 13c per dozen in case lots. Cheese is firmer in sympathy with outside markets; small lots job at 9½c for the best makes, and good to medium at 8c to 8½c.

**DRUGS.**—There has been a quiet trade the past week, with but few changes in prices. Payments generally are reported good.

**FLOUR AND GRAIN.**—The supply of flour appears to be somewhat limited, and prices rule firmer. Holders are not anxious sellers, and better prices seem to be anticipated. Superior extras have sold at \$3.65 and extras at \$3.55. Spring extras scarce and nominal at \$3.30 to \$3.40, but no sales reported. Patents are quoted at \$3.85 to \$4.50, according to quality. Wheat continues unsettled, with the movement restricted. No. 2 fall sold at 77c, and No. 3 red winter at 78c. No. 2 spring is quoted at 79c, and No. 2 red winter is nominal at 79c to 80c. Barley continues dull and purely nominal. Receipts by wagon are beginning to arrive. Oats are unchanged, with a wide range in prices owing to difference in quality. Choice white sell at 36½c to 37c in car lots, mixed at 35½c to 36c, and inferior at 34½c to 35c. Peas are quiet and steady, at 59c to 60c for No. 2. No movement in rye or bran. The latter is quoted firm at about \$10 on track. Oatmeal remains inactive and prices steady; car lots are quoted at \$3.80 to \$3.85.

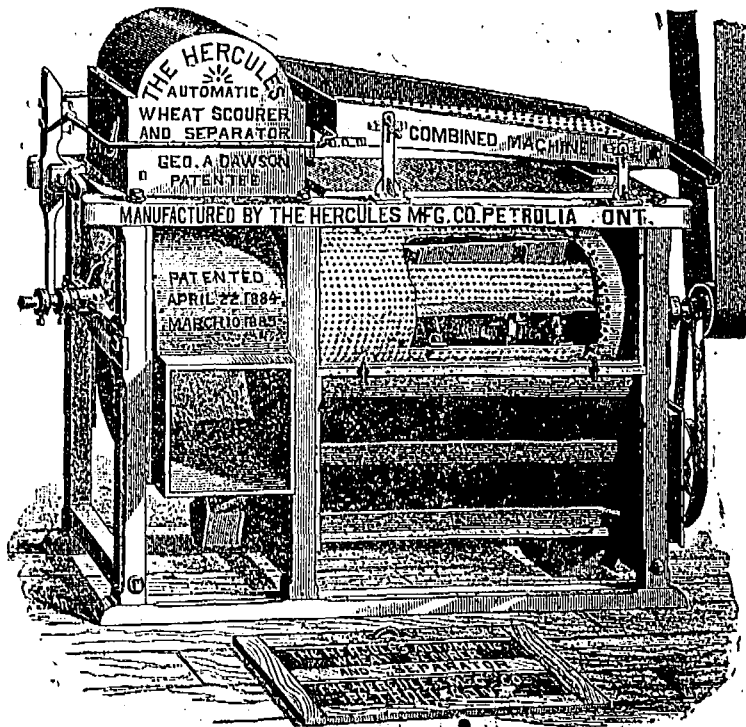
**GROCERIES.**—Trade has been rather quiet this week and prices steady. Teas in moderate demand and steady, especially for greens and low grades of black. Sugars are rather easier; Canadian refined is selling as low as 5½c, and granulated at 6½c to 6¾c. Canned salmon is higher.

**HARDWARE.**—There is a moderate trade doing, with an increased movement expected later on. Prices as a rule are steady.

**LEATHER.**—There is a fairly satisfactory trade, and prices generally rule firm. Harness in good demand, and splits are being shipped east. No. 1 Spanish sole 27c to 29c, No. 2 24c to 27c; harness 28c to 33c; kip skins, French, 85c to \$1.00; English 65c to 75c.

**HIDES AND SKINS.**—Hides are unchanged with dealers paying 8½c for No. 1 steers and 8c for No. 1 cows. The best cured sell at 9½c

and cows at 9c. *Calfskins* are steady at 12c for No. 1 green, and at 10c for No. 2. Cured 13c to 13½c. *Lambskins* and pelts are in good demand and firm at 45c for the best offering. Tallow steady at 4½c for rendered and 2c for rough.

**LIVE STOCK.**—The receipts of cattle have been fair and prices steady. Very few shippers offer, and they rule at 4c to 4½c per lb. A few stockers are selling at 2½c to 2¾c per lb., and they are shipped chiefly to Buffalo. No. 1 butcher's sell at 3½c to 3¾c per lb., No. 2 3c to 3½c, and No. 3 at 2½c to 2¾c. *Lambs* are steady at \$2.80 to \$3.25, the latter for the best offering. *Sheep* are 3c to 3½c per lb. *Hogs* firm at 4½c to 5½c per lb., the latter for light fat.

**PROVISIONS.**—The sales have been limited and confined to small packages, stocks being very low. Prices are firm; long clear *bacon* 8½c to 9c for case lots, and Cumberland cut 8c to 8½c. *Hams* firm at 14c to 14½c for smoked, and 12½c to 13c for pickled. *Lard* sells at 9½c to 9¾c in quantities. *Mess Pork* steady at \$13.50 for small lots. *Hogs* bring \$1.50 per 100 lbs. *Beans* steady at \$1.20 to \$1.30 a bushel for hand-picked, and *potatoes* are easier at \$1.50 a barrel in small lots. *Hops* are still quoted at 22c to 25c, but the movement is limited.

**WOOL.**—Business is fair, with sales of round lots of selected fleeces at 22c. Dealers pay 21c. Coarse is quoted at 18c to 19c, and southdown 23c to 24c. Supers quiet at 22c to 23c, and extras at 26c.
