

My dear Dr. Low,

It was a real delight to me to receive your letter of October 13th, in which you speak kindly of the qualifications of Dr. John T. Farr. I shall pass your letter on to our authorities and hope that Dr. Farr may be successful in his application for an internship in the Royal Victoria Hospital.

You will be glad to know that our medical school maintains its first-class reputation. A few weeks ago we laid the cornerstone of the new Neurological Institute, a building just across from the Royal Victoria Hospital and connected with the latter institution by a bridge. It contains some 44 beds, of which 16 are for private patients. There are all sorts of laboratory and experimental rooms, besides operating rooms, lecture clinics, accommodation for internes, etc. Altogether, it should make the most complete neurological institute on this Continent, and certainly no institute in the world is guided by a more qualified or a more capable surgeon than Dr. Wilder Penfield, most ably assisted as he is by another eminent man, Dr. Cone. Dr. Penfield already has working with him men from Canada, the United States, Great Britain, Denmark, Germany, Poland and Russia. Nothing that we have done in recent years will add more to the reputation of the School. We are getting a fine class of students, and our constituency ever widens.

I do not know when I shall be in Regina next but in the meantime please remember me most kindly to all my friends there, and with all good wishes, I am,

I beg to make my application for an internship in the Department of Gynecology and Obstetrics at the Royal Victoria Hospital.

My second year at this Hospital is completed on June 1st, 1934, and I would sincerely appreciate being considered for any appointment commencing after that date in your department.

I think in such applications as these it is customary to offer a brief report of one's previous experience. Mine is as follows:-

- 1930 Summer Vacation - 4 months as a student, living-in at the Prince Albert Sanatorium, Prince Albert, Saskatchewan.
- 1931-32 12 months - Winnipeg Municipal Hospitals.
Infectious Diseases and Tuberculosis;
Attending lectures at Faculty of Medicine but living in hospital.
- 1932-33 12 months - Junior Interne. General Rotating Service, Winnipeg General Hospital.
Demonstrator, Department of Physiology.
- 1933-34 12 months - Senior Interne. Winnipeg General Hospital.
6 months - Female Surgery.
3 months - Casualty
3 months - Female Medicine.

The final year of medicine at this University consists of a compulsory internship. I spent my internship at this Hospital in a general rotating service, graduating this May with honors standing. Included in this junior rotating internship was one month of Obstetrics, during which I delivered approximately forty cases, and two months on the Gynecological service under Professor D.S. McKay.

My dear Sir Arthur-

A young Dane named Langballe came to Montreal over a year ago. He has been engaged on various jobs of somewhat humble character. I have seen some of his letters, and he seems to be a man who is apparently of very excellent character. From what he tells me he is a graduate in Arts of the University of Copenhagen where he studied for seven years, but lack of funds prevented him from completing his medical course. He tells me that he speaks German, Danish, Norwegian and Swedish, and he speaks English with an accent. He reads French but cannot speak it fluently. I have been trying to get him a position more in keeping with his education but have so far failed.

Knowing your ever willing readiness to help young men, I wondered if you happened to know of a position where a man knowing the Scandinavian languages, having studied philosophy, etc. as well as several years of medicine could be profitably employed? He would finish his medical course if he could finance it. It would seem to me that in a Cosmopolitan City like this, a linguist should find useful employment. The Scandinavians make excellent settlers in Canada, they are the very best that we can have, they quickly assimilate, they are industrious and reliable.
