SYAU RESUME ECLIPSES.

In the year 1864 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun.

I. A total Eclipse of the Sun, May 5, invisible in Nova Scotia. It may be seen in the North Pacific Ocean, California, and North Western part of North America.

II. A total Eclipse of the Sun, October 30, invisible in all parts of North America, but may be seen in the South Atlantic Ocean, and in South America. It will be partial at the Cape of Good Hope.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

VENUS will be *Evening Star* to July 13; thence *Morning Star* to the end of the year.

MARS will be *Evening Star* up to April 21; thence *Morning Star* until Nov. 29; it will then be *Evening Star* to the end of the year.

JUPITER will be *Morning Star* until May 13; thence *Evening Star* to Nov. 26; after that it will be *Morning Star* to the end of the year.

SATURN will be *Morning Star* until April 6; after that *Evening Star* to Oct. 10; thence *Morning Star* to end of the year.

MERCURY will be *Evening Star* to June 26; thence *Morning Star* to April 1; after that *Evening Star* until Sept. 21; then *Morning Star* until Nov. 16; thence *Evening Star* to the close of the year.

EXPLANATION OF THE CALENDAR PAGES.

LEFT HAND PAGE.

Column.

- 1 & 2. Days of the month and of the week.
 - 3 & 4. Rising and setting of the upper limb of the Sun.
 5. The Sun's declination for the same as the Equation, 6th column.
 6. Equation of Time (or quantity by which the Sun is slow or fast of the clock at noon, apparent, not mean, time, at Greenwich).—Equation of time is the difference between mean and apparent time. There are only four periods of the year when this difference is nothing, viz:—About April 15, June 14, September 1, and December 24, as may be seen on reference to this column.
 7. Length of Days in Hours and Minutes.
 - 8 & 9. The rising and setting of the Moon.
 10. The time of the Moon's southing, or passing the meridian,—this column also gives the time of Highwater at Parrsboro', Horton, Cornwallis, Hantsport, Windsor, Newport, Truro, &c.
 11. The Moon's place in the Signs, or Constellations of the Zodiac.
- At the top of the columns on this page is given the Moon's Phases, or times of new and full moon, and of the First and Last Quarters, or quadratures of the Sun.

RIGHT HAND PAGE.

Column.

1. The days of the Month.
2. Holidays, Anniversaries, &c.
3. Time of High Water at Halifax, N. S.
4. " " " Pictou, N. S. and Cape Tormentine, N. B.
5. " " " Annapolis, N. S., St. John, N. B., and Portland, Maine.
6. " " " St. John's, Nfld.—of that tide which immediately precedes the southing of the Moon.

All the calculations are made to mean solar time.

Apogee is that point in a planet's orbit in which it is farthest from the earth.

Perigee is that in which it is nearest to it.

Lunation the time from new moon to new moon again.

Penumbras a partial shadow, resulting from the diminished light of the sun to the earth or moon, during a solar or lunar eclipse, appearing as partial.

Aphelion—That part of a planet's orbit farthest from the Sun.

Elliptic the plane of the earth's orbit extended to the starry sphere.

Perihelion is that part of a planet's orbit nearest the Sun.

Declination is the distance of a heavenly body from the Equinoctial line.

Elongation—Angular distance of a planet from the Sun, as seen from the earth.

THE FARMERS' FRIEND.

HORSES BALLING—The balling of snow on horses' feet may be materially lessened, by making the upper side of the shoe wider than the lower side, so that the inner edge will be bevelled outward. If constructed in this way the balls of snow would more readily fall out than if held by square-sided shoes. This suggestion is worthy the attention of blacksmiths, or those who have horses to be shod. At best, damp snow will pack into the shoe; but if the lower side of the opening be the widest, it will be more likely to drop out.

REMEDY FOR CHOKED CATTLE.—As soon as you discover that the creature is choking, take hold of the windpipe, below the potatoe, or whatever it is, with both hands, having one thumb on each side, and work out. If that fails, take a horse-shoe and put into the mouth to hold it open, then run the hand down the throat and take it out. An ox once choked with a potatoe will throw it out by giving him two or three spoonfuls of Cayenne pepper.

HEAVES IN HORSES.—Horses fed in part on carrots seldom suffer from heaves; they will be found to have a silky coat as well as a loose hide, and enjoy far better health than when hay and oats alone are used. Three quarts of carrots and three quarts of oats will sustain a horse much better than six quarts of oats. When the carrots form part of the feed, all the oats will be digested and assimilated; but, when oats alone are fed, the dung will be found to contain whole oat shells, undecomposed starch, amounting to more than half the quantity of oats consumed. The floor of every cutting box should be ribbed or opened so as to permit all dust to pass down before the hay reaches the cutting knives. Many horses are rendered asthmatic by being fed on dusty hay, and, consequently, every means calculable to remove the dust should be resorted to.

Notwithstanding the various opinions which now prevail in regard to shoeing horses, all will confess that a shoe with a concave surface next the ground is the only proper one to apply.

EVERGREENS.—The best time to transplant evergreens is when the tree begins to push its buds, or a little after. From the middle of April to June, in this latitude, is a good period. A calm, warm, cloudy day should be chosen for transplanting. The roots of an evergreen should never be allowed to get dry, or become chilled, when taken up. It is the exposure of the roots to such influences that kills so many of these trees. Care also should be taken to save all the roots. They are more injured by cutting the roots than other trees.



MEADOWS.—As soon as these are dry enough to bear feet without injury to the turf, they should be carefully picked of all loose and projecting stones. Stumps should be dug or pulled out, accidental brush or other rubbish removed, and small hillocks levelled down.

Meadows which were top-dressed with coarse manure in autumn or winter, which was more or less spread in lumps, should be harrowed as early as possible, so as to break those lumps and spread the whole uniformly. Cattle droppings, on meadows or pastures, should be finely beaten to pieces and well scattered over the surface, as soon as the frost will admit, and before the frost has all disappeared from the soil. It is scarcely necessary to mention that no good farmer ever allows either his meadows or pastures to be touched by a hoof early in spring while the ground is soft.

The best oil for harness is one quart neat's foot oil, four ounces beef's tallow, and three table-spoonfuls of lampblack; add four ounces of beeswax for use in summer weather.

NEW BEDBUG TRAP—SURE THING.—Take a board, say a foot wide and four feet long, punctured with many holes with a small bit, put it inside the headboard and next to the bed and pillows; if there is a bug about the bed, he will find the way to the holes in the board soon. Take it out of its place every morning, hold it over the fire or water, and give it a few raps with a hammer, then put in place and repeat. EARLY POTATOES.—New potatoes are a great luxury in July, and a little attention and forethought now will enable us to have them upon our tables a fortnight or three weeks earlier than those of our neighbours who may be less disposed to force the season. Select a quantity of seed potatoes sufficient for our first planting, and spread them evenly in the centre of a heap of horse manure, and there let them sprout. As soon as the frost will permit, remove them carefully, and plant in a piece of warm, well-pulverized ground, taking care not to break the sprouts, and give to each hill a generous shovelfull of fine barn-yard manure. After they break the soil, the subsequent frosts may nip the tender shoots; but, if well covered, the roots will continue to grow, and the gain in time over unsprouted seed in producing an early crop will be quite surprising to those who have not planted in this manner.

In milking, the hands should be dry and clean, as wet hands crack the teats in cold weather, and dirt injures the skin.

REMEDY AGAINST MOTHS.—An ounce of gumi camphor, and one of the powdered shell of red pepper, are macerated in eight ounces of strong alcohol for several days, then strained. With this tincture, the furs or cloths are sprinkled over, and rolled up in sheets.

FRECKLES may be reduced very considerably in depth of colour by the use of a weak solution of chloride of lime or soda, in union with glycerine, viz : chlorinated soda, $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce; glycerine, 1 oz.; rosewater, 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ ounces. Use night and morning freely, with a sponge.

WASH FOR FRUIT-TREES.—Put a pailful of water in a tub, and stir in three quarts of fresh cow manure, one quart of soft soap, two quarts sifted wood ashes, and add urine enough to make the mixture of the consistency of white-wash. Apply this to the trunks and limbs of the tree early in June, with an old broom. The manure and ashes form a coating which the rain gradually removes, leaving a clean, glossy bark, and also carrying fertility into the soil.

A correspondent of the *London Journal of Horticulture* recommends sulphuric acid for destroying weeds in gravel walks—a solution of seven parts of water to one of acid being used. If chalk or lime abound, the acid is speedily neutralised, and the weeds spring up again.

THE APPLE TREE BORER is a sad pest of the orchard. To repel this beetle from depositing its eggs upon the bark, the tree, towards the latter part of May, and until the end of June, should be rubbed with soft soap, or have some other alkali, the substance applied to it. The application must be repeated, as copious rain washes it off. Dusting the butts of the trees thickly with air-slacked lime, is also thought to be a good method.

NOTES FOR JULY.—Hoe and weed corn, potatoes, and all other crops; run the cultivator through them when the opportunity offers. Buckwheat and turnips may be sown this month. Make early preparation for harvesting; repair barn, vehicles, and tools. Get the best tools in the market; the extra cost of a good article may be earned in a day's work. Clover should be cut while in bloom. Timothy and red-top do not ripen till a fortnight after clover; they should be cut while the seed is in full mild, and before it is so ripe as to shake out when handled. Cut down and root out weeds before seeding; gather flowering herbs, and dry quickly in the sun.

RAT KILLING RECIPE.—Cut clean fine sponge in pieces of pea size, fry well in hog's lard, and expose in infested place about the houses, barns, granaries, gardens, etc., keeping cats and dogs shut up. The rats eat it greedily, but do not as readily digest it, the gastric juice, and especially water, if accessible to them to drink, swells the sponge, and noise in ratdom is the result. The dose proves fatal in most cases.

THE POTATO Rot.—To prevent potatoes from the disease or rot, put a spoonful of salt into each hill, so as to have it dissolve and go down to the roots. It will cool the ground and prevent the rot; and even if the rot has commenced, the salt will cause the rot to go off, and leave a scar around the potatoe plain to be seen. Put the salt on when the potatoe vines are nearly grown. The extra quantity of potatoes will more than pay for the salt.

A NOSEGAY THAT WILL KEEP TILL CHRISTMAS.—Take a wooden box, large enough to hold as many flowers without pressure as you intend to preserve;—make the box tight, to exclude light and air; place at the bottom a sheet of white paper, then a layer of nice young cut flowers, next another sheet of paper, and so alternately flowers and paper till the box be full. Close the box carefully—place in a cellar or damp room. At Christmas you will have a nosegay as beautiful as in the middle of summer.

TO DESTROY CANADA THISTLES.—Leaves are the lungs of plants. Kill the leaves and the plant will die. If Canada thistles are cut off even with, or below the surface of the ground, the operation being repeated as often as they make their appearance, they will be effectually destroyed. This process should especially be carried on in the latter part of summer. A thorough eradication of the top growth about the last of August or the first of September is of the greatest importance.

SAVE YOUR POULTRY DUNG.—It is worth vastly more than stable manure. It is well to keep a little moist loam mixed with it, to absorb the ammonia, which is very strong, and readily unites with the humic acid of the ground. For any choice garden plot, or a small bit of ground requiring extra manuring, this is the stuff to apply.

Cow's TEATS CRACKING.—Never wet them with milk; but use at each milking a little milk or molasses. Either will prove a remedy.

FARM WASTE.—One of the greatest wastes of many, and perhaps most farms, is the excrementitious matter of the family, and also of the domestic fowls. This first is buried upon some farms, generation after generation, in deep vaults below the surface. Fowls are allowed to roost here and there and everywhere; on trees, in the barn, over the wagon, or on top of some of the farm buildings. The manure, if carefully saved and well applied, that a large stock of poultry would make in a single season, would nearly pay for the erection of a plain poultry house. The carcasses of dead animals is another of the foolish wastes of some farmers. The body of a dead horse is worth more than an ordinary sucking colt; and the body of a dead cow is worth more than a vermin covered spring calf, with all his life.

TO PREPARE GREEN CORN FOR WINTER.—Cut it from the cob without scalding, and spread on plates. Keep it as near the stove as possible, and stir it often. It will dry quickly and keep well. When preparing it for the table, it is much better to change the water after it has soaked half an hour.

VERY PALATABLE AND WHOLESOME BROWN BREAD.—Graham Flour, Indian Meal and Rye Meal, one quart each; or, if Rye Meal cannot be had, 1 pint of yeast flour—or this may be omitted—mix together thoroughly—adding a little salt, put in 2 or 3 gills of molasses, according to taste—dissolve in a very little lukewarm water 2 tea-spoonfuls soda—and add to the flour and meal—and one quart of sour milk or butter-milk—mix well. Steam in a covered pan 3 or 4 hours; then bake in a quick oven for 20 minutes. When stale, this bread may be warmed and freshened by being put in the steamer for 15 or 20 minutes. This is a most excellent bread, and for dyspeptics is invaluable.

LICE ON CATTLE.—The *Boston Cultivator* recommends the use of fine sand, as a preventive and cure for lice on cattle. Haul into the barn a few loads of loam or fine sand, and spread it under the stock during the winter. If any of the creatures are lousy when coming to the barn in the autumn, throw some of the sand or loam upon them; it fills the hair and causes the lice to roll off, but does not kill the nits; the application must be repeated two or three times a week, until every generation is exterminated. Bulls are noted for their freedom from lice, and it is probably owing to their habit of pawing up earth and throwing it over their bodies.

It is the custom in Yorkshire to give cows something to eat during the milking to keep them pleased under the process, but many think they can be trained to stand perfectly still, much better in the absence of food.

TO KEEP POTATOES.—Dust over the floor of the bin with lime, and put in about six or seven inches deep of potatoes, and dust with lime as before. Put in six or seven inches more of potatoes, and lime again; repeating the operation till all are stowed in that way. One bushel of lime will do forty bushels of potatoes, though more will not hurt them; the lime rather improving the flavor than otherwise.

SANDY SOILS CAN BE STIRRED TOO MUCH.—A correspondent of the Farmer and Gardener thinks the New Jersey farmers use the plow, harrow, and cultivator too frequently, and the roller too seldom. Sandy soils are too full of air, and require much heavy rolling to make them compact and retentive of moisture.

Cows.—Cows should be kept warm and comfortable, and well bedded. They should be fed regularly; and the hay, before given them, should be well shaken and dusted. An occasional change of food would be beneficial.



**DIRECTIONS FOR THE DAILY READING OF HOLY
SCRIPTURES IN PRIVATE.**

The whole Bible may be read through in a year by reading *three* chapters on each working day, and *five* chapters on each Sabbath.

To accomplish this, read every day *two* chapters in the Old Testament, omitting the Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Solomon's Song. Read, in addition, every working day, *one* chapter, and every Sabbath day *three* chapters in the New Testament, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Solomon's Song.

The New Testament, with the above four books in the Old Testament, furnishes the supply just named for the year, less eight chapters. To supply this deficiency, read together two of the 22 divisions of Psalm exix., the short Psalms exvi. with cxxxii., and cxxxii., and Psalms cxxxiii. and cxxxiv.

LIGHT HOUSES.

On the coast of Nova Scotia, and on the coast of New Brunswick, in the Bay of Fundy, Cape Race, Newfoundland, Gulf and River St. Lawrence, and Strait of Belle Isle.

MEAGHER'S BEACH—East side Halifax Harbor. *A fixed light.*

SAMBRO ISLAND—West entrance Halifax Harbor. *A fixed light.*

CROSS ISLAND—Entrance to Lunenburg Harbor. *Two lights—flash light above, fixed light below.*

IRON-BOUND ISLAND LIGHT—Off the entrance of LaHave River. *A bright, flash light of ten seconds duration, followed by an eclipse of thirty seconds. The lantern is placed on a square wooden tower, painted white on the southern side of the Island, and is visible from all points of approach. Elevation seventy-five feet above sea level.*

PORT MEDWAY—*A fixed, white light on Admiralty head, W. side of the entrance of the port. Building square, painted white with black square in the centre of seaward sides, forty feet above sea level, and stands within thirty fathoms of the shore.*

LIVERPOOL—South-end of Coffin's Island. *A plain, revolving light.*

FORT POINT harbor light, at the head of Liverpool harbor, southern entrance of the river. *A bright, fixed light, visible from all points of approach, and must be left on the larboard hand when entering the harbor.*

RAGGED ISLAND HARBOR LIGHT—On Gull Rock, off the entrance of the harbor. Building square, and painted white, exhibiting a clear, white light, at an elevation of fifty-one feet above the sea level, and is situated in lat. $43^{\circ} 39' N.$, and long. $64^{\circ} 66' W.$

SHELBOURNE—McNutt's Island. *Two fixed lights, one above the other.*

BARRINGTON—Baccaro Point, east side of the entrance to Barrington Bay. *A flash light of fifteen seconds.*

CAPE SABLE ISLAND—On Cape Sable, in the County of Shelburne. *A red, fixed light. The building is an octagon, and is painted white.*

SEAL ISLAND—The first light on approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the south point of Seal Island. *A plain, white light, elevated about eighty feet above high water mark, and may be seen, on approaching the Island, from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called Blonde rock, about three and one-third miles S. by W., by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island there are some dangers: the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.*

PUBNICO HARBOR LIGHT—A Beacon Light on the S. E. side of the entrance to Pubnico Harbor, situate on the E. side of the entrance to the Bay of Fundy, about thirteen miles northerly of Cape Sable. Building square, painted white. *A fixed, red light, on the seaward side, twenty-eight feet above high water level, (rise and fall twelve feet,) and stands fifteen fathoms from low water mark. The point of beach is bold.*

YARMOUTH—West side of the harbor. *A plain, revolving light.*

A FOG BELL has been erected on the E. Cape of Yarmouth harbor, a few feet to the southward of the Light House, and about one and a quarter miles from the extreme outer point of the Cape. Strikes seven times per minute. Bell not in operation at night.

BRIAR ISLAND—*A plain, white light, situated about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point of the Island.*

WESTPORT—Peter's Island, at the South entrance of the Grand passage. *Two white lights, placed horizontally, to distinguish it from Briar Island Light, at an elevation of forty feet above high water mark.*

DIGBY GUT LIGHT—On the W. side of Digby Gut, from Briar Island north-eastward. *A fixed, white light.*

PORT WILLIAMS, LATE MARSHALL'S COVE—A Beacon Light, square and painted white, exhibits at a distance of about five miles a white light, and on nearer approach a green-light. Port Williams is distant from Digby Light House East 25 miles, and from Black Rock Light House West 27 miles.

MARGARETVILLE BEACON LIGHT—Building square and painted white, exhibits at a distance of about five miles a white light, and on nearer approach a red light. Margaretville is distant East thirty-seven miles from Digby Light House, and West 15 miles from Black Rock Light House. These Lights in the above Beacon Lights distinguish them from other lights in their vicinity.

BLACK ROCK LIGHT—On the southern shore of the Bay of Fundy, a fixed, white light.

APPLE RIVER LIGHT—North side of the entrance to Apple River, in Chignecto, or Cumberland Bay. *Two fixed lights, placed horizontally.*

PARTRIDGE ISLAND RIVER—An octagonal light beacon, on the W. side of the entrance to Partridge Island River, Parrsborough, on the N. side of the Basin of Minas, and exhibits a plain white light, at an elevation of thirty feet above high water; rise and fall about forty-five feet. The tower is white, and stands close to high water mark on the beach. Vessels can only enter the harbor at high water, and must lie aground on the soft bottom when the tide is low.

HORTON BLUFF LIGHT—In the Basin of Minas, ninety-five feet above sea level, high water; rise and fall forty or forty-five feet. Building square, painted white; stands sixty feet from the Bluff, and shows a white light, which may be seen in clear weather over the greatest part of the Basin of Minas, (after passing Cape Blomedon,) and above the Five Islands, and up Windsor River, until intercepted by the continuation of the Bluff to the southward of it.

BURNCOAT HEAD LIGHT, BASIN OF MINAS—The Lantern is erected on a square tower attached to the main building, and shows a plain white light, about 75 feet above high water level, and visible from all points of approach. Tower and building painted white. Bearings and distances: Cape Blomedon N. 70° , W. $26^{\circ} 5'$, 10 miles. Brick Kiln Ledges N. 52° , W. $7^{\circ} 5'$, 10 miles. Economy point N. 36° , W. $3^{\circ} 9'$, 10 miles.

DEVIL'S ISLAND—An octagonal building on the S. W. point of Devil's Island, at the entrance of the Eastern passage to Halifax harbor, and exhibits a red light on the seaward sides, to distinguish it from Sambro and Meagher's Beach light; stands forty-five feet above high water mark; rise and fall six feet. The tower painted dark brown, with a white belt between the Balcony and Lantern, to distinguish it in the day time.

EASTERN BEAVER, OR WILLIAM'S ISLAND—*A white, revolving light.*

WHITE HEAD ISLAND LIGHT—On the S. W. point of White Head Island. The tower is square, painted white, stands seventy-five fathoms from the water's edge, with an octagonal iron lantern, sixty feet above

sea level at high water; rise and fall six feet. The light is distinguished by bright flashes of ten seconds duration, followed by eclipses of ten seconds, displaying alternately three flashes and three eclipses in a minute. The light will not be totally obscured during the eclipse.

CANSEAU, CRANBERRY ISLAND—Two fixed lights, one above the other.

GUYSBOROUGH, HARBOR BEACON LIGHT—On the W. side of the entrance to the harbor, head of Chehaluseto Bay, a fixed light.

ARICHAT BEACON—A light on Point Morichi, on the south-east side of the southern entrance to the harbor. Building square, painted white. A white light thirty-four feet above the sea level.

EDDY, OR SAND POINT LIGHT—On Eddy, or Sand Point, on the west side of the south entrance to the Strait of Cansau, distinguished by two white lights placed horizontally, twenty-five feet above sea level. Building square, painted white, with a black diamond on the seaward side.

WEST SIDE OF THE GUT OF CANSO—A fixed white light.

CAPE GEORGE—The lighthouse now building on Cape George, in the County of Sydney, is intended to show a white revolving light, at intervals of thirty seconds. It is a square building, and is to be painted white.

PICTOU HARBOR LIGHT—On the south east side of the entrance to the harbor. Two fixed lights, vertical—upper one white, lower one red.

PICTOU ISLAND LIGHT—On the south-east point of the Island. Building square, and painted white. A white fixed light, fifty-two feet above high-water mark.

PORT HOOD LIGHT—Changed from white to red, when seen from the northern entrance, to distinguish it from Margaree and North Canso Lights.

SEA WOLF, OR MARGAREE ISLAND LIGHT—Situate on the N. W. side of the Island of Cape Breton, nearly midway between Port Hood and Cheticamp Harbors, and distant from Cape Breton two and a half miles. A plain white light. The lantern is placed on a square wooden tower, painted white, near the centre and summit of the Island. The lantern is 298 feet above sea level—visible from all points of approach. To vessels in proximity to the Island the light may become obscured by the abrupt cliffs or sides of the Island, which may serve as a guide to tack or anchor by, as hundreds of vessels find anchorage on the south-east side. The chief building is near the south-east end, in shore, where a few fishing stages and boats are kept in use during the fishing season.

ST. PAUL'S ISLAND—A fixed light on the north-east end, and a flash light on the south-west end. Both white lights.

LOW POINT LIGHT—East side of Sydney, C. B. Harbor. A fixed white-light.

FLINT ISLAND LIGHT—On Flint Island, on the eastern coast of Cape Breton, lat. $46^{\circ} 11' 5''$ N., and lon. $50^{\circ} 45' 20''$ W., and exhibits a bright, flash light, every fifteen seconds, visible from all points of the compass. The light is sixty-five feet above sea level, and can be seen at the distance of twelve miles.

SCATTARIE ISLAND—A white revolving light at the east end of the Island.

LOUISBURG—On the east side of the entrance to the harbor. A fixed light.

BIRD ISLAND—East coast of Cape Breton. Lighthouse in building.

GANNET ROCK LIGHT—This light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands, off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. A *white, flash light*, twenty seconds dark, and forty seconds light, in each minute. Building painted in stripes, vertical, *black and white*. Between the northernmost and southernmost of the Murr' Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them *almost* above water, and extend eastward from the Light House about four miles. From this range further *southwardly*, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker called the Bull—this may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan open.

MACHIAS SEAL ISLAND LIGHT—*Two fixed, white lights*, upon the Machias Seal Islands, forty-five feet above high water, and bearing from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W., distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance, of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, British or American. Both buildings painted *white*. Vessels standing to the northward between these lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these lights into one, as they will be then not more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr' Ledges, if not more than five miles to the east of the light.

HEAD HARBOR LIGHT—Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain white light (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbor Light, placed on the N. E. extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the Inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbor. *A fixed, white light*. Building painted *white*, with a *red cross* on it.

POINT LE PREAU LIGHT—Upon this projecting headland two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant twenty-eight feet. Both lights are seen from every point of the compass where they may be useful; both are *fixed* and *white*. Building painted *white* and *red*, in stripes, five feet broad each, horizontally.

PARTRIDGE ISLAND LIGHT—At the entrance of the river and harbor of St. John, N. B. *A fixed, white light*. The building painted *red* and *white* in vertical stripes.

BEACON LIGHT—Within Partridge Island, and upon a spit or bar, which extends about half a mile south off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. *A fixed, white light*. Building painted *white* and *black* in stripes vertically.

QUACO LIGHT—*A revolving, white light*, placed on a small rock, off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. The light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. Building painted *white* and *red*, in horizontal stripes.

CAPE ENRAGE LIGHT—On a point of that name in Westmoreland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbor, N. S. Building painted *white*, and about 120 feet above the tide mark. *A plain, white light*.

WEST QUODDY LIGHT—This is an American light, placed on the west side of the entrance in the St. Croix, by Lubec and Eastport.

A LIGHT HOUSE has been erected upon CAPE RACE, Newfoundland. *A fixed, white light*, from sunset to sunrise. The light is visible to seaward from N. E. by E. round by the S. E. and S. to W., and is elevated 180 feet above mean water level of the sea, and may be seen

LIGHT HOUSES.

in clear weather 17 miles from a ship's deck. The tower is striped red and white vertically. It stands close to the location of the old beacon, which has been cut down. The lighthouse is in Lat. $46^{\circ} 39' 19''$ N., Long., $53^{\circ} 21' 28''$ W. Bearings magnetic. Var. 24° W.

ENTRANCE TO GREAT BRAS D'OR AND ST. ANN'S, East coast Cape Breton. Flash light, red and white, at intervals of sixty seconds.

FISH ISLAND—Entrance of Tusket River. Two clear fixed lights, horizontally, seaward.

SPENCER'S POINT—North shore of Cobequid Bay, near head of Minas Basin. Clear, fixed light.

ST. PIERRE AND MIQUELON ISLANDS—Galantry Point. Revolving light, making a revolution every 20 seconds, one red flash following two white ones. Lat. $46^{\circ} 45' 30''$, Long. $58^{\circ} 27'$. Elevation above level of high tides 198 feet; range of light 18 miles; covered on north side by highlands of St. Pierre. The south-east channel entrance to St. Pierre Bay, indicated by two small lighthouses with fixed lights, one a white light, at Canon Point; the other red, at the north of the town.

In the River and Gulf of St. Lawrence and Strait of Belle Isle.

BELLE ISLE LIGHT.—An island at the eastern entrance of the Strait of Belle-Isle, separating Labrador from Newfoundland, situated at the extreme south-west point of the island. A single fixed white light. Building, circular stone tower, faced externally with fire brick of a light color. Lat. N. $51^{\circ} 53' 0''$; Long. W. $25^{\circ} 26' 0''$. Whole horizon lighted, and seen in fair weather $28\frac{1}{2}$ nautical or $32\frac{1}{2}$ statute miles.

POINTE AMOUR LIGHT, Labrador Coast, Strait of Belle-Isle, at the south-east point of Fortean Bay. Lat. N. $57^{\circ} 27' 30''$; Long. W. $56^{\circ} 53' 40''$. A single fixed white light, two-thirds of the horizon illuminated, and seen in fair weather $18\frac{1}{2}$ nautical or $21\frac{1}{2}$ statute miles. Building, a circular stone tower, faced externally with fire brick of a light color.

ANTICOSTI LIGHT at the extreme west end of the island of Anticosti, Lat. N. $49^{\circ} 52' 30''$; Long. W. $64^{\circ} 35' 0''$. A single, fixed white light, two-thirds of the horizon illuminated, and seen in fair weather 15 nautical or 18 statute miles. Building—a circular stone tower, faced externally with fire brick of a light color.

CAPÉ ROZIER LIGHT—East coast of Gaspe, at the extreme point of the Capé. Lat. N. $48^{\circ} 51' 0''$ Long. W. $64^{\circ} 35' 0''$. A single fixed white light—two thirds of the horizon illuminated, and seen in fair weather $16\frac{1}{2}$ nautical or $19\frac{1}{2}$ statute miles. Building—a circular stone tower, faced externally with fire brick of a light color.

Signals will be given at or near each of the above four light houses by means of an air or fog whistle, sounded at short intervals during foggy weather and snow storms, or by a nine pounder gun, fired every hour, in case of the whistle being out of order.

The following Rocks and Shoals are on the coast of Newfoundland and Labrador:

LABRADOR. *Mid Rock*—Eight feet least water, lies 300 fathoms E. by N. from south point of Surf Island, in the Caribou Channel, leading to Muddle Harbor; and is cleared on the East by keeping Cape Saint Lewis touching Surf Cape until the South point of Surf Island bears W. N. W.

Sizerock Shoal—Eight feet least water, lies half a mile S.S.W. from the *Mid Rock*, and is cleared on the West by the South point of *Surf Island* touching *South middle rock*.

NEWFOUNDLAND, *Trinity Bay*, North side. *Catalina Harbor*—Is dangerous of approach, and should not be attempted by a stranger; besides the *Brandies*, 4 feet, and *Charlton*, 6 feet, there is a rock about half a mile within the *Burnt Point*, lying 60 fathoms from the South shore.

Poor Shoal—22 feet least water, lies 2 miles N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. from *Green Island Lighthouse*:

Morris Rock—22 feet least water, lies S. S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. one mile from *Green Island Lighthouse*.

Skerries—This rock, with 36 feet least water, lies $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles East from *Green Island Lighthouse*.

Feather Rock—36 feet least water, lies nearly 4 miles S. E. from *Green Island Lighthouse*.

Deer Rock—Off *Random Head*, 9 feet least water, lies 3 miles S. W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. from *Duck Island*, and is cleared by keeping *Bonaventure Head* open South of *Duck Island*.

TRINITY BAY, South Side. *Arthur Rock*—6 feet least water, lies one mile N. N. E. from *King's Head*. The *Sugar-loaf* in line with *King's Head*, leads clear to the South of the rock.

Hants Harbor Rock—A wash at low water, lies one mile and a quarter N. E. by N. from *Hants Harbor Head*, and is cleared by *Sugar-loaf S. W.* by *W.* open of *King's Head*.

Knife Rock—24 feet least water, lies 2 miles N. E. by E. from *Hants Harbor Head*.

Rif-raps—2 feet less water, lie 500 fathoms north of *Salvage Point*.

Salvage Rocks—6 feet least water, lie $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. E. from *Salvage Point*.

Brandison Rocks—20 feet least water, lie one mile North from West point of *Seal Cove*.

CONCEPTION BAY. *Wall Rock*—30 feet least water, lies 600 fathoms E. N. E. from *Split Point*.

Job Rock—30 feet least water, lies $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. E. by E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. from *Gull Island*.

Puddy Rock—30 feet least water, lies 500 fathoms N. E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. from *Western Bay Head*.

Bell Rock—18 feet least water, lies 1 mile S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. from the *Bell of Belle Isle*. Shoal water extends off the East end of *Belle Isle* 400 fathoms.

Brandies. Three rocks, of four, eight, and twelve feet respectively; the uppermost, 12 feet, lies 800 fathoms E. S. E. from *Cape St. Francis*, and is cleared by keeping *Torbay Point* open of *Black Head*.

Tantan Rocks—18 feet least water; the uppermost, with 30 feet, lies three quarters of a mile N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. from *Torbay Point*.

Redhead Rock—30 feet least water, lies nearly a mile S. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. from *Torbay Point*.

ST. MARY'S BAY, South Coast. *Bank Shoal*—24 feet least water, lies $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. from *Point La Haye*.

Greet Shoal—27 feet least water, lies $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. S. W. from *Point La Haye*.

NEAR CHAPEAU ROUGE. *Point Rock*—Off *St. Lawrence*, 27 feet least water, lies S. W. 180 fathoms from *Middle Head*.

The above balls, &c., are hoisted on the east or west yard arm, according to the quarter the vessel first appears in.

When vessels are reported from an outpost, the following signals are shown under the yard-arm as repeats,

For a square rigged vessel, two balls of a size, one at the outer, the other at the inner halliard, close up.

A Ship or Barque, a large ball at the end of the yard, with a small one at the inner halliard.

A Brig, a small ball at the end of the yard, and a large one at the inner halliard.

A Brigantine, a cross close up to the outer halliard.

Two or more Brigantines, a cross half hoisted.

A Topsail Schooner, a cross close up at the inner halliard.

An upper yard having been added to the Ship Staff, it will be used exclusively to designate Steam Vessels, thus:

One ball East or West indicates a Steam Vessel repeated in that quarter.

A small ball out and a large one in, a Branch Packet or Merchant Vessel.

A large ball out and a small one in, a Man-of-War Steamer, or Royal Mail Steamer.

Numbers will be indicated as directed from the lower yard.

The lower yard is now used for sailing vessels only.

When the description of vessel in sight is ascertained from the Citadel, the following descriptive colours will be hoisted at the mast head:

A Union Jack, Flag Ship.

Do. with a red Pendant over it, a two decker.

Do. with a blue Pendant over it, a Frigate.

Ashes, viz: pot ashes and pearl ashes; Asses and Mules; Baggage and apparel of passengers not intended for sale; Barilla and soda ash; Beans; Bells, organs, and musical instruments for churches; Biscuit or Bread, viz., ship or navy; Books not prohibited to be imported into the United Kingdom; Bristles and hairs used in the manufacture of brushes; Bullion, gold or silver; Burr stones; Coal; Cocoa; Coin, viz., gold and silver coins, and British copper coins; Copper: yellow metal, composition and zinc for ship sheathing, if a size forty-eight inches long by fourteen inches wide, and sheathing felt, composition, and zinc bars or bolts, nails, spikes and clinch rings for ship-building; Copper, viz., in pigs or bricks, old or worn, or fit only to be remanufactured; Corkwood; Corn, viz: wheat, rye, indian corn, barley, oats, rice and buckwheat, unground, rice meal, barley meal, rye meal, indian meal, oat meal, buckwheat meal, peas and beans; Catch; Engravings and photographs; Fish, viz: fresh, dried, salted or pickled; Fish hooks: Fish oil, viz: train oil, spermaceti oil, head matter and blubber, fish or skins the produce of fish or creatures living in the sea; Flax; Furniture that has been in actual use, working tools and implements—the property of immigrants, or persons coming to reside in the Province, and not intended for sale; not to include machinery, musical instruments and plate; Hay;

LETTER RATES.

Letters posted in Nova Scotia, addressed to any place within the Province beyond the county wherein they are posted pass, if prepaid, for 5 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., and may be sent from way office to way office without passing through a post office; but if posted unpaid, such letters are charged 7 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

Letters mailed at any office in the Province for delivery within the county in which the office is situated, if prepaid by stamp, are liable to a charge of 2 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., if not prepaid they are subject to the ordinary rate for unpaid letters.

On Letters to the United Kingdom, the rate is $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. If posted unpaid, they are charged with a fine of 6d. stg. in addition to the postage. This regulation also applies to letters dropped into the box after the hour of closing, and up to the arrival of the packet; and to letters received on board the steamers after the mail has left the Post Office. Letters are forwarded at the same rate, "per Canadian Steamer," via Pieton and River du Loup. On letters to the United Kingdom per closed mails via United States, (letters to be specially addresed) "via New York," the rate is 17 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. A fine of 6d. stg. is charged in addition to the postage if the letters are posted unpaid.

On letters to the United States, the rate is 10 cents; when posted in the interior "per Royal Mail Steamers," $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents. On letters to Oregon and California the rate is 15 cents. The prepayment of postage to the United States is optional when letters are forwarded by land mail.

On letters throughout British North America a uniform rate of 5 cents is established, if the weight does not exceed $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.; if more than $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. and less than 1 oz., 10 cents; if more than 1 oz. and less than $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz., 15 cents; if more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. and less than 2 oz. 20 cents; if not prepaid, double postage will be demanded at the place of delivery. On letters to Canada by closed mail, "per Royal Mail Steamers," via Boston, the rate is $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents, viz.: $8\frac{1}{2}$ cents packet rate, and 4 cents

Colonial rate—*prepayment optional*. (Letters must be addressed “*Closed Mail for Canada.*”)

On letters to Newfoundland and Bermuda, the rate is 10 cents; when posted in the interior $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents. *Prepayment compulsory.* On letters via Bermuda, for Havana, Honduras, Lagunyra, Mexico, Venezuela, and the British and Foreign West Indies, the rate is 10 cents; when posted in the interior, $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents; for Chagres and the Pacific, Chili and Peru, it is 33 cents; 5 cents additional when posted in the interior. *Prepayment compulsory.* Unpaid letters from Newfoundland and Bermuda for Halifax are taxed $8\frac{1}{2}$ cents the $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., and $13\frac{1}{2}$ cents if addressed to other places in Nova Scotia.

☞ Letters for Registry must be posted half an hour previous to the closing of the mail by which they are forwarded, and the postage as well as the registration fee must be prepaid.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

British and Colonial newspapers, and small religious periodicals, such as “The Child’s Paper,” “The Play Hour,” “The Sabbath School Visitor,” and others of a like description, whether British or Foreign, shall pass through the Nova Scotia Post Office, whether posted within or without the Province, free of charge, for Nova Scotia postage. All other newspapers (except one copy, to be called an exchange copy, addressed to any newspaper publisher in Nova Scotia) shall be liable to a charge of one cent each; to be prepaid by stamp if mailed within the Province; or if mailed without, the postage to be collected on delivery.

Periodicals passing through any office in the Province, if posted without the Province, shall be liable, in addition to any charge prepaid, to an additional charge on delivery, of two cents for each number. If posted within the Province, for delivery within or without the Province, they shall be liable to a charge of two cents each, *to be prepaid by stamps.*

CIRCULARS, HANDBILLS, &c.

Circulars, handbills, lithographed letters, and other printed matter of like character, posted in Nova Scotia, and addressed to any place in or out of Nova Scotia, are charged one cent per ounce up to 48 oz., *to be prepaid by stamps.*

BOOKS AND PAMPHLETS.

Books and Pamphlets may be sent from any part of the Province to any place within the same, at the rate of one cent per once, prepaid by stamp, up to 48 ounces; beyond which weight they cannot be sent by mail. Books and Pamphlets from Great Britain to Nova Scotia, or *vice versa*, are charged the following rates—*the postage in all cases to be prepaid by stamps.*—

For a packet not exceeding 4 ounces..... 7 cents.

“ “ “ $\frac{1}{2}$ lb..... $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents.

“ $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. and not exceeding 1 lb..... 25 cents,

and so on, adding 25 cents for every additional pound or fraction of a pound. One book package may contain separate books, publications, almanacks, maps, and paper, parchment or vellum; the latter materials may be written or printed on, and the package may contain the name and address of the sender. Rollers may accompany prints and maps, and markers may be sent with books. No package must exceed two feet in length, width or depth.

British reprints of Copyright works from the United States, by land mail or steamers, charged letter postage.

SYSTEM.

1. Single Orders may be issued for any sum up to One Hundred Dollars.

2. The Commission payable for each Order is in accordance with the following scale:—

3. Money Orders are made out on Forms supplied for the use of the Money Order Offices.

4. Persons applying for Money Orders, will do so on form of Application provided for that purpose.

5. Place of Payment of a Money Order may be changed in accordance with instructions provided therefor.

6. Alteration of Payee's name may be effected, by issue of a new order and payment of commission thereon.

7. Applicants for Money Orders are expected to observe due care in examination of the same, relative to filling and stamping, &c.; defects in Orders, when presented for payment, may cause difficulty and delay, for which the paying office is not to be held accountable.

8. Postmasters are requested to observe due care, in paying of Orders, to prevent mistake and loss.

9. Payees also should observe due care, relative to presentation of Orders, for when an Order is once paid, and the voucher therefor obtained, the paying Office will not be liable to any other claim on the transaction.

10. Postmasters may pay Orders, to others than the Payees, when, by written authority, or otherwise, they are satisfied that such transactions are genuine.

11. Orders may be repaid to parties who obtained them, but the commission for such Orders is not returnable.

12. Postmasters are advised to recommend the use of the Money Order System, for transmission of monies, in preference to such transmission by Registered Letters, or otherwise, through the Post-Office;—the M. O. System being the only recognized mode for ensuring from loss of monies in such cases.

PARCEL POST.

Parcels closed at the ends and sides may be posted at any Post Office in Nova Scotia, for conveyance to any other Post Office (not Way Office) in the Province, at a rate of postage subject to the following conditions :

1. No letter or letters shall be enclosed.
2. The parcel shall not contain any explosive substance, glass, liquids, or other matter likely to injure the ordinary contents of the mail, under penalty of the forfeiture of the parcel.
3. The weight of the parcel shall not exceed 3 lbs., nor the size exceed one foot in length or breadth, or six inches in thickness.
4. Parcels must be prepaid at the following rates, and by *postage stamps* (not by money) :

If weighing less than 1 lb.....	25 cents.
More than 1 lb., and not exceeding 2 lbs.....	50 "
More than 2 lbs., and not exceeding 3 lbs.....	75 "

5. The parcel may be registered, on prepayment, also by stamp, of a registration fee of 10c., in addition to the above rate.

6. The parcel shall have the words "*By Parcel Post*," plainly written over the address. It should be well and strongly put up, and be legibly addressed to the Post Office address of the intended receiver, including the name of the County in which the Post Office is situated. The following is an example of the mode of address recommended.

BY PARCEL POST.

To _____ Post Office,
County of _____, N. S.

Sent by _____, _____ County.

7. If the name and address of the sender be written on the parcel, it will, if delivery should fail from any cause, be returned unopened to the sender on payment of an additional rate of 25c. for the return conveyance.


8. If the number of stamps affixed to a packet be insufficient to prepay the proper rate, the amount deficient will be rated unpaid, with a fine of 10c. in addition.

PROHIBITORY CLAUSES.

No written communication shall be enclosed in any circular, periodical, pamphlet, book, book parcel, or parcel for the Parcel Post; and no communication shall be written upon any circular, periodical, pamphlet, book, book package, or parcel.

No letter, or any writing, or any marks to serve the purpose of a letter, shall be written upon or be enclosed in any newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper.










HACKNEY CARRIAGES.

[Extracted from an Ordinance of the City, passed May 15th, 1860.]

Any person or persons having a license in full force, who shall stand his carriage in any other than its appointed place or manner, or not have it properly numbered, or any driver or person in charge of a licensed carriage who shall not produce the tables of fares and distances when thereto required, or who being upon his stand disengaged shall refuse to convey any person seeking to employ him, or who shall in any way violate this ordinance, shall for each offence, besides being liable to have his license revoked, forfeit and pay such fine as under and by virtue of this Ordinance may be adjudged against him. And the owner or driver of any such carriage who shall demand or extort from any person or persons a sum beyond the rate of fare herein established, or hereafter to be established, may be so fined, and shall forthwith forfeit the license for such carriage, and be liable to refund to the party grieved the sum so extorted, with costs of prosecution. Livery stable keepers not occupying the stands of said City shall be liable, in every respect, to this Ordinance, except as to going on the stands.

One-half of the above price to be paid if returning in the same carriage. For employment in the night the fare shall be as parties may agree, not, however, to exceed double fare.

For every carriage hired by the hour for one person, 2s. 6d., each additional grown person, 1s., each child, 6d. Any number of minutes over ten and less than fifteen shall be counted as one quarter hour on time of hiring; for each quarter hour detention the party or parties carried shall pay one-fourth of the sum they are bound to pay for the one hour.

To and from any steamer, passenger vessel—to and from any hotel or dwelling-house to any stage office or other place within a mile, with half cwt. luggage,—1s. 3d.

As above, with more than $\frac{1}{2}$ cwt. and less than 2 cwt. of luggage, 2s. 6d.

TRUCKMEN'S REGULATIONS.

Extract from an Ordnance of the City Council, passed May 15th, 1860.

No Licensed Truckman, being on his stand, shall refuse or neglect to cart, truck, or employ his horse and cart, truck, or sled, within the said City of Halifax, for any person when requested.

The following shall be the table or rates and prices of truckage payable to, or to be demanded by the truckmen of the City of Halifax for their service, subject however to be altered from time to time by the resolution of Council :

RATE PER LOAD WITH CART, TRUCK OR SLED.

For a quarter of a mile.....	7d.
For a Half do.....	9d.
For Three Quarters do.....	1s. 0d.
For One Mile.....	1s. 3d.
For One Mile and a Quarter.....	1s. 6d.
For One Mile and a Half.....	1s. 9d.
For One Mile and Three Quarters.....	2s. 0d.
For Two Miles.....	2s. 6d.
For every additional Quarter of a mile over Two Miles....	3d.

One-half of these charges to be added to the rate for the following articles, viz.: Wood, Coal, Lumber, Bricks, Building Stone and Sand, Potatoes and other Vegetables.

The amount which shall be considered a full or regular load for a horse and truck, sled, or cart, shall be fixed agreeably to the following tables, viz:

1 hhd. Sugar ; 1 pun. Rum or Molasses ; 1 pipe Wine, Brandy, Gin, Oil ; 1 load Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Beef, Pork, Fish, &c.. 5 bbls. each ; 1 load Sugar, 5 bbls., Flour 6 bbls., Bread 7 do. ; 1 hhd. Dry Fish or 10 quintals ; Hay or Straw 10 cwt., if in bundles ; Wood $\frac{1}{2}$ cord ; Coal $\frac{1}{2}$ chaldron ; Bags Coffee 10 cwt. ; Bricks $\frac{1}{4}$ M. ; Lime 2 hhds. ; Sand 12 bushels ; Stone $\frac{1}{2}$ ton ; Iron $\frac{1}{2}$ ton ; Lumber, $\frac{1}{3}$ M. ; Shingles 5 M. ; Clap Boards $1\frac{1}{4}$ M. ; Grain, Wheat, 20 bushels ; Barley 25 bushels ; Oats 30 bushels ; Potatoes and other vegetables 20 bushels ; Salt $\frac{3}{2}$ hhds. ; Fish, loose, 10 quintals ; Leather or hides $\frac{1}{2}$ ton ; Cables 10 cwt. ; loose articles 10 cwt.

In removing the furniture of a house the rate to be settled by agreement of parties, if not settled, 2s. 6d. a load per half mile.

If any Licensed Truckman shall ask, demand, or receive, from any person any greater rates of fare than is allowed by the table aforesaid, or may hereafter be allowed and prescribed, he shall forfeit and pay the sum of not less than five shillings nor over twenty shillings.
