HISTORICAL SKETCH.

TOWN OF PICTOU.

When the early settlers arrived in this County, a small portion of land was laid out as a town near what is known as the Town Gut, and likewise a similar work was done at Fisher's Grant, but neither of these commanded sufficient interest to be extensively built upon. The credit of locating the site of the present Town of Pictou, called that name, it is said, after an old Province of France named *Poictou*, is generally attributed to a gentleman named John Patterson. When the first grants of lands were issued, the block on which the town stands, including the shore from Brown's Point round to Carriboo, had been reserved out of the Philadelphia Company's Grant, and given to Colonel McNutt, and his friends. In the year 1770, however, the grant was escheated, and Lieutenant Richard Williams became the owner. Afterwards it was transferred to Walter Patterson, Esq., who had been appointed Governor of Prince Edward Island, and who had previously occupied the position of Judge in the Province of Maryland, the place of his nativity being the Northern part of Erin's Isle. He at once commenced selling portions of his newly acquired property, and laid out a town (on paper at least) which he named *Coleraine*, eastward of what is still known as Coleraine Street. The most valuable part of the Governor's property appears however to have been purchased by John Patterson, in 1787, which embraced the central portions of the town, extending from Coleraine Street westwardly to the Market. The ground along the shore some forty feet wide was reserved for a high-way road or street,

and this ultimately became the front street of the town. Mr. Patterson soon commenced dividing the front-part of his land into small lots for building-purposes and effected several sales. It appears at this time the name of the town was not definitely settled, as in old documents we find it called Coleraine, New Paisley, Alexandria, Donegal, Teignmouth, Southampton and Walmsley, but finally Pictou was given to the oldest town of the County bearing that name. Situated as it is on the North side of the harbour, on gradually rising ground, its position as seen from the water is both commanding and attractive. During the past few years a large number of excellent houses have been erected, especially in the more elevated portion of the town. Here we find commodious and handsome mansions, modern villas and neat cottages, all of which indicate the wealth and prosperity of the inhabitants. The public buildings are likewise worthy of notice. The Court house, Registry Office, and Custom House stand foremost in this class, and the latter especially is an ornament to the town. The handsome and substantial building lately erected by The Pictou Bank and used as offices for the Company, and the one in course of erection for the Young Men's Christian Association, the ground floor of which we understand, will be our future Post Office, add considerably to the attractiveness of the town.

Pictou is well supplied with Churches, which include three Presbyterian, one Episcopal, one Methodist, and one Roman Catholic, all of which are moderately well attended. The principal Educational Establishment is the Pictou Academy, originally founded by the Rev. Dr. McCulloch. The building however must have undergone considerable improvement, since his day, as it now presents the appearance of a modern structure. Then there is the High School,—a building replete with every comfort and convenience for the youthful part of our population. There are several moderately good halls including Masonic, Prince Street, Assembly, and others of minor importance.

TRADE AND COMMERCE.

Some years ago the amount of business done here in the exportation of coal was very large, so much so that vessels had to wait

their turn frequently for weeks, while the beautiful and extensive harbor presented a small forest of spars. Not so now, however, there is unfortunately a decline in this important branch of business which is hoped in the near future may undergo a favorable change. The maritime interests of the town are considerable and vessels of all classes belong to the port. The harbour is considered one of the best on the South shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence and affords ample accommodation to the numerous ships, which frequently come in to its safe and capacious basin. The Marine Railway or Slip for the overhauling and repairs of vessels, leased by Messrs. J. & J. Yorston (who are likewise ship builders) is a great accommodation to the shipping trade generally.

The town has Gas Works, Brass and Iron Foundries, Tobacco Factories, Tanneries,—one within the limits of the Corporation owned by Messrs. R. Campbell & Son and the other immediately outside of the town the property of John Logan Esq.,—both of which are doing a very extensive business, and affording work to a large number of hands. Here too, there are several excellent stores, including Hardware, Dry-Goods, Books and Stationery, Grocery, Drugs, Boots and Shoes and a variety of others. The town contains three Banks with several Savings Banks, also Fire, Life and Marine Insurance Companies, Telegraph Offices, many excellent Hotels, a most efficient Fire Brigade, a widely circulated newspaper, all of which are more particularly referred to in our miscellaneous directory.

The Eastern terminus of the Intercolonial Railroad is situated at Pictou Landing, opposite the town, and connected by steam ferry. The population of Pictou, a seaport town and County seat, is nearly 4000, and is seven miles from New Glasgow, the second largest town in the County.

THE PRESS.

“THE COLONIAL STANDARD.”

The “Colonial Standard” published in Pictou every Tuesday morning, was established over twenty years ago, its first number being issued in October, 1858. The present Provincial Secretary and Premier of Nova Scotia, the Hon. S. H. Holmes, who still retains his connection with the paper, was its first Editor and Publisher. In politics, the “Standard” is a zealous advocate of Conservatism, while its appropriate motto is “Fear God and honor the Queen”. The “Standard” has been generally supported not only by its political friends but by all classes, so that it has had a successful business career. When the paper first made its appearance it was a symmetrical twenty-four column folio; in this form it was published until 1870, when Mr. Robert P. Grant became publisher, and printed it in an enlarged form.

In 1874, Mr. Grant's connection with the “Standard” was severed, and in the following year the paper passed into the hands of Mr. David F. Power, the present efficient Editor and Publisher. Mr. Power at once enlarged the paper from twenty-four to thirty-two columns and printed it from new type, so that the sheet is now one of the handsomest of its kind in the Dominion. In connection with the “Colonial Standard” is an excellent job office, in which a large amount of printing is done, including the “Monthly Record of the Church of Scotland in the Maritime Provinces.” The

"Record" is the organ of that portion of the Presbyterian Church which declined to unite with the other Presbyterian bodies of Canada, when in 1874 the Union was effected.

In closing this necessarily brief notice, we may observe that as a literary production the "Colonial Standard" holds a prominent place among the weekly Canadian Press. Until very lately the leading articles were regularly contributed by the Hon. S. H. Holmes. The news and general editing is done by Mr. D. F. Power who also occasionally lends the use of his pen to its political columns. The Editor is assisted by many able regular contributors some of whom rank among the foremost professional men in the county. The circulation of the "Standard", which is steadily increasing, is some fourteen hundred copies, which constitutes it a capital advertising medium.





TOWN OF NEW GLASGOW.

In the year 1809, a tract of land containing some 500 acres was granted to a gentleman named John McKenzie, and subsequently transferred by him to Alexander McKay for £20. On this land, bought for the insignificant sum just named, stands the rising town of New Glasgow. A surveyor named William Fraser was employed to lay off the front in acre and half acre lots. One of these lots, situated at the bank south of where the present bridge is located, was presented to a Mr. Chisholm, who erected upon the site a log house, where he and his wife lived for some time, and who were the only inhabitants of the place until the late Mr. James Carmichael, in the year before named, purchased from McKay the lot adjoining to the east and erected a log building thereon. Some two years later the house was destroyed by fire, but rebuilt without any unnecessary delay. The substantial and modern building erected by his son, the Hon. Jas. W. Carmichael, and used as offices for the Bank of Nova Scotia and other purposes, stands on the same site. The father of the present successful merchant and ship owner, was associated in business with a Mr. Argo, and as may be naturally supposed in those early days, their transactions were not of a very gigantic character. subsequently, Mr. Carmichael conducted the business exclusively on his own account, and as the population increased, his business, consisting chiefly in trading in timber, butter, pork, skins, grain, in fact all kinds of agricultural produce, became

somewhat extensive. As time rolled on, the humble trader who commenced the battle of life with so many apparent difficulties, became one of the most prominent merchants in the County of Pictou, and what is of far greater value, history records the fact that this pioneer merchant was distinguished for his uprightness of character and honorable business principles—elements of character which in our estimation, independent of money, constitute the commercial nobleman.

The town, since the period referred to, has become a place of no ordinary importance, and especially since its incorporation. The limits of the town are extensive, and its founders evidently looked forward to the time when, as we hope, it will become at no distant period, a flourishing city. Already some of the largest ships of Nova Scotia have been built here, and although the past few years have been marked by very great depression in ship building and other branches of industry still the hope is cherished that ere long a change for the better will take place.

There are several foundries in the town, including the extensive establishment of Messrs. I. Matheson & Co., engineers and boiler makers; also, the New Glasgow foundry and the Nova Scotia Forge Co., immediately adjoining the town. Here too, are three tanneries, ship building yards, factories of various kinds, two banks and savings banks, several excellent stores, and other places of commerce, Many of which would be a credit to any city in the Dominion. In the town we find five churches, three of which are Presbyterian, one Baptist, and the members of the English Church have service in the Mechanic's Hall every Sabbath, and we understand they have it in contemplation to erect a church, when the funds are available and a suitable site obtained. There is no lack of schools, conducted by efficient teachers—a popular weekly newspaper, the "Eastern Chronicle"—two superb masonic halls, some good hotels, including the Lorne, Dufferin, and American.

On the 1st January, 1879, the “Eastern Chronicle” entered upon the thirty-eighth year of its existence. 





The battery is fully equipped with uniform of the best material, exactly the same as the Royal Artillery and are armed with Snider-Enfield short rifle. Have a battery of six 32 pounder guns, mounted on a gun platform on the Battery Hill, so called.

Since the formation of the corps in 1875, it has been mentioned in all the militia reports as one of the best and most soldierly looking corps in the Province, and was very favorably noticed by the Marquis of Lorne and the Princess Louise on the occasion of the reception in Truro, November, 1878. They have just ordered the new regulation artillery helmet from England, and when these arrive they can for soldierly appearance and completeness of equipment compete with any corps in the Lower Provinces.

The Band of the Battery was formerly known as the Pictou Silver Cornet Band, and under the leadership of Mr. John A. Stramberg, a young man of superior musical talent, has obtained the credit of being the best band in the Province. The instruments were purchased by the men of the battery, out of the battery funds, and the militia department furnished the uniforms. The members of the Pictou Silver Cornet Band enlisted in the Battery, and are still under the able leadership of Mr. Stramberg.

Tariff of Customs

OF THE

DOMINION OF CANADA,

AS IN FORCE

On and after the 15th March, 1879.

—:—

1. *Resolved*, That it is expedient to provide that the value of all bottles, flasks, jars, demijohns, carboys, casks, hogsheads, pipes, barrels, and all other vessels or packages manufactured of tin, iron, lead, zinc, glass or any other material, and capable of holding liquids; crates, barrels and other packages containing glass, china, crockery or earthenware, and all packages in which goods are commonly placed for home consumption, including cases in which bottled spirits, wines or malt liquors are contained, and every package, being the first receptacle or covering enclosing goods for purpose of sale, shall in all cases not otherwise provided for, in which they contain goods subject to an *ad valorem* duty, be taken and held to be a part of the fair market value of such goods for duty, and when they contain goods subject to specific duty only, such packages shall be charged with a duty of customs of twenty per centum *ad valorem* to be computed upon their original cost or value; and all or any of the above packages described as capable of holding liquids when containing goods exempt from duty under this Act, shall be charged with a duty of twenty per centum *ad valorem*; but all packages not hereinbefore specified, and not specially charged with duty by any unrepealed enactment, and being the usual and ordinary packages in which goods are packed for exportation only, according to the general usage and custom of trade shall be free of duty.

2. *Resolved*, That it is expedient to provide that on all goods imported into Canada, subject under this Act or any other Act to an *ad valorem* duty, upon which a drawback of duties has been allowed by the Government of the country where the same were manufactured, the amount of such drawback shall in all cases be taken and considered to be a part of the fair market value of such goods, and duty shall be collected thereon, and in cases where the amount of such drawback shall have been deducted from the value of such goods upon the face of the invoice under which the entry is to be made, the collector of Customs or proper officer shall add the amount of such deduction, and collect and cause to be paid the lawful duty thereupon, and the fair market value of all goods, wares and merchandise imported into Canada, shall be understood to be the ordinary wholesale price at which the same are sold for home consumption in the country where they are purchased or manufactured without deduction of any kind because of any drawback paid or to be paid thereon, or because

of any special arrangement between the seller and purchaser having reference to the exportation of such goods, or to the exclusive right to territorial limits for the sale thereof, or because of any royalty payable upon patent rights, but not payable when goods are purchased for exportation, or on account of any other consideration by which a special reduction in price might or could be obtained: Provided that nothing herein shall be understood to apply to general fluctuations of market values.

3. *Resolved*, That it is expedient to provide that any or all of the following articles, that is to say animals of all kinds, green fruit, hay, straw, bran, seeds of all kinds, vegetables, (including potatoes and other roots), plants, trees and shrubs, coal and coke, salt, hops, wheat peas and beans, barley, rye, oats, Indian corn, buckwheat and all other grain, flour of wheat and flour of rye, Indian meal and oat meal, and flour or meal of any other grain, butter, cheese, fish (salted or smoked), lard, tallow, meats (fresh, salted or smoked), and lumber may be imported into Canada free of duty, or at a less rate of duty than is provided by this Act upon Proclamation of the Governor in Council, which may be issued whenever it appears to his satisfaction, that similar articles from Canada may be imported into the United States free of duty, or at a rate of duty not exceeding that payable on the same under such proclamation when imported into Canada.

4. *Resolved*, That it is expedient to provide that if at any time any greater duty of customs should be payable in the United States of America on tea or coffee imported from Canada, than on tea or coffee imported from any other country, then the Governor in Council may impose on tea or coffee imported into Canada from the said United States an additional duty of customs equal to the duty payable in the United States on tea or coffee imported from Canada: Provided that tea or coffee imported into Canada from any country other than the said United States, but passing in bond through the United States, shall be taken and rated as a direct importation from the country wherever the tea or coffee was purchased.

5. *Resolved*, That it is expedient to provide that an allowance may be made for deterioration by natural decay or breakage upon all perishable and brittle goods imported into Canada, such as green fruits and vegetables, crockery, china, glass and glassware, provided such damage is found to exceed twenty-five per centum of the value thereof upon an examination to be made by an appraiser, or proper officer of customs at the first landing, or within three days of such landing; but such allowance shall only be for the amount of loss in excess of twenty-five per centum of the whole quantity of such goods contained or included in any one invoice; and provided the duty has been paid on the full value thereof a refund of such duty may be allowed and paid in the proportion, and on the fulfilment of the conditions above specified but not otherwise, on application to the Minister of Customs.

6. *Resolved*, That it is expedient to provide that in determining the dutiable value of merchandize, except when imported from Great Britain, there shall be added to the cost or the actual wholesale price or fair market value at the time of exportation in the principal markets of the country from whence the same has been imported into Canada, the cost of inland transportation, shipment and trans-shipment, with all the expenses included, from the place of growth, production or manufacture, whether by land or water, to the vessel in which shipment is made, either *in transitu* or direct to Canada.

7. *Resolved*, That it is expedient to provide that the Governor in Council shall from time to time establish such regulations, not inconsistent with law, as may be required to secure a just, faithful and impartial appraisal of all goods, wares and merchandise imported into Canada, and just and proper entries of the actual or fair market value thereof, and of the weight, measures, or other quantity thereof, as each case may require, and such regulations, whether general or special, so made by the Governor in Council shall have full force and

authority of law, and it shall be the duty of the appraisers of Canada and every of them, and every person who shall act as appraiser, or of the Collector of Customs, as the case may be, by all reasonable ways and means in his or their power, to ascertain, estimate and appraise the true and fair market value and wholesale price, any invoice or affidavit to the contrary notwithstanding, of the merchandise, at the time of exportation and in the principal markets of the country whence the same has been imported into Canada, and the proper weights, measures or other quantities, and the fair market value or wholesale price of every of them as the case may require.

8. *Resolved*, That it is expedient to provide that no refund of duty paid shall be allowed, because of any alleged inferiority or deficiency in quantity of goods imported and entered, and which have passed into the custody of the importer under permit of the Collector of Customs; nor because of the omission in the invoice of any trade discount, or other matter or thing, which might have the effect of reducing the value of such goods for duty, unless the same shall have been reported to the Collector of Customs within ten days of the date of entry; and the said goods shall have been examined by the said Collector or by an appraiser, or other proper officer of Customs; and the proper rate or amount of reduction certified by him after such examination; and if such collector or proper officer reports that the goods in question cannot be identified as those named in the invoice and entry in question, then and in such case no refund of the duty or any part thereof shall in any case be allowed, and all applications for refund of duty in such cases shall be submitted, with the evidence and all particulars, for the decision of the Minister of Customs, who may then order payment on finding the evidence to be sufficient and satisfactory.




of twenty *valorem* when imported into Canada, or taken out of warehouse for consumption therein.

The following articles shall be prohibited to be imported, under a penalty of two hundred dollars, together with the forfeiture of the parcel or package of goods in which the same may be found, viz. :

Books, Printed Papers, Drawings, Paintings, Prints, Photographs, or Representations of any kind of a treasonable or seditious, or of an immoral or indecent character.

Coin, base or counterfeit.

13. *Resolved*, That it is expedient to add the following to the list of goods exempt from Customs duty when imported into Canada.

The following articles being the natural products, or the manufactures of the colony of Newfoundland, viz. :

Fish, fresh, dried, salted or smoked.

All goods manufactured in Bond shall, if taken out of Bond for consumption in Canada, be subject to duties of Excise equal to the duties of Customs to which they would be subject, if imported from Great Britain, and entered for consumption in Canada; and whenever any article, not the produce of Canada, upon which a duty of Excise would be levied if produced in Canada, is taken into a Bonded Manufactory, the difference between the duty of Excise to which it would be so liable, and the Customs duty which would be levied on such article, if imported and entered for consumption, shall be paid as a duty of Excise when it is taken into the Bonded Manufactory.
