According to the annual report of Governor Ogilvie, which was made public to-day, 1197 prisoners were confined in the Hamilton jail during the year ending Sept. 30, 1911. The potent unfluence of intemperance towards this result is indicated by the fact that 1011 of the unfortunates are classified in the report as intemperate, while \$50 in the report as intemperate, while 856 are reported to have been Accarcerated for plain "drunk and disorderly" con-

Prisoners committed for the first time numbered 565; 146 made their second trip, 78 responded to the fateful third call, while 364 bordered on hopelessness, having been committed for more than three times. The feminine persuasion was represented by 108 prisoners, while 1846 "mere men" were registered as temporary residents at the jail.

By Race and Creed.

WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

A NY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 13 years old. May homestead a quarter section of avairable Dominion land in Manitoba. Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by fathermother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Dutles.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least \$0 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, in mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. 
To Do Away With Noise of Auto Whistles.

No longer will the screech of the siren whistle or the earsplitting noise that emanates from devices on automobiles and motorcycles to warn of impending danger be permitted in Sloux City, if an ordinance placed on first reading in the city council becomes effective.

In accordance with the recent state law affecting motor vehicles, Councilman R. S. Whitley and F. E. Gill, city attorney, have drawn up a new ordinance which not only embodies everything contained in the old one, but several new features, writes a Sioux City, correspondent of The Municipal Journal. They are: The use of any horn or noise-making device, except the bulb horn, is prohibited; motor vehicles shall not be run on the streets with the muffer cut out; the Speed shall not be more than one mile in four minutes or 15 miles an hour (in parathe limit is eight miles an hour shall be deemed imprudent. Motor vehicles of the fire and police departments and ambulances are exempt from the speed limit.

"As a concrete example of what the killing of reciprocity has done for Toronto, a few weeks before the election an American firm wanted to buy 50 feet of land on which to build a small factory here. Immediately after the 21st they decided to increase their purchase and they secured 138 feet, and will build a much large factory than they first planned.

"In one of our properties, one which is strictly a workingmen's proposition for two months we hardly sold a lot. The men were afraid that they would lost their jobs, be thrown out of work and that they would need all the capital they had to tide them over a period of hard times. The next day after the elections these same prospective bayers came to us, bought lats, and many of them have now homes well under way. Other real estate men could tell the same story.

C. Through the country the outlook is exceedingly bright, the west particularly. While I do not look for any immediate, advance in local real estate, the present big demand is certain to cause higher valuations. But just now prices are decidedly firm and the whole market displays great strength.
