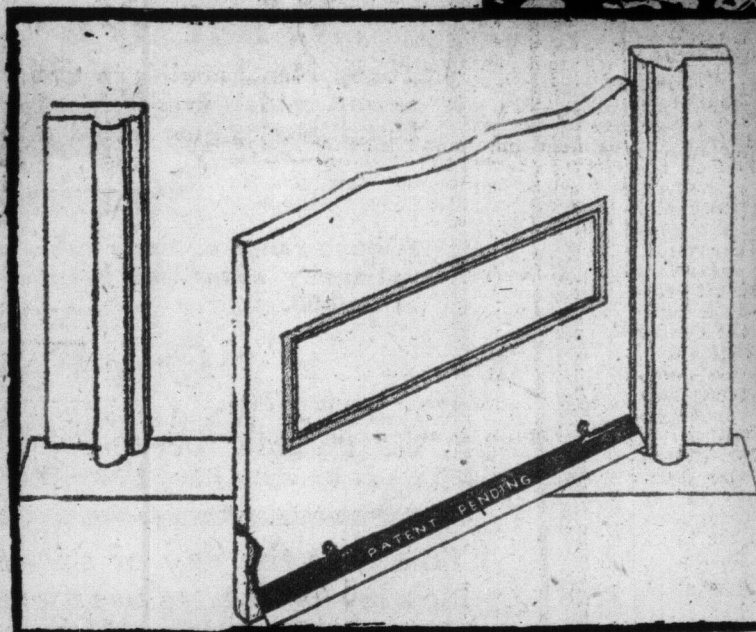
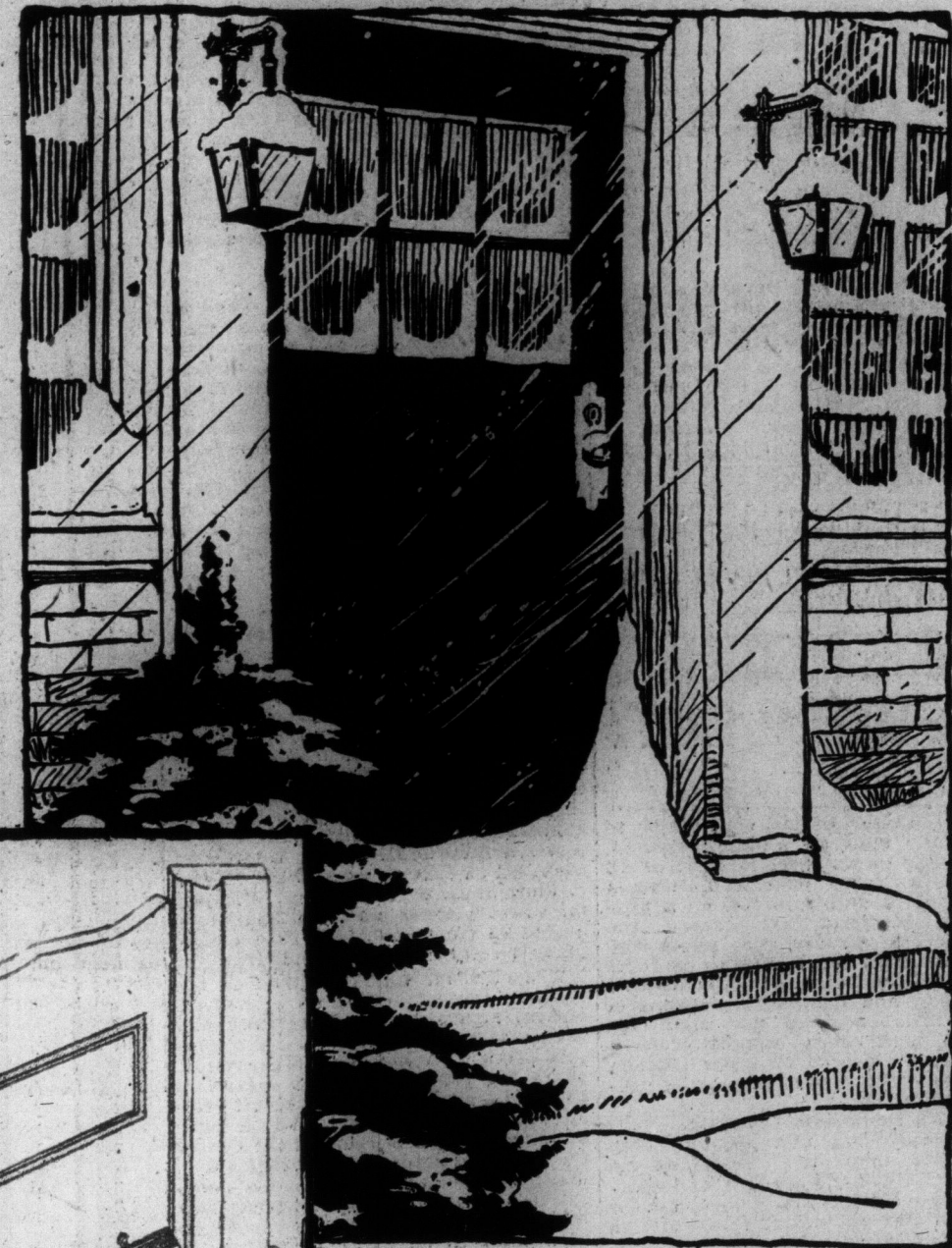

CITY HALL NOTES

For the first time in many moons, the board of control held a peaceful and business-like meeting yesterday morning.

The mayor yesterday received two letters of complaint from the Chinese consul-general. The first letter, dated from Ottawa, makes complaint that at about 11:30 p.m. of the 27th he was with a friend on York street, when he saw a city constable stop a Chinaman carrying a grip.

It was generally concluded at the city hall yesterday that the board of control acted outside the law when on Thursday they voted certain moneys to be used for the construction of the Bloor street car line.

Another complication raised by the hasty action of the board of control was that the council last Monday ordered the Bloor street financing to be taken out of some other fund, and that resolution naturally takes precedence of the later decision.

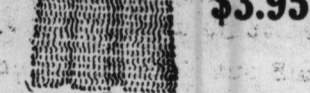

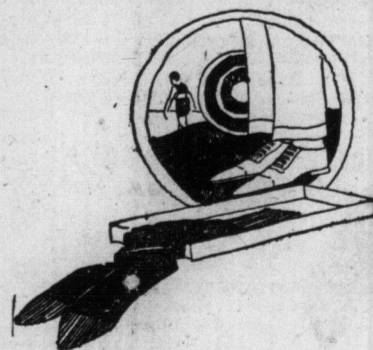

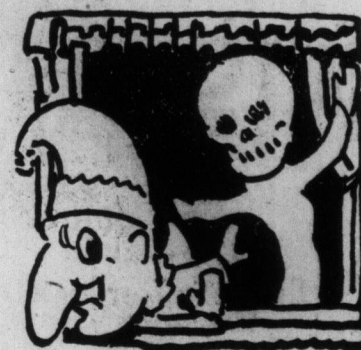
