That Bridge at Victoria Had Been Thrice Condemned.

BUILT FOR WAGGON TRAFFIC ONLY

low the Relatives of the Victims Will Sue the City For Damages Amounting in All to Over a Million of Bollers-Fifty-Three Bodies Taken From the Wreck and Teople Are Still Missing.

Victoria, B.C., May 29 .- This city is still in a dazed condition as the result of the bridge disaster. 'All day yesterday divers were at work. The car that fell from the bridge was pulled out on the bank, but it is believed there are still a number of bodies entangled in the wreckage of the bridge itself. Fifty three bodies have been taken from the wreck, and it is known that at least

three more are yet to be recovered. The bridge had on three separate occasions been pronounced unsafe, and had been condemned. It was built for wagon traffic, and its strength was only one-fourth what it would have been had it been intended for railroad use. The car that caused the accident was the heaviest on the line. Once before several months ago it had crossed the bridge when crowded, and had caused such a sagging that it was feared the bridge would fall. After that experience the car was not run until this week when it was put on to accommodate the extra traffic. It is reported that the city will be sued for one million damages by relatives of the victims.





Lord Durham, so well known in sporting circles on account of his determined efforts to purify the English turf of certain unsavory features— a crusade which led another well-known sportsman, Sir George Chetwynd, to bring an unsuccessful suit for libel against him—has just completed a transaction of a somewhat colossal character by selling his famous Wear Valey colieries to Sir James Joicey for the sum of \$7,000,000.

These colleries have hitherto formed the backbone of the earl's property, yielding him an income of \$400,000 per annum. Their output is about 12,000 tons a day, and at the port of Sunderland the coal until now has been shipped from the earl's own superb Lambton docks on to the vessels of his own Lambton feet, whose red and white black-striped funnels are known in every European port.







An ordinary Crooke's tube is coated on the interior suface with crystals of a new flourescing susbtance which Mr. Edison has devised. It is similar to tungstate of calcium.

People who have been in the Edison booth at the Electrical Show have been able to see bones of their own hands upon a screen set up before an X-ray apparatus. This peculiar screen is pasteboard coated with tungstate of calcium. Without it the shadowgraphs would not be visible.

Now, by applying a somewhat similar flourescing substance to the glass tube, the X-rays, which are naturally invisible, are changed into rays of light by passing through these crystals. Mr. Edison tells of his new discovery as follows:

"What I have succeeded in doing is this: Instead of generating X-rays and throwing them off into space, I have turned into them a pure white light of high refrangibility. It seems as if practically all the electrical energy is transformed into light. To the eye the light is pure white, resembling bright sunlight. It has none of the smoonlight effect. The spectroscope is not be given that."
