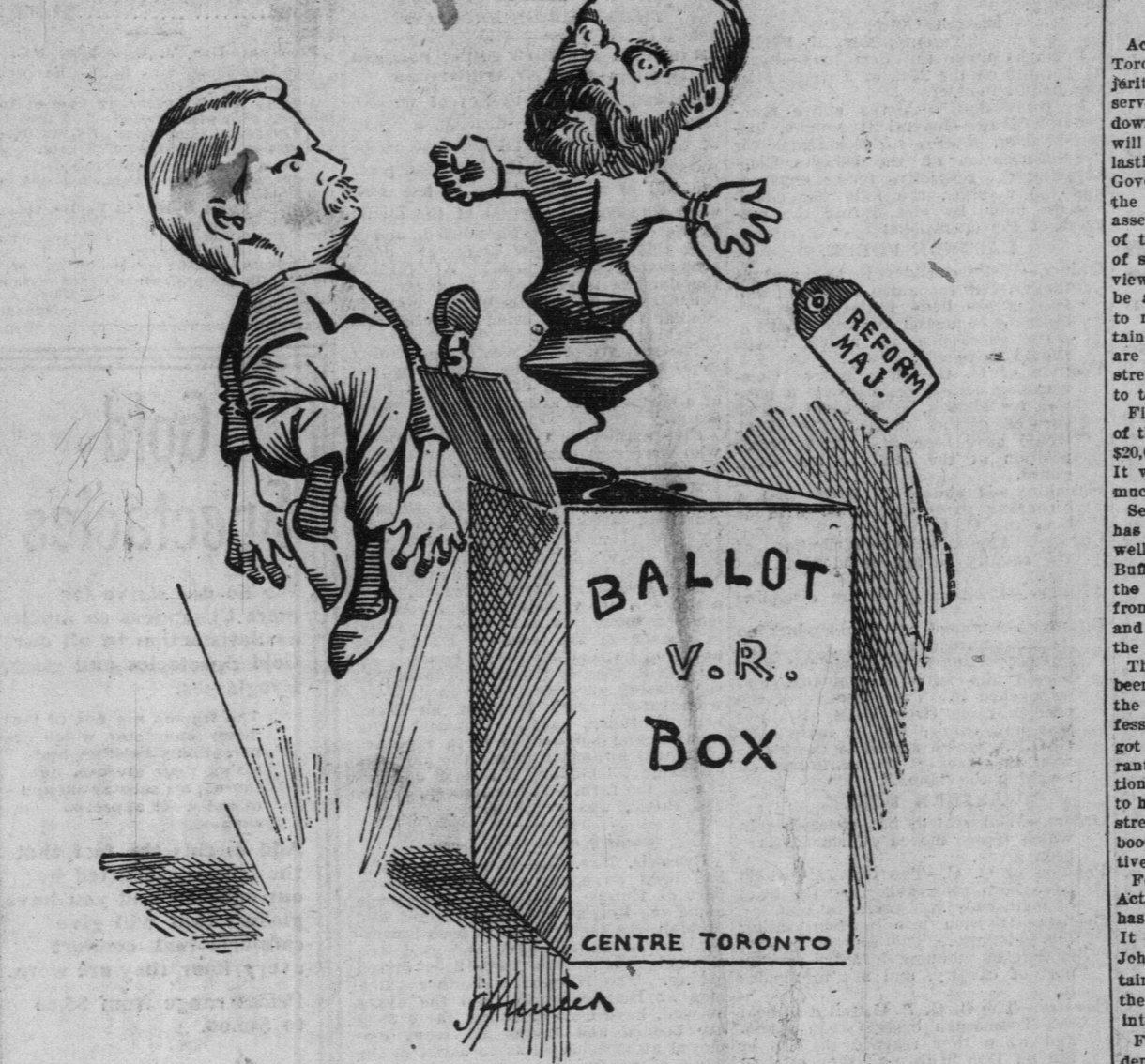

GENERAL GASCOIGNE'S REMARKS

On the Work of the Officers in Command of the Forces on Thanksgiving Day.

General Gascoigne has sent the following remarks to the officers commanding the different forces in the Thanksgiving Day manoeuvres. They would, taken throughout, indicate that the General was much pleased with the day's showing:

District Office, Toronto, Nov. 27, 1897. Remarks upon the field manoeuvres at Toronto on the 25th of November by the umpire-in-chief. In connection with the above manoeuvres, Major-General Gascoigne, umpire-in-chief, desires to promulgate for the information of the Officers Commanding the respective forces, the following observations made by him during the progress of the operations:

EASTERN FORCE. Orders.—Well considered as regards tactics, but too much in detail, and leaving too little to the initiative of the subordinate commanders; orders should state succession in which troops should move off.

Position of Officers.—The Officer Commanding named too forward a position for himself, as he could not have been in a much better position at the head of his main column.

Signalling.—It should be clear that a signalling party should be with or near the "Main" position.

Cavalry.—Approximate distribution of the cavalry should be more in detail.

Artillery.—Position good, fire discipline fair. Infantry.—Advance of Highlanders on "Tottenham" road at first very good, but supporting force should not have passed the advance company, and so masked it. The objective of the city are being charged too high a rate for their water supply.

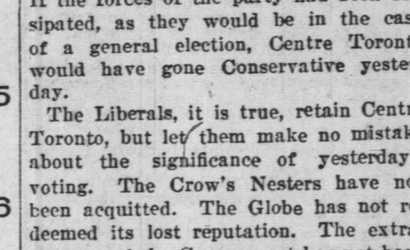
