

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

The bulk of exporters, as will be seen by the representative sales quoted, sold from \$5 to \$5.25 per cwt. Export bulls sold at lower prices, as some dealers seemingly did not want them, having received instructions not to ship them. Prices for bulls ranged from \$3.25 to \$3.80, with something choice at \$4 to \$4.10.
