

RAILWAY TRAFFIC HEAVY, Estimated 80,000 People Passed Thru

Reclaiming the Boys.



He thus beat the longest flight previously made, that by Henry Farman in July, by 9 minutes 34 1-5 seconds, and exceeded the distance covered by Wilbur Wright Friday by about one and three-quarter miles. 



Protection of Public Water Supplies and the Public Health. There is increasing difficulty in find-ing pure water supplies for our cities ing pure water supplies for our cities and towns. Wells give out and streams are becoming more polluted with sewage each year. The question of protection of the water supplies we have is becoming more important each year. The current number of Municipal En-The current number of Municipal Engineering Magazine has a paper, read before the American Public Health Association, by Dr. C. O. Probst, secretary of the Ohio State Board of Health, which offers one method of meeting the difficulties. Dr. Probst thinks that in the first place it should be the duty of the state to protect from pollution as the state to protect from pollution, as far as possible, all sources of water supplies of which use is being made. Municipalities might be given power to protect themselves, but this is a grant of power that municipalities are very slow to make use of.
