**WILSON TAKING FIRM STEPS TO COMPEL ACTION**  
He Hopes to Find Way to Arm Merchantmen Despite Obstruction.  
CAUCUS CALLED TODAY  
Responsibility for Changing Rules Placed Squarely Before the Senate.

Washington, March 5.—Further action by President Wilson in the German situation was postponed today pending a decision by his legal advisers whether he has power to arm merchantmen in spite of the failure of congress to pass a resolution conferring such authority. The question was referred to Attorney-General Gregory and Secretary of State Lansing, and probably will be decided in time for consideration at tomorrow's cabinet meeting. The inauguration ceremonies occupied most of their time today, but members of the cabinet and other officials found opportunity to discuss the subject. A determination to arm the merchantmen if a legal way to do so can be found was generally apparent. Cannot Prevent Action. The president has placed squarely before the senate the question of arming merchantmen in the special session begun today, so that filibustering by a small group of senators cannot prevent action by congress. In the meantime he is preparing to take such steps as he can to meet the crisis and defend American rights. In his inaugural address today he declared, "We stand firm in armed neutrality."

Another Senator in Lira. A Democratic caucus of the new senate has been called to meet tomorrow, and the possibility of following out the suggestion of arming merchantmen is being discussed. It is expected that the rules be changed, it is expected to be determined in the near future. Another name was added today to the list of senators who signed a manifesto in the closing hours of the session, declaring they favored the armed neutrality bill, and would have voted for it if given the opportunity. Senator Lippitt, of Rhode Island, telegraphed to Senator Weeks, asking that his name be affixed, making 76 signers.

**WAR SUMMARY**  
THE DAY'S EVENTS REVIEWED

WHILE the British on the Ancre front busied themselves yesterday with the consolidating of the ground won in the two preceding days, they also suddenly began to apply sharp and active pressure to the German lines northeast and southeast of Arras. This pressure took the form of two extensive raids on the German trenches, inflicting many casualties on the foe and bringing in 42 prisoners and one machine gun. The sections of the front thus assailed comprise the northern portion of the newly-formed Arras salient, and the sudden attention paid to this region suggests that Field Marshal Haig plans to compel the vacation of another large section of the German front as his next step in the operations.

Snow fell on the western front yesterday, according to the German official communication, and it gave the enemy some relief from the relentless British and French pressure. The campaign season will soon open and the British and French will show a great increase in their striking power. The British now fire four shells to the German one, according to recent visitors to general headquarters. On the French front the proportions are much the same, and Italy has also a great production of munitions. The Russian and Rumanian fronts still have the greatest shortage of shells and these allies still continue inferior to the German capacity for delivery. Nevertheless, the enemy could not hope to gain any sort of military decision in the east in one summer's campaign. He has despatched his division from the Rumanian to the western front in order to bring his western strength up to 133 weak divisions, or two million men. The allies have more than double that number of troops in the west.

Since nearly a week ago the daily sinkings of merchantmen by submarines have dwindled to a comparatively low figure, as contrasted with the sinkings early in February. London, March 5.—The official report from British headquarters in France tonight reads: "This morning the enemy attacked the position east of Bouchavesnes gained by us yesterday, but was repulsed with loss, leaving some prisoners in our hands." "East of Gommecourt we have improved and strengthened the positions gained by us yesterday. Two of our successful raids to the southeast and northeast of Arras respectively. Many casualties were inflicted on the enemy; forty-two prisoners and one machine gun were captured. We also entered trenches to the southeast of Ghinchy and took prisoners. In every case our casualties were light." "East of Ypres the enemy exploded a mine. No damage was done to our trenches." "Yesterday there was considerable activity in the air; many bombs took place. In the course of the day six hostile machines were brought down, two falling in our lines. Eight were driven down damaged. Two of our machines were brought down, and five are missing. Useful artillery reconnaissance work was carried out, and many places of military importance were attacked with bombs."

### BRITISH SPREAD OUT LINES FAR BELOW SOMME

French Hand Over Large Section of Front to Haig's Forces. OCCUPY FINE RUINS

New Armies Find Country Not So Devastated as on Ancre.

FROM A STAFF CORRESPONDENT OF THE ASSOCIATED PRESS.

British Headquarters in France, via London, March 5.—The characteristic laconic reference in an official communication regarding enemy artillery activity south of the Somme has been the British method of publicly announcing the fact that they had taken over still more of the western line and that the meeting point of the British and French troops had now been established well below that small but famous river. As a matter of fact, the Somme is a most disappointing stream to have had such a large share in the world's history. It wanders almost lazily from pool to pool in the flat lowlands, occasionally deflected by a dam, turning hundreds of mill wheels and then slips idly along into the sea. The new territory defended by the British troops just north of the river, however, is extremely interesting. It is deeply shell scarred, but there is not the same chaos of ruins around Pozières, Beaumont-Hamel, Mametz and other villages which have been absolutely obliterated by the war. Such places as Flaucourt, Domplere, Asselvers and Estrees, behind the new section of the British line, still show evidence of having once been habitations. Some large farm buildings and factories form most picturesque ruins.



COUNCIL ACCEPTS JAIL COMPROMISE

New Arrangement Will Save Only Eight Thousand on Total Annual Cost.

PENSIONS GANTED

Aldermen Declare City is Forced to Reward Government's Political Friends.

Council yesterday accepted the Ontario Government's compromise on the closing of the old jail, but not without protest. The final vote was 7 to 7, but every member who spoke in support of the agreement expressed the opinion that a big saving was being made over the city's head, and that in agreeing Toronto was simply making the best of a bad business.

BEAVER WITHDRAWS OFFER OF STOCK

Injunction Granted to Restrain Holding of Timiskaming Meeting.

LIVELY DISCUSSION Pres. Culver Makes Stinging Remarks re Circulars Sent Out.

One of the most acrimonious and widely discussed controversies in connection with the mining business reached its climax yesterday, when President Frank L. Culver, of the Timiskaming Mining Company, stated to an informal gathering of the Timiskaming shareholders, that the offer made by the Beaver Mining Company, of a large block of Kirkland Lake stock, which was announced by the latter company, was withdrawn.

Notice had previously been given to the shareholders of the Timiskaming company of a special meeting to be held yesterday, for the purpose of considering the purchase of 616,257 shares of the Kirkland Lake stock from the Beaver Mining Company, and in accordance with the notice, all arrangements were made for the holding of the meeting. After a delay of over an hour, it was announced that the injunction had been granted by Mr. Justice Latchford, to restrain the shareholders from holding the meeting. The injunction was sought by Max Macgillivray, of New York, who claimed to be the largest individual shareholder in the company.

Pursuant to the court order, Mr. Culver informed the shareholders that no formal meeting could be held, but that an informal discussion of the situation might take place. The shareholders gathered in the afternoon, and this was attended to unanimously. In a frank statement of his position to the shareholders, regarding the Kirkland Lake deal, Mr. Culver declared that never in his business career had he experienced such a situation where the shareholders of a company could be prevented from discussing the affairs of their company, when regular notice had been given.

He expressed sorrow over the fact that so many holders of the Timiskaming stock had been stirred up by certain brokerage houses, who circulated "false and vilifying" literature. He had had to grossly misrepresent in circulars sent out, and administered a stinging rebuke to the authors. In discussing the position of the Timiskaming shareholders, he laid stress on the fact that unless the new vein, No. 117, upon which a winze was being sunk, developed into good silver, the Beaver Mining Company would have found anything new in over a year.

The life of a mine, he said, was on an average about seven and one-half years, and that Timiskaming had been going now for ten. He solemnly warned the meeting that if Timiskaming expected to continue in business for any length of time, they would have to acquire another property. The holdings of the company, including the Kover Dome, Green, Best Jacket, had been thoroughly prospected, and to date nothing had been found.

The Kirkland Lake mine had appealed to the directors as a fine opportunity for the Timiskaming, and the matter had been placed before the shareholders for their approval. The Beaver company, he said, at the present time owned upwards of 775,000 shares of Kirkland Lake stock; the Beaver directors had recently bought 4,000 shares at 90 cents per share, and the bulk of the remaining shares, some 616,000, had been offered to the Timiskaming company at a price which exceeded 50 cents per share. In answer to a query, Mr. Culver stated that the Kirkland Lake stock held by the Beaver company had been purchased on a sliding scale upwards, from 8-1-3 cents per share to 40.

After outlining the deal in all its various aspects as presented by the Beaver company, Mr. Culver stated that, in his opinion, the mining business had received an almost irrevocable setback by reason of the Beaver deal. Long has been published, particularly in the United States, where the unfounded charges of criminality which had been made against the Timiskaming directors, had, to a very great extent, destroyed confidence in Canadian mining companies. In proof of which, he produced and read several communications from American shareholders, who stated that they were withdrawing from Canadian mining entirely.

Mr. A. McCausland, the local mining broker, strongly upheld Mr. Culver. He stated that, as a member of the Standard Stock Exchange, he was going to protest against the issuing of such literature, as had been sent out by certain of its members, and that he would recommend that they be severely rebuked. Discussion of the deal in question has been the sole topic in mining circles for the past week and a half. The chief objections raised against the purchase by the Timiskaming of the Kirkland Lake stock was on the ground that the Timiskaming would be buying into a minority holding, the Beaver being the largest holder of the stock. Serious allegations were also made as to the integrity of the directors of the Timiskaming company, because of the fact that the directorate of both companies was identical.

Representatives of the various factions, who were present at the meeting, indulged in some lively repartee, which combined to make one of the hottest meetings held in years. STOCK MARKET KEEPS UP MAKING ADVANCES U. S. Steel Contributes Twenty Per Cent. to Business of Day.

New York, March 5.—Except for the half hour when lower prices indicated disappointment at the failure of congress to adopt the administration measure, especially the armistice neutrality bill, today's market continued upward. U. S. Steel, which contributed no less than 20 per cent. to the day's business, registered an extreme gain of 2 1/2 points to 110 1/2. Bethlehem Steel issued made further recovery from last week's setback, the old shares rising 1/4 to 140, with 5/8 for the new issue at 116 1/2, and 6 1/4 for the subscription rights at 15 1/2.

Advances in these stocks were accompanied by circumstantial rumors that large orders are about to be placed by the home government. Metals led the


