

PLANS FOR A FRENCH CONGRESS ARE OUTLINED

Educational Convention of French Canadians of Ontario In Ottawa

Home for Shantymen, Temperance and Teaching of Dual Languages are Some of the Big Subjects Which Will Be Taken up

Ottawa, Jan. 5—Plans are rapidly maturing for the education congress of the French Canadians of Ontario, which is to be held in Ottawa on January 18, 19, 20.

The object of this gathering of the French citizens of the province is to discuss ways and means for the betterment of the condition of all classes of Frenchmen in Ontario and the advancing of the interests of the French-speaking people, not only as individuals but as a people Educational work in almost every branch is to be taken up and in addition plans will be discussed for the bringing into existence of institutions which will work directly for the benefit of the Ottawa, Jan. 5-Plans are rapidly mat

work directly for the benefit of the

Amongst these institutions one which will directly interest Ottawa, and which it is proposed to have discussed by the congress is a French-Canadian home for French-speaking shantymen. Here it is proposed to have a place to which the lumbermen, fresh from the woods, may go and get at reasonable prices food and lodgings and be free from those templations which in the past have so often, in a few hours, parted the lumber-jack from his winter's wages.

It is expected that this congress will also deal with the importation of liquor into lumber camps and with a view te stepping the sale of liquor in this way to the lumber-jack at his work, it is expected that the congress will set in motion a petition to be sent to the Ontario government asking that the introduction and sale of liquor in the lumber camp be set on the same footing as the sale of liquor in a railway construction camp.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3,00 per acre. Duties—Mast reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead point of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead abent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.


