THE CHURCHWARDENS' REPORT,

EASTER, 1886.

In presenting their Report for the past year, the Church-wardens have again to congratulate the Vestry on the satisfactory condition of the finances of the Church, the Offertory showing a large increase over that of the preceding year; and the number of persons attending the Church has also increased. The receipts, including balance brought forward from last Easter, amount in all to the large sum of \$9,514.23. Of this sum \$1,120.83 was received through the envelope system, \$2,416.69 through the general offertory, and \$586.75 through the Clergy Fund; the balance, \$5,199.52, being contributed for special objects. The Mission Fund is considerably more than last year, owing to the parochial collection for 1885 not having been received by the Churchwardens in time for insertion in their last statement.

The average weekly offertory for the past year amounts to \$62.27, showing an increase of \$1.81 per Sunday over that of the former year.

The special collections on behalf of the new Sunday School Fund, including the balance brought forward from last Easter, amounts to \$3,037.15, but of this sum the Rector (Rev. John Pearson) has been repaid the \$1,000 advanced by him to secure the land, and the fee simple of the property is now vested in the Lord Bishop of Toronto.

The Churchwardens feel it their duty to state, that the \$1,000 was advanced by the Rector over a year since, and on handing him back the amount he declined to accept any interest whatever.

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A Report from the Sunday School Building Committee will be presented, by which it will be seen that the Committee have had plans prepared, and advertized for tenders. They also have to propose a plan for the creation of a Sunday School Building Fund, so that the debt to be incurred in the erection of such School House can be gradually liquidated.

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The Churchwardens have much pleasure in stating that they have been able to execute a portion of the necessary repairs to the Chapel and Parsonage, to which attention was called in their last report—they trust their successors in office will be able to complete the balance of repairs so as to place both the Parsonage and Chapel in a proper state of efficiency; a large portion of the roof of the Chapel will require complete repair and the Chapel itself to be painted and cleaned.

In order to meet the additional expenses for the coming year the Churchwardens would earnestly ask the Congregation to be liberal in their contributions, and that the Envelope Committee use every exertion to increase the number of subscribers.

In accordance with a resolution passed at a former meeting, the Churchwardens had the resolution of condolence to the family of the late Rector, the Rev. W. S. Darling, engrossed and forwarded to Mr. F. Darling.

In conclusion, the Churchwardens beg to offer to the many ladies and gentlemen of the congregation who have sustained them in all their undertakings during the past year, their grateful and hearty thanks.

New School House.

The School House Committee have great satisfaction in reporting that towards the end of last summer an active canvass was made by several ladies of the congregation, and that a sufficient sum was obtained to pay for the land which had been previously secured for a School lot. The land has been conveyed to the Bishop of the Diocese in trust for the purpose intended.

The Committee have obtained plans for the building, and recommend that an effort be made to collect from the congregation for the purpose of erecting the same; and that a similar effort be made annually until the debt incurred is liquidated. They also advise, that when the plans have been finally determined upon, the same be submitted to a special vestry meeting called for that purpose.

Magazine.

A Magazine, called "Church Work," price 30 cents per annum, is largely circulated. Subscriptions received at the Parsonage.

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Girls' friendly Society.

The branch of this Society in this Parish was organized in the summer of 1883, and now numbers 40 members, exclusive of associates. The meetings are held every Monday evening at 7.30 in the School Room. Mrs. Sullivan is the President, and Mrs. G. S. Holmested the Secretary-Treasurer. Other ladies in the congregation are associates.

Those not actively connected with this association, might, nevertheless, materially assist its operations by donations of material for work, *i. e.*, factory cotton, print or small pieces suitable for patch-work, etc.

Alms for the Loor.

The offerings at the early Communion, together with some additional sums placed in the general offertory for the purpose, amounting in all to \$220.85, have been devoted to the relief of the poor.

District Visitors.

There are several ladies who have kindly undertaken this work during the past year; but there are still some streets for which the Clergy would be glad to find visitors. During the past year the inhabitants of seven of the streets west of Yonge Street have been personally invited by the Clergy to attend the Church, and cards containing a list of the services have been left at their houses.

The Dorcas Society.

This society met during the months of October, November and December, and the money collected was laid out in flannel, cotton, and shoes. The flannel and cotton were made up into articles of clothing by the members of the Society, and distributed among the poor of the Parish, on the recommendation of the District Visitors and others.

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The Mothers' Meeting.

This is a branch of the Dorcas Society, formed for the purpose of enabling those of the congregation and parish who may desire it, to help themselves and their families with clothing. The meetings have been conducted by Mrs. Pearson every alternate Thursday night.

The Church Women's Guild.

The Church Women's Guild has met every Thursday afternoon during the past year. The proceeds of their work, amounting to \$20.00, was handed to the Churchwardens towards the School House Lot. They also made a number of cassocks and surplices for the Choir.

The Guild meets every Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock, in the School Room. Any ladies of the congregation having time at their disposal will be gladly welcomed as members of the Society. The President, Mrs. Pearson, will be pleased to receive orders for plain sewing to be done by the members. The proceeds of the coming year will be devoted to the New Sunday School Fund.

Sewing School.

A Sewing School, in which plain needlework is taught, and which is attended by about 40 little girls, is conducted every Saturday morning by Miss M. Ince, Miss Pearson, Miss Wragge, and Miss Sullivan.

The Librarian's Report stated that the Library had been placed in thoroughly good condition by the addition of 196 new volumes, the rebinding of 45 volumes, and printing of a new catalogue. Much care has been taken, as on former occasions, in the selection of the new books, so as to ensure their being not only of an interesting and instructive character, but also, as far as possible, suitable for a Church of England Sunday School.

The Treasurer's Report showed receipts from all sources. (including balance in hand from the previous year) of \$347.84, and an expenditure (including the sum of \$60 remitted to the Indian Homes at Sault Ste. Marie) of \$295.03, leaving a balance in hand of \$52.31, out of which the remaining debt incurred for the additions and improvements to the Library was liquidated.

Hearty acknowledgements, as in former years, are due to the congregation for their liberal donations in money and provisions for the Summer Excursion and Christmas Treat. These were successfully carried out during the past year. The Officers, Teachers and Scholars are eagerly and hopefully looking forward to the erection and completion of the new School House, and bespeak the generous aid of all the members of the congregation in bringing this important work to a speedy conclusion.

Young Leople's Association.

It is gratifying to state that the Association has been enabled to complete its programme for the season in a most satisfactory manner. A course of Lectures and open Concerts were arranged for the season, all of which have been fully carried out. Lectures were delivered by the President, Mr. Alan Macdougall, C. E., W. Batington, Esq., of the School of Practical Science, John Hague Esq., F. S. S., the Rev. John Pearson, Dr. Natters, and Mr. Holmestead, to all of whom the thanks of the Association are due.

The Bishop of Toronto heartily consented to be our Patron again in a most kindly letter. On account of Mr. Blackburn's numerous engagements he was unable to fulfil the duties of musical director; his place being taken by Miss O'Reilly, to whom the Association is much indebted for the most satisfactory fulfilment of an ardous position. An Association of the same nature has been formed in connection with St. George's Church, Guelph, who hearing of the success of our own, have been in correspondence with us on several occasions on matters of detail and business, which we think may be accepted with gratification as a proof of our well-being.

The number of active members for the past season is 58, a decrease of 19 from last year; this we think is attributable to insufficient accommodation; and feel certain that the sooner the new School House is built the better, as greater interest will be taken, both by the Congregation and the Members of the Association, in the welfare of a most important branch of the worshippers in Holy Trinity.

It is to be regretted that so few (in comparison with the size of the congregation) of the young men are on the roll

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of the Association, as it must be remembered that the principal object of this Society is the advancement of the general interests of the Church in which they worship. Nevetheless, the Association is quite satisfied with its success, and feel that with the hearty co-operation of the congregation its past, and we will venture to say, future endeavors, will not have been in vain. The annual meeting for the election of officers, and arrangements for lectures, etc., will be held as usual in October next.
