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MINUTES
OF THE
TORONTO CONFERENCE,

Held in the City of Toronto, Ont.,

JUNE 14th to 22nd, 1882.

THE NINTH SESSION of the TORONTO CONFERENCE was opened in the Elm Street Methodist Church, Toronto, on Wednesday, the 14th day of June, 1882, at 9 a.m. The President, the Rev. JOHN G. LAIRD, occupied the chair. After the Secretary, Rev. SAMUEL J. HUNTER, had read the 2nd Chapter of the 2nd Epistle of Paul to Timothy, the 753rd hymn was sung, and the Revs. E. CLEMENT, and N. R. WILLOUGHBY, M.A., led in prayer.

The SECRETARY called the Conference Roll, and 174 brethren answered to their names.

The Conference immediately proceeded to the election of a President, whereupon the Rev. ALEXANDER SUTHERLAND, D.D., was elected.

The Rev. WILLIAM H. LAIRD was elected Secretary.

The President, in felicitous terms, acknowledged the honour conferred upon him.

The Secretary in suitable words thanked the Conference.

On nomination of the SECRETARY, the Revs. HENRY S. MATTHEWS, and J. A. CHAPMAN, M.A., were appointed Assistant Secretaries, and the Rev. JOHN S. CLARKE, Journal Secretary, and Rev. WILLIAM H. ELMSLEY, Assistant Journal Secretary.

The Conference prayer-meeting was held from 12 to 1 o'clock, and was a season of great spiritual power and profit.

On motion it was resolved to re-affirm the resolution of 1876 to elect by ballot a Committee of five to nominate the several Conference Committees not otherwise provided for, and the following brethren were elected:—Revs. JOHN SHAW, Dr. HUNTER, Dr. DEWART, J. LEAROYD, and J. G. LAIRD.

Votes of thanks were passed to the retiring President, Secretary, and Journal Secretary, for valuable services rendered last year, and suitable replies were made by the honoured brethren concerned. (*See "Special Resolutions."*)

The following telegram was received from the London Conference:—"Greetings to the Toronto Conference from their brethren of the London Conference, in the language of Hymn 751, 2nd Verse:—"

"Joined in one Spirit to our Head,
Where He appoints we go;
And still in Jesus' footsteps tread,
And show His praise below."

QUESTION—Who have died since last Conference?

EGERTON RYERSON, D.D., LL.D.

This distinguished minister, who closed his earthly career in the City of Toronto, on the 19th of February, 1882, was called in the providence of God to perform so conspicuous and important a part in the history of his country and his Church, that a faithful record of his life would be little less than a history of Canada and of Canadian Methodism during the last fifty years. It is not easy, therefore, to condense even the most meagre outline of the multifarious and many-sided activities of such an exceptionally busy life, into a paper sufficiently brief to be entered upon the Journal of the Conference, and preserved among the official records of the Church. Egerton Ryerson was the fourth son of Col. Joseph Ryerson, a member of that devoted and heroic band of Loyalists to whom the subject of this sketch has paid such a noble tribute in his recently published work ; and from him, doubtless, he inherited that indomitable courage, and that chivalrous devotion to the Crown and Constitution of Great Britain, which were such conspicuous traits in his character during the whole of his life. But to his godly mother, for whose memory he cherished the most affectionate and reverential regard to the close of his life, he appears to have been chiefly indebted for those intellectual and moral qualities for which he was equally distinguished. To her pious counsels, accompanied with her prayers and tears, he ever regarded himself as principally indebted for "any studious habits, mental energy, or even capacity or decision of character," that he possessed.

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He was born on the 24th of March, 1803, in the Township of Charlotteville, near the Village of Vittoria, in what was then called the London District, now the County of Norfolk. His early inclinations pointed to the legal profession, and it was with a view to this that he early entered upon that course of intellectual training which was the means of preparing him for acting his part so well in after years in an altogether different sphere. The exact date of his conversion is not known. His first religious impression, however, appears to have been received when he was a child under six years of age, when, having been guilty of some infantile act of wrong-doing, his mother took him into her bedroom, told him how bad and wicked his conduct had been and what pain it had given her, and then knelt down and clasped him to her bosom, and prayed for him, while her tears which fell upon his head seemed to penetrate to his heart. In 1815, when he was a boy of twelve years of age, through the influence of his elder brothers, George, William, and John, who had become deeply religious, his convictions took a more definite form; and after lengthened fastings, watchings, and prayer, in the exercise of simple trust in Christ, and while looking to Him for a present salvation, he entered into the peaceful and joyous consciousness of acceptance with God. From this time he appears to have been practically a Methodist, being permitted to enjoy all the privileges of the Church, though for prudential reasons, he did not formally connect himself with it until six years afterward.

From the time of his conversion he appears to have experienced a great intellectual quickening; he became a

diligent student, and new quickness and strength seemed, as he tells us, to have been imparted to his understanding and memory. His heroic struggle and almost super-human exertions in the pursuit of knowledge, in the face of the most formidable difficulties, furnished material for one of the most interesting chapters in the history of his eventful life; and the habits of study, and of severe and protracted mental application, formed in these early years, appear to have remained with him during the whole of his after life. He does not appear to have ever been a local preacher, or even an exhorter, and beyond the opportunities afforded by the social means of grace of the Methodist Church, he had not any facilities afforded him for exercising his gifts as a public speaker, until he was called out by the late Rev. Thomas Madden, Presiding Elder, to fill a vacancy occasioned by the illness of his brother William, on what was then called the Niagara Circuit.

He commenced his ministry in this way in 1825, and two years afterwards, in 1827, he was received into full connection and ordained a deacon by Bishop Hedding. But even before this latter event took place, while he was yet a probationer for the ministry, he assumed another rôle in which he was destined to distinguish himself, and to render invaluable service to his country and his Church. It was in 1826, when he was but twenty-three years of age, that he appeared upon the scene as the champion of Methodist ministers, who had been bitterly attacked in a sermon preached by the Rev. Dr. Strachan, afterwards Anglican Bishop of Toronto, on the occasion of the death of Bishop Mountain,—a sermon which has become historical on ac-

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count of the controversy to which it gave rise. The effect which was produced upon the minds of his brethren by the appearance of Mr. Ryerson's vigorous reply to this defamatory effusion may be inferred from the following sentences from the pen of the late Dr. Green. He says: "Mr. Metcalf and myself were together when we received the paper; and we went out into the field in the rear of the parsonage, sat down by the fence, and read the review. As we read we wept and speculated about the unknown author. Again we read and wept, and then kneeled down upon the grass and prayed and thanked God for the able and timely defence of truth against the falsehoods that were then being circulated among the people. Little did we then think that the reviewer was a youth who had been received on trial with myself at the previous Conference." The consternation which this production created in a different quarter may be inferred from the exclamation of Mr. Ryerson's father, when he learned who was its author: "My God!" said he, "we are all ruined!"

The promise contained in this auspicious commencement of his career as a public writer and controversialist, was amply fulfilled in after years. Having once put on the harness he was not soon permitted to put it off again. The times were evil; matters, both ecclesiastical and political, were in a comparatively crude and chaotic state; and not a few grave and difficult questions had to be settled before either the Church or the State could be established on a satisfactory foundation. And, owing to the prevalence of old-world notions, respecting the relation of Church and State, questions affecting these, respectively, were so in-

volved and entangled with one another that they could not be easily separated ; they could only, therefore, be treated effectually by one who combined in himself in some good degree the qualities of both the ecclesiastic and the statesman. Egerton Ryerson was found equal to the occasion. And it is not, perhaps, too much to say, that he contributed more largely to the laying the foundation of that large measure of civil and religious liberty, which is happily enjoyed by the people of this country, than any man of his generation.

The period during which he did regular pastoral work was comparatively short—about ten years in all ; but during that time he had ample opportunity to acquaint himself with every department of our work by actual observation and experience. He appears to have spent four years on large country circuits, such as Niagara, Yonge Street and York, Cobourg, and Ancaster—all of them of considerable extent in those days ; he spent one year on the Credit Indian Mission : and five years in city appointments—three in Kingston and two in Toronto. In all these fields he appears to have laboured with zealous efficiency ; but it soon became apparent to his brethren that there were other spheres of activity in which he could render even more valuable service to the Church than in ordinary circuit work. As early as 1829, in the fifth year of his ministry, he was appointed Associate Editor of the *Christian Guardian*, and the following year he became Editor-in-Chief, an office which he appears to have filled (though not continuously) for eight years. He visited England by appointment of his Conference four times, being delegate to the English Wesleyan

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Conference in 1832, 1836, 1839, and 1840, being on each of these several occasions entrusted with the management of matters of great delicacy and importance in which the interests of his Church were involved. His first visit was in the interest of the Unification of Methodism in Canada, its object being to negotiate a union with the Wesleyan Church in Great Britain; his second visit was in the interest of higher education in this country, the fruit of it being the obtainment of a Royal Charter for the Upper Canada Academy, which has since developed into our noble Victoria University, and the collection of a considerable sum of money designed to form the nucleus of an endowment; and the object of both his third and fourth visits was to adjust matters in dispute between the Church here and the parent body in England. He appears to have represented his Conference as delegate to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States five times, his first appointment to this mission being in 1835, and the last in 1866.

In 1841, Mr. Ryerson received the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity from the Wesleyan University, Middletown, Connecticut; and the same year the Upper Canada Academy having been invested by Act of Parliament with university powers, under the name and style of the University of Victoria College, he became its first Principal. This office he filled until 1844, when, by the advice of his brethren and the permission of his Conference, he accepted a Government appointment to the office of Chief Superintendent of Education for Upper Canada—an office which he held for thirty-two years, and in which, as a founder of a

system of public elementary instruction, which, it is believed, has few equals, and no superiors, in the world, he has won world-wide recognition as one of the foremost educationists of the age, and reared for himself a monument more enduring than marble or brass.

The last of the honours bestowed upon him, and that which, it is believed, he regarded as the greatest of his life, was his election to the presidency of the first General Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada in 1874; and his able and efficient discharge of the duties of that high office during the quadrennium closing in 1878, formed a fitting close to the more than half a century of important service which, in the Providence of God, he was permitted to render to Methodism in this country. Of the period intervening between the close of his duties as the chief officer of his Church, and the end of his earthly career, it is not necessary to speak particularly. It was characterized by waning strength and growing infirmity; but though the outward man was perishing, the inward man was renewed day by day. He was blessedly sustained by the abiding sense of the divine presence and favour, and the hope of a blessed immortality. There was a tenderness and sweetness in his spirit which indicated his ripeness for heaven, and made it a special privilege, as many of his brethren can testify, to visit his sick room when he had become a prisoner, being no longer able to go abroad. When death came it found him ready, and waiting to depart. His end was peaceful and triumphant.

Though Dr. Ryerson was a man of positive views, and devotedly attached to his own Church, he was distinguished

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for his comprehensive charity, and his genuine appreciation of great and good men from whom he differed widely in opinion; and it is remarkable that some of the most touching tributes which have been paid to his memory, since his decease, have been by persons outside of his own denomination; and even men who, for political reasons, had been in life-long antagonism to him, have not been wanting, since the grave has closed upon him, in their expressions of respectful appreciation. His goodness, no less than his greatness, will serve to keep his memory fresh among his brethren, and the recollection of his virtues will, it is hoped, be to many a powerful incentive to a fuller consecration to the service of God.

THE REV. LACHLIN TAYLOR, D.D.,

Was born in the parish of Killean, Argyleshire, Scotland, on the 18th June, 1815. His early life was spent under the influences of a Christian home, and in the parish school, of which his father was master. At eleven years of age he was sent to a classical school at Glasgow, and five years later came, with his father's family, to Canada. While father and son were engaged in teaching, near St. Andrew's, Que., the entire family, under the ministry of the Rev. John Black, and subsequently of the Revs. Asahal Hurlburt and Stephen Brownell, were drawn into association with the Methodist Church; and in the year 1835, in a wonderful revival which nearly doubled the membership of the old Ottawa Circuit, the young people were made partakers of saving grace. In 1839, after the usual apprenticeship of

exhorter and local preacher, Lachlin Taylor was placed by the Chairman of the District, the Rev. Richard Jones, upon the Buckingham Mission, and at the following Conference he was received on trial, and in 1843 was received into full connection and ordained. For eleven years he held his place in the itinerant ranks, taking, according to the custom of the time, a new station each year. The state of his health necessitating rest, he took a supernumerary relation, and in 1850-51 visited Europe. On his return he entered the service of the Upper Canada Bible Society as General Agent. Henceforward he became the servant of all the Churches, and was known and esteemed by Christian people of every name, and in almost every town and village of Ontario. After seven years of effective service, during which the income and influence of the Society were more than quadrupled, a second and third visit were paid to Europe, and his travels extended to the Holy Land, Egypt, Asia Minor, Greece, and Italy. On his return home, by lectures delivered in the principal places of the country, he awakened a wide interest in the lands and scenes of Biblical and classical history. In 1863 he accepted from the British and Foreign Bible Society the task of establishing a branch of its great work in British Columbia. Shortly after his return home, the Methodist Church once more laid claim to his services, by appointing him Secretary-Treasurer of the Missionary Society. This was a work for which the labours of the preceding fourteen years had given peculiar fitness. Visiting the great centres of population and religious life, to increase there the interest in Missionary work, and with not less frequency the remoter districts, to see for himself

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the toils and successes of the Missionaries in the field, he traversed once more all parts of Canada, from Gaspé to the Rocky Mountains, encouraging the toilers at the outposts, and stimulating the whole Church to Missionary zeal. When he entered upon this work the income of the Society from Canadian sources was \$53,248. When, at the end of ten years, he resigned the office, the Society was independent of foreign aid, and its income was \$117,940.

The last three years of his active life were spent in the service of the Canadian Government, in promoting the settlement of our great North-West by emigrants from Great Britain. While engaged in this work an accident in the City of London laid the foundation of disease of the heart, by which his vigorous constitution was rapidly undermined. Returning home at the beginning of 1878, he suffered patiently for three years and a half, what to him was the severest of all—inability to work. To the last he was full of hope that life had still in store for him years of usefulness. Whenever a little recovered strength made it possible, he was ready as of old, in the pulpit or on the platform, to respond to the calls of his brethren to come to their aid. But failing sight and strength made him more and more God's prisoner. In the summer of 1881, after a cheerful visit to many of his friends, he went to the old resort in Prince Edward Island to seek more strength. An effort to preach and lecture in Charlottetown, proved too great for his feeble body, and after a short illness he died on Sabbath morning, September 4th, 1881.

His Celtic fire, brilliant imagination, and sonorous voice, gave him a prominent place for forty years among Cana-

dian pulpit and platform orators. In his Christian character he combined the deep earnestness and severe ethics of Presbyterianism, with the full assurance and warmth of Methodism. With true Scottish reserve, his inner Christian life was not often opened to the views of even intimate friends. But he was a man of prayer more than many, and his faith in God never seemed shadowed for a moment by death. He lived in a land of strong assurance, and when his physician announced to him that the end was at hand, he said simply, "It is all right;" and in the final paroxysms of extreme pain, before consciousness failed, his last words were: "Paradise! Paradise! that's the place for me!"

REV. JAMES SEYMOUR.

James Seymour was born in the county of Antrim, near Randalstown, Ireland, in the year 1798, just a few months after the famous rebellion of that year had collapsed. The Methodist itinerants regularly visited Randalstown, and their lively singing, fervid prayers, and pointed preaching, made a powerful impression on his heart, while still a child. The result was that while still a youth, he was soundly converted, joined the Methodists, and preserved towards the church of his choice, the most intense and unwavering affection till his dying hour.

While still a mere boy, he was constrained to go out into his own neighbourhood visiting the sick, reproofing sin, and attempting to preach, in which labour God so abundantly blessed him, that soon a large class was formed, which he

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duly handed over to the travelling preachers, he himself being appointed by them as leader and local preacher. Among others, several of the members of his own family were converted, two of whom became, afterwards, devoted and useful ministers.

The English Wesleyans, about this time, determined to open a number of Mission day-schools in Ireland. He was one of the very first teachers appointed, and for seven years he laboured hard at different places in this work. A revival of religion broke out in one of the schools where he was teaching, which resulted in some forty or fifty boys being converted, one of whom is now living in this country, an honoured member of the Methodist Church of Canada, whose delight it was a few years ago, to meet his dear old teacher and spiritual father, and show him a great pile of class books containing many hundreds of names of members of the Church that had been under his care as a class-leader during the many years he held that important office. That same gentleman has had for many years, a son in our ministry, a highly respected member of the London Conference.

In the year 1825, he was united in marriage to Miss Eliza Milliken, of Maherafelt, a union that proved to be one of the happiest character. In the year 1830, the way opened (as he always believed Providentially) into the ministry of the New Connexion Church. For twenty-eight years he laboured indefatigably, in different parts of Ireland, for a good part of the time in rough, dangerous, and extremely trying missions, among the Roman Catholics of the South and West of Ireland. In 1858 he exchanged

the Irish work for the N. C. Mission field in Canada, where for six years he travelled in the active work. He had charge of the Howard, Melbourne, London North Clarke, and Mallorytown Circuits, and on the last two was Chairman of the District.

In the year 1864 he was superannuated and retired to the Township of Bayham, where he resided for over eight years, labouring as hard as his strength would permit in preaching, visiting, and doing all that lay in his power for the cause of God on the Bayham and neighbouring circuits. In all the labours of his life, his beloved wife had been his constant and most zealous and efficient helper; but in the year 1872, she was called to her reward. Her death he ever afterwards felt to be the greatest and most irreparable loss of his life. Since that time he lived with his son-in-law, the Rev Edwin Holmes, of the London Conference, and for the last few years with his son, the Rev J. C. Seymour, of the Toronto Conference, rendering, at all times, the most willing and efficient services on the circuits, as he was able. For several years his health has been declining. His last illness was only for a few days. He died in great peace, on August 8th, in the Methodist Parsonage, Markham.

Though not free from faults or imperfections, he was a man of many sterling excellencies. With a physical frame of far more than common strength, he had a strong, clear, decided intellect. His knowledge of theology was extensive and accurate, and his doctrines, which were Wesleyan in the most thorough sense of the term, he held with stubborn firmness, and defended against any assailant, with

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a courage and force that had in it very little ceremony. As a preacher he was clear, concise, logical, intensely evangelical, and, as a rule, very acceptable to the people. As a writer, he was pithy, trenchant, and practical. His piety was deep—the ruling passion of the soul—tinged, possibly with sternness, but sound and true. Few men have ever studied more thoroughly, and loved more intensely the Book of God. His memory is that of the just, and it is blessed.

REV. THOMAS McMULLEN,

Was born in the town of Clones, Ireland, on the 15th of September, 1803, and died at Yorkville, Ontario, on the 11th of December, 1881. At the age of twenty years he came to Canada with his widowed mother and her family, and settled in the vicinity of York. In 1826 he attended a camp-meeting held on the Yonge Street Circuit, and was savingly converted to God. About two years afterwards he was appointed to the office of class-leader, and subsequently to that of exhorter and local preacher. His natural gifts, combined with piety, zeal, and earnestness, attracted the attention of the Church, and after rendering efficient service for one year as a hired local preacher, he was received on trial at the Conference of 1833. For twenty-two years, he laboured in circuit work, occupying some of the most difficult and toilsome fields in the connexion. During these years of hardship and privation he did much work for the Church, and was identified with some fruitful revivals. In 1859 his strength was found

inadequate to the requirements of the circuit assigned him, and he was obliged to seek the relation of a supernumerary minister, which he sustained till the time of his death. For some years past he was confined to his home through infirmity and pain, but his Christian graces were refined and purified in the furnace, and as the conflict with "the last enemy" drew near, there was given him the all conquering faith which enabled him to say: "Thanks be to God, which giveth us victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

PHILIP J. ROBLIN.

Philip J. Roblin was born June 1st, 1797, of U. E. Loyalist parents, in the County of Lennox, Township of Adolphus-town, the cradle of early Methodism in Canada.

He was converted to God in 1817, under the preaching of the Rev. Ezra Adams, and received license as a local preacher from the Rev. Thomas Madden, at Kingston, in 1830. He was ordained a deacon by Bishop Hedding. In 1818 he was married to Jane Casey, and settled as a farmer in the vicinity of Napanee, where his home was ever open to the ministry, and its hospitality shared by many a weary itinerant in those days of toil and travel. While thus situated he was much sought for and actively engaged as a local preacher, and travelled far and near to proclaim the unsearchable riches of Christ, of whom it was his delight both to testify and to preach.

He was an ardent lover and a strong defender of our Church polity, as well as a warm and zealous advocate of the Temperance cause, in the days when its ranks contained

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but a scanty few compared with the hosts that to-day are engaged in this mighty conflict.

By virtue of his office as a deacon he had authority to solemnize the rite of matrimony, and to administer the Sacrament of Baptism, and by permission of Conference also the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, which gave him special qualification for work on Mission-fields, in which capacity he was employed as a hired local preacher by the Chairmen of the Belleville District, from 1868 until 1876. During this time he laboured with untiring zeal, and shared with cheerfulness the privations of those among whom his lot was cast, compensated the while by the joy of turning many souls to righteousness, and helping to make happy many a heart that now recalls his memory with gratitude and tears.

In 1875, at the Picton Conference, he received the relation of a Supernumerary, an act by which the Conference signified its recognition of his worth and work, and very highly appreciated by him as a token of his brethren's love and esteem. He was a very faithful preacher of that Gospel, which he knew by experience, to be the power of God unto salvation. Sound in doctrine, wise in counsel, blameless in life, by manifestation of the truth he commended himself to every man's conscience in the sight of God.

He assured his friends in his last hours of his peace with God, and was often heard to repeat these words of confidence :—

“ Above the rest this note shall swell,
My Jesus hath done all things well.”

He died at Madoc, December 16th, 1881, and passed to that inheritance, in the title to which he had long rejoiced, and into meetness for which he had long been ripening.

REV. RICHARD POTTER,

Was born in Yorkshire, England, in 1830, and died on the 29th of June, 1881, in the 52nd year of his age. He was the son of a devoted Methodist class-leader, and was converted when a mere boy, and began at once to use his talents in the service of God. Called soon to be an exhorter, then a local preacher, he laboured in that capacity with great acceptance and success in his native country, and the Lord blessed his labours in the conversion of many souls.

Coming to Canada in 1857, he was that year received into the ministry of our Church, and laboured effectively during 24 years. His first circuit was Demorestville, and the last circuit on which he laboured was Ameliasburg. He had a glorious revival on his first circuit—scores being converted to God, and on every circuit on which he laboured the Lord greatly blessed him in the conversion of souls.

Brother Potter possessed a strong intellect, which, cultivated by diligent study, gave him a clear perception of truth, which he was enabled to present in a pleasing and edifying manner. He was a good preacher, very methodical, and strong in his appeals to the conscience and the heart. Our brother was naturally amiable, and his natural gifts were strengthened and developed by the power of Divine grace. He was passionately fond of music, was blessed

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with the gift of song, and took intense delight in singing the songs of Zion. The illness which resulted in his death was brief—although admonitory symptoms had existed for some time. Starting on his journey to the Conference of 1881, he was detained at Hastings by nervous prostration, which in about three weeks resulted in death.

Though he was not expecting death, he gave full assurance to those with whom he conversed, that it found him not unprepared. His last utterance to his now bereaved wife and family was, "Love Jesus and meet me in heaven." Thus closed the life of a devoted Christian, and a zealous and successful minister. "He being dead, yet speaketh."

HENRY BAWTINHEIMER.

Bro. Bawtinheimer was born in the Township of Blenheim, in the year 1828. God blessed him with pious parents, they being among the pioneer Methodists of that part of Canada. He seems, like Samuel, to have loved the Lord from his early childhood, for his now sorrowing wife says, "I cannot tell the exact date of his conversion, but I have often heard him say he could not remember the time when he did not pray and earnestly wish to be good."

He having become convinced of his call to preach, entered the Ministry of the Primitive Methodist Church in 1855, and after one year of acceptable service in that connexion, offered himself to the Wesleyan Methodist Church, by whom the offer was accepted. He then travelled, successively, the Bayfield, Stratford, Blyth, Teeswater, and Petrolia Circuits. After labouring one year on the last mentioned, his health

failed, and he had reluctantly to ask for a superannuated relation, and located for five years in Paris.

Seven years ago he was employed by the Chairman of the Owen Sound District to labour on the Cape Croker Mission, and, for four years of that period, he preached with great acceptability to the Indians. He was thus engaged when called from his field of toil to his reward.

Bro. Bawtinheimer possessed good intellectual ability,—was of a generous, sympathetic, sensitive nature, and had a warm loving heart. He was a devoted Christian, a faithful pastor, and loved to preach Christ. In forming an estimate of his character, however, we should, in loving sympathy, remember his long years of sickness—the last twenty years of his life having been, with a few intervals of rest, one long agony of excruciating pain, which shattered his constitution, blighted his prospects, and what, to a highly nervous and sensitive nature like his, was exquisite torture, involved those whom he loved with him in a common misfortune; this threw a sombre shade of gloom over his whole nature, and would, had it not been for the sustaining grace of God, have overwhelmed him in an awful despair. But God did sustain him, for even when his lips were quivering with anguish, he recognized the source of this agony and knew it came with a divine purpose. Though his “chastening” was not “joyous but grievous, nevertheless, afterward it yielded” to him “the peaceable fruits of righteousness,” because he was “exercised thereby.”

During his last illness he was singularly patient and submissive, and constantly raised his heart to God in prayer for His blessing to rest upon himself and family. His un-

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dying devotion to his work was strikingly manifested a few Sabbaths previous to his death, for when the hour of divine service had come, he requested his attendants to carry him to the "house of God," that he might once more proclaim to his flock the story of redeeming love, and point them to that home whose delights he was so soon to experience. He died April 15th, 1882, in the 54th year of his age, "in sure and certain hope of the resurrection to eternal life."

DAVID WILLIAMS.

David Williams was born on the 13th of August, 1837, in the County of Carlow, Ireland; emigrated to Canada in 1852, and two or three years afterwards settled in the Township of Brant, in the County of Bruce, Province of Ontario. In 1856, when he was about nineteen years of age, under the ministry of the Rev. George Jaques, he was soundly converted; and immediately afterward the fruit of this great change became apparent in the zeal which he manifested in every department of Christian work. He entered upon his career of usefulness by conducting family worship in his father's house, and he soon had the satisfaction of seeing the whole family brought to the Saviour. In 1867, after several years of acceptable service as a local preacher, he was called out to fill a vacancy on the Invermay Circuit, under the Chairman of the Owen Sound District; and the following year he was received on trial and appointed to the Artemesia Mission. From this time until he was compelled by failing health to desist, he devoted himself with uncommon zeal and earnestness to the work of

soul-saving. All his strength was exerted in publishing the sinner's friend.

His health first began to show signs of failure while he was engaged in special services in the Village of Dundalk. Such appeared to him to be the spiritual necessities of the place, and such his self-consuming zeal for the salvation of souls, that he appeared to have forgotten himself, and overlooked the fact that there is a limit beyond which we cannot go with impunity, even in our efforts to do good. He won a glorious victory, but he did it apparently at the sacrifice of his life, which he did not hold dear that he might finish his course with joy and the ministry which he had received from the Lord Jesus. He almost fell upon the field. The closing part of his last year at Dundalk was passed in comparative rest; and at the Conference his health appeared to be so far recruited that he requested a circuit, and was, in 1880, appointed to Durham. It soon became apparent, however, that his work was done. A few months ended his earthly labours. The shattered state of his once powerful physical organization compelled him to accept a superannuated relation in 1881; and on the 23rd of January last he passed triumphantly home to heaven.

Brother Williams had great quickness of perception and considerable logical power. He was a man of strong convictions and of indomitable courage. He believed and, therefore, he spoke. His views were in thorough harmony with the standards of Methodism. Wesley and Watson were among his favourite authors. He was a powerful preacher. With a special aptitude for evangelistic work, he was especially successful in leading sinners to the Saviour.

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He was a fervent and devoted Christian, an agreeable colleague, and a judicious superintendent. When death came it found him ready to depart and be with Christ. Though his sun went down while it was yet noon his life was not a failure. He turned many to righteousness, and he shall "shine as the stars for ever and ever."

EDWARD MORROW.

Edward Morrow, the youngest son of William and Isabella Morrow, was born in Fairmount, in the Township of Cavan, Province of Ontario, June 22nd, 1840, and departed this life in the City of Winnipeg, Province of Manitoba, on the 31st of August, 1881. His parents were intelligent and earnest Christians, devotedly attached to the doctrines and Discipline of the Methodist Church; and these things, through their godly example and instruction, were known and loved by Edward from his childhood. At a camp-meeting held at Millbrook, under the superintendence of the Rev. William Young, which was attended by the late Mrs. Phœbe Palmer, he became the subject of a sound Scriptural conversion. After graduating in the Victoria University, he offered himself for the ministry, and was received on trial in 1862. In 1866 he was received into full connexion and ordained. He continued in the active work of the ministry until 1874, when he was compelled, by failing health, to accept superannuation. In 1876, Mr. Morrow settled in Winnipeg, hoping to derive physical invigoration from the bracing atmosphere of the North-West; but though his health was somewhat improved for a time, he

never so far recovered as to be able to resume ministerial work. In his forced retirement, however, he never lost his interest in the Church for which, in various ways, he laboured, according to the measure of his ability and opportunity, to the close of his life. He was an indefatigable Sabbath-school worker, and the true friend of his ministerial brethren. Possessed of more than ordinary capacity for business, he amassed a considerable amount of property, the greater part of which he left to the Church, to be used for the furtherance of the interests of higher education in the North-West. Although until within a very short time of his death he appears to have had no apprehension of the approaching end, when he became aware that his departure was at hand he had no fear. He died in the full assurance of faith, sustained by the confident hope of a blessed immortality.

REV. ALMON P. LYONS,

Was born April 14th, 1842; entered the ministry of the Methodist Church of Canada in 1873; and died on June 16th, 1882.

"Brethren, my heart's desire and prayer to God for Israel is, that they might be saved." ROM. 10-1.

The above was all that Bro. Lyons desired to be entered in the Minutes of Conference.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON METHODIST UNION.

The Committee on Methodist Union beg leave to report that resolutions have been referred to them from eleven District Meetings, and that from the careful examinations of these documents it appears :—

1. That there is a very general desire upon the part of both the ministers and laymen of our Church to see the several bodies of Methodists of this country brought into more intimate and friendly relationship with one another, and that they would be glad, if it could be effected without the sacrifice of anything essential to the integrity and efficiency of Methodism as a whole, that they should be brought into organic union.
2. That in view of the state of feeling in our own Church, your Committee has been gratified to learn that it is by no means confined to our own Church, but that it is very generally shared by the other Methodist Churches of the country. Resolutions expressive of earnest yearnings for Union have been passed by fourteen Quarterly Conferences, and by the three annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and by, at least, one Quarterly Board, and by two District Meetings of the Primitive Methodist body. Conventions have been held at Iroquois and Brampton, in the interest of Methodist Union.
3. Your Committee infer from these facts, as well as from the tone of the documents which have been referred to them, and also from the circumstances connected with the opening up of our great North-West, that the time is especially favourable for the consideration of this subject.

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4. Your Committee, therefore, commend the matter of Methodist Union to the sympathetic and prayerful attention of both our ministers and people. We believe the frank and courteous discussion of it can scarcely fail to be attended with beneficial results; and though we do not close our eyes to the practical difficulties which lie in the way of the consummation of such a Union as is desired—a Union which will make the Methodism of Canada one in form, as we believe it to be one in spirit—we do not doubt, that in answer to our united prayers, wisdom will be given by which these difficulties will be overcome, and a consummation so devoutly to be wished will be secured.

5. In conclusion, your Committee would respectfully suggest that this matter of Methodist Union should be recommended to the favourable consideration of the approaching General Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS,
1881-2.

The Committee on Statistics respectfully submit the following as their report:—

The membership returns show an increase of only 410. But one or two facts should be sufficient to neutralize the depressing influence of this small increase on the minds of the Conference, namely, that three circuits which last year report collectively 135 members, this year make no reports; and, secondly, that this year many hundreds of our people

have left Ontario for Manitoba and the North-West, very many of whom have not yet been registered as members in the regions to which they are gone.

We are thankful to report in connection with our Sunday schools an increase in scholars to the number of 1,427.

All our Connexional Funds are in advance.

REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee on Temperance work beg to submit the following suggestions for your adoption :

1. We regret to learn that an effort is being made to have the Prohibitory Liquor Law of the North-West Territories repealed. We strongly protest against such a step as retrogressive and injurious to the highest interests of that country ; and we suggest that the President, on behalf of this Conference, petition the Dominion Government to make no change in the law that will injure its effectiveness or destroy its prohibitory character.

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2. The necessity for the instruction of the children concerning the moral and physical evils that flow from the use of alcohol is generally admitted, and we rejoice to learn that provision has been made for the instruction of our Public School teachers attending our Normal Schools on this subject. We believe a suitable Temperance Text Book should be introduced into all of our Public Schools, and we recommend that a petition on this behalf be forwarded to the Minister of Education.

3. We believe the power to license the sale of alcoholic liquors in this Province should continue in the hands of the Provincial Government, and we disapprove of the proposition to transfer it to the Dominion Government.

4. Your Committee regret that notwithstanding the repeated and strong recommendations made by this Conference, concerning the use of unfermented wine in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, alcoholic wine is in general use in our Churches. As arrangements have been made for the supply of a pure unfermented article at a reasonable price, it is hoped that it will soon take the place of intoxicating wine at the Lord's Table. We also suggest that the Committee appointed to arrange for the Conference services be instructed to provide unfermented wine for use in the Conference Sacramental Service.

5. That the members of Conference be requested to preach sermons on the subject of Temperance on the second Sabbath in December.

6. It is desirable that Temperance Societies, under the direction of our Churches, should be established wherever practicable, but we especially urge the establishment of Bands of Hope in connection with our Sunday Schools. We also suggest the holding of District Temperance Meetings or Conventions.

7. In order to give effect to these recommendations we suggest that the Conference Temperance Committee be a Standing Committee for the ensuing year; that a Secretary

be appointed, as last year, to have a general oversight of the work ; and that a District Secretary be appointed by each Financial District Meeting, who shall look after the interests of this work in his District. We recommend that a collection be taken at the Annual Conference Temperance Meeting to meet the necessary expenses of the Committee.

8. We acknowledge the receipt of a communication from the Women's Temperance Union, calling attention to the work being done by that organization. We assure the members of the Union that the members of this Conference have watched their labours with deep interest, and we rejoice with them in what they have already accomplished. We wish them God-speed in their noble work, and pledge them our sympathy and earnest co-operation in their efforts for the advancement of the cause of Temperance and Prohibition.

9. The Committee recommend the re-appointment of Rev. T. W. Campbell, B.D., as Secretary.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee beg leave to report :

That a review of the state of the work throughout the Conference is occasion for gratitude to the Great Head of the Church for the success which has attended the labours of our ministers. The spirit of revival is still with us, so that, although there has been a large number of removals during the year, we are enabled to report an increase in membership. A great interest is taken in the public services in the churches ; still there is need for improvement on the part of many who are very careless in this respect.

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We also make special mention that while our Sunday Schools are well attended by the children, very few are to be found in many of our congregations. This is not as it should be. Each child should attend Church at least once each Sabbath; and we recommend that parents bring their children not only into Church but into the same part of the Church with themselves. Our Church and Sabbath School publications and literature are largely circulated. We regret, however, that other than our own find their way into the schools and homes of our people. We cannot speak too strongly in favour of loyalty to our own publishing house. We therefore suggest that our ministers from the pulpit recommend our literature and publications, believing that by so doing it would tend greatly to their circulation.

We deplore that there is a falling off in the number of children learning our Catechism, knowing that a thorough instruction in its truths is the best safeguard against the errors and false doctrines of the times in which we live; we trust that greater attention will be paid to this important part of the work.

The social means of grace are amongst the most vital, to which greater attention should be paid by both ministers and members. A means of grace which has so largely conserved the piety of the Methodist Church as the class-meeting cannot be too diligently and strongly guarded, and if the whole Church will only use this means of grace to accomplish the good it is intended to do, we are satisfied that never in the past has there been such rapid progress as would then be realized. It is a fact that the members of all our Churches and congregations are looking to the ministers for example and instruction on the class-meeting question. We therefore recommend that a sermon bearing directly on this question be preached during the year in all our Churches, and that where possible our ministers show their love and loyalty for this grand institution of Methodism by personal attendance.

We note with pleasure the large increase in the contributions to the funds of the Missionary Society, and yet the rapidly opening fields call for still greater effort in this direction.

It is a cause of thankfulness that some persons whom God has blest have been moved to endow certain chairs of learning in connection with our Church. We trust that this spirit of liberality may extend to all the branches of the Church's interests, so that all our ministers in the regular work may not only be paid in full but also receive a fair salary, and that our superannuated ministers may receive the allowance provided by the Discipline.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

The Committee on Church Property met in the Elm Street Methodist Church, Toronto, on Tuesday, June 16th, 1882.

The Rev. R. Jones was appointed Chairman, and the Rev. P. D. Will, Secretary.

The Committee having carefully considered the several cases brought before them, beg leave to report as follows :—

Toronto District.

PARKDALE CIRCUIT.—That the Trustees of Parkdale Church be permitted to sell their present church and lot, and apply the proceeds towards the payment of the mortgage on said property, and the purchase of new lots for a new church and parsonage.

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YONGE STREET SOUTH.—That the Conference be recommended not to give permission to the Trustees of Asbury Church to sell that property.

Brampton District.

KLEINBERG CIRCUIT.—That the Trustees of Peterman's Church be allowed to sell that property, and apply the proceeds to repairs on Morrow's Church.

Whitby District.

NEWCASTLE CIRCUIT.—That the Trustees of the Liskeard Church be permitted to sell said property, and apply the proceeds on their church debt.

Belleville District.

BELLEVILLE NORTH.—That the Trustees of Bleeker Street Church be permitted to sell one of their church lots, and apply the proceeds on their church debt.

BRIDGEWATER MISSION.—That the Trustees of Queensboro' Church be allowed to sell two of their lots, and apply the proceeds to improvements on the said church.

FLINTON MISSION.—That the Trustees of the old parsonage, in the Village of Flinton, be permitted to sell that property, and apply the proceeds to the debt on the new parsonage in the said village.

Peterboro' District.

MILLBROOK CIRCUIT.—That the Trustees of the Methodist Church and Parsonage, in Millbrook, be permitted to sell said property, and apply the proceeds to a new church and parsonage.

SOUTH MONAGHAN CIRCUIT.—That the Trustees of the Brick Church be permitted to remove said church to the Village of Baillieboro', to sell the old lot, and apply the proceeds to the rebuilding of the church in Baillieboro'.

Bradford District.

That the resolution from Bradford District, recommending the General Conference to create a Court of Appeal, to which disagreements with regard to church sites may be referred, be laid on the table.

Barrie District.

BARRIE CIRCUIT.—That the Trustees of the Burial Ground, upon lot number five, in the First Concession of the Township of Vespra, be permitted to sell that part of the said lot that has not been used for burial purposes, and the remainder thereof, provided the parties interested consent to such sale, and apply the proceeds to church purposes.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee have much pleasure in presenting their Annual Report, seeing that there is a very gratifying increase in several departments of our Sunday-school work, more especially in the funds. The amount raised for Sunday-school purposes exceeds the amount of all former years by nearly \$30. Your Committee are pleased to state that the returns from the respective Districts are more complete than on some former occasions; still, several are very deficient, and, while your Committee have no disposition to cast reflections on anybody, it does seem that more accurate returns would be secured if the requirements of the Discipline, relating to Sabbath-schools, were complied with, especially reading those returns at the District Meet-

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ings. Your Committee also regret that from some important schools no collection has been received. They regret to say, further, that they fear such neglect is to be laid at the door of some of the members of this Conference.

Your Committee regret to have to state, as they have often done, the sad neglect of our incomparable Connexional Catechism by some important schools in the Conference. Your Committee would reiterate that this is not the time to neglect teaching the children and young people of Methodism the grand doctrines which our fathers so nobly preached and taught from house to house. They would respectfully suggest that at least ten minutes, before reading the lesson for the day, should be employed in teaching the Catechism. They think, too, that the Ministers, in their pastoral visits, should remind our people of the importance of teaching their own children more regularly the truths which, as a denomination, we believe ; for sending children to the Sabbath-school is not to be regarded as a substitute for the discharge of parental duties. Your Committee would respectfully suggest that there should be more direct preaching to children ; and, in their judgment, it would be best, say once in three months, to make the public service a children's service. "Feed my lambs," is the command of Christ. Those who have the best sheep bestow most care upon the lambs. The Church should take care of the children, and not wait until their best days have been lost before their conversion is secured. The children of Methodism have no right to be outside the fold of the Church.

It is the opinion of your Committee that increased attention should be given to Ministers' Bible Classes. Of

course, only few of these can be held on Sabbath, but your Committee think, from what they have heard, that they might be held during the week, and would beg most earnestly to recommend them to the notice of the members of the Conference. The Ministers who will attend faithfully to this important department of labour will gain an influence over the young people for good, which will be ample compensation for all the extra labour thus performed.

Your Committee are glad to report that they have heard the most gratifying results respecting the gift of old libraries to poor schools, more especially from Muskoka District. They, however, think that by a little diligence on the part of many, a larger number of books might be collected from the schools in older settlements, and sent to places where they would be received with gladness. The Sunday-school Board has helped many poor Schools, not only with old books, but has also supplemented these with additions from our excellent Book Room, and also supplied them with Hymn Books and other School requisites. Your Committee was told of one place where a library thus donated was read by every family in the locality.

Your Committee would also recommend, in accordance with a resolution sent from Toronto District Meeting, the importance of adopting the plan of systematic collections in all our Sabbath-schools, for Missionary and other purposes; and they are of opinion that it would be well to have some Sabbath set apart as "the Children's Day," when the results of the year's labours could be stated, and the children thus be encouraged to persevere in their noble work. They think, also, that at the regular Missionary Meetings, the children's

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services might be utilised in singing, and other means, which would give additional interest to those services.

Your Committee would once more respectfully call attention to the importance of Ministers looking well after the Sunday-school libraries. Our own Book Room, the largest Publishing House in Toronto, has an immense assortment of suitable books for such purposes. The "Winnowed List," prepared at great expense of time and money, and recent issues, as the "Temperance Battle-Field," should be largely patronized. Look with vigilance at the literature which circulates among the children, for much depends upon this as to what they will be in the future.

In conclusion, your Committee would remind the Conference that the great Head of the Church has promised the Holy Spirit to us and to our children, and even upbraids us for not asking more largely, and, therefore, we should pray earnestly for the descent of the Holy Spirit. Some Sabbath-schools adopt the plan of holding occasional Teachers' prayer-meetings, and their more general practice would be a great benefit.

Your Committee recommend the re-appointment of Rev. E. Barrass, M.A., as Secretary-Treasurer.

REPORT OF MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

Term of Ministerial Service.

In reference to the term of Ministerial Service, the Committee recommend as follows :—

After carefully considering the subject, it is the judgment of this Conference, that it would be for the interest of our work, and tend to promote the prosperity of the Church, to extend the time for a minister to remain on the same field of labour, under certain restrictions as stated below. Therefore,

Resolved, That we memorialize the General Conference so to change our Discipline as to allow the Stationing Committee to appoint a minister to the same circuit for FIVE consecutive years, provided always, that for the three first years the Discipline remain as it is; but for each succeeding year there shall be a two-thirds majority of the Quarterly Official Board desiring the Minister's return. Carried.

Children's Fund.

Several papers have come to us for consideration, and as there is apparently some considerable degree of dissatisfaction in regard to the working of this Fund, your Committee recommend the Conference to memorialize the General Conference to appoint a Commission to make a thorough examination of the practical workings of the Fund, and to recommend such modifications as the facts of the case may seem to call for. Carried.

Children of Probationers.

One Memorial requesting that the Children of Ministers of the late Wesleyan Methodist Conference, born during their father's probation, be placed on the same basis as children of probationers in the late New Connexion, believing that as those brethren when received were aware of the existing regulation, and the number in this position very small, and will speedily lapse together, the Committee recommend no change. Recommended to the General Conference Commission.

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Election of the General Conference Delegates.

In reference to the Election of Delegates to the General Conference, we recommend no interference with our present plan. Carried.

Stationing Committee.

Two resolutions came for consideration, desiring that the Stationing Committee be composed of Laymen as well as Ministers. The Committee do not recommend that change at present. Carried.

Laymen in Annual Conference.

In reference to Lay Representatives in our Annual Conference, the Committee recommend no change. Carried.

Election of Chairmen.

Two Memorials were referred to our consideration relating to the Election of Chairmen by the District Meetings, you Committee do not see any reason for desiring any change Carried.

Moved by the Rev. J. S. Clarke, seconded by the Rev. J. Shaw, "That as certain Resolutions have come up from Missions and Circuits, bearing upon the question of a general Superintendency, this Conference relegate the whole subject to the General Conference for final settlement."

Class-Meetings.

The following is the action of the Conference, "That we recommend that there be no change in the law of our Church in relation to Class-Meetings."

Bible in our Schools.

Being in sympathy with the expressed desire to more extensively afford opportunities to our public schools to obtain Biblical knowledge, and, in view of the object contemplated in the communications from the Presbyterian Synod, and also the Synod of the Episcopalian Church, we recommend that a committee be nominated by the President, to co-operate with the other religious bodies, in order to obtain the object desired. Carried.

Free Public Library.

In relation to the communication requesting an expression of opinion as to the establishment of Free Libraries as authorized by Provincial Statute, we recommend the following: "That as the circulation of books of a useful character is calculated to effect great good throughout the country, we hereby commend the subject to the careful consideration of those concerned." Carried.

Bible Society.

Having received a communication from the Upper Canada Bible Society, in relation to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, and believing that the more widely the Bible is circulated the better for nations and communities, we hereby commend the Society and its objects to the earnest, prayerful, active co-operation of our ministers and people. Carried.

An Amendment to the Report of the Memorial Committee on the State of the Work was moved by the Rev. N. S. Burwash, and seconded by the Rev. J. Webster, asking the General Conference to place the Walkerton District in the London Conference. Carried.

COURSE OF STUDY

TO BE

PURSUED BY CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY
IN THE TORONTO CONFERENCE OF THE
METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA.

Preliminary—English Branches : English Grammar and Composition, Arithmetic, Geography, Ancient History (Schmitz'), Modern History (Collier's British Empire). Biblical History : New Testament History (Smith's). Theology : Wesley's Sermons, i. to lii. ; Wesley on Christian Perfection.

The standard of qualification for young men recommended to be received into our Conferences as Probationers, shall not be lower than fifty per cent., of the marks on the Preliminary Course of Study.

Any Candidate who may present a public-school teacher's certificate of the second class, or a certificate of having passed a matriculation examination at any of our Universities, shall not be required to be examined on the English branches of the Preliminary Course; but he shall be required to pass an examination on the subjects of Biblical History and Theology—two and three, Preliminary Course—before the Examining Board of his Conference, or for the College at which he may be pursuing his studies.

First Year.—Biblical Instruction (Angus' Hand-book, Pt. i.); Biblical History (Smith's Old Testament History); Theology, (Fletcher's Checks, Chaps. i. v.)

Second Year.—Exegesis (Wesley's and Watson's Notes on Matthew; Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on John); Church History (Kurtz' History of the Church to the Reformation, Stevens' History of Methodism to the death of Wesley); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii. Chaps i. to xvii.)

Third Year.—Exegesis (Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on Romans); Rhetoric (Whately's); Church History (Fisher's History of the Reformation); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Parts ii., Chap. xviii. to the end); Pearson on the Creed.

Fourth Year.—Theology (Watson's Institutes, Parts iii; and iv.) Apologetics (Hopkins' Evidences of Christianity; Garbett's Dogmatic Faith); Logic (Whately's); Metaphysics, Hamilton (Bowman's American Edition); Stewart's Active and Moral Powers; Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR GRADUATES IN ARTS.

Candidates who have proceeded to a degree in Arts, or who may do so prior to Ordination, shall pursue the following Course of Study :—

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Language;
Language;
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Preliminary.—Theology (Wesley's Sermons, i. to lii.; Wesley on Christian Perfection); Biblical History (Smith's New Testament).

First Year.—Biblical Introduction (Angus' Hand-book, Part i.); Theology (Fletcher's Checks i. to v.)

Second Year.—Biblical History (Smith's Old Testament); Theology (Garbett's Dogmatic Faith); Hopkins' Evidences of Christianity.

Third Year.—Exegesis (Gospel of Matthew and John in Greek; Wesley's, Watson's, and Whedon's Notes on Matthew and John); Church History (Kurtz' History of the Church to the Reformation); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii. Chaps. i. to xvii. inclusive, and Parts iii. and iv.)

Fourth Year.—Exegesis (Epistles to the Romans in Greek; Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on Romans); Church History (Fisher's History of the Reformation; Stevens' History of Methodism to the death of Wesley); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii., Chap. xviii. to the end); Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR PROBATIONERS AT COLLEGE.

All Candidates on Probation, except Undergraduates in Arts, who are recognized by their Annual Conference as such, on being appointed to College, shall pursue the following Course of Study:—

First Year.—Systematic Theology; Exegesis; the Greek Language; Homiletical Studies; Rhetoric and the English Language; Logic; Church History; Hebrew, or Natural Science.

Second Year.—Systematic Theology; Exegesis of the New Testament in Greek; Homiletical Studies and Elocution; Metaphysics; Church History; Hebrew, or Natural Science.

Third Year.—Historical Theology; Exegesis of the New Testament in Greek; Homiletical Studies; Ethics and Evidences; Old Testament Exegesis, or Natural Science.

The option allowed in No. 5 each year shall be determined by the Faculty of Theology according to their judgment of the circumstances and ability of the student.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE GERMAN WORK.

All Candidates, before being recommended to the Conference to be received on trial, shall pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects :—

Preliminary.—Elements of German Grammar; Nast's Larger Catechism; The Calverin Church History; the Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

After admission on trial, they shall be examined each year during their probation as follows :—

First Year.—Jacoby's Compend of Doctrines and Scripture Proofs; Wesley's Sermons, Vol. i.; Hare on Justification; Kurtz' Sacred History; Webster's General History; Wursts' Grammar.

Second Year.—Wesley's Sermons, Vol. ii.; Wesley on Christian Perfection; Fletcher's Appeal; Saucer's Church History; Wursts' Grammar.

Third Year.—Nast's Introduction to the New Testament; Lisco's Exposition of the Creed; Nast's Wesley and his Coadjutors; Pearson on Infidelity; Ahn's First Course of English.

Fourth Year.—Warren's Logic; Luthard's Apologetics; Harless' Christian Ethics; Ahn's Second Course of English.

The Candidates shall present a written sermon each year on some subject embraced in the Course of Study.

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REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

THE REV. JOHN BREDIN presented the Report of the Board of Examiners, as follows, which was adopted :—

The Annual Meeting of the Board was held on the 21st of June. There were 72 certificates issued, of which there was only one in the third class, 49 in the second class, and 18 in the first class.

The Board of Examiners shall meet the Probationers and Candidates for the Ministry in three sections, on the last Wednesday in April, 1883, at 9 o'clock a.m., as follows :—

THE EASTERN SECTION, comprising the Picton, Belleville, Cobourg, and Peterborough Districts, in Brighton; to be attended by the Revs. E. Barrass, M.A., and J. C. Seymour.

THE CENTRAL SECTION, including the Lindsay, Whitby, Toronto, Brampton, and Walkerton Districts, in the Metropolitan Church, Toronto; the Revs. Dr. Hunter and James Thom, B.A., attending thereat.

THE NORTHERN SECTION, embracing the Algoma, Owen Sound, Collingwood, Bracebridge, Barrie, and Bradford Districts, in Bradford; to be attended by the Revs. John G. Laird and William H. Laird.

The manuscript questions shall be sent to the Secretary not later than the first day of February next. The Secretary will supervise the printing of the questions, and afterwards distribute them.

Examiners shall report results to the Secretary immediately after the examinations.

The Rev. Dr. Withrow moved, and the Rev. John Bredin seconded the following resolutions, which were adopted :—

- I. That This Board recommends the General Conference to provide uniform examination papers for all the six Conferences.

2. That Pope's Theology be the text book for the Conference Examinations, as well as in the Theological Colleges, in the stead of Watson's Institutes.

3. That the General Conference be requested to introduce into the first year's course of study, a second and thorough examination in English Grammar.

The Rev. Dr. Harper was re-appointed Chairman, and the Rev. John Bredin Secretary, for the ensuing year.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING CANDIDATES.

Before a Chairman or Superintendent shall propose a Candidate to the Conference to be admitted on probation, such Candidate must have been a member of our Church for one

year, and a Local Preacher in good standing for six months, and approved and recommended by the Quarterly Official Meeting of the Circuit or Mission on which he resides. He must also pass a satisfactory written examination, and an oral examination such as the Examiners may deem necessary, on the subjects prescribed by the Conference as the Preliminary Course of Study.

No Candidate shall be recommended by any District Meeting, to be received on trial for that year, who does not produce a certificate from the Examining Committee of the District to which he belongs. But the cases of all young men on trial shall be reported to their respective District Meetings.

All recommendations of Candidates to be received on trial shall be made at the February Quarterly Official Meeting, and the Candidates recommended shall appear before the next meeting of the Examining Committee of the District to which they belong.

The District Meeting shall require the Superintendent of the Circuit, from which any young man is recommended to be received on trial, to give a written statement of his religious character, talents, and usefulness, educational advantages and acquirements, employment and means of support, and such other particulars as the meeting may deem necessary; which statement shall be signed by him and recorded in the District Book.

If in any given year the number of Candidates recommended by the District Meetings shall be greater than the Stationing Committee deem it prudent to employ for that year, the Examining Board shall meet at Conference, and determine who are the most suitable to be employed for our Itinerant work, and who are to be placed on the List of Reserve; being governed by their own class lists and those of the District Meetings.

The District Meeting shall examine, as heretofore, all the

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Candidates in regard to their religious experience and belief of our doctrines, together with their general qualifications and suitability for our Itinerant work, and shall arrange them in three classes, according to the results of the Examination.

Nothing in our present Course of Study shall be understood to prevent a District Meeting, in special cases, from recommending a Candidate to the Conference for reception on trial, after examination by the Chairman, before the District Meeting, on the subject of the preliminary Course of Study.



Special Resolutions.

In Memoriam—Rev. Dr. Ryerson.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Nelles, seconded by the Rev. D. B. Madden,—

“That this Conference desires to record its sense of the deep loss sustained in the removal by death of the late Rev. Egerton Ryerson, D.D., LL.D., for nearly sixty years a minister of the Methodist Church of Canada, and taking a prominent part in all her movements and enterprises.

“To most of us from our early childhood the name of Egerton Ryerson has been as a household word, and we learned to esteem and love him even before we were capable of estimating his character, or the greatness of the service which he was rendering to his own and coming generations; and the knowledge of him which we have been permitted to acquire in our riper years has only tended to deepen the impressions of him which we received in early days.

“As the fearless and powerful champion of civil and religious liberty, and of the equal rights of all classes of his countrymen, he is associated in our memory with the patriotic and Christian struggles of a past generation, which resulted in securing to our beloved land as large a measure of liberty as is enjoyed by any country under the sun. In respect to the incomparable system of Public Instruction, to the perfecting of which he devoted so many years of his active and laborious life, and with which his name must

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ever be associated, we feel that he has laboured, and we have entered into his labours. We can hardly conceive how either our country or our Church could have been what they are to-day, but for his fidelity and the work which he accomplished.

"The lively interest which he took in every patriotic, Christian, and philanthropic movement, especially those which tended to increase the influence and usefulness of his own Church—the zeal with which he laboured for them, and the large-hearted, generous liberality with which he contributed of his means for their support—awaken our gratitude and thankfulness, and will be a perpetual inspiration in our efforts to promote those objects which lay so near his heart, and to further the interests of that cause which he served so well.

"Standing, as we are to-day, with bowed heads and stricken hearts beside the grave which has just closed upon the mortal remains of our venerated and departed brother, while we gratefully recall the great work which he was in the order of Providence permitted to accomplish, we would especially recognize the grace of God in his life and character.

"We delight to cherish the memory of his penitent and childlike faith in Christ—the sinner's only Saviour and hope—and of those graces of the Holy Spirit which gave so much beauty and sweetness to his character, and which were more and more conspicuous in his declining years.

"Though Dr. Ryerson was a man of positive views, and devotedly attached to his own Church, he was distinguished for his comprehensive charity, and his genuine appreciation of great and good men from whom he differed widely in opinion. His goodness no less than his greatness will serve to keep his memory fresh among us, and the recollections of his virtue is to us a powerful incentive to a fuller consecration to the service of God."

That this Conference having heard the report of the Book Steward, we desire to express our great satisfaction with the

We also tender our sincere thanks to the Book Steward, under whose able and efficient management this highly satisfactory state of prosperity has been attained.

And we beg to assure Dr. Carroll that in his declining years, as during the whole period of his ministerial career, he lives in the affection and esteem of his brethren; and we pray that the evening of life may be to him cloudless and serene, and that when the Master calleth, the messenger may be Love.

Rev. Thomas Crosby.

Moved by the Rev. E. R. Young, seconded by the Rev. S. J. Hunter,—

That having been delighted by the visit, and charmed by the addresses of the Rev. Thos. Crosby, this Conference has much pleasure in recording its profound thankfulness to God for raising up for the important and difficult work of preaching the glad tidings of salvation to the long-neglected and degraded tribes of Indians in British Columbia, a brother so eminently qualified for that arduous, and yet Christ-like work, as the Rev. Thomas Crosby.

That the cordial thanks of this Conference are due, and are hereby presented to the Rev. J. Herbert Starr, retiring Treasurer of the Children's Fund, for the valuable service rendered in the supervision of the fund during the past eight years.

Sympathy with Rev. Dr. Wood.

Moved by the Rev. Richard Jones, seconded by the Rev. John G. Laird,—

Resolved,—That this Conference learning that the venerable Dr. Wood is unable, through physical indisposition, to be present, the official letter-writer be requested to send him a letter, assuring him of our profound sympathy, and that our sincere prayer is that his valuable life be long spared to the Church.

Dr. Jeffers' Resolution on Conference Services.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Jeffers, seconded by the Rev. E. B. Harper, D.D.,—

That the Nominating Committee shall, immediately after fixing the plan of each ensuing Conference, proceed to nominate a Committee on Conference Services, who shall prepare the programme of the public services and anniversaries connected with the meeting of said ensuing Conference.

Relating to the Bible Christian Deputation.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Dewart, seconded by the Rev. W. Briggs,—

That this Conference has heard with great satisfaction the fraternal words of Christian greeting of the Rev. Frederick Wm. Bourne, Editor and Book-Steward of the Bible Christian Church in England; and the Rev. Edward Roberts, of Toronto; the honoured deputation from the Bible Christian Church, of Canada, whom we cordially welcome, both on their own account, and on account of the earnest and successful branch of Methodism which they represent. With regard to Mr. Bourne, who is now, we understand, on a short visit to Canada, we specially pray that by the good Providence of God he may be brought safely back to his home and family; and that he may be richly blessed in the important work which his Church has committed to his charge.

Women's Missionary Society.

Resolved,—That this Conference desires to record its great gratification at the formation of a Woman's Missionary Society, in connection with the Methodist Church of Canada, and at the establishment of branches of this valuable auxiliary to our Missionary work in different parts of the country. We regard these societies as giving promise of great and growing benefit to our Church, as enlisting the Christian sympathies and consecrated energies of the women of Methodism on behalf of their sister women, and of destitute and orphan children in heathen lands, and among the Indian tribes, and on behalf of the general interests of our Missionary work. We strongly recommend the formation wherever practicable of such auxiliary societies, and commend them to the hearty and practical sympathy of the Church.

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Conference Prayer-meeting.

Moved by the Rev. J. E. Sanderson, and seconded by the Rev. Dr. Dewart,—

That the Conference Prayer-meeting be held at the opening of Conference instead of noon. Carried.

Thanks to Dr. Jeffers for Sermon.

Moved by the Rev. E. R. Young, and seconded by the Rev. W. Young,—

That this Conference has much pleasure in placing upon record its high appreciation of the very eloquent and instructive sermon preached in the Metropolitan Church, Wednesday evening, by the Rev. Dr. Jeffers, Chairman of the Belleville District, and earnestly prays that the great Head of the Church may long preserve his life and health, that for many years to come the Church may be edified by his able counsels and eloquent sermons and addresses.

Relating to the Ryerson Chair.

Resolved,—That we, the members of the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada, have been pleased to learn that steps have been taken to endow a Chair of Moral Philosophy and Christian Evidences in Victoria University in honour of the late Dr. Egerton Ryerson, to be known as the Ryerson Chair. We believe that while this will afford timely and needed aid to an institution which is doing a great and good work for the Church and the country, no more fitting tribute could be paid to our venerated departed friend and brother, who during his lifetime took so deep an interest in all institutions of learning, particularly in Victoria University, nor could any monument that could be erected more appropriately perpetuate his memory. We rejoice, therefore, in the success which has already attended this movement, and while we cheerfully pledge ourselves to do what we can for

its furtherance, we heartily commend it to the generous consideration and liberal assistance of the thousands of our people who loved Dr. Ryerson so well, and who in so many ways and on so many occasions have evinced their interest in our noble University.

Relating to Children's Fund.

Moved by the Rev. J. B. Sanderson, seconded by the Rev. W. Burns,

"That we recommend that the Children's Fund be raised by assessment on the circuit according to the salaries paid, as reported for the preceding year, including salaries, board, and fuel; that said assessment be a graduate assessment on each hundred dollars paid, viz.: on \$100, one per cent.; on \$200, two per cent.; on \$300, three per cent., &c., according to the amount paid." Lost.

Moved by the Rev. W. W. Leech, seconded by the Rev. J. C. Wilson,

"That the ensuing General Conference is hereby respectfully requested to so change, or amend, our Discipline with respect to the Children's Fund. That instead of the amount required for that Fund being raised by per capita tax of the membership as at present, it shall be raised by taxation on the amount paid by each Circuit or Mission for ministerial support.

"That any minister receiving \$1,200 or upwards, his children shall not be considered claimants on the Fund."

Theological Union.

Moved by the Rev. T. W. Campbell, seconded by the Rev. W. J. Young,

"That the Special Committee on Conference Arrangements be recommended to devote, either Wednesday or Sabbath evening, to a service under the auspices of the Theological Union."

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Letters of Sympathy.

The letter writers were directed to send letters of sympathy to the widow of the late Rev. A. P. Lyons; also to Rev. Michael Fawcett, in his illness, which detained him from Conference.

Standing Resolutions.

Order of Connexional Collections.

The collections in aid of the Connexional Funds shall be taken up in the following order, viz. :—

1. CONTINGENT FUND.—In the months of September and March.
2. SUPERANNUATED MINISTERS' FUND.—In the month of October or November.
3. EDUCATIONAL FUND.—In the month of February or April.
4. SABBATH SCHOOL FUND.—In the month of September.
5. GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.—In the month of July.

Collections for Connexional Fund.

That it is the judgment of this Conference, that when collections for Connexional purposes are appointed to be taken in any of our churches, the whole of such collections throughout the day shall be appropriated to the respective Funds to which they are related, without any deduction for the Circuit, or any Trust or other Fund.

Ministers Removing.

That in case of ministers removing, they shall be held responsible for the supply of the pulpit on their old Circuits two Sabbaths, and for the supply of the new the third Sabbath after the Conference.

Ordination Sermon.

That the Ordination Sermon be preached by the ex-President of the Conference.

Application for Additional Preachers, and List of Reserves.

That in future no application or recommendation for the appointment of a young man, in addition to the Superintendent in any Circuit, shall be entertained by the Stationing Committee, unless such application is accompanied by a distinct pledge from the Official Quarterly Meeting of such Circuit that, at the end of four years, they will receive a married man in place of such single man.

2. That the Chairmen of Districts are hereby instructed to bring before the Quarterly Official Meetings of Circuits, on which a married and a single man have been stationed for the past four years the necessity for making provision for two married men at the earliest practicable date.

3. That we recommend the formation by the President and Stationing Committee of a "List of Reserves," upon which shall be placed the names of all young men recommended for the ministry whose services are not imperatively required to supply the work.

4. That when young men are recommended for the work of the ministry, and are placed upon the "List of Reserves," it shall be distinctly understood that their probation shall not commence till they are appointed to a Circuit by the proper authorities.

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Grade of Certificates of Probationers and Candidates.

That the District Meeting be required to include in their recommendations, concerning Probationers and Candidates, the average secured by them in their literary examinations, as well as the grade of their Certificates.

Constitution of the Toronto Conference Missionary Committee.

The Missionary Committee shall consist of the President and the Secretary of Conference, the Chairmen of Districts, the General Secretaries, and the Lay Treasurer of the Society, and one layman from each District, to be appointed by the laymen at the May District Meeting.

Resolved,—That as the Constitution of the General Society makes no provision for the transmission of funds to the Head Office, it shall be an instruction to the Treasurer of all Committees to transmit promptly to the General Treasurers all contributions received by them.

CONFERENCE PUBLIC SERVICES.

I.—Communion Service.

On Wednesday evening a masterly sermon, suitable to the occasion, was delivered by the Rev. Wellington Jeffers, D.D., of Belleville, after which the ministers and a large number of lay friends united in the observance of the Lord's Supper. The entire service was one of sacred and hallowed delight.

II.—Missionary Meeting.

The Annual Missionary Meeting was held on Thursday evening. The President presiding. Addresses of thrilling interest were delivered by the President, the Revs. James Woodsworth, W. J. Hewitt, and Thomas Crosby.

III.—Reception of Young Men.

The public reception of the Candidates for the Ministry who had completed their term of probation took place on Friday evening. The President, who occupied the chair, delivered an impressive address, explanatory of the nature and object of the meeting. After the Secretary had called the names of the candidates to be received, the following brethren related their Christian experience and call to the ministry :—

The resolution for the reception of the Candidates for Ordination was moved by the Rev. George Cochran, D.D., and seconded by the Rev. John S. Clarke, in addresses of great power and eloquence. The class was addressed in words of wise counsel by the Rev. E. B. Harper, D.D.

IV.—Sabbath Services.

The love-feast on Sabbath morning, which was conducted by the Rev. Geo. Brown, was "a season of grace and sweet delight." The President of the General Conference, Rev. Dr. Douglas, preached the official sermon from part of the 13th and 14th verses of the 3rd chapter of Paul's Epistle to the Philippians. The Conference gave expression to their appreciation of the Dr.'s labours in a resolution which will be found elsewhere. After the sermon, the President of the Conference, assisted by the senior ministers, ordained the candidates for the ministry, by the imposition of hands in accordance with the provisions made by the Discipline of the Church. The ex-President preached to a delighted congregation in the evening.

V.—Sunday-school Meeting.

The Sabbath-school Meeting was one of more than ordinary interest. It was held on Monday evening, June 19th, the Rev. Dr. Burwash in the chair. The Rev. Edward Barrass, M.A., read the report, which indicated a very

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satisfactory state of our schools. Deeply interesting addresses were delivered by the Revs. Dr. Burwash, J. W. Totten, A. Browning, and Thomas Crosby.

VI.—Educational Meeting.

The Annual Meeting in the interests of the Educational Society was held on the evening of Tuesday, the 20th June. The venerable Richard Jones in the chair. Thoughtful and eloquent addresses were delivered by the Revs. Richard Jones, J. A. Chapman, M.A., George Washington, M.A., William Burns, Dr. Nelles, and Dr. Burns, of the London Conference.

VII.—Temperance Meeting.

The Conference Temperance Meeting was held on Wednesday evening, June 21st. The chair was ably occupied by the Rev. Thomas Cullen. The Revs. T. M. Campbell, B.D., J. A. McClung, Thomas Crosby, J. C. Seymour, and James Scott, addressed the meeting on the evils of intemperance, and the best method of their cure.

An interesting feature of the evening was the presentation of an Address, and a beautiful Photographic Group, by the Ordination Class of this year, to the honoured President of this Conference. The President acknowledged the gift in suitable terms, thanking the Class for the present, and assuring them of peculiar interest in their welfare for the future.

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PASTORAL ADDRESS
OF THE
METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA, TORONTO
CONFERENCE,
TO THE
CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

BELOVED BRETHREN,—

We greet you in the name of the Lord Jesus. "Grace unto you, and peace be multiplied." We rejoice that there has been given to you, through the Holy Ghost, the spirit "of power and of love and of a sound mind;" and that you have not been "ashamed of the testimony of our Lord, who hath saved us and called us with an holy calling" to make "manifest the savour of His knowledge by us in every place."

In all the sessions of Conference we have had tokens of the presence of God. The religious services have been seasons of gracious, Divine manifestations. The review of the year has revealed to us considerable and gratifying progress, and we see with great joy new paths opening before us for future extension and usefulness.

The number of members reported in the Toronto Conference is 37,687. There is also a large increase

in all the connexional funds, this is specially noticable in the Superannuation Fund. Our Sunday-schools have an increased attendance of over fourteen hundred scholars. For every soul added to the Church, and for the temporal prosperity bestowed upon us, we glorify God.

It is pleasant to remember that in sending to you our loving pastoral we are shut up to a sublime alternative. Our approach to "the flock of God, over which the Holy Ghost hath made us overseers," is in the name of the Good Shepherd who gave His life for the sheep. Indeed, there is no other name stamped with imperishable significance! The ages reached their highest splendour when to Jesus of Nazareth "who is over all, God blessed for ever," they gave eternal pre-eminence. There is touching pathos and profound importance in repeating our strongest assurances in Christ's mission and power to save to the uttermost, since we confront an age in which the principles He died to declare are being assailed with violence and unblushing insolence. Moreover, the opposition comes from those, the brilliance of whose intellects and the excellency of whose lives, only serve to make their attacks the more difficult to resist and overcome.

These scientific and skeptic adventurers are marching through the domains of truth as their own preserves, and are endeavouring to strike down everything with which their perverted tastes do not sympathize. These assaults are made with the old weapons of attack, which have been refurbished for the fray by the materialism so characteristic of the times.

Remember, dear brethren, that the faith of Christianity has been kindled into greater enthusiasm by

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repeated contests with the foe. Such struggles lead the soul to look upward, and, while conflicts shock and shatter the world, they condense and inspire the vigour of faith. The severe scrutiny to which the truth has been subjected has served to lay bare to the world the broad foundation upon which the superstructure sublimely reposes. And the storms of opposition now breaking are clearing the atmosphere, and producing a purer air in which to toil as defenders of the faith.

All, therefore, who enjoy life through the Word, can well afford to be calm, and stand unmoved amid the densities of secular doubt. "Watch ye, stand fast in the faith, quit you like men, be strong."

We rejoice at the deep interest shown in the Revised Version of the Holy Scriptures. A gifted committee of the wisest divines has devoted many years of gratuitous service to accomplish this sacred task. The millions of copies sold testify to the interest of the people in all that pertains to Scripture, and the result gives to scholars and students of theology the maturest fruits of modern Greek scholarship.

The responsibility of Christians to "search the Scriptures," and possess a more accurate knowledge of the things of God has become increasingly important, while the thorough instruction of the young is more necessary than ever. As the entrance of the Word giveth light, let no labor be accounted too great to open the portals of the youthful mind to that Divine Light which illuminates the intellect, purifies the heart, and gilds the expanding horizon of the coming manhood with promise of a glorious triumph. Amid the sanctities and endearments of home continue with increased fidelity the method of loving education.

The words that a mother's lips whisper live, fragrant and beautiful, with undecaying power in the human heart, and are the strongest forces employed by the Divine Spirit in building up the tiers of a youthful existence for holiest purposes. "Instead of thy fathers shall be thy children, whom thou mayest make princes in all the earth."

Need we, dear brethren, call more careful attention to the privileges of secret and family prayer! Be assured that true elevation of character and fervour of Christian spirit result from the sacred influences of devotion. The memory of these quiet hours with God live like an abiding inspiration to strengthen in temptation, and to animate in duty; while the spell of domestic worship over childhood exceeds all expression. In view of the social elements which are hurrying us along in this restless age, we would repeat with emphasis the words of the Master,—“Thou when thou prayest enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to thy Father who is in secret; and thy Father who seeth in secret shall reward thee openly.”

Our conviction of the utility and Scriptural character of class-meetings is as strong as ever. Without reference to the subject as a mere matter of discipline and law, nothing would more delight the hearts of your ministers and fill them with true Methodist joy in the Lord, as to see a revival of the time-honoured and distinctive institution of our Church throughout the entire connexion.

Religious ideas which usually gain their expression through temple services, are the greatest forces in the universe. Since time writes no changes on man's aspirations, the lessons of the sanctuary are ever help-

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ful and precious. Here truth commands the homage of the intellect, and is at once a light to illumine and a power of defence. Here moral influences touch man's deepest nature, and uplift it, and adorn it, and crown it with the beauties of holiness. And amid the inevitable sorrows and disappointments that sooner or later overshadow every life. Thy way of consolation, "O God, is in the sanctuary." Attention to these voices of God's house will, at the same time, redeem the day of rest from secular dissipation, and fill the home with the sweet enjoyments of Christian life.

Be thankful for a wise Church organization. Its distinctive attributes are the outgrowth of long experience. The principles upon which Methodism rests are immutable. The policy which embodies and gives effect to the principles is subject to those modifications which the expanding wisdom of the Church and the varying posture of the age may require to render her more effective in her Divine mission; but the impress of blessing which has marked the history of her existing organization is the highest sanction to its adaptation, and the clearest indication of its utility.

Our legislative body holds its third quadrennial Conference this fall. It will unquestionably fully represent the intelligence and devotion of the Church. Into its hands may safely be committed every interest. Of the results we have no fear whatever. May your earnest prayers linger around this august assembly during its sessions in September next! Remember the mighty works done in our Father's days and in the "old time before them." These Divine displays require to be constantly repeated, otherwise the machinery, however beautiful, is powerless for goo

"Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us, but unto Thy name give glory, for Thy mercy and for Thy truth's sake," is the language of our hearts to-day for the evidences of success afforded by the recent Dominion census returns. We accept these indications of growth so favorable to Methodist communities, with gratitude. We trust they are but the prelude of greater enlargement; and we hope their highest inspiration will be reached in our supreme consecration to God on behalf of the thousands of souls committed to our care!

Again,—Never was the Apostolic admonition more worthy of being remembered than at this hour,—
"They that will be rich fall into temptation and a snare." The ambition to acquire wealth has become all-absorbing, and pervades all classes of society. We cannot close our eyes to the fact that the ages have unconsciously waited for the opening of the golden gateways of our great North-West. Brilliant opportunities invite forward, but awful dangers threaten the advance. With judicious enterprises we are in deepest sympathy. Adventure, when sustained with prudence, is a good tonic, and is consonant with the very genius of Christianity. But the spirit of reckless speculation has kindled the fires of an unrestrained avarice, which devours and destroys the spirit of simple piety, and issues in utter shipwreck of faith and of a good conscience. The higher the speed the greater the oscillation and the fewer the safeguards, while the more terrible the plunge when the rails of a steady run cannot be kept! Your life, beloved brethren, is not so much a question of success as it is of character. Poverty unimpeached is more to be desired than wealth stained with dishonour.

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Let those who go forth assured that the pillar of cloud leads them, covenant that they will stand by the Church of their fathers; and taking the necessary credentials of membership, they will gather into the fellowship of saints, and make the land of their adoption resound with the songs of the regenerate, and coming generations will arise to call them blessed.

We are pleased to inform you that your prompt liberality in contributing to the Relief and Extension Fund has relieved our missionary society of all debt; and we have also satisfaction in stating that the income of the year shows a commendable increase. But we desire earnestly and especially to impress the minds of the whole Church with the fact that the missionary work is so great as to demand our full energies and resources in meeting the openings which Divine Providence is making upon us to keep pace with the expanding territory of our country. Your esteemed and devoted missionary, Rev. Thos. Crosby, whose stirring and eloquent appeals have moved all hearts, returns at once, with his wife and family, to British Columbia, accompanied by several assistants.

One of the distinctive features of the times is the growing spirit of union. The Conference recognized this fact, and appointed a committee to consider the question in all its bearings. We regard this as one of the fruits of the Ecumenical Council, held last autumn in London, which great assembly marked a new era in the Methodism of the world, and authenticated the unity of faith and loyalty to the essentials which distinguish our Church everywhere.

The position which our Church has reached in the work of education must be ascribed to the fidelity of those early founders who have given to us educational

institutions, whose success is the surest proof of the loyalty of their sons to this sacred trust. These schools and colleges are liberally patronized by painstaking students; and they require the prayers, as well as the gifts, of the people to increase their efficiency and meet the necessities of our rapidly-growing country. That Church which counts among her resources the strength and value of ripe scholarship, and takes commendable steps to diffuse the benefits of a liberal education will reach, in coming time, the lofty and coveted position of pre-eminence among the ecclesiastical systems of this great Dominion.

We have to record with thankfulness the continued success of our publishing interests in spreading abroad a truly Christian literature, and we commend our excellent periodicals as worthy of a wider patronage on the part of our people generally. We may well rejoice at the issue and introduction of a Hymn Book, judicious in its selections, graceful in its arrangement, and embodying the choicest lyrics which sanctified genius has given to the modern Church, and which is not only equal, but, perhaps, superior to any existing book of Church psalmody.

"The fathers, where are they, and the prophets, do they live forever?" With bowed heads and dimmed eyes we stand to-day before the memory of the mighty dead. Eminent names are found on the year's death roll.

Prominent on the list is that of Lachlin Taylor, the recollection of whose eloquence as a preacher, and abounding, self-denying service as Secretary of our Missionary Society, will abide as the heritage of the Church.

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Moreover, we mourn the departure of the chiefest son and the most honoured minister of Canadian Methodism. Our Apollos for eloquence, our Nestor for wisdom, whose sweet simplicity of character and great powers of mind for sixty years illuminated not only our own Church, but the land in which he lived, laboured, and died. "A prince and a great man has fallen in our midst; the last of the illustrious three who bore the name of Ryerson has gone to enrich the heavens."

A grateful Church intends to hold in honour this name, and attach it forever to that University he loved so well and served so long.

Life passes with rapidity, and calls upon us to increased fidelity to the Lord Jesus. As an oration annually delivered over the tomb of Leonidas produced a yearly crop of heroes, so may the weaving of our chaplet of memory animate every believer to greater heroism of purpose and daring of achievement. "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might; for there is no work, nor device, nor knowledge, nor wisdom in the grave, whither thou goest." "My beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for as much as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord."
