# British Traps Snap on German Submarines; Four Are Gone

Steel Cages Enclose Two Underwater Craft At **Entrance To Firth of Forth**

New York, March 30—C. F. Bertelli, wires to the "American" from Paris, that the allies, after numerous conferences, have decided to give Constantinople to Belgium for the wholesale ruin of her country.

He says that Russia's claims to Constantinople did as much as the winter weather to delay naval action by England and France, against the Dardanelles and the Russian difficulty was rendered all the greater by the uncompromising attitude of Roumania, which made it quite clear to England and France that she would much rather forego possession of Transylvania than see Russia in command of the Bosphorus at Constantinople.

Then it was that European diplomats found what they term, the "elegant solution" of oftering Constantinople to Belgium. To such a way out none of the Entente allies can object. It is also believed that it will be quite acceptable to Greece, Bulgaria and Roumania and, of what is of much greater importance to Italy also. Believed Latter Were Captured and Forced To

London, March 30—A Toronto Mail and Empire London cable says:—

The effectiveness of the steel submarine traps which have been put down to guard British rivers and harbors has been shown by the fact that two German submarines have been caught in the Firth of Forth. In addition, a third has been sunk off the coast of Haddingtonshire and a fourth was rammed on last Wednesday disabled, captured and towed into Leith, where the crew was taken prisoners.

No description of these nets can be given, and no information of their effectiveness has been allowed to go forth by cable, but at this date, since King George himself has inspected one of the captured submarines and it is talked about freely, no harm can come from letting the world know of it. The first of the submarines, one of the very large type, was caught in the net of the Firth of Forth, which held it at the bottom until it was found by inspectors. Engineers and divers with great dredges went to work and succeeded in lifting the machine and towing it to a dock. When the hatches were finally opened, an investigation showed twenty-nine dead German sailors and their officers. In addition there were four Scotch fishermen. Today the names of those men stand very high in their native land.

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It was apparent that the submarine bound on a voyage of destruction up the Firth, came upon the men fishing. She took them prisoners and ordered them to steer their craft safely up to a point where they could accomplish their mission.

It has been asked "Did the fishermen, knowing of the traps the huge steel nets stretched here and there, deliberately steer the submarine into one of them." They were caught and they died.



### WAR SERVICE BADGES FOR MEN OF THE SEA

Effort to Have Them Available For All British Merchant Ships


Thanks to the assistance of Cathcard Wason, M. P., of their parliamentary committee, the Imperial Merchant Ser-vice Guild have been instrumental in

vice Guild have been instrumental in the Admiralty deciding upon granting "war service badges" to captains, officers and men of British merchant transports. The guild have urged the extension of this principle to all merchant ships in consideration of the work they are doing under circumstances of considerably enhanced personal peril.

Captain Basil E. Peto, M. P., chairman of the parliamentary committee of the guild, advanced this suggestion in the British House of Commons when Dr. T. J. Macnamara said in reply that the proposal involved a very considerable extension of the present scope of the scheme for distributing war badges.

He promised, however, to take an opportunity of discussing it with the president of the Board of Trade, but beyond that he said he was afraid he could give no undertaking.

Supplanting Captain Peto's suggestion, the guild have now addressed special appeals both to the Admiralty and to the president of the Board of Trade. From the latter the guild have received an acknowledgement to the effect that the matter is receiving his attention.

### Germans Fire On Captured Vessel As Those On Board Leave; Many Are Killed and They Include Women

London, March 29, 10.15 p. m.—Upwards of 150 lives were lost in the sinking by German submarines of the African liner Falaba and the British steamer Aguila, bound from Liverpool for Lisbon.

The Falaba, which was torpedoed in St. George's Channel Sunday afternoon, carried a crew of 90 and about 160 passengers, and of this total only 140 were rescued. Of those rescued eight died later from exposure

The Aguila had a crew of 42, and three passengers, and of these I as of the crew and all the passengers were lost.

In both cases, on sighting the submarine, the captains tried to escape by putting on all speed possible, but the underwater craft overtook the steamers, showing that Germany now has some of her most modern submarines engaged in the blockade operations against England.

The captain of the Falaba, who was one of those lost, was given five minutes to get his passengers and crew into the boats, but, according to survivors, before this was possible, a torpedo was fired striking the engine room and causing a terrible explosion. Many persons were killed, and the steamer sank in ten minutes.

Trawlers which happened to be in the vicinity rescued most of those who were saved; others got away in the boats, which were ready for launching, and which were quickly lowered when the order was given to abandon the ship.

The captain of the trawler Ottilie, whom the commander of the submarine told of the sinking of the Aguila, went to the rescue and picked up three boats, containing nineteen of the crew. The fourth boat, which contained the other members of the crew, could not be found, and it is presumed that she foundered. On their arrival at Fishguard several of the crew wore bandages, having been wounded by the fire from the submarine.

Another Dutch steamer, the Amstel, of 853 tons, has been blown up by a mine off Flamborough Head, but her crew were rescued.

London, March 29, 9.35 p. m.—"We are fighting Germany, Austria and Drink, and so far as I can see the greatest of these three deadly foes is drink," said David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, replying today to a deputation of the Shipbuilding Employers Federation, the members of which were unanimous in urging that, in order to meet the national requirements at the present time, there should be a total prohibition during the period of the war of the sale of intoxicating liquors. This should apply not only to public houses but also to private clubs, so as to operate equally with all classes of the community.



report that the German submarines which are now so active in the English Channel and the North Sea are accompanied by a supply or "mother" ship is confirmed by the story told by Adolph Doehler, of Baltimore, Md., who was an operator on the British steamship Glenartney, which was torpedoed by a German submarine on March 18.

Doehler says that after the Glenartney went down there was a steamer stationary about two miles away which could see clearly what had happened and yet made no attempt to rescue the crew of the steamer. Shortly after taking to the boats he saw the periscope of a submarine, which made off towards the steamer, and both went away together. There were forty men in the crew of the Glenartney. One was drowned and the others escaped in their boats and reached New Haven.


